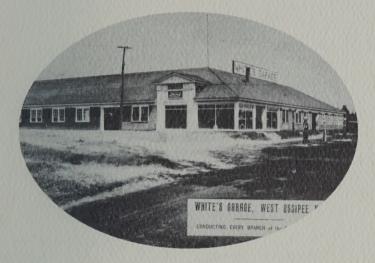
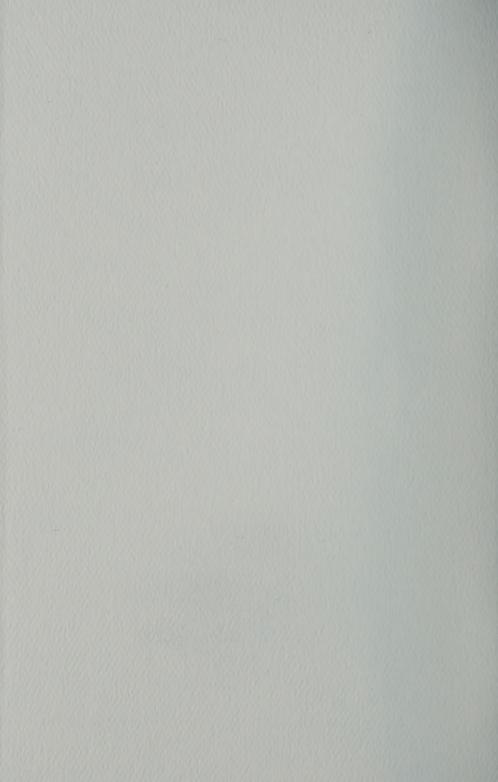

The Zoning Amendment votes were received as follows:

Article 2: Amendment No. 1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 1, establishing Water Resources Protection Districts, purpose of subject districts to protect the public health by preventing contamination of both current and future ground and surface water resources capable of providing water to the Town of Ossipee, New Hampshire, and to implement the Ossipee Water Resource Management and Protection Plan in accordance with the authority of RSA 674:21 (Submitted by the Planning Board)

Article 2 passed as read

Article 3. Amendment No. 2. Are you in favor of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by petition for the Town of Ossipee Zoning Ordinance as follows: Revising the "Ossipee Zoning Map" as shown on the attached plan entitled "Amendments to Ossipee Zoning Map" by changing an area of land adjacent to Route 25 and Ryefield Road from its existing "Rural" district to the "Roadside Commercial" district. (This article submitted by petition) (Not recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 3 Defeated

Article 3. Amendment No. 3. Are you in favor of adoption of the three amend-

ments to the Ossipee Zoning Ordinance which would expand the Roadside Commercial zoning district boundaries? Description:

- 1. Extend the boundary an additional 4500 feet northerly to the centerline of Polly's Crossing Road; 500 feet from Route 16 right-of-way (boundary would be 5500 feet from the intersection of Routes 16 & 28).
- 2. Extend the boundary an additional 1950 feet southeasterly along Route 16, this would be 4350 feet from the intersection of Route 16, Old Route 16, and Pine River Road; 500 feet from the Route 16 right-of-way.
- 3. Extend the boundary from the Ossipee/Effingham town line to the Beech River 1000 feet from the Route 16 and Pine River Road right-of-way.

Meeting recessed at 6:00 P.M.

Meeting resumed at 7:00 P.M. by Moderator George Earnshaw

The moderator asked non-voters to stand and be recognized. Donald Meader made a motion to allow our Town Manager, Thomas F. Rankin to speak at the meeting, approved.

Warren Witherell stood and made the following motion: "I respectfully move that the meeting take up and act on Article 8 of the Town Warrant before moving to the other secheduled articles for this meeting". The reason being that this article requires a bond issue and that Town Council advised by letter dated March 10, 1989 that this article should be on the warrant as the beginning article of the evenings meeting. It enables the meeting not to be delayed an evening, or done after a group of people left making the meeting to small to make an effective vote. It allows as many people to vote as possible. Move was passed

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$375,000.00) for the purpose of an addition to the Library. The sum of \$375,000.00 to be raised by issuance of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the date, maturities, recommended to be over a Twenty (20) year period, denomination and rate of interest thereon. (Submitted by the Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (To be voted on by written ballot, 2/3 majority)

The moderator opened for discussion and Ruth Loring gave a brief history on the Library. George Earnshaw questioned the cost to his taxes per year. Tom Rankin stated it would increase the taxes ten to twelve dollars per year.

Peter Lambert stated that he was the lone dissenter on the Budget Committee and his reasons for doing so were the problems with the design, stating the parking problems and the costs to run the Library. It said for \$375,000.00 we could have a brand new Library with plenty of parking somewhere else in Town.

Polls opened at 7:20 P.M. and to remain open for one hour.

The following vote was received: Yes 216. No 102, 2/3 majority 212 Article 8 PASSED AS READ.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes. Federal Grants and Bond Anticipation Notes.

Douglas Meader spoke on behalf of the Budget Committee and he moved to amend the article on Town Officer's Expense to read \$121,397.00 and the Police Dept. Expense to read \$108,596.00

Police Chief Brad Loomis then spoke about the 1983 Master Plan for the town stating his phase in of 24 hour police coverage over the next couple of years. Brad also moved to amend the Police Dept Budget to increase it to \$128,353.00 This amount woild enable him to hire another full time officer and to have coverage until 3:00AM every day. It also frees up officers to handle investigations and traffic enforcement.

Richard Morgan spoke on behalf of the police force, he brought up some of the past years accomplishments and stated the need for more manpower.

Barry Rollins questioned about the police cruisers. How many are in working order? Brad stated 2 at the present time. The 1986 cruiser has a blown engine. Tom Rankin spoke about the 1986 cruiser and stated that he would like to keep the extra \$4,000 in the budget to cover leasing expenses for a new cruiser if needed.

Call for a vote on the amendment from Doug Meader to decrease the Town Officers Expense and the Police Dept Expense. Unanimous vote to amend.

Call for a vote to amend the amendment on the Police Dept. Expense to increase it to \$128,353.00 Unanimous vote to amend.

Question was raised by Eugene Arata as to why the \$21,000.00. increase to the Solid Waste Disposal budget? Town Manager, Tom Rankin stated the in-

crease was due to some negotiations with the union contract and extra part time help to keep the incinerator open longer hours. Part of the increase was also to purchase scales from S.D. Warren at a cost of \$4,000.00. The scales normally cost around \$30,000.00 - \$35,000.00. Questions were brought up about what the scales were to be used for? The scales would be used if the town had to charge fees, and also in case we have to haul our ash away it would have to be weighed. Wayne Aleska aked if we were separating our trash for recycling, Tom Rankin stated not at this time.

Donald Meader spoke on the issue of insurance and wanted to know if the town has looked into cheaper insurance? He asked about self insurance. Tom Rankin stated the biggest increase being Blue Cross/Blue Shield of \$7,000.00 this amount being offset by revenues of \$6,700.00

Greg Dales questioned about medical coverage for part time employees. Are they covered and to what extent? Tom Rankin stated that some part time employees get full coverge because of their Union contract, they are year round permanent employees. Seasonal part time employees do not get insurance benefits.

To see if the town will vote to adopt by reference as an ordinance. as authorized by RSA 664:52 the BOCA Basic National Building Code/1987, as amended and as established by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International Inc., and any updated edition of the code; and to establish the position of Codes Enforcement Officer (Building Inspector), who shall be appointed by the Selectmen to examine and approve plans for construction and shall issue building and occupancy permits. The Zoning Board of Adjustment is designated as the appeals board for decisions of the Codes Enforcement Officer. (Submitted by the Planning Board)

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development or change or expansion of use of tracts for non-residential uses or multi-family dwelling units (structures containing more than two dwelling units) pursuant to RSA 674:43I and require the Town Clerk to file a certificate of notice with the Carroll County Registry of Deeds indicating that the Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorizaton pursuant to RSA 674:43II. Article 16. To respectfully request the town to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape. This article submitted by petition.

Article 17. to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars for support of Ossipee Children using the services of Tamworth Pre-School, Inc. This article submitted by petition.

Article 17, PASSED AS READ

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to declare Ossipee a Nuclear Free Zone in order to promote the health and well being of its people. There shall be no decision, developmental research, testing production or development of nuclear weapons within the town of Ossipee nor may any nuclear energy be produced within the town. No nuclear weapons, nuclear fuel, or nuclear wastes, resulting from nuclear weapons, or nuclear power production may be transported through, disposed of, or stored within the Town of Ossipee. This article submitted by petition.

- 2. We, as electricity consumers do not want to be responsible for the production of nuclear waste for which there is no proper means of disposal.
- 3. We, as electricity consumers, do not want to be responsible for the nuclear accident which could occur during electricity production for which there is no realistic evacuation plan. This article submitted by petition.

A motion to pass over this article was made and a hand count was taken.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE CARROLL, SS TOWN OF OSSIPEE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Ossipee in the County of Carroll, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Center Ossipee, in said Town of Ossipee on the second Tuesday of March next, being the 13th day of March 1990 at Ten O'Clock in the forenoon (10:00 a.m.) of said day.

To act on the following Articles, the polls to remain open until Six O'Clock in the afternoon (6:00 p.m.) of said day.

Article 1: To choose one (1) Selectman for three (3) years, one (1) Treasurer for one (1) year, one (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for one (1) year, one (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for two (2) years, one (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for three (3) years, two (2) Budget Committee Members for three (3) years, one (1) Budget Committee Member for one (1) year, one (1) Moderator for two (2) years, one (1) Library Trustee for three (3) years, one (1) Supervisor of the Checklist for six (6) years, one (1) Cemetery Trustee for one (1) year, one (1) Cemetery Trustee for two (2) years, one (1) Cemetery Trustee for three (3) years.

Article 2: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35 IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service - connected total disability? The optional exemption is \$1400 rather than \$700.

Article 3: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-F for the adjusted elderly exemptions from the property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence.

Article 4: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veterans exemption and expanded war service for veterans seeking exemption?

The optional veteran's exemption is \$100, rather than \$50.

Article 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment as proposed by petition for the Ossipee Zoning Ordinance?

Topical description of substance of amendment:

The amendment proposed by petition would extend the Roadside Commercial District located on the easterly side of Route 16, which begins at the intersection of Route 16, Old Route 16, and Pine River Road, an additional 1950 feet to the southerly boundary of a parcel of land shown on Tax Map 13 as Lot 102. The present depth of 500 feet from the Routh 16 right of way would be maintained.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for Ossipee Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Topical description of substance of amendment:

This amendment will establish a Wetlands Conservation District which will be an Overlay District on the entire Town applying to Wetland Areas defined in the amendment based on vegetation, soils, and the erection and construction of structures of buildings are not allowed, nor can the natural surface configuration be changed by the addition of fill or dredging. Other uses are available by special exception. This amendment will also prohibit new septic tanks or leach fields closer than 125 feet to any wetland. No part of a wetland may be considered as part of the minimum lot size requirement of either the Zoning Ordinance or Subdivision Regulation.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Ossipee Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Ossipee Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Purpose: To allow the erection of a building on a non-conforming lot while still maintaining the setbacks and lot coverage standards in Table 2.

23.1.1 - A pre-existing lot, as described in 32.1 above, which does not conform to the minimum area and or frontage standards in Table 2 may be built upon, and shall conform to all other provisions of this Ordinance provided that approval for the design of an on-site sewage disposal system is obtained from the N.H.W.S. & P.C.D.

Article 8: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as pro-

posed by the Planning Board for the Ossipee Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Purpose: To make the ZBA decisions more readily available to the public. 25.3.5 - Notice of Decision - the Board shall issue a final written decision with all reasons and conditions set forth for the record on each appeal heard. If the appeal is not approved the decision shall state the reasons for disapproval (RSA 676:3, II). In addition, a copy of the decision shall be given to the appellant, Board of Selectmen, Codes Enforcement Officer, and other Town Boards and Commissions, and shall be published in the local newspaper.

Article 9: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Ossipee Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Purpose: To reflect the actual measurement of the Roadside Commercial Zone as delineated on the Map.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Following the policy guidelines from the Board of Selectmen, and based upon the recommendations of the Budget Committee, the 1989 Budget was prepared with the goal of providing Municipal Services with no more than a 5% increase in the Municipal portion of the rate. We fulfilled that goal with an approximate 2% reduction in the Municipal Tax Rate while accomplishing projects at the incinerator, Elm Street, Water & Sewer Line construction, and Dam repairs. On going planning efforts have included Solid Waste Planning, development of a Road and Bridge Program, as well as research toward a Capital Improvement Plan, and potential impact fees to help further stabilize the Tax Rate.

Efforts to improve financial management aspects of our Town operation with the cooperation of the Auditing Firm of Plodzik & Sanderson

are continuing with the cooperation of Town Officals.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN 1989

During 1989 library books were checked out, returned and taken care of as usual; but, there was a great difference; the thought in our minds that next year our new addition would be in use, providing the library with more shelving for all those books now stacked on top of things, plus a room where books could be processed and mended, and much more.

In our ordinary day by day schedule, we try to interest children in reading more and more. One way is to have a story hour for preschoolers. The story hour is held every Tuesday all year. Last summer volunteer readers Virginia Bradley, Irene Coombs, Ann Baldwin and Ruth Loring read stories and taught small children to do small crafts. Other volunteer readers this fall and winter are Jennifer Clough, Nancy Watkins, Karen Godfrey, Lorey Pendarvis and Janice Shaheen. All children in the Ossipee area, ages 3-6 are welcome to any story hour.

Thirty-four children joined our summer reading program, "Summer Safari" and read an astonishing 32 books in seven weeks. Our beautiful African landscape for the program was painted by Lesley Jorgenson of

Granite.

Programs for children were very well attended. In April storyteller Cindi O'Connor of Conway entertained over 50 children and parents with well known tales for small people. In August The Little Red Wagon Caravan from the University of New Hampshire presented their version of The Wizard of Oz for 95 parents and children. This program took place on the library lawn.

Interesting adult programs presented were The Ossipee Ring Dike, with John Brooks as speaker; this was the best attended adult program ever; another program was an author's party for Ted Cook, author of Ossipee, N.H. 1785-1985: a history; "The Tie That Binds" a history of railroads in New Hampshire was presented by Professor William Taylor of Plymouth State College; and a night for learning about deeds and your

house history, with Ted Cook.

Besides the volunteers already mentioned, special thanks go to Isabella Clark and Eleanor Bassett who have typed hundreds of catalog cards since last year. The librarian also wishes to thank staff Georgina Leland and Betty Kennard. Also Lesley Jorgenson, Ann Baldwin and Arletta Paul, the trustees, the members of the Building Advisory Committee, and especially all the area voters who believed that libraries help every person who makes use of them in a great variety of ways, and showed it by making a super effort last March to vote for our wonderful new addition to the present Ossipee Public Library.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE OSSIPEE PUBLIC LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Since Town Meeting 1989, lives of the library community have been filled with excitement, decision making and anticipation. The long-awaited building addition is nearing completion. Soon we can all be enjoying a spacious and inviting library, a place where all townspeople will want to spend time.

In October 1989 Ossipee Public Library was awarded a Library Services and Construction Act grant for \$20,000; the matching \$20,000 was raised by responses to a letter drive and by a series of successful fundraisers. These monies are currently being used to furnish and equip the newly expanded library. In February 1990 the library submitted a proposal for a LSCA direct grant, requesting funding for Project LEAP, which will take us into the 21st century by enabling a computerized Ossipee Public Library to become an active participant in the New Hampshire Statewide Automated System.

Activities reaching out to the entire community were offered and enjoyed throughout the year. Storyhours continue to offer a delightful time for pre-schoolers each Tuesday morning in a library corner. A visit from Storyteller Cindi O'Connor, UNH's Little Red Wagon, and last summer's reading program added enrichment to our young people's reading. Geologist John Brooks' presentation on the famed Ossipee ring dike had to be moved to the school when the one hundredth audience member appeared! The publication of Ossipee's Town History was followed up by an autographing session hosted by the library, and by a later program presented by author Ted Cook on tracing the history of your property in the

Ossipees. Plymouth College Professor William Taylor is always a welcome visitor to our library. His slide lecture on the history of railroading in New Hampshire, "The Tie That Binds," interested many area residents. In October Ossipee resident Ron Bergeron presented a workshop assisting amateur photographers in the identification and preservation of old pho-

tographs.

Once again, the year's fundraising ventures turned into happy events for all participants, adding significantly to the expansion fund. The Annual Perennial Sale and Used Book Sale started our early summer events. The second annual Book- It! footrace organized by Mitch Merrow attracted seventy-seven runners and earned \$400 for the library. In August the Evening Under the Stars benefit auction held on the grounds of Long Look brought out eager auction goers, despite the uncooperative weather. The calendar committee responded to popular demand by producing a 1990 Ossipee Remembers calendar featuring photos of Old Ossipee from the Ossipee Historical Society files.

Without the continued dedication of Librarian Ruby Pearson to our library and our community, the modern library which is gradually evolving would not become a reality for us all. We also appreciate the pleasant and caring assistance of Library Aides Gene Leland and Betty Kennard, volunteer typists Isabella Clark and Eleanor Bassett, Jennifer Clough and Storyhour volunteers. And...a heartfelt expression of gratitude goes to the following members of the Building Expansion Committee whose efforts made a librarian's dream and an architect's plans come to life: Ann Baldwin, Linda Bergeron, Mary Buswell, Caroline DeAngelis, Lucille Flynn, Dorie Johnson, Maria LaGuardia, Gene Leland, Ann Lessard, Arletta Paul, Betty Reed, Ted Reny, Harry Simpson, Chris Templeton and Fred VanCor.

We predict and anticipate an exciting future for Ossipee Public Library.

REPORT OF OSSIPEE POLICE DEPARTMENT Annual Report 1989

Ossipee PD had another busy year, comparable to last year in many ways with some differences.

We travelled over 95,000 miles using over 6600 gallons of fuel.

Assault reports and reports of bad checks increased significantly. There was also a dramatic increase in the numbers of vehicles stopped resulting in a significant increase in the number of people arrested for operating after suspension.

Sgt. Richard Morgan of OPD and Sgt. Guy Eldridge of CCSO again worked together on a lengthly drug investigation resulting in approximately a dozen people being indicted on approximately 3 dozen counts of drug sales and related charges. Information gathered through these investigations led to valuable intelligence information regarding other criminal activity in the area. Their work has been invaluable to Ossipee and the surrounding communities.

I would also like to thank Sheriff Roy Larson for all the resources he

committed to this investigation.

We added a new full time officer to the department. Many of you already know long time resident Don Grow. Officer Grow successfully completed the NH police academy this past fall.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As we move into 1990 we can look over the past year with many positive changes for the Town of Ossipee.

The Selectmen, Town Manager and Budget Committee have worked diligently to keep the Municipal portion of the tax rate down while provid-

ing needed services to the town.

Sections of Elm Street and Granite Road were prepared by the Highway Department and paved by Pike Industries. Also, Phillips Engineering completed a road program and bridge study which will enable the town to set up priority work with professional answers in these two areas.

Weight scales and building were built at the incinerator facility to enable the town to determine the weight and types of materials going into

the facility.

With the cooperation of the front office, officials and available federal programs, cut welfare costs decreased this year by several thousands of dollars. This was accomplished by working with the clients, the continuation of a workfare program and liens on property, if necessary.

Our Police Department has done a commendable job over the past year. Drug investigations are of particular concern to the residents of Ossipee and they have done an admirable job in meeting this need.

This past year the Water and Sewer Department has completed a new fire hydrant on Dore Street, over 800 feet of water line replacement on Valley Road and the addition of the Hodge Lane sewer line.

The Recreation Department will be enhanced by the ballfields, tennis courts, picnic area and conservation trails now underway at the Long Sands Constitutional Park.

Our zoning ordinance has now been in place for one full year and the people are now accepting the ordinance, but there is a need for a codes enforcement officer to handle the increased work related to the ordinance.

Emile Legendre and volunteers are continuing the repair work at the Mill Pond, a popular swimming and fishing attraction in the summer.

Town officials are working with the state to ensure that needed repairs are completed to preserve the Whittier Covered Bridge in West Ossipee.

REPORT OF THE OSSIPEE PLANNING BOARD

1989 was a busy year for the Ossipee Planning Board. Public hearings were held on the first Tuesday evening of every month with workshops every Tuesday evening as well as many Monday evenings. Planning Board members attended workshop/lectures on Solid Waste Management, Current Use and Land Protection and a series of municipal law lectures held in Meredith on the subjects of Grandfathering, gravel pits and Planning Board Procedures.

The good news is that over 20 plans were approved by the Ossipee Planning Board. New subdivision regulations were written and adopted. A Wetlands Conservation District Zoning Amendment was formulated with a great deal of help from the Ossipee Conservation Commission. A Water Resources Management Plan was also formulated and adopted. At the annual Lakes Region Planning Commission meeting held in June, Planning Board Chairman, Bruce Bennett, accepted an award for the Town of Ossipee in recognition of their efforts in zoning and plan-

ning.

The bad news - due to a serious shortage of Planning Board members and lack of public interest, as well as the resignation of members Leon Taylor and Ron Bergeron, much needed work on projects, i.e. site plan review, suggested zoning amendments, industrial development research, etc. was seriously hampered. Much remains to be done in the Town of Ossipee in regards to long range planning, growth and goal setting. Only with an active, concerned and interested citizenry will the Town of Ossipee be able to continue its efforts to maintain a quality community and environment.

A major loss to the Planning Board and the Town of Ossipee was the death of long time resident and Board member, Daniel Lunt. His insight,

effort, wisdom and sense of humor has been sorely missed.

Plans and goals for 1990 to date, are to finish site plan review regulations, revision of earth excavation regulations, possible zoning amendments, building codes and any other issues it becomes necessary to address. Hopefully, the Ossipee Planning Board will attract more interest, effort and input from the town's people in 1990.

OSSIPEE CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT - 1989

The Ossipee Conservation Commission functioned this year under the leadership of Peter Olkkola, Chairman, and Frank Hammond, Vice-Chairman. A total of 13 Dredge and Fill Applications were processed, and 1 court case was settled favorably for the town.

The town was granted several conservation easements to be managed by the commission. The commission is seeking to establish a con-

servation fund which it would administer.

The commission is in the process of indexing all of the town-owned property, which will provide an inventory of potential uses and options. This task will include on-site inspections by various members of the commission.

A natural resource (wetlands) ordinance is being proposed, as an amendment to the zoning ordinance. This is designed to preserve and protect our wetlands, as well as to provide safeguards in areas prone to flooding.

An open house was held in November to provide a public forum for those in the community who wished to interact with the commission. A total of 6 visitors attended, and provided some very useful discussion.

The commission is in the process of planning a cookout in late June, to which the conservation commissions of all adjoining towns will be invited. This will provide an opportunity to discuss common problems and those of mutual concern.

Our appreciation is extended to those people who, during 1989, served our community through the conservation commission.

ANIMAL CONTROL 1989

Since my appointment, in November, as your Animal Control Officer I have travelled a total of 575 miles and responded to 27 complaints in 1989. Eight adult dogs and six nursing puppies were held at the Ossipee Dog Holding Facility, two dogs were killed on the highways and one

dog was taken to the Humane Society in Laconia for adoption.

As of January 1990 the Town of Ossipee has signed an Animal Control Contract with the N.H. Humane Society in Laconia. This means that the Humane Society in Laconia is now responsible for all Ossipee stray dogs brought to their shelter by your Animal Control Officer. The Humane Society will hold the dogs for required period of time, try to locate the owners, see to any veterinarian needs, hold the dogs for Court if necessary, and eventually either place or euthanize the animals. Therefore, if you are missing your pet it is important that you call the Humane Society at 1-524-3252. The Shelter is open every day except Sundays and Holidays from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. As your Animal Control Officer, however, I will plan to hold dogs for a few days at the Ossipee Dog Holding Facility in the hopes that you and your dog can be reunited sooner. I can be reached by calling the Sheriff's Office in Ossipee.

THERE IS A TOWN LEASH LAW. It is unlawful for your dog to be off your property unless accompanied by you and on a leash or under well-trained control by voice commands. Your dog MAY NOT run at large on the property of others. If your dog is running at large he will be impounded as a stray and a fine will be imposed before you can reclaim him. ANY DOG OR DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE ARE A POTENTIAL HAZARD TO

WILDLIFE, DOMESTIC ANIMALS AND PEOPLE.

State Law requires all dogs to receive the Rabies Vaccine at specified intervals and to be licensed at three months of age and by May 1st of every year. The Ossipee Concerned Citizens organization sponsors a Rabies Clinic at the Ossipee Town Hall every spring. This is run by the Kindness Animal Hospital of Ossipee. The cost of the vaccine at this Clinic is considerably cheaper than it would be at the Office of your veterinarian, so I strongly recommend that you take advantage of this service. Date and Time will be publicized in local papers.

If your dog is left outside for any extended period of time YOU MUST PROVIDE HIM WITH AN ADEQUATE SHELTER. Your dog can be impounded for Cruelty to Animals under RSA 644:8 if you have failed to

provide him with proper care, sustenance and shelter.

If your dog is in heat she must be confined WITHIN AN ENCLOSURE.

She cannot be tied outside.

I am very glad to be your Animal Control Officer. I genuinely care about you and your animals and I hope to be constructively helpful to you both. But the best implementation of this job depends on you. Please let me know if you have complaints and I will do my best to rectify them.

Unless a complaint results in court action at your request, all the complaints I receive are confidential.

My thanks to the Town Officials, the Ossipee Police Dept., the Ossipee Sanitation Dept., Troop E and the Sheriff's Office. Without their help my job would be impossible.

The Agency Staff made a total of 6862 home visits in 1989. All services are provided under the orders of each client's personal physician. Nursing services are available seven days a week; other services are available Monday through Friday.

In 1989, through the generosity of a local resident, we began a Cholesterol Screening Program at five sites throughout our service area. In FY 1990 we will begin to provide Speech Therapy for homecare residents.

OSSIPEE CONCERNED CITIZENS, INC.

To the Selectmen and residents of the Town of Ossipee: Ossipee Con-

cerned Citizens submits its report for 1989.

The meals program received a major boost in July when the state awarded us direct funding for our meals programs. Funding for our congregate meals and Title III home-delivered meals had previously been included in the North Country Senior Meals (CAP) contract. Elimination of this middle-man funding has allowed us to expand our congregate meals to five days, and given us the use of over \$6000.00 in client donation money we had been previously mandated to send to Berlin.

The meals program served 18681 home delivered meals to residents of Ossipee, Tamworth, Effingham and Freedom, 10390 of these meals

were served to Ossipee residents.

The Ossipee Congregate Site served 5131 meals. The Tamworth Congregate Site served 515 meals during their six months under our contract.

The WIC program has a present enrollment of 863 clients country-wide, this represents an increase of over 100 clients from 1988. 169 of these clients are residents of Ossipee. These Ossipee residents are receiving \$384.00 each in yearly food packages or a combined total of \$64896.00 worth of food. An additional 30 clients are receiving commodity foods every month through the WIC Commodity Food Program. These foods are valued at \$45.00 per package.

The 1989 Santa Project provided food and gifts for 296 people. Thanks to the many businesses and individuals who supported this project. Special thank-you to: Jack Fogarty, Shop & Save, Diprizios Garage, Fleet Bank, Ossipee Central School, Joe Duchesne and his Boy Scout

Troop. Belknap/Merrimack CAP Commodity Foods.

The OCC Building Committee concentrated its efforts this past year on repairs to our existing facility. At a cost of \$4868.00 we are now boasting a non-leaking roof and are in compliance with state fire and safety codes. We would like to thank the Ossipee Water Department for thawing us out and Emile Legendre for his volunteer work on our leaking faucets.

Plans for our Day Care Facility and expansion program are progressing and we plan to submit a proposal to The Office of State Planning for a

Feasibility study in June.

As we enter 1990 and a new decade we begin our sixteenth year of service to the community. The staff and board of directors look forward to the coming decade and optimistically await the challenges the years ahead will present. We appreciate the many ways you have supported us in the past and look forward to working with you in the future.

OSSIPEE WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT 1989 TOWN REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen & Citizens of Ossipee

In the Towns annual meeting, the department placed over \$126,000.00 proposed budget before you and your support for passage was much appreciated. Now 1989 has passed and the revenues were collected and placed into our account payables and used. Let us account for this funding.

The department employed one more full time employee and presently stand at a full time superintendent, a full time operator laborer, a part

time operator laborer and a part time bookkeeper/secretary.

We presently serve water to over three hundred fifty residences and/ or business, schools & town buildings. Likewise, the wastewater part of

the department services over two hundred connections.

Beyond our daily work, the department has provided time and efforts to three projects this year. First, a main line upgrade with fire protection on Dore Street, secondly, a main line replacement on Valley Road-replacing over eight hundred feet of cast iron water main, which was installed about year 1910, to a new 12" ductile iron cement lined water main capable of high flows as in fire usage, thirdly and lastly the department prepared the planning & contractor implementation of the Hodge Lane sewer project. As this was part of the sewer impact area the remaining Grant Funding paid this expenditure.

Since, the Valley Road main line work water pressure has increased the department urges those services who are receiving over (75) seventy-five pounds pressure seriously consider installing a pressure re-

ducing valve on their service line.

The Department takes this time to offer appreciation to our revenue payers, as well as other Town Agencies and Town Employees for sup-

port and assistance this year.

In closing, the Department personnel will be working on customer surveys after March Town meeting. The survey results regulate water/sewer charges. Any charges found in the survey will be implemented the beginning of the next quarter, whether decrease or increase of charges.

The Superintendent again makes note that this is a Service Department and our employees are constantly aware that our place is service to our community and you will find them to be courteous and responsi-

ble to this task.

OSSIPEE RESCUE SQUAD 1989

Report to the Selectmen and Citizens of Ossipee

The year 1989 presented us with many new and exciting challenges. As you know the Ossipee Rescue Squad purchased a cardiac defibrillator (shock paddles) for use in cardiac emergencies. This machine allows us to recognize a fatal heart rhythm and hopefully turn it into a normal heart rhythm. To date, two of our squad members have been certified in its use with three other members involved in a course at this time.

The EMT Intermediate level, which is the final step before entering the paramedic program, has also been made available to us this year through the efforts of the Emergency Room Staff of Huggins Hospital. This certification will allow us to give intravenous fluids for certain problems arising from accidents or illnesses. At this time we have one person certified and four more in the process of certifying to perform this procedure.

1989 also marks the Ossipee Rescue Squad's tenth year of service to the residents of Ossipee. We began operations on July 4, 1979 after all members had successfully completed a Red Cross Advanced First Aid course. Today, I am proud to report that we continue to maintain a roster of 11 members, all of whom are nationally registered emergency medical technicians. We have two prospective members enrolled in an EMT class at this time and we continue to function entirely as a volunteer organization.

My ten years with the Ossipee Rescue Squad has proven to be one of the most rewarding experiences of my life and I am proud to have the opportunity to work with some of the best EMT's anywhere and I can not fully express my appreciation for their selfless dedication to a task that takes them out in all kinds of weather anytime day or night, all year long.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE DEPARTMENT 1989 ANNUAL REPORT

The 1989 Fire Season was a long and busy one due to the lack of snow and rain. I am pleased to report that there were no fires along the ATV trails, and only two along route 16 due to carelessness. I thank you, this could not have happened without your support. I am not pleased to report that 15 fires were caused by individuals burning without written permits. There is no excuse for this action. A written permit, a law that has been in effect since 1895, is required when the ground is not completely covered with snow. Violators may be fined up to \$1000.00 and/or a year in jail, plus the cost of extingushing the fire.

Fire Permits are issued by the following:

Things to remember with any open burning:

- 1. NO burning between 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- 2. The maximum diameter for brush is 5 inches.
- 3. Fire must be attended at all times until completely extingushed.

For more information contact your precinct Fire Chief or Fire Warden.

Training is always a large part of any season. Ossipee once again hosted the 8 hour State Basic Suppression Course. I, like other Ossipee Wardens in the past, was able to take part in two weeks of on the job training as a western crew member. As part of a crew, I worked on a 12,000 acre fire in Idaho, where I had a chance to observe large fire ground organization, and to use different suppression techniques.

In closing I would like to express my thanks to the Ossipee Police Department for their valuable assistance with Fire Suppression and Law Enforcement. The cooperation is greatly appreciated. To the ladies in the Selectmens' office who have made it more convenient for Ossipee residents to get Fire Permits, and have helped with routine department duties. To the Citizens of Ossipee, Thanks! And REMEMBER, ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes

are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or caused to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire Permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000. and or a year in jail and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression

cost.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allenstown, Alton, Chesterfield and Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.
