WARRANT.

The State of New Hampshire,

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plymouth, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate in addition to that required by law, for the support and maintenance of the Free Public Library.

4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, in addition to that required by an act of the Legislature approved Feb. 24, 1905, to be used for permanent improvement of its main highways, such improvement to be made under the advice of the State Engineer.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to pay firemen.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the decoration of Soldiers' graves.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Citizens of Plymouth :

Do the citizens fully realize the opportunities for securing an academic training or vocational, in one line, constantly maintained within this town? For those who desire to lay foundations for a broad collegiate or technical education this town provides one of the very best preparatory institutions in the state. Owing to the competition of four new high schools in towns, where there were none, when the new High school was built, we probably shall never attain the expected total membership. In order to gratify the desire for diversity of choice, four courses are equipped and enough teachers are employed to give proper attention to the pupils. One course, the Commercial, is distinctly vocational. By it any one, who deliberately chooses to waive all chance of connecting with a college, can become proficient in the training that fits for a business career such as book-keeping, stenography or clerical work.

The advisability of establishing an agricultural course has been given careful consideration for the past two years. The equipment would be somewhat costly, but not more than the town can afford, if the desire for such a course should manifest itself in the future. From a canvas of the present pupils of the High school, it appears that one junior and four seniors who are to graduate in June, 1913, would choose the course, if offered. The real fact appears that children whose home life is the farm desire something else than further study of agricultural pursuits.

That a course, similar to that provided by the Boston Mechanics Art High School as a means of preparation for the mechanical courses in the technical schools, would appeal to more students, is worthy of consideration. Some tuition

students might be attracted to choose our High school and some of our own children might be given the chance of preparing for a life study, better adapted to their individual capabilities, if such a course could be offered.

The schemes of manual training and domestic science, suggested by educational agitators as brain cordials, have not yet demonstrated their usefulness and desirability in a school like this, which constantly aims at sound preparation for the higher institution or a life of culture. This part of vocational training is amply furnished in many families in their well conducted homes and business life. It can be secured in other cases, if the parents or pupils so desire, in ways that will not add a burden to the tax payers. The girl in order to sew, and the boy in order to saw, should not need a \$1,000 instructor to teach them, when of High school age. The shifting by parents of the burden of their responsibilities onto the public school is becoming too common.

Most of the District and Grammar school graduates enter the High school. Some come from other towns, for whom we expend as much extra as we receive. No feasible way appears of collecting even a part of the cost above the limit which towns may pay. That only one out of every two or three that begin High school study perseveres and graduates is unfortunate and in many cases without 'ustifiable excuse.

We have received the college certificate privilege for three years, owing to the good work of recent graduates and the standards of instruction we constantly aim to maintain. Drawing has been the means of keeping this High school in touch with one of the great Polytechnical institutions.

The gutters of the High school are a fruitful source of trouble and the electric clock continues to produce all varieties of time. Its facial expressions are as varied as those of the professional impersonator. Yet none applaud or desire an encore. When time is no more, perhaps something reliable and lasting can be found for a substitute.

The new fire escape on the High school building is a thing of beauty and, we trust, a joy forever. In case of calamity it may serve to save many from premature destruction. Expressed public sentiment, as well as statute law, must erect safeguards against possible fatalities in case of fire in places of public assemblage.

The Model school loan bonds have been printed and exchanged for notes as far as possible.

The District schools continue to give the opportunity, to those within their environment, of preparing for our High school or the common walks of life. Before long, if the homes cannot teach sewing, cooking or simple joinery, these features of manual training will have to be introduced. We can justly claim that in these schools, if nothing else, the pupils can learn to study, and the gulf between them and the High school is not great for their graduates.

Much has been said about attractions, good or bad, that interfere with school work. Yet distracting influences need not deprive children of the free opportunity of getting an education up to the point of entering college,—the equal of college training of the former generation.

Under the statutes both parents, not the street, or associates, or attractions, are the appointed guardians of the destinies of their offspring. The choice of environment and occupation is with you, the fathers and mothers of school children. We submit that there are responsibilities that are up to you. What are you going to do?

We recommend that \$11,000.00 be raised under article number seven.
