Report of Fire Chief

Reviewing the past year, I feel that Rye was very fortunate not to have a greater loss by fire.

Five fires in Rye were reported through Portsmouth Telephone Exchange to the Portsmouth Fire Department and assistance was asked of them for two fires.

This cooperation of Chief George Cogan means much to the Town of Rye.

North Hampton Fire Department was called during one woods fire.

Rye Department went to Greenland for a ground and tree fire caused by electric service wires.

During the October forest fires our new apparatus stood by in Portsmouth and served in the Biddeford, Maine area. The value of this inter-city and town fire fighting cannot be expressed in dollars and cents.

The new apparatus has been in service ten months, during January and February the Rye Beach apparatus answered the calls. It was necessary to use both fire apparatus for several fires during the year.

There were 49 fire calls in Rye during 1947, two of them false alarms during the smoky days in October.

Ten grass fires, again carelessness, a want of understanding and over estimation of our individual ability to cope with the situation.

An incinerator caused one fire, see that they are covered and distant from any inflammable material and if made of metal, that the openings are not greater than one-half inch in diameter.

Nine woods fires, again carelessness in the majority.

Five oil burner fires, they are not yet fool proof and extreme care should be taken to keep them clean and if there is any question regarding their condition, have someone who knows oil burners do the adjusting.

Six dump fires, a more satisfactory control of the town dump has been arranged by Henry Dechene and in complying with his instructions posted there, you will have his appreciation.

Six chimney fires, even under what appears to be a clean condition, fire will start in some chimneys, but in

the majority of cases the fire is due to a heavy collection of soot, frequent removal of this deposit will help.

Two automobile fires, one with minor damage and the second total loss.

Two buildings, minor damage to roofs, both caused from sparks out of fire place, this condition is common during a high wind, care should be taken when placing wood on the fire, avoid moving embers and do not add a large amount of fuel.

Two electrical fires in home, the first fire was caused by a crushed bridge lamp cord having 30 ampere fuses on the line, never use over 15 ampere fuses on a lighting service and if no heating or power units are used on the line, 10 ampere fuses are sufficient.

The second fire was caused by a workman driving a nail through the power service cable. Only minor loss in each fire.

The following reports on the Biddeford, Me., fire by the men in charge of our apparatus, Assistant Chief Roy Greene and Captain Richard Oeser, as read before the monthly meeting of the Rye Volunteer Fire Department.

On October 20, due to the extremely hazardous condition created by a prolonged drought, it was decided that it would be to the town's advantage to have the fire apparatus located at the Center as much of the time as possible.

On October 23, at 1.30 P. M., Chief Drake relayed a call for standby duty from Portsmouth. Arrived at Portsmouth Station 1.45 P. M. At this time Chief Cogan had already dispatched aid to Rochester, N. H., and Waterboro, Me., had three calls at once in Portsmouth, and a call of utmost urgency for help in Biddeford, Me. Reports indicated that the fires in Portsmouth were not serious. Almost immediately another call from Biddeford told of the need for ambulances to evacuate the two hospitals and of an immediate threat to the entire city. Chief Cogan asked if Rye apparatus would go there. He promised to come to Rye and obtain what ever equipment necessary in event of an emergency. After a call to Chief Drake appraising him of the situation and obtaining his approval the apparatus with the addition of three of Chief Cogan's men left Portsmouth at 2.00 P. M. Upon arrival at Biddeford Central Station at 2.40 P. M. the situation was found to be extremely serious. Three great fires were raging around the city. One of

them moving in on the Westerly side was within a thousand yards of the thickly settled hospital area. No fire trucks were in the area and none in the station. After a quick refueling, we were given a guide and dispatched to the Westerly area mentioned.

As a great deal of confusion existed we were sent to a location where the trucks could not be fully effective so were redirected by telephone to the Alfred Road. As we approached the fire we could see that it could not be extinguished or held with our booster lines, so we asked the guide to direct us to the nearest hydrant. He told us that there was one "Just ahead." Traffic and smoke were so thick that we had to depend upon him completely. We had approached to within 50 feet of the fire when he suddenly recalled that we had passed the last hydrant on the line about a quarter mile back. Fire by now had crossed the road blocking it completely and four large tank trucks plus an assortment of other vehicles blocked the road behind. We ordered both booster lines out to protect the truck and formed a bucket brigade from the nearest tank truck to keep the booster tank supplied with water. Meanwhile the fire had burned closer to the truck and the wind was blowing flame almost over it. The men on the booster lines knocked the fire down and held it until police were able to unsnarl the traffic behind us and enable us to pull out and go back to the hydrant. There we connected a four-inch suction hose between the pump and hydrant and also connected two and one-half inch lines to both outlets. This hose had previously been laid. As the hydrant was located on a corner, one line was laid to where we had been and the other laid at right angles down a side street. We will refer to these lines as No. 1 and 2. Line 1 was approximately 1,000 feet long so a $2\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{1}{2}$ wye and two lines of one and one-half inch each approximately 250 feet long were added, one and one-half inch combination fog and straight stream nozzles were used on these lines. Line 2 was approximately 1,000 feet long and a one-inch play pipe was used on its end. On 100 pounds pressure and 25 pounds hydrant pressure, sufficient water was delivered to throw streams over the highest house in the area.

At 4.15 P. M. Norman Jenness, William Jenness, Philip Drake, Jack Hayes and Leighton Remick arrived to help man the truck and they were a welcome sight.

At this time ambulances belonging to Vern Wood, the Navy Yard, the city of Portsmouth, the city of Biddeford and others were evacuating the two hospitals nearby. People were trying to move their possessions on anything with wheels. Trucks loaded with men, hose, water barrels, in fact, anything that would carry water, state police, local police, Army staff cars and jeeps were pouring into the area. All this was seen through an eye-tingling haze of smoke against a background of lurid red sky was a never-to-be-forgotten sight.

The fire in that area was extinguished after approximately six hours of pumping with no loss of homes. Of this fact we can be justly proud because the assistant chief of the Biddeford department made the statement later, that at the time the Rye truck rolled in he would not give a nickel for the chances of the city.

At 1 A. M. we were recalled to the Central fire station where we were put on standby duty. From that time until 3 A. M. when a piece of apparatus from Boston arrived, ours was the only piece covering the city.

We answered six calls, none of which warranted any pumping. At 6 A. M. the Rye crew, with the exception of Richard Oeser, returned home, conditions having gradually improved. At 7 A. M. Russell Hayes and Richard Sterling came into the station, they had volunteered their services at Rochester, and after hearing where we were, hitch-hiked to Biddeford. At 9.30 A. M. Chief Remick brought a relief crew consisting of Roy Greene, Frank Wilson, Jack Hayes and Herbert Drake. The Portsmouth firemen, Russell Hayes, Richard Sterling and Richard Oeser returned to Rye with Chief Remick.

The apparatus stood by on call in the station, after being sent out on two fires it seemed advisable for the department to return to Rye where it was completely checked over.

On October 25 the apparatus was again stationed at Rye Center, but at 1 P. M. Chief Cogan asked if Rye would stand by in Portsmouth, at 9 P. M. Roy Greene, Richard Oeser, Norman Cameron and Paul Oeser took over and at the request of Chief Cogan left for Biddeford at 10.30 P. M.

After arriving in Biddeford word was sent back for

additional men and Frank Wilson, George Mahar, William Varrell, Joseph Varrell and James Morrison were sent.

That night Rye relieved a Portland fire department and stood guard on six sets of buildings on the Biddeford Pool Road. Considerable valuable experience was gained by the crew which twice turned back bad fires.

On October 26, Sunday noon, Rye department returned to the Biddeford fire station and stood by for calls. Late in the afternoon the crew with the apparatus returned to Rye.

The department is very proud of the fact that both the equipment and the crews performed satisfactorily and were commended highly for their work.

Your action on behalf of the Rye, New Hampshire, Volunteer Fire Department in returning to the city of Biddeford checks for services rendered during Maine's October forest fires and expressing the hope that your move would start a similar movement among similar organizations, is encouraging and appreciated, not only by the citizens of Biddeford, but by all of the citizens of Maine. On behalf of the citizens of Maine I wish to congratulate you and commend you and your Volunteer Fire Department for this attitude which already has been and I hope will be further exemplified in many communities in Maine. However, such action taken by a kindly neighbor across our borders is doubly gratifying. The people of Maine will long remember the many acts of assistance and generosity by our good neighbors from New Hampshire.

In closing this report I want to thank all the men and women who gave so generously of their time and use of their automobiles during the days and nights in October when Rye could have been visited by just such a fire as destroyed some of our not distant towns. We will never know, but we can well believe that the careful patrol of our roads at that time prevented this destruction of our homes and woodland.

Should a drought of like severity ever come to us, a road patrol before the first fire starts may be advisable.

Your vounteer fire department is an active and interested group of young men and they are deserving of your support. They have responded to the fire calls and in their monthly meetings have taken advantage of hearing informal talks on fire fighting by experienced firemen and have had instructive moving pictures on various types of fires.

During the past year they have done controlled burning of fields after the owner had secured a permit, the small charge made for this work has been credited to the volunteer department.

The permit to burn is issued by Henry Dechene, town fire warden. Having been granted this permit you do not escape the responsibility for any damage to adjoining property should your fire get out of control.

Highway Agent's Report

Receipts

Report of the Library Trustees

When the Rye Library was first established in 1911 there were few standards for the guidance of the trustees. Now, however, there is a definite pattern set up by the State Library Commission, the result of study and experience, to which we are asked to conform in order to offer the best service to our townspeople. To meet these requirements the annual budget should be based on a per capita tax of \$1.50. This is further confirmed by the report of the American Library Association that in order to give the service that was possible in 1940 a library must now have 50 per cent more funds than at that time.

The income from the trust funds on which we largely have depended for the purchase of books has been drastically reduced, while the prices of books as well as most maintenance costs have materially increased. Thus it is evident that a larger town appropriation is needed than has been requested in previous years.

This year has brought a change in the personnel of your board with the retirement of Mr. John E. Anthes, who had served as treasurer since 1932. Mr. Thomas J. Morris was elected to succeed him. Mr. John Day has succeeded Mr. George Ellison as caretaker. Mr. Thomas Rand served as assistant librarian until September and was succeeded by Miss Jeannette Pickering. Miss Emma Foss is now acting as full time assistant.

The library has many faithful and appreciative patrons but is equipped to serve many more, having on its shelves some of the world's greatest literature even though the latest "Best Seller" may not always be available. There are many people in Rye however, who have never visited the library. It is open Wednesdays and Saturdays from 1 to 7 o'clock. We urge a more general use of its facilities. We have prompt access to the books of the State Library whenever our own reference material is inadequate.

Again our thanks are due to the Every Other Tuesday Club, and to the friends who have so generously donated books and magazines.

Report of Trustees of Trust Funds

To the Citizens of Rye:

At the end of the fiscal year the town held in trust 141 funds of which the income from 11 was for the benefit of the library, the income from 137 for the care of privately owned burial lots in Central Cemetery, the income from two for the care and maintenance of the Seavey Cemetery at Lang's Corner and the Locke Cemetery at Straw's Point and the income of the Dalton Fund for the general care and beautification of Central Cemetery.

The principal, income during year, expenditures during the year and balance of income on hand at the end of the year are all shown in detail on the accompanying report.

During the year several more of our securities have been called. The investment of new money has been largely in United States Government bonds paying two and one-half per cent interest. Re-investment of funds to the extent of \$9,300 has been in a group of approved bank stocks, the annual return from which has averaged four and one-quarter per cent. The average return on all trust funds is now at the lowest point in our experience which adverse condition has affected the library income severely.

School Board Report

Your School Board respectfully submits the following report:

Again this year we have been very fortunate in being able to keep our entire staff of excellent teachers, with the exception of Miss Martin, our Art teacher. And we were delighted to have Mrs. Janice Naves Wholey return as Art teacher.

We were very happy to allow Mr. Day to use any necessary part of the building for his vacation school during the past summer. Rye parents enjoyed the privilege of supervised play and activities for their children and also the privilege of their learning to play with other children.

We feel Mr. Day deserves a great deal of credit for this and also the Saturday movies during the cold weather, which this year are free to all children living in Rye, through the generosity of public-minded friends of the school. Mr. Day is also doing a lot in the line of sports activities. Our baseball, football and basketball teams have played against teams from Greenland, North Hampton, Hampton and Portsmouth.

Mrs. Keith gave up caring for the hot lunch program, but Mrs. Barnett has again taken over and is doing a grand job.

Our school enrollment is higher this year than ever. Our class rooms are very crowded. The auditorium has to be used for all manual training work and our home economics room has to be used as a class home room. Because of this, we are not able to participate in the Federal lunch program except as we have the fresh milk. We very seriously need three more class rooms and a cafeteria.

When we have room it would seem to be proper for us to establish a kindergarten for all Rye children over five years of age.

The P. T. A. is again sponsoring a dancing class for the four upper grades, and we do appreciate this and the nice parties given for this class. Our very hearty thanks go to the Darning Needle Club, the Every

Other Tuesday Club and all individuals who made it possible for us to have a mimeograph, and to the Community Club for the money for the achievement awards at graduation in June. Also to the Rye Grange for the new dishes.

We have been able at last to purchase an electric refrigerator, so that as warm weather comes on the milk can be kept cold.

During the summer we had the auditorium floor sanded and refinished and a few other necessary repairs made.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

I hereby submit to you my annual report as Superintendent of the school year 1946-1947. Some statistics will also be given for the present year.

The current school year began on Wednesday, September 3, 1947, with an enrollment of 240. This is nine more pupils than that of the previous year. The increased enrollment reflects a nation-wide trend in the elementary schools. Rye, in common with many schools in this vicinity, has witnessed a large increase in its enrollment, particularly in the lower grades. The school report of 1931, just prior to the construction of the present building, gives the September registration as 150 pupils. The comparable figure for this year is 240.

This 60% increase has resulted in several educationally undesirable features. The mechanic arts room and the home economics room were made home rooms to accommodate the increased enrollment. The mechanic arts benches were placed in the auditorium, thereby depriving our pupils of full time use of this room for physical education. The home economics units were lined up at the side of the seventh grade home room. Since this room was also used for the preparation and serving of noon lunches, during the winter months, the results of such crowding are easily observable. Rye schools benefit from the Federal Lunch Program to the extent of reduced prices on milk. This, together with the hot lunch offered is a valuable service to our children. The crowded condition of the building makes the serving of a full Federal Lunch Program undesirable.

To enter the modern world with an understanding mind, our children must have more acquaintance with Science, at least in its elementary form. To bring this to them effectively, much equipment is needed. This should be housed in a special room adapted to its peculiar purpose. The necessary equipment cannot be scattered about various parts of the building. If our pupils are to have the benefit of this type of preparation, suitable provision must be made.

In order to better meet the needs of the pupils, additional rooms must be made available. The increase in pupil enrollment is not a temporary condition. National survey shows that the birth rate in the United States increased from 18 per thousand of population, the prewar figure, to 26.2 per thousand in 1947. Since the increase began in 1942, more children will be entering the first grade now. Provision must be made for these increased classes.

The kindergarten is now generally recognized as an integral part of a public school system. Children five years of age easily learn social adjustments which result in happy personalities. The spirit of playing together and working together can as easily be taught at this age as a year later. Little children learn valuable lessons in the care of property and in sharing with others that to which all are entitled. Is it possible that some provision can be made for housing such a school?

It would seem that five additional rooms should be made available very soon. A more complete mechanic arts course should be housed in a satisfactory shop as should the home economics work. Each of these courses has practical phases which need equipment of their own undisturbed by formal class work. As the enrollment of pupils increases we shall need at least two more class rooms. An enrollment of thirty-five pupils in each room should be a maximum. Forty pupils is the upper limit possible. The science room, so constructed that it may later be converted into a class room, should also be included.

This year a census of all pre-school children was taken. This enumeration showed continually large enrollment. Children four years old last September who now live in town was recorded as 35, three-year olds 32, two-year olds 32, and one-year old, 35. Since this census could make no allowance for families moving into town, or possibly some children unrecorded, it is evident that we face larger classes in the immediate future.

The September enrollments of the first grade by years gives a clear picture of the past ten years:

As a result of a vote passed at the school district meeting of 1947, a committee was appointed by the Moderator to examine the needs of the school and to bring recommendations to the next district meeting. This committee is now at work and will doubtless make its recommendations as scheduled.

Under the new education bill passed by the legislature, Rye qualifies for State Aid to the amount of \$5,525.23. This is acquired through two accounts. Under the Equalization provision, Rye secures \$1,717.37. This amount is determined by the equalized valuation of the districts. Rye's share of the General Aid comes to \$3,805.86. This second figure is based upon the number of children for whose education the district is responsible, as determined by the average per pupil membership. This money helps us in meeting additional school expenses including the minimum teachers' salary and the increased cost of text books, supplies and administration.

Rye supplies its children with as complete an education as can be found in any comparable school. It would be noted by any visitor that the noon hour is utilized for physical education, their games take place after school, that school programs are frequent and that rehearsals for plays, public speaking and school exhibitions are part of the regular school schedule. The Saturday picture programs under the sponsorship of Mr. Day and generously supported by contributions of the citizens is an unusual service of the school.

The Rye Parent-Teacher Association is a valued part of the school. It is always generous in its help. I wish to add my thanks to that of the Board and the School Staff for its continued interest.

Rye is one of the few schools fortunate enough to retain its complete teaching staff for the current year. Mr. Day as Principal, heads a school with unity of purpose. There are not, as sometimes happens, eight different schools housed in one building. All teachers working together under good leadership must result in a successful school.

As in previous years, Grades 6, 7, and 8 are departmentalized. Mrs. Seavey, Mrs. Cole and Miss Edwards are the four regular teachers for this group. They have achieved results not only commended by the

schools which their pupils later attend but also commended by the people of Rye. The middle grades are taught by Mrs. Jenness and Miss Wakefield. Both of these teachers are students of their pupils. They understand each child individually and work with him from his present location.

It is in the three lower grades that the child must have constant supervision and the ground work must be started for independent work in the late grades. This is no mean assignment. Fortunate is the district that retains good, experienced teachers in these grades. Rye has done just this by retaining the services of Mrs. Makin, Miss Farnum and Miss Scammon. We were all pleased to welcome Mrs. Wholey again as teacher of Art and also Mrs. Foster in the Music department. The work of both these teachers adds enjoyment to the school life.

Mrs. Lindsey, the school nurse, has attended numerous conferences during the year to study the expanded program which is to be a part of her work. Recognizing the importance of this field, a new Supervisor of Health has been appointed by the State office. It will bring a more definite Guidance program toward habits of health for our children.

Union 21 is to hold a citizenship workshop for all its elementary teachers. This is to take place in Hampton on January 21-23. This workshop is to be conducted by the State Department of Education for the benefit of the teachers. Representatives of the state office will demonstrate the most approved methods of teaching in the modern school. This is a part of the in-service training recommended by the Lay-Professional group organized in New Hampshire last year. The hope is that similar workshops will be available to the teachers in the state annually.

May I again express my appreciation to the school board of Rye for advice and hearty co-operation given me in the work of the past year.

Report of School Physician

The 1946-47 annual medical examination of grades two and six was held in the spring of 1947, too late for publication in last year's town report. At that examination 48 children were examined. No physical defects were noted and the general health and nutrition was good.

The pre-school round-up was held in May, 1947, under the sponsorship of the Rye Parent-Teacher Association. Twenty-nine children were examined and 18 children were vaccinated against small pox.

The 1947-48 annual medical examination was held in January, 1948. At that examination 57 children were examined. The general health and nutrition was good. A comparatively small number of minor physical defects were noted and referred to the parents of the children through the cooperation of the school nurse, Dorothy E. Lindsey, R. N.

At both annual examinations the condition of the teeth was good due to the good nutrition of the children and the annual dental clinic under the direction of Dr. Harold Pierson of Hampton, N. H.

Report of School Nurse

The physical examinations were conducted by Dr. Sanders, the second and sixth grades being examined. The other grades were examined by the school nurse, and vision and hearing tests were given.

Dental clinics were held at Dr. Pierson's office in Hampton during November, 1946, and April, 1947. One hundred and thirty-three children received complete dental care. The clinic is sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association. The Red Cross provided dental care for seven children.

The Summer Round-up Clinic was held May 23, 1947. Twenty-nine children were given physical examinations by Dr. Sanders. Eighteen were vaccinated. This Clinic, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association, is conducted for pre-school children. It enables the parents to have defects corrected before the beginning of the school year in September.
