To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following report of the Department of Drawing is herewith submitted.

The work in drawing in the grades has been a continuation of the work of last year.

I have been using the same outline with but few changes.

The following topics are included in the course in drawing:

Illustrative Drawing, Object Drawing, Nature Drawing, Paper Work, Color, Design.

In as many schools as possible I am putting in manual training without special equipment, along with the drawing, in this way making drawing more practical. The pupils have been furnishing their own materials for the manual work, with but slight expense to themselves, and have shown a very great interest in it. This includes making baskets of raphia and useful objects of cloth and paper, with colored decoration.

The work in the High School is a more difficult problem on account of the limited amount of time. The school is divided into two classes. The boys take the mechanical drawing course, while the girls are doing tooled leather work, embroidery and stenciling. The pupils make up their own designs. In closing, I wish to thank the teachers for their hearty co-operation.

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Mr. F. L. Kendall, Superintendent of Schools:

The music in the schools of Antrim has gone very well this year, despite the inroads that colds have made upon the singing and attendance. This has been worst felt in the First and Second Grades. The Second Grade is improving, and the change in them since their first year is marked. They are using the first reader and the sight-singing slips.

The Third and Fourth Grades are showing great improvement under the care of Miss Barker.

In the Fifth and Sixth Grades two part music is being sung, and the theoretical work is sound. The singing and

general musical work in the Grammar room is better than last year, all parts in the three-part singing being well supported. In these two rooms, original melody work is being done, set to words given them. In the High School, work is being done on a cantata and several part songs, also double mixed quartet work. Attention should be called to the concert given by the Antrim High School last April, which was a success, and secured a fund of some twenty dollars as proceeds. It is hoped this can be done this year also.

I thank each teacher from the First Grade up through the High School under Mr. Gibbs for their kind co-operation in the music.

With a total membership of nearly two hundred and a High School average attendance of sixty pupils, we consider the present year auspicious for the growth and improvement of our school.

The entrance of the Eighth Grade with the Ninth in the fall gave us an unusually large Freshman class. The record of those pupils entering from the Eighth Grade, however, thus far seems to warrant our elimination of the Ninth Grade.

The added room for High School recitations and the better division of subjects with three teachers has also worked for added efficiency in carrying out our program of studies.

We are glad to see the increased number of tuition pupils in attendance and the general air of interest in all our work.

Last year the number of tardy marks for the High School was excessive. Shall we not have the hearty co-operation of all parents in seeing that pupils are regular and punctual in their attendance?

It is our hope that we shall be favored with more visits from parents and friends of the school.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

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## Members of the School Board:

I respectfully submit the following report concerning the schools of Antrim for the year ending February 15, 1912.

During the school year ending in June, 1911, we were fortunate in that we were not obliged to have any changes in the teaching force. At or near the close of the year, however, three teachers decided to accept more lucrative positions elsewhere. These were Miss Grace C. Waterman, assistant in the High School; Miss Winifred Cochrane, teacher of Grades Three and Four, and Miss Ethel M. Batchelder of the Center School. Miss Gladys M. Wilbur of Providence, R. I., was elected to succeed Miss Waterman, Miss Edith S. Barker was transferred from the East School to the South School, Grades Three and Four; Miss Fannie P. Cutler of Waltham, Mass., accepted the Center School position, and Miss Mary L. Thompson of Antrim succeeded Miss Barker at the East School.

The work in the schools is being adjusted to the requirements of the "Program of Studies" furnished by the State Department. As this is outlined for an eight grade system of schools, it has seemed best to arrange the studies in our schools in accordance with this idea. For some time, therefore, we have been planning the work with that in mind. This year the Ninth and Eighth Grades in the South School are in the same room and are doing practically the same work. After this year even the name of Ninth Grade will probably disappear, and pupils will enter the High School directly from the Eighth Grade. That the members of this grade might have an additional incentive for doing good work, they have been told that those whose average rank for the year in any subject is eighty per cent or more will be excused from the final examination in that subject.

It is fortunate that we were able to unite the Eighth and Ninth Grades this year, because of the unusually large enrollment in the High School, making it more necessary than ever that there should be three teachers who could give full time to that part of the school work. It also made it possible to use

the old Ninth Grade room for a recitation room.

The small number enrolled at the East School keeps the question before us regarding the advisability of closing that school and of transporting the pupils to the South School, where they could be cared for easily, as not one of the grade rooms is at all crowded. As far as that is concerned, the pupils of the Center School also could easily be accommodated at the South School.

The enrollment at the North Branch School has been much larger than usual for the last term or two, there being at one time twenty-seven names on the register. The building needs a number of repairs and improvements. As suggested in my report of last year, it should be provided with a heating and ventilating plant, so that the pupils may be supplied with a sufficient amount of fresh, warm air. A new floor should be laid, as the present one is uneven and badly worn.

In addition to these, a number of minor repairs are also needed in order to put the building in respectable shape. To cover the expense of these, I would recommend a special appropriation of at least three hundred dollars. Of course, a new building, constructed to the latest ideas regarding heat, light and ventilation, would be still more desirable.

The year just closed has been by far the most successful of any since the James A. Tuttle Library was opened to the public.

During the past twelve months the total circulation of books was 9,625, with a weekly average circulation of 185 books; as compared with the number loaned last year there is a total gain of 1,125, with a weekly gain of 22 books. While as in former years fiction has predominated to a considerable per cent in the books taken out, it is gratifying to know that there has been a steadily increasing demand for works on history, biography, travel and science. In connection with the Dickens' centenary anniversary there has been an unusual call for books by this author the past two months. The largest monthly output of books was during April and December, the combined circulation for the eight weeks being 1,868 volumes.

The pupils of the graded schools and especially the high school students have used the library much the past year; following the method adopted last year, a section of the shelves in the stack-room was set apart for the use of the pupils of the high school, and all the required books for supplementary reading have been kept in this section; by this means the books are made of easy access to the students, and the idea

has met with general satisfaction. During library hours the pupils have used the reading rooms more than in former years, consulting reference books not permitted to be taken from the building and procuring necessary material for essays and debates. Members of the various literary clubs in town have patronized the library each week in search of material for papers for the different club meetings.

The number of borrowers' cards in constant use is about 575, and this number represents families from all sections of the town. Aside from the books loaned, there has been a call for papers and magazines from the reading rooms, and during the year many periodicals have been loaned to those living at a distance from the library.

Throughout the year the library has been well patronized by the men employed in the cutlery shops, who have taken out large numbers of books, as well as using the reading rooms to a considerable extent.

The library has been most fortunate this year in receiving an unusually large number of gifts of books and magazines; one of the largest donations was from Hon. Wyman Kneeland Flint of Milwaukee, who presented the library with over two hundred volumes, included in the number were many valuable reference books and two sets of encyclopedias; this makes eight sets of encyclopedias now owned by the library, which is something rather unusual for a town the size of Antrim.

Among those who have donated books and magazines the past year are Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Hammett, John Bryer, Mrs. Charles R. Talbot of Brookline, Mass., Ephriam Weston, W. R. C., Miss Mabel Petty, Miss M. J. Abbott, Mrs. Nathan C. Jameson, Mrs. D. H. Goodell, Mrs. Lucretia Shaw, Mrs. Edwin T. Adams, Mrs. Eugene Woodward, Mrs. Melvin D. Poor, Clark B. Cochrane, A. A. Swift, Charles S. Abbott and Dr. I. G. Anthoine of Nashua. Each week the library has received a copy of "The Antrim Reporter" from Editor H. W. Eldredge, who has also remembered the library each month with copy of a valuable and up to date magazine on electricity. Through the courtesy of U. S. Senator Burnham, the library has recently been presented with a large map of the United States and its island possessions, which has been placed on the

north wall of the stack-room. One of the important gifts of the year was a handsome two-volume edition of the Standard Dictionary, presented the library by Mr. B. F. Funk of the publishing company of Funk & Wagnall of New York. An enlarged picture of the late Levi Woodbury, a native and former prominent business man of Antrim, was received from members of the family a few weeks ago.

The last gift of the year, and one of the most acceptable, was the life size marble bust of the late Judge Luke Woodbury, a native of Antrim and widely known throughout New Hampshire, of which at the time of his death he was Democratic candidate for Governor. The bust, which is the gift of Mrs. John F. Whittemore of Arlington, Mass., is of Italian marble and stands on a marble pedestal near the main entrance to the library, where it attracts the attention of all who enter.

It is under the most prosperous conditions that the Tuttle library closes the year with bright prospects of a still better year to come.
