

### TOWN WARRANT.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town on Tuesday, the eighth (8th) day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of its highways and bridges.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for permanent improvement of its highways under Chapter 35, Laws of 1905.

Given under our hands and seal this 18th day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and ten.

# STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

# Highway Department.

Statement Relating to State Aid for Highways in Town of Salisbury, N. H.:

Under Chapter 29 of the Laws of 1899, towns are required to raise one-fourth of one per cent of their valuation for the maintenance of roads, provided, however, that no town is required to raise an amount exceeding \$50 per mile of road. The valuation of the towns for 1910, and the actual mileage of roads in each town cannot be definitely stated at this date, hence the amounts opposite "A" and "C" below are approximate only.

Subject to the above statement, the following amounts

If no application for state aid is made in 1910, the town is required under Section 3 of Chapter 35, Laws of 1905, to set apart and expend for permanent improvement the sum of \$270.00.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

The Board of Health have been called upon to act more than usual the past year as it was thought best to fumigate under the existing conditions in several cases where not absolutely required by the existing laws. There has been the past year one case of diphtheria, and one of tuberculosis, measles have occurred in four families. Typhoid has prevailed to an unusual extent, there have been 15 cases in four families, resulting in two deaths, and six other cases of persons who were working here were removed to their homes or to the Concord hospital. It is supposed to have had its origin in the use of the water from one well. Samples of the water were sent to the State Laboratory and it was pronounced unfit for use.

### SCHOOL REPORT.

In presenting our annual report it is not necessary to enter into any extended remarks on our school system. In selecting teachers we have endeavored to procure such as were adapted to the schools under their charge, and we know that we have been fortunate in every school.

A word to parents: A great improvement is needed in the matter of prompt attendance. Now, parents, you ought to know that a school cannot do as well with several of the pupils late every day, or absent; and we find when the parents are prompt, and kindly help their children to form the habits of punctuality that we have the best results. Then help them and help the school. It is the earnest co-operation of parents, with the pupils and teachers in schools, with the help and the earnest work of the whole school board that will give the best results.

During the past year we have made repairs on the North Road house and find that our schoolhouses want some repairs done on the inside. Most of them are in bad shape, and if we have a pleasant room for the children, it will help to make a pleasant and profitable school.
