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

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#### TOWN WARRANT.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town's meeting house in said Henniker, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for schools other than that required by law.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise towards paying its indebtedness.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise in addition to that required by law for the support of Tucker Free Library.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of observing Memorial Day.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the fire department.

9. To hear and act upon the reports of town officers, library trustees and committees.

10. To see if the town will vote to put in any additional reservoirs for protection against fires, raise money for the same, or pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for payment of electric lights for the ensuing year, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the permanent improvement of highways.

13. To see if the town will vote to exempt Charles J. Burnham from taxation for the term of ten years, on a proposed grist mill that he might erect any time within one year from April 1, 1911, including land, buildings, machinery and power to operate same.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

The health conditions of the town for the past year have been generally good.

Six cases of contagious disease have been reported to the board, five of measles and one of scarlet fever.

In no instance during the year has any contagious disease been imparted to any person outside the family in which it originated after it was discovered and reported.

The house infected with scarlet fever germs, also one in which occurred a death from consumption, were disinfected in accordance with the requirements of the State Board of Health.

There has been but one complaint of nuisance presented to the board during the year.

There has been one analysis of the Henniker Spring water by the State Laboratory of Hygiene, and the same was found to be in good condition.

We would again call attention to the fact, of no cisterns on the south side of the river, except the one on the Common, which covers only a small area. A small amount of money spent in building a cistern may prevent a large property loss in this section of the village.

The apparatus of the department is in good working condition.

One improvement has been added to the equipment in putting the General Taylor engine on runners, which has proved a success.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL-HOUSE REPAIRS.

The schoolhouses in Divisions 1, 4 and 5 have been painted outside, whitened and tinted inside and the furniture varnished. The house in Division 5 has been painted inside.

The furniture and sheathing of the Central building has been given a thorough coat of hard oil finish, and the wall and stairway of the lower hall re-tinted. Blackboards in all of the school houses have been given necessary attention.

The houses at Divisions 3 and 6 are in need of repairs the coming year.

At the Central building the condition of the water closets has become intolerable, and it is alleged an enormous quantity of water is wasted. It seems to be absolutely necessary to raise sufficient funds to install a new system the present year.

I would recommend that not less than \$500 be raised for schoolhouse repairs.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

Mrs. Jennie N. Dodge, Secretary School Board:

I submit, herewith, my third annual report as superintendent of schools.

Recent inspection of all the schools in town shows them to be in good condition. The work is progressing, harmony exists in all quarters and in most cases a very general improvement is being made.

The district schools present many problems. It is difficult to find satisfactory teachers and exceedingly difficult to keep them. Moreover, under the present arrangement effective supervision is a task.

1. In the matter of securing competent teachers the school board is aware of the difficulty encountered. Could local girls be persuaded to teach, the matter would be somewhat solved.Out of fifteen girls graduating from our high school in the last three years, none are now teaching and but one is preparing to teach. And yet teaching is the one profession that is not overcrowded, the one field in which there is rapid advancement for the individual who "makes good."

2. Retaining satisfactory teachers is also a problem. In three years there have been eighteen changes in our six district schools, half of which number have left for better paying positions. We may count ourselves fortunate if a good teacher remains with us a year.

3. On an average each district school is visited once a month, the work observed and the pupils examined; however, this is not wholly satisfactory, both because the teachers come to know the exact hour of the visit, and because the time of the visit is too short for thorough work. If there was but one long session daily at the high school, I am convinced that far more efficient supervision would be possible, that it would be better for all schools, not excepting the high school itself.

The teaching force in the Central school was materially strengthened last fall by the change in the grammar department. A careful comparison with the state requirements and with other schools of high standing shows that the Central school is up to the standard in nearly every particular.

Except for a few minor repairs all the school buildings in town are in good condition. At the Central school, however, a new system of toilets is required to replace the old ones which are worn out beyond repair. I would urge the board to bring this important matter before the voters at the next school meeting.

An examination of the table below shows a large percent of tardiness and a larger percent of absences. Of the larger schools the high school has the best record and Quaker street the poorest. In all schools the percentage is far too high. This is a matter that parents should attend to—the prompt and uninterrupted attendance of the children, as every absence is a distinct loss to the child.

### REPORT OF TUCKER FREE LIBRARY

#### For the Year Ending February 15, 1911.

The library catalogues were received in March 1910, and have since been for sale at the library. They were procured at the urgent request of many of the patrons, and we hope they will be of much use to the townspeople. We sell them at the price of \$.25 each although they cost \$1.00 apiece.

We have purchased 113 new books, and have replaced 18 that have been worn out, and have had 47 rebound. We have also been favored with several large gifts during the past year: Mrs. Caroline Wadsworth Haley of Concord, N. H., having given 125 bound volumes together with a large number of magazines and paper volumes. There are among these books, the American Cyclopedia of 17 volumes, several dictionaries of different languages, a large volume of sermons by Rev. John Flavel published in 1667—a book valuable by reason of its age.

Of these books but ten are fiction, the others being solid reading. These books are not yet catalogued. Dr. A. F. Wheat of Manchester has given 20 small books on Theosophical subjects. Mrs. Kate Childs has given 13 volumes. Six volumes have been given by Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Carter of Lebanon in memory of Mrs. Hannah B. Whitney. New Hampshire Medical Report given by Dr. G. H. Sanborn. History of Rockingham, Vt., from Myron H. Ray; also books given by Mrs. George Preston, Mrs. Ella Howlett, Walter A. Connor, R. H. Thompson, and the U. S. Government. Of the new books 16 are solid reading, 97 are juvenile and fiction.

Under the direction of the excellent teachers in the

Central school, the pupils are making much use of the library, both with the Reference books, and with the solid reading. We have the same list of magazines as last year, with the addition of the System, a business magazine. We have also the Outing presented by Mrs. Curtis Childs, Hampton's Magazine presented by Mrs. Roswell Brill, and the Technical World presented by Sewall E. Huntington. We desire to thank all friends of the library for their kindness and liberality.
