Fourth Annual
Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the School Board: My brief term of service, dating from last September, is sufficient reason for making my first report correspondingly brief. To one desiring knowledge of the progress which has been made in the Hill schools in recent years I would suggest a reading of Superintendent Sumner's three reports. To me they have been most interesting reading.

EQUIPMENT. The new schoolhouse leaves little to be desired as far as housing conditions are concerned. The brick building, while inadequately lighted, is comfortable and fairly serviceable. The upper grades are supplied with a first-rate equipment of maps, and the stock of text-books is in excellent condition and practically complete.

GRADING. The grammar room now comprises grades six, seven and eight; the intermediate has grades three and five and the primary has grades one and two. Good results can be secured under these conditions although three grades in a room make it difficult for a teacher to devote full time to all subjects.

ATTENDANCE. Tardiness has been and is too prevalent especially with the older children. I have wondered if the lack of some standard of correct time is in any way a cause of this. New school buildings erected in large factory towns are not nowadays supplied with belfry tower and bell; but, as there is no town clock, it might be advantageous to have a bell on the schoolhouse. I would at least suggest the advisability of making some arrangements so that a bell could be sounded ten or fifteen minutes before nine and one o'clock. This

would doubtless prove a convenience to others than school people. Further than this device I earnestly solicit the aid of the parents in securing greater punctuality.

THE SCHOOL-ROOM WORK. Special effort has been made to secure better results in language, geography and penmanship. An inspection of the compositions of the pupils will show that these efforts have met with a good degree of success. The general work under the direction of our present efficient corps of teachers is full of interest and profit for the children.

The exhibition of work held during the last week of the winter term would compare favorably with work of similar grades in many towns or cities of the state. I must admit my surprise at the excellence of the singing of the children both by schools and in concert at this public meeting.

RURAL SCHOOLS. The discontinuance of the Murray Hill school leaves the one at the Center the only rural school in town. The total registration in the latter is five pupils with an average of four attending. Aside from the regard naturally felt for a place that has so long been the center of associations and memories little can be said in favor of continuing this school. The per capita expense for maintenance is three times that of the village schools, hence it is not a paying proposition financially.

RECOMMENDATIONS. As early as possible adjustable furniture should replace the furniture now in the new building.

One hundred and fifty dollars should be raised for books and supplies.

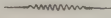
