TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday the Thirteenth Day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose on Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk, and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town, and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Article 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.

Article 7. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of band concerts the coming season.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the two following described portions of the old public highway leading from Hillsborough Bridge Village to West Henniker, which portions are bounded and described as follows, to wit:

First Portion: Beginning at a row of stakes across the highway on the easterly side of the Contoocook River and about 30 feet easterly from the east bridge abutment; thence westerly crossing the river to the westerly abutment of the old bridge; thence still continuing westerly to the southeasterly side of that new highway leading from Hillsborough Bridge Village to West Henniker known as Route No. 9. The distance between the easterly and westerly ends being about 2,000 feet.

Second Portion: Beginning at the easterly end thereof at its junction with the northwest side of the new highway leading from Hillsborough Bridge Village to West Henniker, which is known as Route No. 9; thence westerly to a line of posts across said highway; thence still continuing westerly, crossing a culvert, to a point 20 feet westerly of the culvert which crosses said old portion of the highway. The distance between the easterly and westerly ends of said old portion being about 480 feet.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that old portion of the public highway leading from Hillsborough Bridge Village to Hillsborough Center

which lies just east of the present newly constructed and relocated highway connecting said two points, which old portion is bounded and described as follows:

Commencing at the junction of said old portion with said present relocated highway, it being southwest of the dividing line between the Niedner property and the property of the State of New Hampshire known as the Fox place; thence in a general northerly direction and passing just west of the dwelling on the Fox farm to the junction of said old portion with that new cross highway leading from said relocated highway to the present highway leading to the Charles F. Butler farm. The distance between the two above mentioned termini being substantially 900 feet.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that old portion of the public highway leading from Hillsborough Bridge Village to Hillsborough Center, which lies northeasterly of the present newly constructed and relocated highway, which old portion is bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the easterly end of said old portion at what was formerly known as the School House Corner, and on the westerly side of the highway leading to the Charles F. Butler farm; thence westerly along the southerly line of said Butler land to the junction of said old portion with the present Hillsborough Bridge Village-Hillsborough Center highway as now relocated and constructed. Said old portion of highway being about 450 feet in length.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, the same to be used for the purpose of procuring a suitable dumping ground, or rendering the land now owned by the town accessible and suitable for that purpose, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to expend \$8,000 of its receipts from the Lemuel A. Cooledge Estate in paying up town debts other than debts for current expenses.

Article 16. To see if the town will instruct its Selectment to provide for the payment of all town debts, except temporary loans in anticipation of taxes, by issuing its

serial notes in accordance with Section 3, Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, and authorize said Selectmen to fix the rate of interest on said notes at a rate not in excess of $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ per annum; and further, to authorize said Board of Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to execute and issue said notes in behalf of the town.

Article 17. To vote by ballot to see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Section 22, Chapter 99 of the 1933 Session Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the legacy bequeathed to it in trust by Article 33 of the last will and testament of the late Caroline A. Fox, or take any action in relation thereto. Said Article 33 reads as follows:

“Thirty-Three. I give and bequeath to the Public Library of said town of Hillsborough, New Hampshire, all the books located in my home in said town of Hillsborough at the time of my decease and the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) as a trust fund, income to be used for the care and maintenance of the Fuller Public Library and the Hillsborough Community Building”

Article 19. To see what action the town will take relative to the appointment of a Committee to expend the income of the trust fund of \$25,000 created by Article 33 of the last will and testament of the late Caroline A. Fox and what instructions shall be given to said Committee relative to the manner of expending and the purposes for which expenditures may be made of said income.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Executors of the last will and testament of Caroline A. Fox, upon the terms and conditions imposed by said Executors, the sum of \$10,000 to be given to said Town by said Executors under and by virtue of Paragraph 34 of the last will and testament of the late Caroline A. Fox, which reads as follows:

“I direct my Executors herein named to give to such persons, organization or corporation as

they may determine, the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to be expended for boys' activities in said town of Hillsborough,"

and take any further action relative to the appointment of a committee and the expenditures of the net income from said sum of \$10,000.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Given under our hands this twenty-third day of February in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-four.

REPORT OF FULLER PUBLIC LIBRARY

We submit herewith report of Fuller Public Library for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1934.

We gratefully acknowledge the many gifts of books and magazines.

According to the will of Miss Caroline A. Fox Fuller Public Library jointly with the Community Building will receive the income of \$25,000. Her own private library, consisting of over 370 books, and a late edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica were also bequeathed to the library. We are indebted to Mrs. E. P. Cochran for the fine picture of Miss Fox, which rests on the mantle in the reading room, and for the "Dance of the Nymphs" by Corot which hangs on the wall.

Under the Federal Civil Works Administration Miss Clara Widger, an experienced librarian, was assigned as assistant to this library. Her duties commenced Dec. 4th for the period of ten weeks. This has made it possible to open the library every afternoon. As Miss Widger left at the end of two weeks to accept a permanent position, Mrs. Carrie Kelso was appointed to fill her place. We were also assigned an experienced book mender for three weeks. During that time 100 books were mended.

There seems to be a greatly increased number of patrons of the reading room, and with so many students doing reference work there, it seems necessary to continue the present increase in hours, through the winter at least.

It is interesting to note that the adult circulation of books for 1933 has increased by 984 books over the circulation for 1932.

The town appropriation of \$500 for 1933 enabled the trustees to pay \$100 of the amount borrowed from the White Fund. The savings bank accounts stand as follows:

This sum in the Amoskeag Bank covers the entire amount invested there. It is back interest which was paid at the time the White Estate was settled. The interest from the Sarah A. White Bequest can be used for the purchase of books and magazines only. It is the belief and seems advisable that the surplus interest should be available toward the maintenance of the library, and steps are being taken with that end in view.

During the year 1933 the following renewals were made on the water system.

Unavailable Assets

Two hundred and five feet of 6-inch cast iron pipe on Preston Street, replacing the old 4-inch cement pipe. This renewal at a cost of \$379.38; renewal \$116.85, excess renewal \$262.53.

During December, and January 1934, this street was completed with the renewal of 1,320 feet of 6-inch pipe. This additional project was carried through with the help of a grant from the Civil Works Administration which was applied to labor. The material being supplied by the Precinct. The cost of this job to the Precinct was \$1,095.70 charged as follows: Renewal, \$752.40, excess renewal \$343.30.

Also on Bridge Street 500 feet of pipe was laid, 120 feet of 8-inch and 380 feet of 6-inch. Labor on this project was also paid for out of C. W. A. funds. The cost of this job to the Precinct was \$555.10; \$401.80 charged to renewal and \$153.30 to excess renewal.

For the Fiscal Year Beginning July 1st, 1932, Ending
June 30, 1933

To the Inhabitants of Hillsborough Town School District:

The Board of Education of the Town District respectfully submits its annual report with that of its Treasurer, Superintendent and Auditors.

There have been six schools maintained in the District, and the work accomplished deserves much credit, for the pupils and teachers.

We will be pleased at the annual meeting to advise in regard to the work that has been done, and to recommend the appropriations necessary for the fiscal year beginning July 1st, 1934, ending June 30th, 1935.

The Superintendent of Schools respectfully submits his fifteenth annual report, being the report for the school year 1932-1933.

The Center School has the highest percent of attendance and also the largest number of tardinesses. Great credit is due them for the first, and the second is easily explained by the distance which they must travel. The Lower Village School has the largest number on

the Honor Roll, and also the largest number of visitors. Considering the sizes of the Schools the Flat School had a larger number on the Honor Roll, and again considering the sizes of the schools, the Goodale School had the largest number of visitors.

The standard school year has 180 days, while ours varied from 167½ at the Merrill School to 172½ at the Upper Village. We should strive for a full year of 180 days. The School Board is credited with 144 visits, and the Superintendent made 152 visits, seeing each teacher about once every seven days.

Expense is an important item, so the following statement is of interest. We spent, for our schools 74 cents on every hundred dollars of our valuation. The other districts in this Union spent \$1.85, \$1.42, \$1.28, \$0.94 and \$0.67. In other words, only one district in this Union spent less according to its valuation than we did.

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Special School District in the town of Hillsborough, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the High School Building in said District on Friday, the 16th day of March, 1934, at seven o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator, clerk and treasurer for the ensuing year. One member of the Board of Education for the ensuing three years, and any other necessary district officers.

2. To hear the reports of the Board of Education, Treasurer and other officers and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for the purpose of purchasing materials for the drainage of the high school basement and the renewal of rotted floor in the auditorium, provided the Federal Civil Works Administration or some other governmental agency, will supply money for the labor costs, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for the purpose of drainage of the high school basement and the renewal of rotted floor in the auditorium, or take any action relating thereto.

5. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of painting the two school buildings outside, or take any action relating thereto.

6 To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate money to pay for the truck hire on the C. W. A. project on the Grammar School grounds, said sum not to exceed Sixty Dollars (\$60.00) to reimburse Mr. Arthur Dodge whose truck has been used.

7. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

8. To choose auditors, agents, or committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Superintendent of Schools presents to the School Board, this his fifteenth annual report and the twenty-eighth report of the superintendents of this district, being the report for the year 1932-1933.

Our corps of teachers is the same as that of last year, with the employment of Miss Alice Belcher as assistant to the Principal in place of Mrs. Harvey, and to save space in this report the usual table is omitted.

The percent of attendance in grade 8 was very good, and grade 7 is to be congratulated upon the fact that no one was tardy during the whole year. The superintendent visited the eighth grade more often than the other rooms for conference with the Principal, and it should be noted that the 137 visits to the high school were divided among the six teachers. Please note the decreasing number of visits by citizens to the upper grades, three visits being made to every pupil in the first grade, with one visit for every ten in the high school. Are we thirty times as interested in the first grade as we are in the high school?

The first annual report of a superintendent of this District was made in June 1906, and our growth in that time will be seen from the following items:

The High School enrollment has more than tripled, and the attendance has improved greatly. The parents seem to show less interest in the high school and more interest in the Grammar School. Our average membership is 95.4% of our enrollment at present, while 17 years ago it was only 88.7% of the enrollment. Stating the same fact in another way, we lost 4.6% of our pupils during the year while they lost 11.3% of theirs. Their Honor Roll contained the name of one high school pupil and nine from the grades, ours contained 29 from the High School, 137 from the grades. Congratulations to the four on the former list whom I happen to know, Irving Reed, Bernard Webber, Harold Buttrick and Wilbur Heath.

The report of the State Department from which the above facts were taken goes on to show that of all pupils going to college or Normal School from the 29 high schools classed with us, pupils from only two of them have done better work than our graduates for the past five years.

At the Hopkinton Fair our Domestic Science pupils received four first, five second, and four third prizes. In the so-called "Battle of Brains" two of our three teams stood first. Our Commercial pupils have also been a credit to the school, 15 of them earning Certificates, four being awarded Bronze Pins and two awarded guards for pins previously received, all for excellence in typewriting. The Haslet Scholarships went to Marie Johnson and Gloria Marcy, and the Butler Scholarship to Bertha Raines.

A great help to school spirit, yes, and to excellence in

scholarship, is found in properly conducted athletics, and our high school takes second place to no other high school in our class in this respect. Our boys having won the basketball championship in the Central N. H. League for three consecutive years, may keep the beautiful silver trophy. They also won the League Championship in baseball, and our basketball girls were champions in the girls' division of the basketball league.

The Grammar School teachers should receive considerable credit for the results in the "Battle of Brains," because they laid the foundation for the good work. Paul McAdams won the S. A. R. Medal for good citizenship awarded annually to an eighth grade pupil by the State S. A. R.

The High School Valedictorian was Bertha Raines, the Salutatorian was Emma Yeaton. The Grammar School Valedictorian was Nellie Brzozowski and the Salutatorian was John Grund.

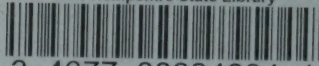
