State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court room in Town Building on the 12th, day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Auditor, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute the violation of the Liquor Law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library each for the term of three years in place of, Stella B. Farr, Jane H Tuttle, and Ianthe K. Sanger, term expired, Constable and two Road Agents. ¶

Article 2 To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the laying out and construction and repairing highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor and for all other Town charges.

Article 3 To see what sums of money the Town will appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 4 To see what action the town will take for
¶ three members of the Constitutional Convention.

the purpose of securing State aid for highway, in this town under the provision of an act to provide for State aid and for the expenditures of other public moneys in the permanent improvements of main highways throughout the state approved Feb. 24, 1905 and any amendment thereto to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed advisable and to make suitable appropriations under said act or acts.

Article 5 To see what action the town will take with reference to instructing the selectmen as to disposition of the Town History.

Article 6 To see what action the town will take in the matter of placing a new roof on the town building, and appropriating a sufficient sum of money therefor.

Article 7 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for the purpose of renovating the stage scenery, dressing-rooms and plumbing of the same, and for placing steel ceilings in the police court room, selectmen's room and the town clerk's office.

Article 8 To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Military Band.

Article 9 To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote taken at the March meeting of 1902, whereby Chapter 33, Laws of 1901, relating to Public Weighers was adopted.

Article 10 To see if the town will appropriate a sum not exceeding five thousand dollars for the purpose of constructing a bridge across the Ammonoosuc river,

at a point between the Electric Light Pond and the Pike Mfg. Co's. plant, said point to be designated by the Selectmen.

Article 11 To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 12 To choose any other necessary town officers fo the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 13 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The old school house, now called "Bethel," has been leased for the current school year and used for the fourth grade. It is in very poor condition for such use. The proprietors desire to remodel it for church uses and give no assurance that the lease can be renewed.

Conditions as to ventilation and light remain the same as for years past. It would be difficult to make improvements in most cases, but children's health and the efficiency of the schools would be improved.

The sanitary equipment of the high school and Apthorp buildings has been entirely renewed and is now equal to the best. Both buildings are well equipped with cement floors in basement, durable self acting

water closets and sanitary drinking fountains. The Apthorp building has two small basement playrooms. The much needed basement room under the high school building was not provided. The closets at the Kilburn building are worn out and the sewer should be larger.

The Kilburn building was thoroughly cleaned last summer and walls, ceilings and desks varnished, making great improvement. Several buildings need renovating. The high school building is, as reported for several years past, in an especially discreditable condition.

Settees were obtained for two High School rooms and 32 new adjustable desks and chairs for No. Littleton. We still have two school houses, besides the leased Bethel, with ancient home made desks, and many of our school rooms are filled with a patchwork of several kinds of desks, mostly not adjustble.

The furnaces under the Kilburn building are growing old after 17 years of good service, and it would be difficult to conduct pipes from them to the new school room. Therefore steam heat has been provided for the new room, the hall and the basement, none of which were reached by the furnaces. The piping and radiators can be used without change when the district is ready to install a central heating plant for the two buildings. The chimney at the high school building was never built for the present use, and is becoming dangerously loose at the top. A new chimney is seriously needed. The district now maintains three fires

under the Kilburn building and in the high school one that is not economical because of poor draft. There is good reason to believe that the saving of coal in a properly installed central plant would more than pay the interest of the cost.

DISTRIBUTION AND ATTENDANCE OF PUPILS.

The 3d and 4th grades numbered between 50 and 60, and could no longer be kept in one room, so the

4th grade is being taught in the Bethel. The 1st and 2d grade rooms have each a number large enough for one teacher. Unless the trend of population changes there will be needed next year 1 room for each of the first five grades, and one for grades 6 and 7, six rooms in all. The Mitchell building contains about the usual number, just now 59. The difficulty there lies not much in the number of pupils as in the fact that there are three grades in a room, making it difficult to secure good results. Any shift in population which should increase registration there would make it necessary to transfer one or two grades to the main building.

The table of statistics shows conditions of attendance to be much the same as in the past. These conditions may not be alarming but can be improved. More or less sickness is inevitable, and there are always a few children inclined to truancy and not easily controlled by their parents, but it is amazing as well as sad that there should be any parents willing to aid their children in habitual absence, or exploit their labor for selfish gain. The force of public opinion and the strength of the law can not be too vigorously used against such conditions.

RURAL SCHOOLS

The six rural schools had in January 93 pupils, distributed as follows: No. Littleton, 27; Pattenville, 14;

Monroe, 11; Slate Ledge, 10; Meadow, 16; and Mann's Hill, 15. The Powers school was not opened for the current school year, the three pupils there being carried to Mann's Hill. The great and sometimes sudden variation in school population in rural districts, vexatious problems of transportation, low salaries for teachers, and the difficulty often experience in getting good teachers at any price, make the administration of rural schools especially unsatisfactory. It is my belief that rural teachers should be put on the same salary basis as those of the village, and also on the same basis as to training and experience required, that schools when they grow small should be grouped together into units large enough to warrant payment of higher salaries, and that transportation should be regulated as far as possible under contracts over well planned routes and as little as possible by dickering with individual parents.

TEACHING, TESTING AND PROMOTING.

Promotion of scholars has always been largely a matter of guess work and compromise. Teachers know pretty well what a child can do, but teachers differ in judgement and standards are lacking. It is easy to arouse disappointment and envy if strict justice is rendered. Moreover the individual differences among children are infinite. This is the most conspicuous fact in any study of school work. Therefore, graded schools are more or less of a chaos, with 5 or 6

grades of ability and all sorts of intellectual differences in each class. It is certainly hopeless to put a 3d grade intellect into a 5th grade room and expect a 6th grade pupil at the end of the year. Yet almost every room has conditions of this sort which cause more worry and waste more time than all the rest of the teacher's work. Less frequent, but much too common, is the case of the child whose mental growth is more rapid than the average, but who is held with his class when he ought to have a chance to go ahead.

We need and are slowly acquiring definite standards by which we may judge pupils' mental growth by their abiilty to do. So far as these can be used, they establish the pupil's standing and the class to which he belongs. There will still be many cases for compromise and much need of careful judgement. Especially will this be true in placing children whose mental growth is very slow or very rapid. Those who are handicapped by ignorance of English, and those whose development is quick in some ways and slow in others. These facts are brought out here first, because every town of this size has enough of these special cases to warrant special provision for their training. It would be economy to give such children a better chance and relieve the regular teachers an unfair burden. This is recommended to the careful consideration of school board and people.

Furthermore, and especially in the case of children whose progress is slow or erratic, it is not fair

to blame the teacher or the child, nor to expect that a summer's cramming will make up for what has not been gained in the year's work. Parents should be interested now, and if help is needed should be giving it now. First, give it by care of the child's physical well-being. See that he keeps regular hours, and has plenty of sleep, wholesome food and suitable clothing. Second, maintain a friendly, stimulating interest in all his school affairs. It should never happen that a child is falling behind because there is no one at home who knows or cares. Incidentally, visit school. Third, very rarely can real good be done by much direct help in studies at home. Most children get all the teaching they ought to have at school.

PROGRESS

To speak of progress means for the most part, that we are trying to do a little better this year, much the same thingst that have been done in the past. In a few ways distinct advance may be noted. Penmanship has been put in definite form, with definite means of instruction and suitable standards for judging results. We know by careful tests better than we have ever known before where our pupils are strong and where they are weak along several lines, especially in arithmetic, and are dirceting our work accordingly. Education through the hand is a vital part of a well-rounded development. The importance of this is becoming well recognized, and Littleton must do more

along these lines or be left behind. In the first two or three grades we have this principle well worked out, although there may be improvement in details. All teachers do what they can with drawing, but we need the services of a competent drawing teacher. Beyond this until recently nothing has been done. This year several teachers have been experimenting to see what could be done without means and without equipment. The results have been pleasing. The children have responded heartily, readily contributing pennies for the purchase of material, and have shown increased interest in all school work, more than making up for the time taken in manual training. With your permission we shall continue to experiment, trying to find out what we can do without special rooms and special teacher and with small equipment and expense. We shall be glad of any aid the district feels able to give and feel sure of your sympathy and interest.

HIGH SCHOOL

I am glad to present a report on the high school from its principal:

In the school report of a year ago I had occasion to call attention to two important points.

First. A lamentable falling off in attendance.

Second. A need of better equipment.

I am pleased to report improvement in both respects. While several pupils have left school, the

cause, except in the case of two, has been removal from town; and has meant continuance of the high school course elsewhere. Only two pupils have actually discontinued school. Such a record is a commendable one, and has been due, I believe in considerable measure, to the co-operation of the parents in the work of the school. I hope the record may continue.

Our equipment has been increased by new settees in two of the recitation rooms, and by the installation of electric lights in the main room. The new sanitary arrangements including the drinking fountains are proving of incalculable advantage.

Some pieces of necessary apparatus have been added to the laboratories. Still there is no disguising the plain truth, the high school will not be adequately fitted for the important work it has to do in this community until there is a new high school building.

Conditions on the whole have been more favorable to progress this year than last. We were fortunate enough to retain all but one of our corps of high school teachers. Mr. Stephen A. Doody, of honor rank Middlebury College 1911, took the place of Miss Georgia Henry, and has proved efficient in the position. All the teachers have worked faithfully and with success. Their work deserves praise.

The state department at Concord has advised us to reduce our five year course to four, and an attempt has been made in that direction. A considerable percent of the first year class will complete their work in

four years. All the curricula will be reduced to the four year basis, as soon as practicable. It should be understood however, that the proposed change does not mean the dropping out of a year of school work. It aims rather at more intensive work, so that the four years will stand for as much accomplishment as the five years do now. The reduction will not be sucessful unless the parents thoroughly undertsand the significance of the proposed change.

This year the work of the school has been going along the usual lines. The pupils on the whole are doing a good grade of work. Clean athletics have been supported. Debating is being encouraged. The school is a member of the New Hampshire debating league; a school paper issued and published by the pupils has been established.

In behalf of my teachers, and of myself, I wish to thank the citizens of Littleton for their hearty co-operation, in erest and good will.

NEEDS AND CONCLUSION.

The following needs are respectfully mentioned for the consideration of the district:

- 1 A new high school building.
- 2 A four room addition to the Apthorp building, two rooms to be finished before Sept. 1. Steam heat and good ventilation in the enlarged building.
- 3 A central heating plant for the high school and

Kilburn building. A new chimney is imperative at the high school.

4 New water closets and a new sewer at the Kilburn building.

5 A better basement and other improvements at the Mitchell building.

6 A renovated interior for the high school and several rural buildings.

7 New floors at Pattenville and Monroe and new furniture in a number of rooms, both village and rural, especially Slate Ledge and Mann's Hill.

8 Medical inspection in the schools. This is compulsory in several states, including Massachusetts. It is often introduced by the volunteer service of physicians and others interested. Portsmouth, Groveton and Whitefield are recent examples. Much suffering, inefficiency and retardation might be prevented.

9 Material encouragement to progress along the lines of manual training.

10 A district by-law giving control over children from 6 to 16. The new employment law at present tends to increase the number of children between 14 and 16 who cannot be lawfully employed. Children from 6 to 8, once entered in school, should be required to attend regularly.

In conclusion let me say how highly I appreciate the hearty support and kindly interest given by all. Especially worthy of mention is the work of the Colonial Club in encouraging saving by the children.

LITTLETON SCHOOL REPORT

29

Begun in Oct. 1910, during the remainder of the school year, \$482.44 was collected from about 300 children and deposited in the savings bank. Up to Feb. 9, of this school year \$164.12 had been added. The whole community is benefited by such lessons in thrift.


