### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

The trustees submit the annual reports of the treasurer and librarian for the year ending December 31, 1901, which present the financial and administrative record of the year.

The fixed income, or interest of the permanent fund, the past year was \$181.27, which is insufficient to meet current expenses. There is an urgent demand for new books, which will be purchased whenever the money for that purpose is at our disposal. To continue the library on the present basis and to make limited purchases of new books, we must appeal to the town of Rindge for continued assistance. Can we have for use the current year, the sum of \$300, including the interest on the note of the town?

The library was established for, and has been dedicated to the public good. Its influence for good in the community will be measured by the general interest manifested by the people. As far as the young and the old make use of it, so far will it become an important factor in the education and intelligence of the present and future generations. The mission of the library, and the duty of the town cannot be separated.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DEC. 31, 1901.

Bearing in mind that there are two other public libraries in this town, which contains fewer than one thousand inhabitants, we realize that the circulation of books from the Ingalls Memorial library continues remarkably good, the daily average for the year being thirty volumes. The number of magazines, and the number of West Rindge library books given out here, were the largest since this

library was opened, and they more than balance the decrease of sixty-three in the circulation of our books.

One commendable feature for the past year is the decrease in the circulation of fiction and the increase in the use of more instructive reading. This is due partly to the books taken for school use, some of the new books being purchased with this aim in view.

One hundred and seven new books have been added by purchase, and thirty-five volumes were given to the library. The new books have met with an unusual demand, and in several instances there is need of more duplicate copies.

Among the gifts received by the library were a set of twenty-two volumes of the works of Swedenborg, given by Mr. Calvin Allen; three volumes from Mrs. A. A. Platts, of Reed's Ferry, N. H.; several volumes for the Payson collection, from E. P. Payson of Boston; the Life of Frances E. Willard, from the W. C. T. U. of Rindge; several volumes from G. H. Ingraham; and other gifts from A. S. Coffin, of New York, Mrs. E. J. Hale, Mrs. S. R. H. Towns, C. F. Platts, Mr. Golder, Mrs. Verrill, Marcus Danforth, and others whose names by request are not given.

For the museum collection, a bullet mould was given by Mrs. Joel Wellington, and cards for carding wool, were given by Mrs. Warren Sawtell. All of these gifts are gratefully acknowledged.

The large glass case for birds was given by Miss Ware, at a cost of about one hundred and fifty dollars. Her gifts and services to the library are appreciated by the Rindge people. The many and successful efforts of Hon. Ezra S. Stearns, in collecting material of historical value to the town of Rindge, should be acknowledged here, as well as the services of all the trustees, whose liberal management has allowed the library to accomplish the greatest good for the community.

It is well to mention here, also, the large amount of library work which the librarian has to do out of library hours, such as catalogue work, accession book lists, shelf



lists to be rewritten, and such writing or work as the interruptions of library hours will not allow.

We would recommend the purchase, at an early date, of all the New Hampshire town histories to be obtained, as many of them will soon be out of print. Any other historical material of local or state interest should be procured.
