TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Art. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Art. 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.

Art. 7. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.

Art. 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

Art. 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Hillsboro Town School District, this fourteenth annual report is respectfully submitted, and it covers the period of the school year closing June 30th, 1932.

Miss Thaida Gruenler, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, and a former resident of Hillsboro, came to the Bear Hill School in place of Miss Alva Ford who resigned in order to continue her studies. Mrs. Catherine Tasker, who had taught previously in this Union came from the Contoocook School System to take Mrs. Evans' place at the Merrill School. We have no inexperienced teachers, and six of our seven teachers have the highest form of State Certification.

Data in regard to the teachers is given in the following table:

In addition to the regular teachers we had cadets from Keene Normal School as supervisors of Drawing and Music, and results certainly warrant the continuation of this work. Four of our teachers have had more than ten years' teaching experience, and those with less experience are very enthusiastic and capable.

According to the teachers' registers the school board made 85 visits to the schools, the Superintendent made 158, and there were 337 by others. This shows an increasing interest in our schools which is appreciated.

I call attention to the very good records made at the Center, Lower Village and Flat schools.

Again the Parent Teachers' Association has shown its interest in the schools and its friendship to the teachers in many ways, and we had some helpful programs, although the attendance at the meetings was not

large. They furnished prizes again this year in the Prize Speaking Contest among the pupils of the seventh grade in which the first prize went to Verna Crane, second prize to Elsie Whitney and third prize to Irene Deshan.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of the Hillsborough Special School District, is herewith submitted the fourteenth annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

This year we made use of no cadets, but had a half time teacher in place of Miss Curran in the seventh and eighth grades, Miss Curran going to the eighth grade in Antrim. One addition to and one change in the high school faculty, completed the changes in our teaching force, as recorded in the following table:

The starred names are names of those who taught for us only part time, which accounts for the salary. Miss Gendron was elected to the head of the Commercial Department, in place of Miss Brooks who went to the Concord High School. She was a member of our high school faculty for ten years, and was conspicuous for her interest in the welfare and future of the individual pupil, and many former pupils have been influenced in their life work, by her interest and advice. Mr. John V. Quimby, who was with us last year as a Cadet, was elected to a regular position. There was no change in janitors. The Medical Inspection was again made by our four physicians.

Dental defects head the list of defects according to the

medical examination, there being 128 such defects, a large percentage of which were among the elementary school children. There were 49 cases of diseased tonsils, 33 cases of underweight, and 17 cases of adenoids. Other defects were much less in number.

Some think that the percentage of boys in a high school indicates the value of the school. We doubt very much if this is true, but it may be well to know that just 50 per cent of our high school pupils are boys while the State Average is 48.6 per cent. So we are holding our boys a little better than they are held in the state as a whole. I believe this is in a measure due to the wholesome state of athletic activities under the guidance of Headmaster Welcome.

We still have a shorter school year than the average. 355.5 was the average number of half days of school in the state, compared with our 341.6 half days. Some schools had as many as 368 half days and 257 of our New Hampshire schools had 360 or more half days in the school year.

Our pupils are creditably regular in attendance. The per cent being 97 compared with the State Average of 95.8 per cent. Hillsborough had 23 pupils per teacher compared with 17.8 for the state, so that we can hardly be said to have too many teachers.

Sixty per cent of our pupils go to post secondary schools while only 50.7 per cent of the high school graduates of the state attend these higher institutions of learning. Although we send a large number of graduates to continue their education, they do exceedingly well in those schools. Hillsborough is grouped by the State De-

partment with 29 schools of about the same enrollment and for the past three years we have held third position in this group. This means that the graduates of only two schools in this group did better work in college or Normal School, than was done by our graduates.

In a test given by the State Department to the seniors in high schools, in Spelling and in English our pupils stood above the state average in both. The figures in the few preceding paragraphs were taken from the report of the State Department.

The Wild Flower Preservation Society awarded prizes for posters. The state was divided into districts and prizes were awarded in each district for the best posters. We were placed in what was known as the Concord District and Burton Yeaton won the High School Prize in that district. The S. A. R. Good Citizenship Medal was awarded to Howard Clark. At the Annual Scholarship Day Tests at Keene we again won first place in Arithmetic, with a fourth place in Geography, and fifth place in Spelling among the high schools of the state.

The Haslet Scholarships were awarded to Arthur Call and Elizabeth Sargent, and the Jennie Butler Scholarship was awarded to Barbara Severance. Pupils from the Domestic Science Department won three first prizes, four second prizes and five third prizes for canned goods at the Hopkinton Fair, and nine of our Commercial Course pupils won first awards for speed and accuracy in type-writing.

It may be well to keep a list of the names of the High School graduates for future reference.

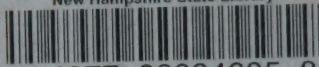
