

EXTRACT FROM WILL OF MRS. EMMA B. WIGGIN.

Be it known that I, Emma B. Wiggin, of Stratham, in the County of Rockingham, and State of New Hampshire, being of sound mind and memory do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following:—

*First:*—After the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses, I give, bequeath and devise unto G. Ralph Laighton, of Portsmouth, George H. Odell and Annie W. Scammon of Stratham, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in trust for the following purposes. Said Trustees are to purchase a suitable lot on the main road near the village in Stratham, in some elevated site, convenient of access, and are to erect thereon a library building, said building to be of brick or stone,

and in the erection of the building and the management of the same said Trustees are to have in mind the welfare and convenience of the citizens of Stratham and the permanence of said building. The entire expense of said building and lot is not to exceed the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars. Said building to be known as the George A, and Emma B. Wiggin Public Library, and is given by me in memory of my late husband and in accordance with what I know to be his expressed desire for the welfare of his native town and its citizens. Said Trustees are to have the charge and management of said library during their lives, and upon the death or resignation of any of said Trustees the vacancy is to be filled by the surviving or remaining Trustees, provided that said vacancy is not occasioned by the death or resignation of the resident members of the board, in which case the town of Stratham at its annual meeting or at any special meeting called for the purpose, shall choose some person, a citizen of Stratham, to fill the vacancy.

The Library Trustees also hold in trust one thousand (\$1,000) dollars, the income from which goes to Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Blodgett for life, and at their death the principal goes to the Library as a fund and the income to be used in the purchase of books.

The Trustees also hold about five thousand dollars (\$5,000), the income of which goes equally divided to E. J. Blodgett and John W. Wiggin for their life time and then to Annie W. Scammon, and at her death the principal goes to the library as a fund for the support of the same.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools.

#### To the School Board of Stratham:

Gentlemen: I hereby submit my first report as Superintendent of your public schools.

Since the inception of my work last September. I have sought to learn as thoroughly as possible the condition of your schools, their efficiency, the causes of waste, of loss, of retardation, of lack of adjustment of the individual pupil to his school work and to the grade in which I have found him. An endeavor has also been made to devise plans by which greater efficiency and less waste may be attained in the operation of the schools. To secure the highest degree of efficiency in its work, the schools must make the most effective use of the time and the material at their disposal. With this end in view the teachers have co-operated with the Superintendent in making their daily programmes in such a way that the amount of time in which pupils are awaiting recitations. or in which they are not actively engaged in preparation for recitation, has been made a minimum. Efforts have made been to reduce the loss due to poor attendance, but this most serious waste of the public money is vet considerable. Previous reports of School Boards and Superintendents have emphasized the importance of good attendance and punctuality. The apathy of parents in this matter has often been responsible for wrecking the careers of boys and girls, who otherwise might have been encouraged by their attainment, and the realization of some latent power to increase their efficiency to a degree adequate to insure success in life. To this great loss of educational instruction to the individual must be added the loss of revenue to the town.

Lack of punctuality is another waste of time we have to meet. The pupils who are dilatory become habituated to shiftless ways, and to the resulting incompetency to properly perform the duties of good citizenship.

There have been too rapid promotions, and as a consequence, many pupils are not equal to the grade of work they are now doing. There are so many grades for each teacher that the time allotment of the several subjects pursued is far too brief. Too much time has been spent on some subjects, too little on others.

The home should supplement the work of the school room, at least should harmonize with it. Sometimes, the lack of knowledge of present school programmes, and of the wide scope of work required of the teacher, causes false conceptions of the value of the teacher's devoted endeavors in the pupil's behalf.

Perception charts for use in arithmetic study have been prepared in accordance with the instructions of the Superintendent. Practical mental work in arithmetic has been emphasized and practical everyday problems have been prepared and solved by pupils. More stress has been laid upon mental, and less upon pencil and paper work in this subject.

Reading and literature courses have been formulated, so as to make the most effective use of the books we have. The memorizing of selections from great writers, story-telling for teaching oral language more definitely have been begun. An endeavor to teach patriotism in the schools has been made, and daily exercises performed which aim to inculcate love of country and honor to the flag.

During the last school year music has been added to the studies pursued in our schools. The expenditure has, I believe, been justified, although work of this nature requires considerable time to insure large results; and the adaptability of the teacher to work, outlined by the musical supervisor, must be taken into consideration.

The most serious problem we have to face at present is the matter of school organization. We, school officials, parents, voters of the town, should interest ourselves in every way possible in this matter. Means should be devised whereby we can have a more thoroughly graded system.

At the present time, there are from five to six grades in each of our four schools. If you take into consideration the increased amount of knowledge that must be acquired by every boy and girl before graduating from the eighth grade, likewise the practical impossibility of accomplishing the requirement by any teacher becomes evident. Besides, regard must be paid to the fact that very seldom is it possible to obtain a teacher, who is naturally adapted or sufficiently well trained to do efficient work in primary, intermediate, and grammar grades. The very attitude of mind of the primary teacher is far removed from that of the grammar school teacher.

No little loss in instruction has been occasioned by the defects in the heating apparatus of two of the schools.

The change of teachers in Division I has naturally caused some retardation, due to the usual readjustment of the pupil to a new teacher's methods of class room management. However, there is reason to believe that the work of this year has been one of progress, and some foundation has been laid for better work, and for substantial results.

In possession of the town are many well selected text books; they have been tabulated; copies of the list will later be placed in the hands of the members of the School Board. A policy of buying for the largest class in town in any given grade, rather than for the total number of pupils of that grade, will render possible some economy in the purchase of text books; and the amount saved can better be spent in securing a wider range of supplementary readers. In this way we can soon, so far as books are concerned, be able to fulfill the state programme of studies for the elementary schools. Lists of the books arranged by grades have been put in the hands of the teachers, so that every pupil in town might have access to the use of every text necessary to the work of his or her grade.

The active, sympathetic support of the three members of the School Board, the ready and enthusiastic compliance of the teachers to the Superintendent's plans, their painstaking, conscientious devotion to the interests of the pupils, and the welfare of the schools, the generous attitude of many of the parents and of the community, have rendered the labors of the Superintendent much easier than they would otherwise have been, and they have his highest appreciation.
