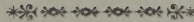

# State of New Hampshire.

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[L. s.]

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY IN THE COUNTY OF CARROLL IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the sum required by law for the benefit of the Free Public Library.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum sufficient to pay for breaking the roads and snowing the bridges, due May 1, 1906.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairing of highways and bridges in addition to the one-fourth of one per cent. upon the valuation of the town as required by law.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to obtain State aid for the permanent improvement of its main highway, as provided by an act passed Feb. 23, 1905.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay Custer Post, G. A. R., of said town to assist in de-

fraying the expenses of decorating the graves of deceased soldiers, and other necessary expenses of Memorial day, May 30, 1906.

8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town, a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars, if needed.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to make a new valuation, and provide for the necessary expenses.

10. To see if the town will vote to regulate the salaries of the town officers.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay on town debt.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to purchase a stone crusher to be used in building and repairing of the highways.

13. To take an expression of the town as to the advisability of the Selectmen laying out a highway at Conway Village, beginning at or near the peg mill, running southerly across the pond and over the land of L. C. Quint, to the log bridge road.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to purchase drain pipe, and lay the same to drain Kearsarge street in North Conway, from a point near the house owned by Mrs. Thurston, on the northerly side of said street, to the drain pipe on Seavey street at a point near the house owned by Arthur Russell, a distance of about 40 rods, and instruct the Selectmen to procure and lay pipe as early in the season as the ground will permit. Agreeable to a petition signed by J. E. Lyman, and others.

15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to defend the case of Broughton vs. Conway, entered at the December term of Court, 1905.

16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purpose of draining Mill street, so called, in the village of Center Conway, beginning near the residence

of Jas. S. Eaton and running to Peterson brook, so called. Agreeable to a petition signed by John H. Garland, and others.

17. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## Report of School Board.

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Another year has rolled past and we again present you the annual report. The school year has been rather more unsettled in its teaching force than in other years. At the close of the school year in June some of our best teachers, who in several instances had been in our schools for several years, resigned: some to seek positions where they would have a longer school year, and others for various reasons. We have found more difficulty than usual in securing and retaining in our small rural schools teachers of experience. This shows to us the almost imperative need of consolidation. And we hope the time is not far distant when this can be brought about with profit to the pupils and the school district. Upon the whole the teachers have been faithful to their trust, and labored early and late for the welfare of their pupils.

The matter of discipline is the most serious and trying one we have to meet, and usually where there has been failure, it is along this line: Another very annoying matter, to the teachers, as well as to the officers, is irregularity in attendance and tardiness. As the statistical report will show, this evil is more marked in some schools than others. There have been enrolled during the past year six hundred pupils. These divided among the nineteen schools, give an average of thirty-two pupils under the care of each teacher. Do the parents of these children ever stop and think of the amount of patience a teacher must always keep in store, in order that peace and harmony may prevail in and around the school building? We are sorry to report a very marked increase of tardiness. We feel that parents are perhaps largely responsible for this, and we urge that in this respect the report for the next year may show a very perceptible improvement.

Another column in the statistics shows a much smaller total than we desire to see: "Pupils not absent or tardy."

Thirty-six pupils from the six hundred registered is a very small percentage. In many of the registers we find many names of pupils who have attended two terms, and it was due to sickness that they lost in the third term. To these pupils who have tried so hard during the past year to have a clean record page, we thank you for your earnest effort, and hope your efforts during the next year will bring you success. Let us all interest ourselves and have this record show thirty-six who have been absent instead of the reverse.

The following pupils were graduated from the North Conway Grammar School: Lucy Brooks, Roy Eastman, Edwin Smith; their class motto being "Not what we are but what we shall be."

From the Center Grammar School were graduated Bessie B. Adjutant, Ella Bachelder, Carl Bemis, Earl Burnell, Myra Fitts, Cassie Mason, Perley Mudgett, Amy Philbrook. Class motto: "Striving always to win." The exercises in both places were of a high order. The essays showed much thought, study, and careful preparation, and were pleasingly given. We have a large number of students taking higher studies at Fryeburg Academy. A large class will graduate from Conway next term.

Whatever is to appear in the life of our nation must come from our schools. W. T. Harris, U. S. Commissioner of Education, tells us that "the average schooling in the United States amounts to merely enough to secure to each child a little more than one-half of an elementary course of eight years; and that of every one hundred pupils enrolled, ninety-five are pursuing elementary branches."

The schools in the north part of the school district are in excellent condition, and show a marked advance during the last fiscal year. The school at Echo Lake has been the least satisfactory, the trouble being due mostly to differences between the parents of the children and the teacher, although two teachers have been tried; while in the other three schools there has been unusual satisfaction with the teachers and the schools as a whole. Mr. Harding as principal at No. 8, has proved an excellent teacher and disciplinarian; Miss Doyle, who taught during the spring term as assistant in the Grammar school, has done excellent work in the Intermediate room; Mrs.

Snyder in No. 8 Primary, and Miss Holmes at McMillan school, have given us their usual high grade of work, while Miss Allard of Kearsarge has made a decided improvement in that school.

#### SCHOOL HOUSES.

A wood ceiling has been placed in the McMillan school-house, which has not only removed the danger of the plastering falling upon the scholars, but has proved a fuel saver. Also at the McMillan school-house the trees which were so near the school building as to make the room dark and to impair the lasting qualities of the shingles and roof, have been cut down and moved away, making a decided improvement in the premises. Both the inside and outside of the Kearsarge school-house have received a coat of paint.

In the line of repairs upon school-houses, some of those mentioned in our report of last year were not made, the principal reason being inability to get carpenters and workmen at times when schools were not in session. The demands and apparent needs of a school building at the "Four Corners" on the county road were so fully realized that the Board ordered or consented to the removal of the Stark school building to the above place. People and those interested giving of time, money and labor. The building was taken down, moved and made ready for the opening of the fall term of school.

Important repairs are much needed at Redstone and West Side. We hope this can be brought about before the opening of the spring term of school. Minor repairs are needed in several other buildings. We would recommend that the usual amount of three hundred dollars be raised for repairs on school buildings.

The school buildings at North Conway Village, McMillan, and the Center were reinsured the past year. We recommend that one hundred dollars be raised for insurance and water.

Last October a very successful and interesting Institute was holden at Conway in co-operation with the Carroll County Teachers' Association and under the management of Superintendent of Public Instruction H. C. Morrison. Mr. Morrison spent one day in visiting the schools of our town, nine were visited. He was pleased to note the excellent condition of our school buildings, the comfortable arrangements for transporta-



tion, and the good working condition the schools were in. He lectured at Center Conway and Conway, upon "Organization of Rural Schools" and very plainly showed the benefits and advantages to be derived by supervision.

Last year the school district meeting was holden on the day of the annual meeting. The experiment proved very successful and the same scheme will be carried out this year. We trust the ladies will feel that they should have the same interest and show it by being present on the afternoon of March 13, at 1:30 o'clock. We wish the citizens would become interested in the question of supervision sufficiently to have the article discussed, at least, at the coming meeting.

In a large town like Conway, with nineteen different schools, under the present system they are not visited and examined as they should be by the members of the Board, therefore the schools are not advancing as they should and could if the teachers were aided, counselled and organized by a Superintendent. Our desire should be to make our schools the best of grammar schools.

We have had a school year of thirty-one weeks since last March. We thank the tax-payers for their willing and liberal support, and hope you will desire, with us, that the school year of Conway should be made thirty-four weeks. We must remember that the *common schools* are the people's colleges. The great majority of pupils are not being fitted for college, but for the duties and responsibilities of life; so that really our grammar schools are the finishing schools instead of preparatory schools. The real work of the public schools will be judged, not from what is taught, but what the teaching has made of them. There never was a time in the history of education when the schools were expected to do so much for the child in the way of disciplining and character forming, when parents seem so willing to shift this most responsible work from the home to the school. We believe the chief requisite, in order to improve our school system and place it on a more permanent basis, is a closer organization of our educational forces.

We wish, in closing, to again thank the teachers who have been so untiring in their efforts, and who have borne the pleasures as well as perplexities of the past year with us, for their faithful work. We are sure that from the careful prepara-

tion of the seed-bed, and the faithful sowing of good seed, much of it will take root and yet bear an hundred fold.

We also wish to express our obligations to the tax-payers, citizens, and all who have in very many ways given us support and aid in the work of superintending the affairs of the School District.

## Report of Public Library.

### REPORT OF LIBRARIAN OF CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY AT CONWAY FOR YEAR ENDING DEC. 31, 1905.

The work of the Library has been much the same as in previous years, while the interest in some directions has increased. During the year the Trustees have purchased 210 volumes of fiction, history, biography and travels, beside a portion of the private library of a clergyman; 3 books have been bought with fine money, 8 given by Kendall S. Norwood, 9 by J. A. Carlton, 25 by the American Swedenborg Printing and Publishing Society, 6 by John C. Lloyd, 19 from other friends, besides government books from Hon. C. A. Sulloway and friends. There has been an increase in circulation of 745 volumes above that of last year; largely due to the new books. The circulation has been: 3813 fiction, 1650 juvenile, 88 biography, 70 history, 86 travels, 9 religious, 85 miscellaneous; making a total of 5801, a daily average of 55 81-104. Cards have been issued to 80 new patrons. The Reading Room has been well supplied with magazines, and papers: "World's Work," "Technical World," "Everybody's Magazine," "Century," "Delineator," "Cosmopolitan," "Success," "Young People," "New Hampshire Issue," "Epworth Herald," "Christian Science," "White Mountain Reporter;" and Boston Dailies have been constantly on the tables, beside occasional copies of other magazines and papers.

These are all eagerly sought for by the patrons of the Library.

During the summer Mr. James McKenzie of Boston, a summer boarder in the village, kindly gave an entertainment in the hall for the benefit of the Library, and thirteen books were placed upon the shelves as the result.
