We want to express our appreciation to all the volunteers, elected officials and employees that have served the town during the past year. We started the year with three new Trustees of the Trust Funds, Amanda Fryberger, Karen LaRue and Tammy Rudolph. They spent many hours learning their role and responsibilities to this important position. They did a great job and we thank them for their service. Ruth Van Houten, Marilyn Rousseau and the OEM and health team have spent many hours organizing the pandemic H1N1 clinics. We thank them for their efforts to keep us safe from this potentially deadly virus.

We welcomed two new employees in 2009. Patricia Lachenal was hired as secretary to the highway, transfer station, cemetery and planning board. Sandy Hoag was hired as deputy town clerk, returning to a position she had held many years ago. We want to congratulate Police Office Noah Sanctuary for graduating near the top of his class at the police academy.

Wares Grove Beach saw a lot of improvement this past year. The Town voted to replace the aging septic system at the beach. A new Clean Solution System was installed. The Town was fortunate to qualify for Federal Stimulus Funds for this project and was awarded 50% of the original cost estimate. The Parks & Recreation Committee has been working very hard to improve the facilities. They were busy seeking donations, which they intend to use to improve the picnic area, basketball court and the play area in the near future.

The State of New Hampshire has proposed a Welcome Center in Chesterfield near the Brattleboro/Chesterfield Bridge. The State presented their proposal to the Planning Board. There are a few things that still need to be done by the State before the Welcome Center is built.

At the end of November, Pine Tree Cable notified us that they were ceasing operations. They served many residents with their cable television and internet needs. We looked into finding a company to replace those services. Argent Communications has stepped in and we look forward to working with them to establish a franchise agreement.

We would like to recognize Boy Scout Troop 286 and their leader Gary Winn for holding a Liberty Tree memorial by the Center Station this past summer to dedicate the new Liberty Elm Tree that was planted there. We would like to recognize that Fred Szmit received a Citizen Volunteer Award from the Governor for his many years of volunteer service to the Town.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Thirteen Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$213,980) for the purpose of resurfacing Town roads, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d). (Recommended by the Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) to be added to the already established Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Ten Thousand Dollars (\$210,000) to purchase a new Grader for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of up to Two Hundred and Ten Thousand Dollars (\$210,000) from the Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, said amount to be offset by the amount received from the trade-in or sale of the existing Grader, or act in any way related thereto. ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) to replace the Furnaces and Insulate at the Town Hall, funding for

this purpose will be from a grant in the amount of One Hundred Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$112,500) and the balance not to exceed Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500) from general taxation, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

ARTICLE 13: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum Twenty Three Thousand Dollars (\$23,000) to be added to the already established Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500) to purchase a Smart Cart Radar Trailer, funding for this purchase will be from a grant in the amount of at least Three Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$3,250) and further to authorize the withdrawal of the balance up to Three Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$3,250) from the Police Department Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to resurface the Tennis Court in the center of Town and authorize the withdrawal of up to Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) from the Outdoor Court Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to construct a children's play structure at Wares Grove Beach and authorize the withdrawal of up to Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) from the Wares Grove Recreation Facility

Enhancement Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

(Recommended by the Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to the already established Parks and Rec Building Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 to be known as the Parks and Rec 4x4 All Terrain Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a 4x4 all terrain vehicle for the Parks and Recreation Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be placed in this fund, or act in any way related thereto.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable general fund trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Parks and Rec pickup truck Expendable Trust Fund for the purpose of purchasing a pickup truck for the Parks and Recreation Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be placed in this fund. ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 41:14-a authorizing indefinitely, until specifically rescinded by the Town, to give the Board of Selectmen authority to acquire or sell land, buildings, or both provided however, they shall first submit any such proposed acquisition or sale to the planning board and to the conservation commission for review and recommendation by those bodies, where a board or commission or both, exist, or act in any way related thereto.

ARTICLE 34: To see what option Town Meeting voters want to direct the Board of Selectmen to pursue regarding the Old Town Office Building located in front of the tennis court on Route 63. Options are deconstruction of the building or preservation of the building. This is a non-binding vote.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance to promote a safe and orderly way of life for our inhabitants:

POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA It shall be unlawful for any person to use, or to possess with intent to use, drug paraphernalia knowing that it will be used or is customarily intended to be used to plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert, produce, process, prepare, test, analyze, pack, repack, store, contain, conceal, inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the human body controlled substances in violation of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a violation.

MANUFACTURE OR DELIVERY OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA It shall be unlawful for any person to deliver, possess with intent to deliver, or manufacture with intent to deliver, drug paraphernalia knowing that it will be used or is customarily intended to be used to plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert, produce, process, prepare, test. Analyze, pack, repack, store, contained conceal, inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the human body a controlled substance in violation of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a violation.

DELIVERY OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA TO A MINOR: It shall be unlawful for any person 18 years of age or older to knowingly deliver, or solicit, direct, or hire someone to deliver any drug paraphernalia as defined on Section Definitions, to a person 17 years of age or younger. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a violation.

ADVERTISEMENT OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA: It is unlawful for any person to place in any newspaper, magazine, handbill or other publication any advertisement, knowing or under circumstances where one reasonably should know, that the purpose of the advertisement, when viewed in whole or in part, is to promote the sale of objects intended for use or customarily intended for use as drug paraphernalia. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of a violation.

DEFINITIONS: The term "drug paraphernalia" means all equipment, products and materials of any kind which are used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance in violation of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. It includes, but is not limited to:

- (a) Kits used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in planting, propagating, cultivation, growing or harvesting of any species of plant which is a controlled substance of from which a controlled substance can be delivered.
- (b) Kits including but not limited to cocaine kits, used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, or preparing controlled substances.
- (c) Isomerization devices used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in increasing the potency of any species of plant which is a controlled substance.
- (d) Testing equipment used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in identifying or in analyzing the strength, effectiveness or purity of controlled substances.
- (e) Scales and balances used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in weighting or measuring controlled substances.
- (f) Dilutents and adulterants, such as quinine hydrochloride, mannitol, mannite, dextrose and lactose, used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in cutting controlled substances.
- (g) Separation gins and sifters used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in removing twigs and seeds from, or in otherwise cleaning refining, marijuana.
- (h) Blenders, bowls, container, spoons and mixing devices used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in compounding controlled substances.
- (i) Capsules, balloons, envelopes and other containers used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in packaging small quantities of controlled substances.
- (j) Containers and other objects used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in storing or concealing controlled substances.
- (k) Objects used or intended for use or customarily intended for use in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing marijuana, cocaine, hashish, or hashish oil into the human body, such as:

- (1) Metal, wooden, acrylic, glass, stone, plastic, or ceramic pipes with or without screens, permanent screens, hashish heads, or punctured metal bowls;
- (2) Water pipes;
- (3) Carburetion tubes and devices;
- (4) Smoking and carburetion masks;
- (5) Chamber pipes;
- (6) Carburetor pipes;
- (7) Electric pipes;
- (8) Air-driven pipes;
- (9) Chillums;
- (10) Bongs;
- (11) Ice pipes or chillers;

DETERMINIATION: In determining whether an object is drug paraphernalia under this ordinance, a court or other authority should consider, in addition to all other logically relevant factors, the following;

- (a) Statements by an owner or by anyone in control of the object concerning its use;
- (b) Prior convictions, if any, of an owner, or of anyone in control of the object, under any state or federal law relating to any controlled substance;
- (c) The proximity of the object, in time and space, to a direct violation of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated;
- (d) The proximity of the object to any controlled substances;
- (e) The proximity of any residue of controlled substances;
- (f) The existence of any residue of controlled substances on the object;
- (g) Direct or circumstantial evidence of the intent of an owner, or of anyone in control of the object, to deliver it to persons whom he knows intend to use the object to facilitate a violation of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated; the innocence of an owner, or of anyone in control of the object, as to a direct violation of the New Hampshire Revised statutes Annotated shall not prevent a finding that the object is intended for use as drug paraphernalia;
- (h) Instructions, oral or written, provided with the object concerning its use;
- (i) Descriptive materials accompanying the object which explain or depict its use;
- (j) National and local advertising concerning its use;
- (k) The manner in which the object is displayed for sale;
- (I) Direct or circumstantial evidence of the ratio of sales of the objects to the total sales of the business enterprise;
- (m) Whether the object is customarily intended for use as drug paraphernalia and the existence and scope of other legitimate uses for the object in the community; and
- (n) Expert testimony concerning its use.

ARTICLE 36: We, the undersigned, petition the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, to designate the unpaved portion of Atherton Hill Road and Lincoln Road as scenic roads. The two roads are actually one continuous road.

We are abutters, residents of the neighborhood and others interested in preserving the rural character of the Atherton Hill Road and Lincoln Roads. The road is a gateway to the California Brook Natural Area, one of the largest protected areas in southern New Hampshire. These roads border a unique wildlife habitat that includes vernal pools, a prime habitat for amphibians. This environment is also home to moose, fox, deer, bear, coyote, and two native songbirds – the wood thrush and the veery – that are unfortunately declining throughout the region.

The highest point on Atherton Hill Road has the only view of Mount Monadnock in Spofford. Historically the roads include the pioneering Lincoln and Atherton farms, built in the early 1800's. The Lincoln and Atherton families are buried in the graveyard on the Bartlett Road, which is just off

Atherton Hill Road. Atherton Hill may well be the former Cannon Road, over which cannons were rolled from Keene New Hampshire, to Bennington, Vermont, during the Revolutionary War. More recently Atherton Hill was part of the Stagecoach Road used for travel and commerce for many years before the introduction of the automobile.

First, we are asking the signers of this petition to help maintain the rural character of this road for the residents who live on the road, for the entire neighborhood and for the residents of the town of Chesterfield. We hope to build a spirit of stewardship and appreciation for our beautiful surroundings. Second, if the road is so designated, there will be a mechanism in place to protect its rural character. Thank you for your time and consideration.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representative(s), our State Senator, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate President. Resolved: The citizens of New Hampshire should be allowed to vote on an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution that defines "marriage".

ARTICLE 38: Shall New Hampshire's Congressional Delegation be instructed to pursue a new and independent investigation to address thoroughly all the evidence and unanswered questions related to the events of September 11, 2001. (The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted by the Town of Chesterfield to New Hampshire's Congressional Delegation).

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Board of Selectmen to dispose of municipal assets by sealed bid, or by other means as deemed appropriate, or act in any way related thereto.

ARTICLE 40: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING 2009

Proceedings of the Annual Town Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Chesterfield School in said town on Tuesday, March 10, 2009.

Moderator Pro Tempore Chester C. Greenwood called the Town Meeting to order at 10 o'clock in the forenoon at the Town Hall and declared the polls open for voting by ballot for Town Officials and amendments to the Zoning Ordinances.

Polls were closed at 6:00 pm at the Town Hall and voting resumed at 6:30 pm at the Chesterfield School. Moderator Bentley called the meeting to order at 6:43 pm with Chester C. Greenwood and Heidi Stanclift as Moderator Pro Tempore and Deputy Clerk, respectively.

Police Chief, Lester Fairbanks, lead the meeting in the salute to the flag.

The Moderator recognized Selectman Jon McKeon, who offered retiring Selectman, Dan Cotter, words of appreciation and thanks for his years of service on the Board. Mr. Cotter responded by thanking his fellow Selectmen and the Town. Mr. Cotter did a dedication of the Town Report to Ruth Van Houten for her outstanding contributions to the Town.

Moderator Bentley then read an Emergency Phone Plan encouraging all residents to register their phone numbers in case of an emergency. He then read a flier in regards to the Chesterfield School Meeting and followed up by thanking Bart Bevis and his Crew. Per a new State Regulation, Moderator Bentley then read the Emergency Plan.

ARTICLE 3: Gary Winn, Budget Committee Chairman, gave the report of the Budget Committee. Gary discussed the COLA at 2% and that 2009 is a 53 week year. He also noted that the Town Clerk was seeing less car registrations.

ARTICLE 4: A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Bob Brockmann and seconded by Gary Winn regards to the Elderly Exemptions from property under the provisions of RSA 72:39-b: Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Chesterfield, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$40,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$60,000; for a person 80 years of age or older \$80,000. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$30,000 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$35,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$70,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by the person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years.

ARTICLE 5: A motion was made by Dan Cotter and seconded by Susan Newcomer to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Seven Hundred Eighty Nine Thousand and Two Hundred and Seventy Four Dollars (\$2,789,274) for the following purposes, or act in any way related thereto. (\$2,812,609 recommended by Board of Selectmen)

A voice vote was in the negative on a motion made by Jon McKeon and seconded by Wanda McNamara to amend the budget to the Selectmen's Recommended Budget as noted above for an increase of COLA from 2% to 5%.

A voice vote was in the negative on a motion made by Susan Newcomer and seconded by Ruth Van Houten to amend the budget by \$1500.00 to add a Public Relations line for mailings or some form of notifications to the public regarding information on important Town issues.

Article 5 is adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Jon McKeon and seconded by Toni O'Neil to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Eighty Nine Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars (\$289,925) for the purpose of resurfacing Town roads, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d). (Recommended by the Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 7: A motion was made by Gary Winn and seconded by Bill Bucknell to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Three Thousand Dollars (\$73,000) to be added to the already established Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto.

A voice vote was in the affirmation on a motion made by Cliff Emery and seconded by Toni O'Neil to amend the amount from Seventy Three Thousand Dollars (\$73,000) to Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000).

Article 7 is adopted by voice vote.

After asking if there was anyone else who wanted to vote, the moderator closed the polls at 8:08 pm.

ARTICLE 8: A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Dan Cotter and seconded by Elaine Levlocke to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Forty Six Thousand Dollars (\$146,000) to purchase a new 35,000 GVW Truck for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of up to One Hundred and Forty Six Thousand Dollars (\$146,000) from the Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, said amount to be offset by the amount received from the trade-in or sale of the existing 1998 International Truck, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

(Recommended by the Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 9: A motion was made by Gary Winn and seconded by Jon McKeon to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Two Thousand One Hundred and Twenty Dollars (\$92,120) to remove and rebuild the Old Chesterfield Road Fire Pond Culvert. Funding for this project will be FEMA reimbursement in the amount of Forty One Thousand Three Hundred and Fifty Four Dollars (\$41,354) and the balance of Fifty Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Six Dollars (\$50,766) from general taxation, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

(Recommended by the Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Susan Newcomer and seconded by Ruth Van Houten to amend the article to have the balance of Fifty Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Six Dollars (\$50,766) to come from the from the established Roadways Construction/Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 9 is adopted as amended by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10: A voice vote was in the negative on a motion made by Bob Brockmann and seconded by Susan Newcomer to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the already established Roadways Construction/Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way related thereto.

(Recommended by the Selectmen) (NOT Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 11: A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Dan Cotter and seconded by Elaine Levlocke to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$5,500) for the installation and first year monitoring of a Fire Alarm System for the Highway Garage, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

ARTICLE 13: A vote by a show of hands (53 for – 76 against) was in the negative on a motion made by Bob Brockmann and seconded by Elaine Levlocke to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) for the purchase and installation of a Generator for the Town Office Building, or act in any way related thereto. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:10 I (d).

(Recommended by the Selectmen) (NOT Recommended by the Budget Committee)

A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Jim Hogancamp to limit discussion.

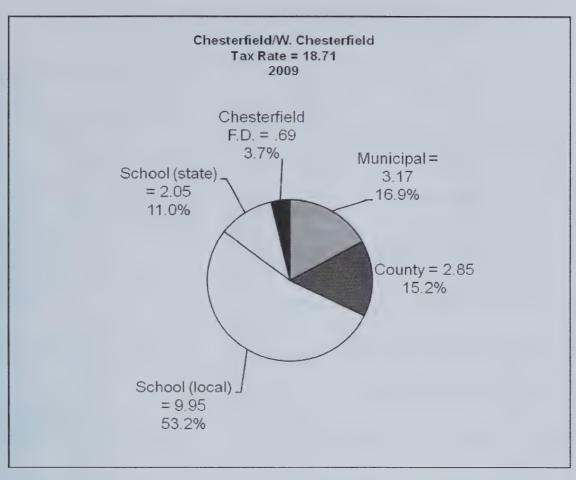

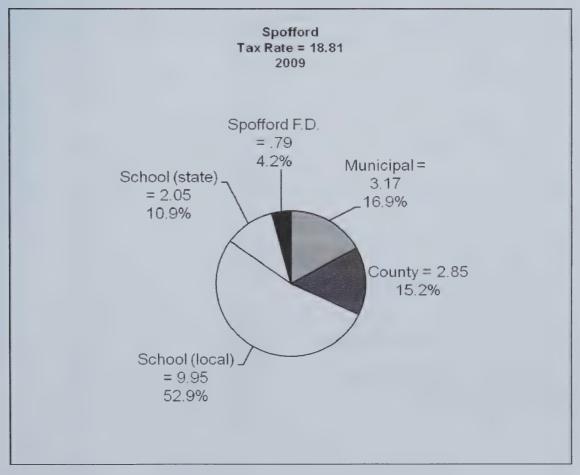

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen
Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire

Transfer Station & Recycling Center 2009 Annual Report

With the help of the patrons of Chesterfield, the Transfer Station and Recycling Center is working out very well. With everyone becoming familiar with the facility and sorting at home we are able to become increasingly quick and efficient.

We are recycling more and more every year. In addition to the environmental benefits, recycling comingle, paper and cardboard saves the town \$100.00 per ton.

This year alone, the new demo container has helped us to recycle 54.23 tons of demo which would have ended up in the land fill.

You may remember that as of January 1, 2008, the disposal of mercury containing products at landfills and transfer stations is prohibited. If you need assistance in recycling these items, please do not hesitate to stop in and ask an attendant.

As you know, there are some items that we are not able to accept such as: TV's, computer monitors, CRT's of any type, microwaves, and florescent bulbs. The Keene Recycling Center is available to take those items from you. Please remember to bring a check with you as the Keene Recycling Center will not accept cash. Unfortunately some individuals have tossed their electronic items aside on our scenic roads which leaves the town with the burden of the cost of disposing of these items. We hope that residents who may witness anyone engaged in such activity will take note and report it to the police department immediately.

If anyone has any questions regarding where the appropriate place to dispose of something is, or need advice of a less expensive location to dispose of chargeable items, please do not hesitate to stop in and ask a transfer station attendant.

If you have purchased a new vehicle, remember to stop in for a new permit.

CHESTERFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT



I would like to thank the Town of Chesterfield for the opportunity to present the Chesterfield Police Department's activity over the past year and some of our goals and programs for 2010.

Challenging economic times have historically come with an increase in burglaries, thefts, and domestic disputes as financial pressures strain family relationships and emboldened the disenfranchised. Chesterfield was not immune to this trend as we saw our burglaries triple in 2010. Detective Eldridge has been working hard on the increase case load of sexual assaults, burglary, and thefts. While he has solved many burglaries, new calls are received as there appear to be multiple groups committing these crimes throughout the region. He has successfully worked with surrounding agencies on tasks forces resulting in the arrest and clearance of several of these crimes. In one instance the investigation solved 40 burglaries in 3 states.

Chesterfield remains a safe community where neighbors look out for each other. We are situated in between Brattleboro Vermont and Keene New Hampshire and many of their issues affect the town. The strength of the closeness of our community does act as a deterrent to the increase of property offenses we see associated with the downturn of the economy. I would like to thank the many people who called noticing suspicious activity in their neighborhoods. There are only 5 officers on the police department and we can't be everywhere, but this is strengthened by your willingness to be part of the solution.

I have spoken with many of you regarding traffic concerns in your neighborhoods. As Route 9 continues to be a dangerous, and in the past couple of years deadly roadway, we spend a great deal of our patrol efforts there. The Selectmen have recommended we purchase a "Radar Trailer". This is a trailer that can be parked anywhere to monitor the speed. It has a large display which shows the speed and flashes when a vehicle drives in excess of the speed. The Radar Trailer also has a statistics package which can be downloaded after each use. This allows us to tell the times when the speeds are the greatest and how fast each car was traveling. While it doesn't identify the car in any way other than the speed, it allows us to better allocate our resources to secondary roads to catch the speeding vehicles.

In 2009 both accidents and injuries were down. We had one reported fatal accident, but the status was changed based on an autopsy which showed that the driver had suffered a heart attack prior to the accident. Of the 16 injuries sustained from 10 motor vehicle accidents, 8 injuries were on Route 9 (5 collisions), 5 on Route 63 (2 collisions), 1 injury each on Pond Brook, Gulf Rd, and Route 9A. The primary listed contributing factors of the injury accidents were caused by Speed (6 injuries in 3 accidents), followed by Failure to Yield the Right of Way (4 injuries in 2 accidents), Driver Inattention (4

injuries in 3 accidents), Following too Closely and Road Conditions. Of all accidents reported 7 took place in parking lots of the local businesses, 46 took place took place on State roads such as Rte 9, 63 or Route 9A and 8 occurred on Town roads.

In 2010 we will continue to try to focus our attention on the underlying unlawful activities such as speed, stop sign violations and following too closely to mitigate and reduce the injuries as a result of accidents. I also intend on continuing to make the investigations of our major crimes, such as burglary and sexual assaults a top priority this year. Detective Eldridge has been doing an excellent job in his many investigations and I am confident he will continue to do so.

I wish to thank the residents of Chesterfield for their continued support and assistance. Many times the information you have provided has made the difference in successful resolutions to our investigations. Please feel free to call us with any concern you have, as it is our goal to provide only the best service to our town. The Chesterfield Conservation Commission Annual Report 2010

The Chesterfield Conservation Commission is dependent on the energy and dedication of its members. This year Bill Tyler retired from the commission. We thank Bill for his years of service to the town. Fortunately Bill's place and his understanding of issues related to the lake have ably been filled by David Wood.

This year the commission has been intensely involved in the Natural Resource Inventory Project (NRI). We all know that Chesterfield is rich in natural beauty, but a reliable and detailed understanding of the town's natural resources is a necessary prerequisite for a balanced effort to protect these riches for ourselves and our children. The Commission has worked closely on the project with Jeff Littleton of Moosewood Ecological LLC. With the assistance of commission members and other citizens the inventory will include a wetlands evaluation and critical wildlife habitat inventory to initiate a conservation plan for the town. It will also include the identification and mapping of high quality agricultural and forest lands. Throughout the project, community participation has been encouraged with public forums and educational programs, including workshops on the use of GPS and on vernal pool identification. The purpose of the NRI is to serve as an educational and planning tool to promote informed land use decisions and to help to establish good management practices for town officials. The information obtained will also be of help to anyone in the community requesting guidance on managing their property. The final report will be completed no later than May 2010.

The Conservation Commission understands that an enhanced public awareness of the natural treasures of Chesterfield will inevitably lead to greater commitment to their careful stewardship. This year again we have sponsored many hikes and trail work sessions. Commission members hosted a number of hikes during the summer as part of our "Celebrating Chesterfield Outdoors" program and a new map of the Wantastiquet-Monadnock Greenway was created. Our web site has been maintained as a source of information about our trails and activities (www.chesterfieldoutdoors.com). This year a bulletin board was added to the site to improve communication.

An important part of our efforts to improve public accessibility to conservation lands has been the continuing work to develop, improve and maintain our expanding network of trails. This year Lew Shelly has completed steps and a puncheon walkway to improve access and safety at the Route 63 entrance to the Friedsam Town Forest. The Madame Sherri Forest entrance was improved with the addition of a picnic table donated by United Natural Food's "Green Team" and with the replacement of the information Kiosk. Maintaining our trails involves constant monitoring for problems. In this work we continue to be assisted by a enthusiastic and committed group of individuals in our Trail Steward Program. More than 60 members contribute their time to monitor the status of trails and report when work is required. This year the commission has continued its commitment to protecting the town's waterways and lakes. In February we cosponsored the Department of Environmental Services public presentation on the updated Shoreland Protection Act and we continue to be a major contributor to the Lake Host Program to protect Spofford Lake from Milfoil infestation.

In 2009 the commission continued to work with landowners to protect critical areas of land for conservation. We have worked primarily through the encouragement and support of conservation easements to the mutual benefit of landowners and the town. This year we have focused our greatest attention on the California Brook Area, a large undeveloped tract on the eastern edge of town.

We would like to thank the people of Chesterfield for their continuing support of our efforts to protect our special corner of New Hampshire.

CHESTERFIELD HEALTH OFFICER 2009 ANNUAL REPORT

We are not aware of any confirmed cases of H1N1 flu in Chesterfield in 2009. I am sure this is due in great part to the diligent efforts of Deputy Health Officer Marilyn Rousseau and the team of Emergency Management. Clinics to dispense the H1N1 vaccine, as it became available, to First Responders, the Chesterfield School and recently to the general public. Thanks for a job well done. Anyone eligible that didn't get their shot should contact their health provider. It is a concern that we may see another wave of H1N1 by spring 2010.

We are thankful that the Bird Flu never materialized as forecasted and hopefully it never will. We should however be mindful that West Nile and EEE will be a larger threat this summer. Last fall EEE was detected in animals in a local town. This threat continues to move closer to Chesterfield. We suggest that residents remove any likely mosquitoes breeding places, wear protective clothing and protect bare skin with Deet products when mosquitoes are present.

I would like to welcome Steve Dumont as a Deputy Health Officer. Steve is a firefighter and EMT for both Spofford and Chesterfield Departments. Steve joins Marilyn Rousseau and Deb Hogencamp as Deputy Health Officers for Chesterfield. They and myself are on call on an as needed basis.

Some of our activities besides the flu clinics were to investigate three possible sewer overflow complaints. All three cases were negative. We continue to provide drinking water testing for the Chesterfield Library and both beaches. We also attended training classes provided by The New Hampshire Health Officers Association.

ICE STORM AFTERMATH

The year 2009 began with the recovery from the December 2008 ice storm, which affected 211 of New Hampshire's 234 municipalities, making it one of the state's most widespread disasters. An "after-action" meeting was held, with all Town Departments participating in the discussion of "what we did right" and "what we can improve upon." Communication to our residents was a major issue, and we have taken steps to address the initial lack of information through local radio stations, many of which are not manned on the weekends. A plan is now in place to overcome this problem. We will also make better use of the town website, posting frequent updates online in the event of future emergencies.

Extensive paperwork relating to ice-storm expense and losses was completed and submitted to FEMA. Monies have been received from the Agency, and the ice storm expense to our Town totals about \$20,000. The State Department of Homeland Security & Emergency Management requested a detailed After-Action Report, which we compiled and provided to them. They also hosted, and we participated in, a regional meeting in Rindge to address the problems faced by area communities. The Commissioners of Public Utilities, Safety, Transportation and Health were all in attendance, along with various other state personnel and representatives from area communities. A copy of our After-Action Report, delivered at this meeting, is on file at the Chesterfield Historical Society.

RADIOLOGICAL PREPAREDNESS

Our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in the Town Office Complex was the site for two radiological Drills held during the spring in preparation for the FEMA Rated Exercise that was conducted in June. Controllers from the State of NH evaluated our performance in the Drills—our first in the new facility—and made several constructive suggestions, which were then put into effect.

The Rated Exercise was evaluated by FEMA, and resulted in the following assessment, taken from the FEMA report:

Chesterfield Emergency Operations Center

The Chesterfield EOC was a well-coordinated and functional EOC. The EOC staff took the exercise seriously, and all participants performed efficiently and effectively with each other. The new EOC facility, in the Town Office Complex, meets the needs and space requirements of a functional EOC.

No flaws were found with the overall performance of our EM team in response to this simulated radiological emergency.

ALERTING

Four new sirens, provided by Entergy Nuclear Vermont Yankee, have been installed at the three town fire stations and the town highway garage. These can be used to alert both first responders and the public, and are tested on a monthly basis. Residents are reminded to tune into an

Emergency Alert System radio station, listed in your VY calendar, if you hear a sustained siren tone lasting for three minutes.

Also, if your primary telephone is unlisted or a cell phone, you are encouraged to fill out and return the RENTS (Rapid Emergency Notification Telephone System) card in your VY calendar, if you have not already done so, to enable automated phone alerting and emergency information.

ALL-HEALTH-HAZARD PREPAREDNESS

Members of the Emergency Management team also serve as representatives to a Regional Coordinating Committee of the Greater Monadnock Public Health Network, formerly the Cheshire Public Heath Network, meeting monthly to refine our readiness for health-related emergencies.

This year, much of the focus for the network, which now encompasses 33 area communities, was on preparing for and responding to, the H1N1 influenza pandemic. Years of planning and coordination proved their value as we mobilized team members and volunteers, in response to guidance from State and Federal health authorities, to conduct a number of vaccination clinics, both in Chesterfield and throughout the region. These clinics continue as we start the new year.

Our thanks go out to all of our dedicated volunteers, who have given freely of their time and energy, as well as to the hard-working nurses of Home Healthcare, Hospice and Community Services (HCS), who have administered thousands of vaccinations in the Monadnock region to date and continue to answer the call as needed.

Residents who have not yet protected themselves with this vaccine are encouraged to do so, as there is the potential for additional waves of this pandemic flu to impact the region in the months ahead. CITIZEN CORPS, CERT & MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS

The Chesterfield Regional Citizen Corps (CRCC) Council met five times during 2009, and sponsored speakers from VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) and VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters). We also held a CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training in Hinsdale, along with a Red Cross workshop on sheltering at Grace Evangelical Church in Spofford. During the month of May, an informational board, brochures and other handouts about emergency preparedness were on display at Ocean Bank in Chesterfield and Keene.

As the pandemic (H1N1) flu of 2009 raised community anxiety, and NH identified the first case in April, the CRCC worked closely with the Public Health Network to provide residents of Cheshire County with updated information. CERT members were kept informed via email, and printed materials from the state and CDC (Centers for Disease Control) were distributed to public locales, including the Town Offices and Chesterfield School. We also offered brief presentations at the Senior Luncheon and the Summer Selectmen's Meeting.

While waiting for the vaccine to be made available, we kept our focus on prevention and planning for distribution. Opportunity to test our training came about in October, when Home Healthcare offered the seasonal flu vaccine to town employees at the Town Offices. A small group of CERT members and other volunteers also participated in a successful Point of Distribution exercise earlier in the year. With the support and cooperation of town Police and Fire departments, we knew we were ready.

In November, Chesterfield was the third location in Cheshire County to offer an H1N1 vaccine clinic, at that time only for those on a priority list. Another clinic on December 17 took place on the very day that the State of NH moved to Phase IV and was thus opened to the general public, with 105 adults and 90 children receiving the vaccine at that time. A subsequent clinic on January 8, 2010 administered vaccine to 142 people ranging from 11 months to 82 years old. Our thanks goes out to the more than 20 volunteers and the HCS nurses who helped to make this all happen.

Another round of CERT training will be offered in Keene in the next few months, and many CERT volunteers and others have been orientated to the Greater Monadnock Medical Reserve Corps, which was initiated with a federal grant in 2008. BE PREPARED!

Emergencies of one kind or another are a fact of life, and it's up to all of us to ensure that our families, our friends, our neighbors and ourselves are as prepared as possible to handle whatever comes our way. Have a plan for what to do, including contact numbers and locations in and out of the area. Make sure everyone in the household is familiar with the plan, and stockpile enough food, water and other essentials to last a minimum of three days on your own. Check to see that your house number is easily visible from the road, so emergency personnel can locate you readily. And we recommend that every household have a battery- or dynamo-powered radio, as well as a landline (non-wireless) phone.

We made great headway in brush cutting along the outer perimeter of cemetery grounds. It is an extremely time consuming and labor intensive task that had been put on the back burner for the past several years due to lack of time. Brush cutting was completed at the Spofford, Friedsam, Chesterfield West and Ware Joslyn cemeteries as well as the Noyes Robertson Coolidge Cemetery on Castle Road and the West Burying Ground on Welcome Hill Road.

The Cemetery Commission approved plans for the proposed cemetery road in the field at the Friedsam Cemetery and the road and lot layout was begun. These projects were in addition to the seasonal maintenance of mowing and weed whacking of Chesterfield's twenty one cemeteries and the Town Hall/Library areas

The Cemetery Commission has continued to implement an annual program to restore and repair stones that have been deteriorating over time. Monument repair was continued at Center Cemetery, Ware Joslyn Cemetery, the Spofford Cemetery, and New Boston Cemetery. Raised granite markers were installed delineating the corners of the new lot areas at the Friedsam, Chesterfield West and Spofford Cemeteries.

The Cemetery Commission and I are appreciative of all the support and help we receive from the townspeople throughout the year. Caring for the cemeteries is a joint effort only possible by the assistance and cooperation of everyone. I am especially grateful for the hard work and dedication of my co-workers at the cemetery and to the Commission for their support and guidance. Special thanks to the entire cemetery crew for a job well done.

We look forward to another rewarding year overseeing the care and maintenance of Chesterfield's cemeteries.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICE 2009 ANNUAL REPORT

We are continuing to see the local economic conditions tighten as the number of building permits has continued to decline over the last few years. We have also observed that the type of projects have reduced in scope. New home construction is being replaced with additions and remodeling projects.

As a result of the 2008 ice storm we are receiving more requests for generator installation permits. Please be aware that installing a generator or a portable generator connection does require an electrical building permit.

Our building permit application form is available on the nhchesterfield.com web site under forms. If a project requires any type of construction outside of an existing structure or if the existing structure or any part of it are within a setback a plot plan showing the measurements from the lot lines must be submitted with the permit application along with a detail of the work being done.

I would like to welcome Steve Dumont as our new Deputy Code Enforcement Officer. Steve is a certified NFPA Fire & Life Safety Code Inspector. Steve is also a firefighter and EMT for both the Spofford and Chesterfield Fire Departments.

WELFARE DIRECTOR'S REPORT 2009

In 2009 14 individual households received assistance for a total of \$11,249.17. The cost breakdown is as follows:

Housing	\$9,273.85
Heating & Electric	\$1,669.10
Food & Prescriptions	\$306.22

The total assistance given in 2009 decreased approximately 8% from 2008 with a slight increase in housing costs but a significant decrease in heating.

In 2009 the Selectboard established a Chesterfield Firewood Policy establishing criteria for distribution of available firewood to qualified residents.

I take very seriously my responsibility to the Town and its taxpayers to be fiscally minded as well as meeting my responsibility to help those residents who are in need. The economic down turn hasn't affected only those residents who qualify for assistance; the taxpayers are feeling the pinch too.

When an applicant comes in for assistance they are also required to make application to all organizations outside of Chesterfield that may be of assistance to them. This is all part of Chesterfield's application process.

I have worked closely with other local organizations such as Southwestern Community Services and the Help-line. I also thank those selfless individuals who faithfully serve our community at Joan's Pantry, Keene Community Kitchen and the Salvation Army. These volunteers make such a difference as they gracefully and respectfully reach out to those in need.

RESCUE INC.

Rescue's mission is to serve as a key component of our rural healthcare system and provide the highest quality, risk appropriate, rapid response emergency medical care and transportation service in our region; to recognize the contribution, determination and dedication of our staff and volunteers who fulfill this mission; and to complement our objective.

In conjunction, the purpose of the Board of Trustees is to provide effective leadership, set policy, ensure fiscal responsibility for the organization and support delivery of the best pre-hospital care in the region.

Due to the dedication of Rescue Inc employees and volunteers, board members, and community members to the mission above, the financial health of the agency has improved over last year's grave situation. We achieved this improvement despite limited payments from the federal and state governments; and reimbursement reduction by private and secondary insurance companies. An ever increasing number of individuals with no insurance put an even larger burden on the system. Rescue Inc. took a loss of \$220,851.00 last fiscal year in bad debt (medical calls that we received no payment for). Couple this with a reduction in the Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement and the financial challenges become even greater.

Volunteers with the qualifications and time to devote to the agency are at a premium and the cost to bring a willing volunteer up to the effectiveness is about \$750.00. Comprehensive and strict rules for training and ongoing certification are mandated by the states of Vermont and New Hampshire.

Our subscription plan, fund raising by the Board of Trustees and Rescue Inc. staff, and donations from the public help to close the financial gap for our non-profit organization. Town assessments also help to finance our operating expenses, medical supplies and equipment purchases, vehicle maintenance, occupancy expenses and constant training of our medical staff. It is our promise that the towns who contract with us will receive the most up-to-date emergency medical care possible. Rescue Inc. has exceptionally well trained staff and with our equipment is considered an "emergency room on wheels".

We currently cover 500 square miles in Windham and Cheshire counties, which includes major highways of Vermont Route 30, Route 9 in both Vermont and New Hampshire and Interstate 91 in Vermont. We responded to over 4,300 calls in the past fiscal year.

With the help of Deputy Wardens Bevis and Fuller, over 230 permits were issued. I also issued 4 official warnings.

Once again, I wish to thank all the Deputy Wardens for their support and suggestions.

At the monthly Cheshire County Forest Fire Wardens Meeting, State District Ranger Matt Apgar, passed out certificates for years of service to Wardens and Deputy Wardens. Chesterfield Deputy Wardens receiving certificates were Wayne Winn, 44 years, William Vogeley, 21 years, Richard Chickering, 24 years, and Richard Gauthier, Jr., 21 years.

I want to remind residents that they need a permit to burn any time there isn't snow on the ground. This also pertains to fire pits, for which I can write a seasonal permit.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. 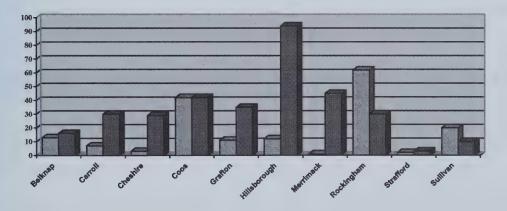
Spring fire season was unusually short this past year, with wet weather beginning the third week in April and lasting virtually all summer long. Consequently both the number of fires and the number of acres burned were below the last five year average. Due to state budget constraints, the staffing of our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers was limited to class III or higher fire danger days. Despite the reduction in the number of days staffed, our fire lookout towers are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented this year by contracted aircraft and the Civil Air Patrol when fire danger was especially high. Surprisingly the largest single fire this year occurred in late November during an unusual dry spell, in the northern Coos County town of Clarksville. This fire burned 17.1 acres and is presumed to have been caused by a careless hunter. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2009 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The meal served at 12:30, following the free blood pressure clinic held by Home Health Care from 11:30 until 12:30. Flu shots are given, usually in October.

Our first 2010 luncheon will be held on Wednesday, March 10th at the town hall at 12:30 pm. Reservations are helpful and appreciated. Please call Joanne at 363-8348. Voluntary donations are collected and the Town of Chesterfield includes an amount in its annual budget to help defray expenses for food and supplies. Chesterfield, Spofford and West Chesterfield seniors are welcome.

Another program for our seniors is the Age In Motion (AIM) exercise program sponsored by Home health Care. During 2009 the volunteers of the Chesterfield Fire and Rescue Precinct responded to 178 calls.

Included in these calls were fires at Road's End Farm, the Putney General Store, going door to door during the ice storm and 105 rescue calls.

It is with great pride and gratitude Will Vogley's 50th year with the Department was celebrated by the community.

The Department made major repairs to a tanker and an engine this year costing around \$18,000. These repairs were not scheduled or anticipated and occurred as a result of age. The costs were paid for from the operating budget and the Emergency Expendable Trust Fund.

In December 2006 Stephen "Bart" Bevis was appointed Chief, and it is with regret in December of 2009 we accepted his resignation as Chief. Bart remains a dedicated volunteer in the Department.

SPOFFORD FIRE DISTRICT 2010 COMMISSIONERS REPORT

2009 was the first full year of operations in the new Fire Station/Multipurpose Building. All members are now comfortable working in the facility as they have learned how all the various systems work. The Geo-Thermal heating system is working very well. The commissioners did authorize installation of an underground system to further protect the thermal piping from corrosion, which will increase useful life and efficiency. In addition, the Heat Smart installation is nearly complete which will decrease energy costs by 15-20% each year. The energy audit is nearly complete and we expect a one time reimbursement for the measures we have taken, however the amount to be received is undetermined.

The old Fire Station has been sold and is now a taxable property. The new owner is complying with the conditions imposed for the sale, namely, the building exterior is not to be changed, and a permanent business, open to the public is not allowed.

There have been questions asked about the new fire siren operation. The siren system has been donated and installed by Vermont Yankee, with the condition they can operate it as a notification system in case of any kind of unusual event or emergency. The Chesterfield OEM can also use it for any local emergencies. The Fire department only uses it when there are first alarm fire calls, not for any other calls.

The operating budget and all proposed warrant articles result in a reduction in taxes of 11.4%. Note the actual operating budget is down 5.1%. By eliminating and redefining some capital reserve funds, we are able to save an additional 1%. Revenues have increased due to the old station sale and rental of the new meeting room.

The commissioners are requesting that they become the agents for the heavy equipment capital fund so that they can have the ability to buy a new fire engine should the opportunity present itself during the year. We believe we can save on the purchase price which will lower tax obligations in the future. There will be no tax impact if a purchase is made due to the monies available in the existing Capital Reserve Fund.

We continue to receive various donations that have helped to equip our operations better and we thank everyone that have donated.

The Spofford Fire and Rescue Department is always looking for volunteers to serve as firefighters, medical responders or auxiliary. Please consider this option as a way to give back to this great community. As usual we thank everyone for your continued support.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

As the School Board entered 2009-2010, it encountered a significant new challenge, declining enrollment, and continued to wrestle with an old challenge, student achievement. Each presented its own budget issues for the Board and both are forcing the Board to look at its priorities and future budgets in new ways.

The class of June 2009 was the last of our large classes—classes with 60 or more students requiring three or more classrooms at their grade level. Competing for qualified teachers and support staff in a tight market is a distant memory. Our focus now is aligning staffing levels to our shrunken enrollment. The amount of space and the size of our building are no longer of concern. Instead, we are faced with an aging building, once stretched to its seams, whose maintenance was sometimes deferred to meet more pressing needs of the large student population it served. Roofing, insulation, paving and aging portable classrooms are looming budget issues as we look ahead.

Now in the fourth year of a Board directed effort to improve student scores, the Chesterfield School staff has produced continuous increases in student scores, striving constantly to hurdle the rising bar set under the No Child Left Behind Act. It is a team effort led by the administration and pushed forward daily in our classrooms by teachers and support staff. A critical question facing the Board now is how it sustains improvement as it aligns staff to lower enrollment levels.

One of the initiatives the Board has taken as it grapples with these issues is improving communication about the direction it is forging. The Board published its first ever Citizens Guide to the Chesterfield School Board in 2009. It joined the Friends of Chesterfield School for an evening of conversation with the Board. Board minutes and agenda have been made available on the school website at http://chesterfield.k12.nh.us/. The Board joined the town selectmen in creating signage at the transfer station to help make town residents aware of the dates and times of budget hearings and annual meetings. The Board will continue its work on improved presentations at Annual District Meetings.

As it sets new directions, the Board needs your help in assessing its efforts. Take the time to fill out our annual Board evaluation available in the March school newsletter. Copies will also be available for citizens at the Annual District meeting. These evaluations help steer the Board's efforts to serve our community better.

The Board encourages the citizens of Chesterfield to participate in the process of addressing the challenges of student achievement, declining enrollment and an aging facility. Come to monthly meetings of the Board, held the second Monday of each month, September through June, starting at 5:30 p.m. Meetings are generally held in the school library. Public input is usually sought at the beginning, the middle and the end of regular Board meetings. Exercise your voice at Board meetings and your vote at the Annual District meeting in March and help chart the future course of your school district.

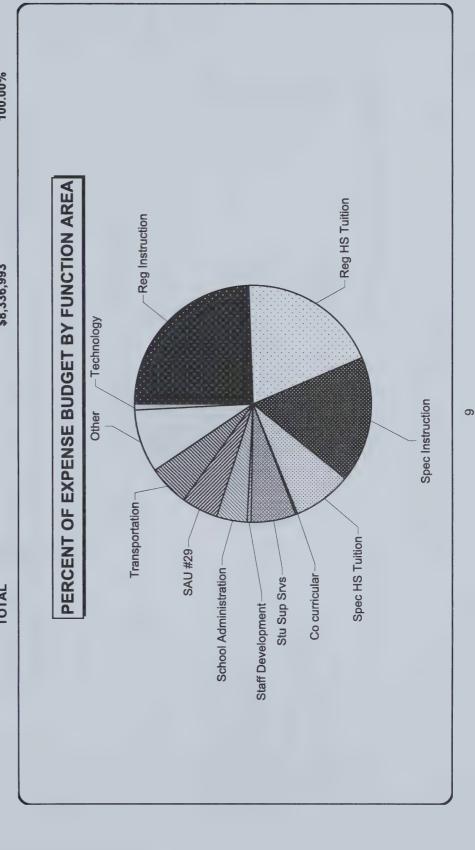

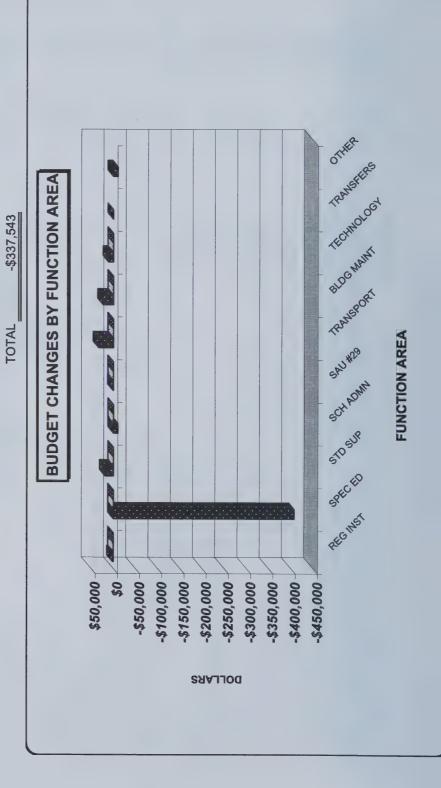

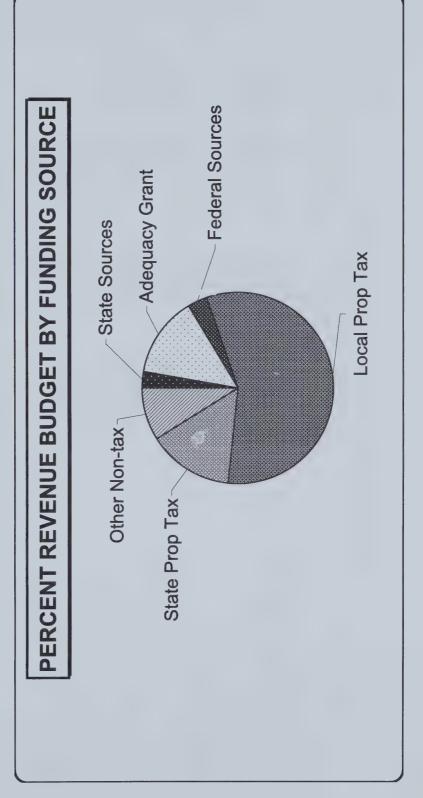

The Moderator took a moment to make the following introductions, introducing himself, the district clerk, and the Chesterfield School Board Members: Judy Idelkope, the Chesterfield School Board Chairman, Ege Cordell, Vice Chair, and other members Rebecca (Becky) Auger, Greg Blair, and Deb Clemente. He then proceeded to introduce Sharon D'Eon, Principal of the Chesterfield School, Mark Speno, Assistant Principal, Wayne Woolridge, SAU29 Co-Superintendent, Tim Ruehr, SAU29 Business Manager for Towns, Paul Cooper, SAU29 Director of Human Resources, and Joe Hoppock, SAU29 School Board Lawyer.

Mr. Winn explained that the polls would remain open during the meeting until he announced their closing, except during paper ballot votes, that warrants articles over \$10,000 (ten thousand) would be voted on by paper ballot, and that any amendment to the warrant articles must be provided in writing to ensure its accuracy and recording. The Moderator also explained the purpose of restricting reconsideration following voting on a warrant article, primarily to prevent reconsideration after a majority of the people have left the meeting prior to its end. He reminded the audience that there is a seven (7) day waiting period prior to holding an additional meeting to reconsider such articles. The Moderator also mentioned the Chesterfield Public School Foundation had a 2008 update report on the handout table for everyone to see.

Following the Moderator's introductions, Martin Mahoney delivered kind remarks in remembrance of Mrs. Sue Sciuto.

Article 1: Greg Blair moved, and Becky Auger seconded, to hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Steve Laskowski presented a report on behalf of the Budget Committee. The Moderator declared a voice vote to accept the reports passed in the affirmative.

Article 2: Judy Idelkope moved, and Becky Auger seconded, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee's recommended amount of \$8,472,604 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment for the statutory obligations of the district. The school board recommends \$8,472,604. Judy Idelkope gave a detailed presentation on the school budget and Tim Ruehr clarified additional questions from the audience related to the budget. Following the discussion, the Moderator suspended voting for district

officers and asked the audience to vote by paper ballots. The meeting was recessed for the counting of the paper ballots. There were 212 (two hundred and twelve) voters present at the meeting. The Moderator declared Article 2 passed by a paper ballot vote of 172 (one hundred and seventy two) Yes, 34 (thirty four) No, and 1 (one) unmarked ballot. Greg Blair then made a motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 2 per RSA 40:10, seconded by Sue Newcomer. The Moderator declared the motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 2 passed by a voice vote.

Article 3: Deb Clemente moved, and Becky Auger seconded, to see if the school district will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the School Board and the Chesterfield Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

Deb Clemente made a presentation on the collective bargaining Judy Idelkope answered questions from the audience; Tim Ruehr also agreement. answered questions from the audience in relation to the educator's salary and insurance costs. Following the discussion, the Moderator suspended voting for district officers and asked the audience to vote by paper ballots. The meeting was recessed for the counting of the paper ballots. The Moderator declared Article 3 passed by a paper ballot vote of 141 (one hundred and forty one) Yes and 59 (fifty nine) No. Following the vote, Greg Blair made a motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 3 per RSA 40:10, seconded by Sue Newcomer. The Moderator declared the motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 3 passed by a voice vote.

Article 4: Greg Blair moved to pass over Article 4, seconded by Toni O'Neil to see if the District, if Article 3 is defeated, will authorize the Chesterfield School Board to call one special meeting, at its option to address Article 3 cost items only. The Moderator declared the motion to pass over Article 4 approved by a voice vote.

Article 5: Becky Auger moved, and Deb Clemente seconded, to see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate \$116,916 for salaries and benefits to support the costs associated with the addition of 4.5 inclusion aide positions. (This article is recommended by the Chesterfield School Board. This article is not recommended by the Chesterfield Budget Committee.). Sharon D'Eon explained to the audience what a Student Needs approach versus the Aides Model would mean and how the Chesterfield school would Later, a citizen questioned the appropriateness of some material benefit from it.

available at the table in the meeting. Marty Mahoney spoke about the role of the aides in the school and the Aides Model for every classroom. Following the discussion, Margaret Winn made a motion to call the question, seconded by Toni O'Neil. The Moderator declared that the motion carried by a voice vote and continued to call the question. The Moderator suspended voting for district officers and asked the audience to vote by paper ballots. The meeting was recessed for the counting of the paper ballots. At this time, the Moderator and the School Board discussed the appropriateness of the material at the table with the School Board Lawyer, Joe Hoppock. Once the paper ballots were counted, the Moderator declared Article 5 passed by a paper ballot vote of 121 (one hundred and twenty one) Yes and 66 (sixty six) No. Greg Blair made a motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 5 per RSA 40:10, seconded by Joshua Goldberg. The Moderator declared the motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 5 passed by a voice vote.

<u>Article 6:</u> Judy Idelkope moved, and Becky Auger seconded, to see if the school district will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the School Board and the Chesterfield Support Staff Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

(This article is recommended by the Chesterfield School Board and the Chesterfield Budget Committee). Judy Idelkope spoke clarifying questions from the audience in relation to the collective bargaining agreement. Bayard Tracy also provided some remarks about this agreement and its impact on the taxpayers. Following the discussion, the Moderator suspended voting for district officers and asked the audience to vote by paper ballots. The meeting was recessed for the counting of the paper ballots. The Moderator declared Article 6 passed by a paper ballot vote of 125 (one hundred and twenty five) Yes, 33 (thirty three) No, and 1 (one) unmarked vote. Fred Rowley then made a motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 6, seconded by Betsy Yacubian. The Moderator declared the motion to restrict reconsideration on Article 6 passed by a voice vote.

<u>Article 7</u>: Greg Blair moved to pass over Article 7, seconded by Becky Auger to see if the District, if Article 6 is defeated, will authorize the Chesterfield School Board to call one special meeting, at its option to address Article 6 cost items only. The Moderator declared Article 7 passed over by a voice vote.

Article 8: Becky Auger moved, and Susan Newcomer seconded, to see if the District will vote to appropriate and authorize the School Board to transfer up to \$30,000 of its

unencumbered funds, if any remain on hand at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 2009, to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established by voters on March 5, 1994, for the purpose of major renovation/reconstruction of the school buildings and related costs, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (This article is recommended by the Chesterfield School Board and the Chesterfield Budget Committee). Ege Cordell made a motion to vote by a voice vote and Marty Mahoney seconded. The Moderator declared the motion to act on Article 8 by a voice vote passed by a voice vote. The Moderator declared Article 8 passed by a voice vote.

Article 9: Judy Idelkope moved to pass over and Greg Blair seconded, to see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate \$75,000 to reduce the general fund deficit pursuant to RSA 189:28-a. (This article is recommended by the Chesterfield School Board and the Chesterfield Budget Committee). The Moderator declared the motion to pass over Article 9 carried by voice vote.

Article 10: To transact any other business, that may legally come before this meeting. On behalf of the board, Judy Idelkope spoke to thank and acknowledge the support of the Ballot Clerks to the Chesterfield Community. Immediately after, a member of the audience inquired about how the School Board will be able to spend the money received from the state stimulus package since no warrant article was established for this purpose. Mr. Wayne Woodridge explained that when the stimulus package becomes available, the State also provides the guidelines for accessing and authorizing the release of such funds. Following the discussion, the Moderator asked if anyone has not had an opportunity to vote for school officials and since none responded, the Moderator proceeded to close the polls at 10:37 p.m. Greg Blair moved to adjourn the meeting and was seconded by Becky Auger. The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned by a voice vote.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Congratulations to the students from Chesterfield, who recorded a second consecutive year of significant growth in reading and math on the New Hampshire state assessments released on January 28th. Congratulations and thank you to staff members, who have invested their knowledge, skills, and energies in assisting students in their learning each day. Of the 14 school districts in the region, Chesterfield achieved the third highest scores in reading and the third highest scores in math. The state test results reflect the knowledge and skills (known as Grade Level Expectations) that proficient students should have mastered by the end of the previous school year. The improvement that has occurred in test scores should not be taken for granted. Continued progress is highly contingent upon open lines of communication between the home and school and a good understanding of what goes on in the school.

This past summer Chesterfield teachers worked on a variety of projects to improve student learning. At the beginning of July, over fifty teachers participated in the Inquiring Minds Want to Know Science Partnership Grant, held at Keene State College. This grant allowed teachers in SAU 29 and Winchester to receive grade-level intense professional development in a seven-day institute format. Eleven SAU teachers served as institute instructors, thus building the cadre of science teacher leaders within our organization; Keene State faculty served on these teams as well to provide an instructional perspective that spanned from elementary through college level. Much of the information from the institute has been digitally captured and a website is being created to allow participants to share their knowledge with their peers who were unable to attend. Grade-level cohorts began to develop a common assessment tool and received direct instruction in Earth Space Science, Life Science, Physical Science, Science Process Skills, and Inquiry and Integration. Field experiences included Mt. Pisgah (AVEO) and Stonewall Farm. The co-authors and co-principal investigators. Dean Melinda Treadwell from Keene State College and Meredith Cargill, Director of Curriculum and Assessments for SAU 29 sought to develop a strong partnership between the two organizations and community organizations that can support applied science aligned with the newly adopted SAU 29 Science Curriculum.

Also this past summer, a group of K-12 teachers met to finalize the SAU 29 Social Studies Curriculum. A new format provides a succinct, user-friendly framework for each grade level. This version incorporates developmentally-appropriate content that aligns with the New Hampshire frameworks. A thoughtful approach was taken to ensure that each of the four Social Studies domains were addressed at each grade level, including: civics, economics, history, and geography.

Educating the whole child requires connections beyond the basic core curriculum and many art teachers worked together this summer to finish an art curriculum rewrite. The SAU 29 Art Curriculum had not been updated in over a decade and the new curriculum developed this past summer takes into account current best practice and research. The format looks similar to our SAU 29 Science and Guidance curricula, but adds a digital "visual curriculum" component that represents developmentally-appropriate artifacts by

grade level for each of the art domains in the curriculum: drawing, painting, printmaking, 3-D, technology, and mixed media.

World Language completed their curriculum work this summer. The World Language curriculum extends through Spanish, French, and Latin and looks at assessing students based on proficiencies: reading/writing, speaking/listening, vocabulary/grammar, integrated skills and participation. Additionally, we welcomed Ms. Zhou Ling, the new Mandarin teacher who is working with SAU 29 schools as part of the Chinese Guest Teacher program.

Many SAU 29 teachers participated in well-crafted professional learning communities over the summer. This provided an opportunity to focus curriculum alignment, common assessment development, and best instructional practices to increase student learning.

One indication that we have quality programs is that Chesterfield students at Keene High School continue to perform well. This past year, Chesterfield School had 200 students enrolled at Keene High School who took advantage of a wide range of academic courses as well as co-curricular activities. In English, 69 percent of the Chesterfield students earned a grade of "B" or better. In mathematics, 58 percent earned a grade of "B" or better. In science, 68 percent of the students earned a grade of "B" or better. In social studies, 68 percent of the students earned a grade of "B" or better. In world language, 60 percent of the students earned a grade of "B" or better. The overall attendance rate for Chesterfield students at Keene High School was 96.58 percent compared to 95.26 percent for the overall KHS population.

Much of the success enjoyed by Chesterfield students can be attributed to the support shown by Chesterfield residents of their young people. Community and parental involvement remains high and sets an outstanding example for other communities to emulate. The spirit of community volunteerism is best exemplified by the dedication of the Chesterfield School Board to provide every child with the means to reach his/her full potential. The many hours of volunteer support serve Chesterfield children well as they pursue their educational journeys.

We are not only looking at the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) but also continue to use data from the NWEA (Northwest Evaluation Association) assessments. Using this data we have been able to make sound instructional decisions for student programming. Our NECAP scores continue to show school-wide progress. Last year we did not make the annual yearly progress due to the performance of our subgroups. However overall as a school we did well. We continue to strive for academic excellence while also providing an enriching learning environment for all students.

School Safety

We continue to take the safety of our school community very seriously. The school has an extensive Emergency Operations plan. The school continues to keep all of its exterior doors locked. Traffic is encouraged not to drive into the circle in front of the school during bus drop off and pick up times. We have worked closely with First Student, the bus carrier for our district, to ensure safe pick up and drop off for all students.

I would like to take the time to recognize our school nurse, Mrs. Glenna Hart-Mercure, who has been extremely busy this year. She has been on top of the many demands that the school has faced this year. Not only did she continue to provide the daily services to our students but she was also very involved working with the local community on the

H1N1 virus. Glenna kept the lines of communication open between the school and the State Department of Health, as well as local officials. While winter may not be over I feel very confident that the school and its members are well prepared for any medical needs.

Special Projects

The Friends began a garden near the walkway on the school grounds. This garden was an Eagle Scout project completed by Jeremiah Harvey. The staff is looking forward to planting in this area this spring. Students will tend to the garden while learning about plants and gardening. Second grade will be leading a planting program in the spring thanks to monies donated by the Friends.

Science Club - Mr. John Fay has volunteered to run an after school Science Club. There is a strong interest in this and we appreciate Mr. Fay's efforts.

Laura Robertson organized Family Reading Night. Mrs. D'Eon read to students, Mrs. Robertson and Mrs. Amy Randall demonstrated techniques you can use when reading to your child. Mr. Young prepared and demonstrated several kinesthetic activities that reinforce early literacy skills and work on fine and gross motor skills.

Screen Free Week led by the Literacy Committee. The Literacy Committee continues to plan nighttime events for students for a week in March. This year the Town Library will have a storyteller available one evening. We will hold an all school read a thon. There will be a music concert on one evening. And the Friends of Chesterfield will hold another Contra Dance night.

The Student Council continues to sponsor a child from Children's International. In addition they sponsor school wide spirit days, a winter carnival, flower sales and the annual semi formal dance.

Several classes participated in making "Houses for Haiti" pins. In less than a 24-hour time frame the students raised over \$1300 for the NH Red Cross to send to help those in need in Haiti.

The student body continues to participate in school wide community service projects. The fall project was Joan's Pantry. This was a way to give directly back to a group that supports local families. Funds are collected as well as food and supplies needed by local animal shelters. An assembly is held where the presentation of these items occur. Additional projects include Empty Bowls night. Students in the sixth grade made homemade soup and clay bowls. All of the proceeds are donated to the local food pantry. Pennies for Peace is a school wide community service project. Each classroom has read Three Cups of Tea by Greg Mortenson or Listen to the Wind. While pennies may not appear to hold great value here in the US in Afghanistan and Pakistan, it will buy a child a pencil. A pencil can open the door to literacy. The purpose is to raise awareness about the world and other cultures.

School Health Services Report for Chesterfield

August 2009-December 2009

The role of the school nurse is more than to provide a band-aid. The school nurse acts as an advocate for the individual child and his/her family, and as a social worker that helps families identify resources and negotiate complex medical systems. The nurse also educates students, families and staff regarding specific health topics. Other roles might include emergency nursing, catalyst, collaborator, gatekeeper, manager, mentor, policy/guideline maker, researcher, safety inspector, and is an important part of a team as well as a surrogate parent at times. The school nurse has much to give within the school system.

Obtain health information on all new students and update information on continuing students. (Ensure all students are up to date with immunizations) Forward 8th grade records to high school at end of each school year.

Establish, supervise and/or conduct vision & hearing screenings as recommended or required by state guidelines (grades 1,3,5,7) and assist with scoliosis screenings. Notify parents and staff of referrals. Document findings on individual health records and input into Powerschool database.

Measure and weigh each student at the beginning of each year. Document on individual health record and input into Powerschool database.

Identify health problems through observation /health assessment and review of health records. Review findings with parents and school personnel.

Develop Individual Health Plans (IHP) for students with concerns that require special attention by school staff. Conditions include children with diabetes, asthma, cardiac problems and allergies.

Attend STAT and 504 meetings and make recommendations for modifications of Individual Educational Plans (IEP and 504) when indicated.

Assess and evaluate health and development status of students with specific health concerns (first aid, illness, medication management). Document each nurse visit. Distribute monthly report of nurse visits to homeroom teachers.

Partner with NH Healthy Kids 100% Schools Project to ensure every child/family has health insurance. Review insurance information, provide referrals and assist parents in finding appropriate health care providers.

Coordinate annual staff flu clinic.

Provide referrals for community resources to assist students and families: Keene Rotary (school clothes), Operation Toy Drop (Christmas gifts), Brattleboro Reformer (winter clothing), Lions Club (glasses, hearing devices & other health scholarships)

State mandated reports of suspected child abuse/neglect as needed.

Assist with Cheshire Smiles mobile dental health clinic for grades K-3. This program offers free dental screenings and fluoride treatment.

Collaborate with the NH Dept of Health & Human Services to report diseases & obtain current health information. Act accordingly to update school community with appropriate health information.

Prepare and distribute first aid supplies & health plans prior to the start of school and field trips.

Serve as a health consultant to school personnel, students and families. Provide classroom education as needed. (diabetes, asthma, blood born pathogens etc.) Display updated facts & students health education work on health bulletin board. Distribute health care bears/letters to grades K-5 as a means of fun health education. Contribute to monthly school newsletter.

Develop/review current school health policies, procedures and emergency preparedness plans.

Follow up with reports of head lice, provide facts to staff & families and conduct individual head checks as deemed necessary.

Attend nursing in-services, conferences to keep up with health related changes, nursing CEU's, and license renewal.
