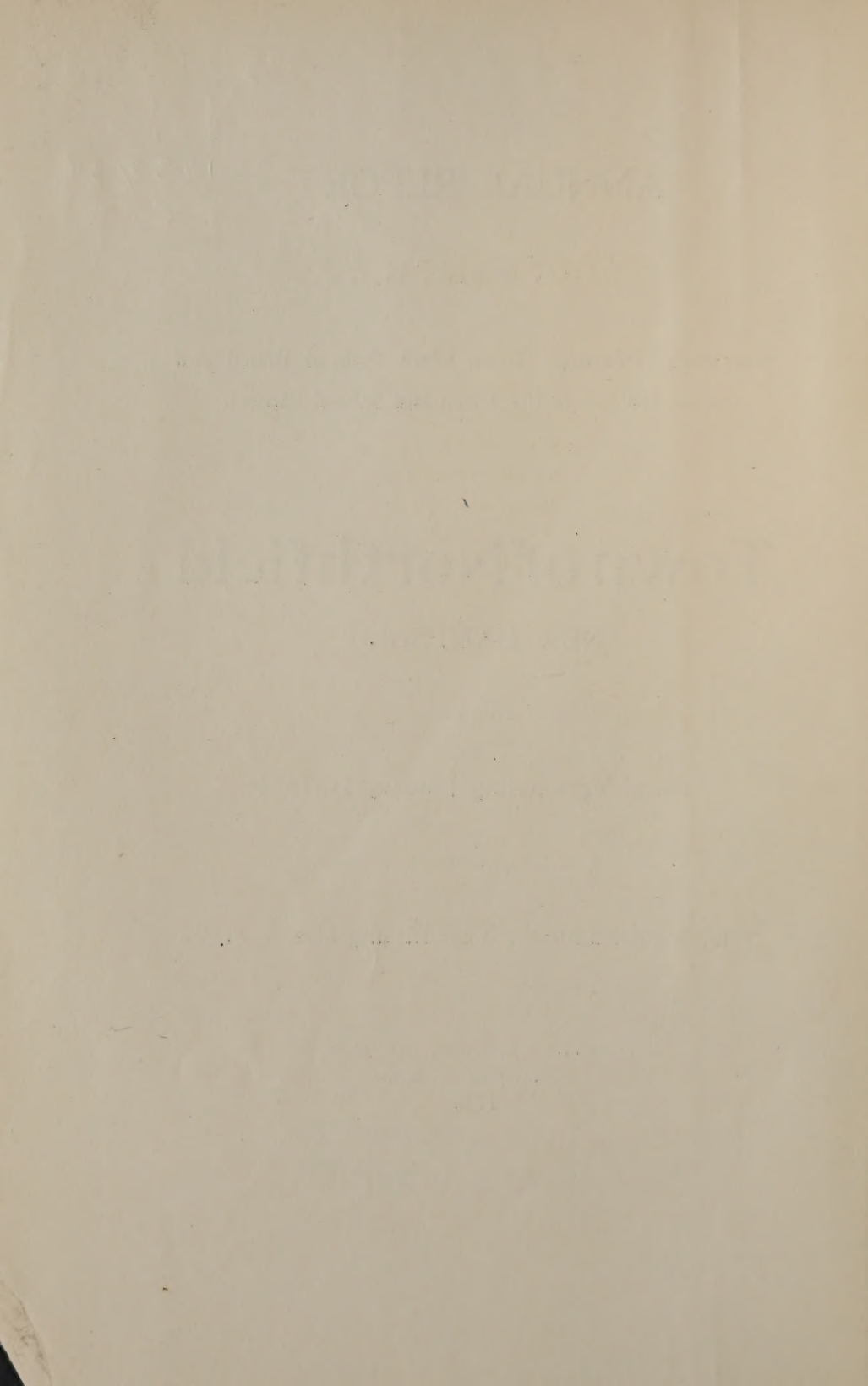

next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the
following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year
ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to
defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appro-
priation for the same, viz. Town Officers' salaries, Town
Officers' expenses, Election and Registration, Care of Town
Hall and supplies, Police Department, Fire Department in-
cluding forest fires, District Nurse and Health Department,
Vital Statistics, Sewer Maintenance, Highway Maintenance
for Road Agents and supplies including snow removal,
Kendegeda Brook bridge, Continuation of Elm Street re-
pairs, Hall Memorial Library, Aid to town poor, Memorial
Day, and care of Cemeteries.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate
the sum of \$200.00 towards the purchase of an automobile
for the District Nurse Association, provided the town of
Tilton raises an equal amount. (By request.)

4. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally.

5. To see what action the town will take in regard to installing a surface sewer on Vine Street extension, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for that purpose. (By request.)

6. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the reports of Town officers as printed.

7. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the Borough Road. (By request.)

The severe epidemic of measles which broke out in the community late in November made it advisable to close the schools early in December, two weeks before the planned closing for the Christmas holidays. Schools will close for the summer vacation on June 22, one week later than originally planned.

Finances

Your attention is called to the financial report of the school board. The first report covers the full year ending June 30, 1933, and is in detail; the second report covers the period from July 1, 1933 to January 31, 1934, a preliminary statement for this current fiscal year. The per pupil cost of our elementary schools for the year ending June 30 last was \$61.62. The state median for that year was \$75.89. The per pupil cost of our elementary schools for this current year will probably be a little over \$50.00.

The last school meeting made a reduction of \$6,450.00 in the school budget as prepared and presented by the school

board. Of this amount \$4,585.00 was for the support of elementary schools and \$1,830.00 for the payment of statutory obligations. There will be a deficit this current year and the school board is asking for a special appropriation of \$2,000.00 to meet the same. This deficit is due to the cost of high school tuition. Fourteen thousand dollars was appropriated for this purpose. The cost this year will be some over \$16,000.00.

Improvements

I would again suggest certain needed improvements in the school buildings. The Sanborn Road and Lochmere buildings should have electric lights. The Eastman building is very much in need of paint and the fence around this property should be immediately replaced. There is need of a new fence at No. Four.

Supervisory Union

A reduction in the number of school superintendents became effective July 1, 1933. This necessitated the reorganization and enlargement of many of the supervisory unions. Gilmanton was added to the Tilton-Northfield union. This union now comprises Tilton-Northfield, Belmont, Gilford and Gilmanton.

Annual Meeting

The annual school meeting will be held Friday evening, March 23, at 7:30, in the Tilton Town Hall. The term of Mrs. Winnifred F. Walker, as member of the school board, will expire at that time. It will also be necessary to choose a member of the school board to complete the unexpired term of the late Hiram R. Blanchard. Mr. Robert B. Chalmers was appointed by the school board to fill this

vacancy until the annual meeting.

Again I wish to thank the members of the school board and the teachers for their assistance and cooperation.
