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

To the Selectmen of Antrim:

In submitting our annual report we incorporate therein the reports of our High School Principal, Supervisor of Music and Drawing, Supervisor to the Superintendent, also his report to us. These reports explain quite fully the work that has been done and is being done in our schools. As they show the excellent progress that is being made, it seems unnecessary to make further remarks along this line. In compliance with the State law, we take this means of notifying you of the amounts required for general school purposes, and our estimate of what is needed for text books and scholars' supplies and flags and appurtenances.

Perhaps a word of explanation is needed in regard to these last two items. We are asking for just the amounts we have spent the past year. We explained in our last report that we needed \$400 for books and supplies and \$10 for flags, etc., and you raised these amounts. Therefore if you raise the amounts this year that we have spent we will have for use the coming year \$400 for books and supplies and \$10 for flags, etc., the same as last year.

We will also make an estimate, based on previous reports and existing conditions, of the amounts we shall probably receive from outside sources:

As the school buildings throughout the district are in very good repair, we think nothing extra will be needed for this purpose. The balance of money on hand will probably be sufficient to pay all bills to the 1st of May, when the taxes for this year should be available.

We recommend selling the school houses in Divisions 5, 6 and 7, and have an article in the warrant to bring the question before the voters. These buildings have not been used for several years, and there is no apparent need of them in the future. It seems an unnecessary bill of expense to keep them in repair and insured.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Members of the School Board:

I respectfully submit the following report concerning the schools of Antrim for the year ending February 15th, 1911.

Since the printing of the last report, there has been an unusual number of changes in the teaching force. Miss Grace Bennett resigned her position as teacher of the grammar school at the Center at the close of the winter term, and was succeeded by Miss Sarah A. Jones, a Normal graduate and a teacher of experience, who remained with us during the spring term. At the close of the school year or soon after, the following teachers tendered their resignations: Mr. LeRoy M. Handy, the principal of the High school; Miss Gertrude E. Neville, assistant; Miss Alice G. Markey, assistant and teacher of the ninth grade; Miss Ida M. Lord, teacher of the primary school at the Center; Miss Maudeeine S. Baker, of the East School, and Miss Helen D. Daggett, the supervisor of music. The names of their successors appear in a tabular statement later in this report. It should be noted, however, that on account of the small enrollment at the Center, it seemed best to engage but one teacher for that school instead of two, as has been the custom heretofore.

Last year, Miss Winifred Cochrane exchanged work with the other grade teachers of the South School, and in this way supervised the work in drawing. As she did not care to continue to do this, it looked for a time as though we would not have any supervision of the work in that subject. During the fall term, however, an opportunity came to unite with other towns and thus secure the services of a teacher trained particularly for the work. By taking advantage of this, we now have a supervisor of drawing, Miss Catherine Reaveley, a graduate of the Normal Art School in Boston. She visits each school in town once in two weeks, gives a lesson, and leaves directions for work to be done before her next visit. This arrangement regarding drawing systematizes the work in that subject, and marks a distinct step in advance in the educational work of the town.

Another change that is being made in the organization of the school work is that of adjusting the work below the High school to an eight-grade system. This is in accordance with the ideas of the State Department of Public Instruction, as indicated in the program of studies recently revised and furnished to the teachers. It is also in line with what is being done in many of the larger and more progressive New England cities and towns.

Last September, four of the eighth grade pupils entered the High school upon examination. It is our hope and expectation that next year a large enough proportion of the class will pass into the High School so that a ninth grade will not be needed the following year. This will make it possible for three teachers to give their entire time to the work of the High school.

A few words may be said regarding the material equipment for carrying on the work of the schools. During the year, quite a number of new books have been bought, either to replace worn out copies that were in use, or to add to a scanty amount of reading material. A small water tank with a faucet has been placed in the East schoolhouse, and one also in the North Branch schoolhouse. This will do away with the necessity of putting a dipper into the water pail whenever a pupil wishes a drink—an unsanitary proceeding. This suggests a recommendation that each child have an inexpensive drinking cup for his own personal use when at school.

A heating and ventilating plant is much needed at the North Branch school house. With the present number of pupils, the air needs to be changed frequently, and it is almost impossible to do this without creating a draft that will be felt by nearly if not quite all of the scholars. Such a plant as I have mentioned need not cost a very large amount of money, and would return good interest on the investment in the way of greater comfort and of less danger to the health.

In closing this report, I wish to thank all those with whom I have been officially connected during the past year for their uniform courtesy and consideration.

Mr. F. L. Kendall, Superintendent of Schools:

School opened September 12, 1910, with a total membership of 180. While the attendance has not been entirely satisfactory, owing to many cases of sickness, yet we must say that the majority of the pupils have kept a good record. A lively interest and attention for the subjects taught is manifest.

In the High School room our motto is "Steady Progress."

The attendance here is larger than for some years, owing both to the entrance of pupils from the eighth grade by examination and to an increased number of tuition scholars.

Our facilities for recitation room are limited. The proposed plan of doing away with the ninth grade and of admitting pupils directly from the eighth, would seem to help matters considerably. This would not only afford us a convenient recitation room without extra expense to the town, but would also increase the efficiency of the High school by adding to the teaching force.

We desire the hearty co-operation of the people of Antrim in our school work, both in raising the per cent of attendance, and in improving the grade of scholarship.

Mr. Frederick L. Kendall, Superintendent of Schools:

The work in music in the schools of Antrim was in fine progress when I came as Supervisor of Music last September.

Although the work has been in progress but one year, it paved the way well, for future work. Much has been accomplished in music since last September, and the interest and enthusiasm of all the pupils from the first grade up through the High School is well worthy of note.

In addition to the regular prescribed course of study, original work in easy melody, writing with different time and key principles, is being done in the higher grades.

A good program of music is receiving much work in the High School, and, thanks to the enthusiasm and co-operation of the teachers and pupils, is developing finely. A little later, we hope to give it in public. We are working under great difficulties without a piano, but are hoping in the near future to have raised funds enough to enable us to buy one, when we hope much more can be accomplished.

The outside schools are doing very satisfactory work, and this with credit to the teachers as well as to the pupils. This is owing to the constant, every day work, even when there are several grades in one room.

I thank all connected with my work for their interest and co-operation.

Respectfully submitted, GERTRUDE E. CLARK, Supervisor of Music. To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following report of the work of the department of drawing is herewith submitted:

On entering, the first of November, upon my duties as the drawing teacher, I found the work in a satisfactory condition. In a great many cases the grade teachers had been giving some lessons in connection with their regular work.

Each teacher in the elementary grades has an outline of the lessons for at least two months in advance, thus giving a definite purpose to work for. I have tried to assign work of such a character that the majority of pupils can perform it well, and that the regular teachers can teach satisfactorily.

The following topics are included in the course in drawing:

Illustrative drawing, Object drawing, Nature drawing, Paper work, Color, Design.

The work in the High school is a more difficult problem on account of the limited amount of time. The entire school is allowed thirty minutes once in two weeks.

In closing, I wish to thank the teachers for their hearty co-operation.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

Antrim, N. H., Frbeuary 7, 1911.

Without exception the year just closed has been the most successful of any in the history of the James A. Tuttle Library.

During the past twelve months over 8,500 books have been loaned with a weekly average of over 163 books loaned; this gives a gain over last year of 21 books each week and a totai gain during the year of 1,069 volumes; of this number fiction has predominated to a considerable per cent, but there has been a material increase in the books of history, science, travel and biography. The iargest monthly outputs were in July and August when 1,643 books were loaned during the eight weeks.

A large number of books have been loaned the students of the town schools for supplementary reading and a section of the shelves in the stack-room has been set apart especially for the books used in the English course of the high school; at the request of the teachers a number of books have been purchased this year for the special use of the high school pupils.

The number of borrowers' cards has increased to nearly 800 and of this number about 550 are in constant use. The library has been generously patronized, not only by those living in the immediate vicinity of the building but by many residing at Clinton, Antrim Center, North Branch, as well as the east and west parts of the town. During the summer many of the sity guests at the different summer boarding houses and from the Gregg Lake colony availed themselves of the privileges afforded by the library. A large number of books especially on the line of biography, history and travel have been loaned the members of Molly Aiken chapter, D. A. R., and the women of the Pioneer Reading Club in preparing articles for their respective meetings; the reference books, which may only be used at the reading rooms, have been used to considerable extent by the pupils of the town schools who have obtained material for debates and essays.

An important section of the Library and one that is much appreciated is the scientific department, made possible through the kindness of our former townsman, W. H. Boutwell, now of Rochester, N. Y. The trustees would be glad of suggestions at any time of additional books to be purchased with this fund.

The library has been well patronized by the men employed in the cutlery shops as well as by large numbers of the young people of the town, who have spent much time enjoying the magazines and papers in the reading rooms. Many of the periodicals have been loaned to those living at a distance from the library.

A large number of visitors have registered during the year, among the number being visitors from many different states as well as from the Province of Ontario and British Columbia.

Among those who have presented books and reading matter to the Library the past year are Hon. Wyman K. Flint of Milwaukee, Mrs. Kate D. Paine of New York, Mrs. Charles R. Talbot of Brookline, Mass., J. G. Turnbull of New York city, Miss Frances S. Forsaith, former Governor D. H. Goodell, Miss M. J. Adams, Mrs. G. H. Hammett, Mrs. Melvin D. Poor, Miss Emma S. McCoy, Mrs. Edwin T. Adams, Mrs. Lucretia Shaw, Mrs. William Cuddihy, Miss Mabel Petty, the Antrim W. C. T. U., Molly Aiken chapter, D. A. R., Mrs. Harry Deacon, Mrs. W. E. Cram, Col Richard C. Goodell, Frank F. Roach, Charles S. Abbott, Bert Paige, Clark B. Cochrane and the late Hon. Nathan C. Jameson. Editor H. W. Eldredge has presented the Library with the Antrim Reporter and each week a copy has been a welcome addition to the adult reading room.

Through the courtesy of Edwin V. Goodwin, the mounted head of a magnificent moose which was shot by Mr. Goodwin in Squaretown, Me., has been loaned the library and this fine specimen now occupies a prominent position over the fire-place in the north reading room where it is the object of much favorable comment by the many patrons and visitors.

Mr. W. F. Dickey of Lynchburg, Va., a former resident and

business man of the town, has presented the library with a valuable relic of the Civil War period, in the shape of a Confederate rifle shell which was buried by the southern army when the northern troops invaded Virginia, and which was recently unearthed near Lynchburg; this interesting historic relic makes a valuable and welcome addition to the collection of antique and historic articles now owned by the library.

One of the most acceptable gifts of the entire year is the enlarged picture of the late Rev. William Hurlin, a former pastor of the Antrim Baptist church, a writer of considerable note and who enjoyed the distinction of being the oldest active minister in New England if not in the entire United States. The presentation was made by Mr. Hurlin's children, and the picture now occupies a prominent position in the north reading room.

The year closes under the most prosperous conditions with brighter prospects for a yet more successful twelve months to come.
