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

# TOWN WARRANT

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#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough Qualified to

#### Vote in Town Affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose all necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

2nd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the Poor, for the laying out and repairing of Highways, and all other charges arising within the town, and appropriate the same.

3rd. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the Fire Department, the Public Library, Peterborough Hospital and for Memorial Day.

4th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate towards paying the town debt and interest.

5th. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

6th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a police officer, or as many as may be necessary, to preserve order in and about the public places in town, and to perform other duties as may be required by the Selectmen, both day and night, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

7th. To see if the town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given to the town in trust by any individual, or individuals.

8th. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of Old Home Week.

9th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate towards building the Contoocook Valley State Highway, and to accept Federal Aid.

10th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for use on the Contoocook Valley Road in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917.

11th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars to construct a gravel road on any portion of the Greenfield road. The same to be under the supervision of the Highway Agent.

12th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the town tool house or take any other action relating thereto.

13th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, to be used for repairing the road leading to the MacDowell Colony Hall, from a point near the upper end of High Street.

14th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a tractor and snow plow, or any other equipment for removing snow, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a Triple Combination Motor Pump for the Fire Department, or exchange the present combination, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

16th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the erection of street lights in the following locations at West Peterborough:

(a) On the Dublin road at the Egan place.

(b) On Harrisville road at North end of bridge.

17th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars to build a cement sidewalk at West Peterborough, beginning at the East end of lower stone bridge, continuing east as far as appropriation will permit. Width of sidewalk to be four and one-half feet, or take any action relating thereto.

18th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate Five Hundred Dollars to be used on the Harrisville Road. 19th. To see what action the town will take relative to extending the town water system to South Peterborough, or installing a branch water system at South Peterborough, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.

20th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate One Hundred and Forty Three Dollars to reimburse the First National Bank of Peterborough for the expense of building the sidewalk on Grove St., in front of the bank.

21st. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a section of the highway near the top of Grey Hill so called on the highway leading from the Sandhill road past the residence of George S. Parker, whenever a new road shall be built to take the place of said section.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to purchase the Traffic Post on the corner of Concord and Pine Sts. and raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Twenty-Five Dollars for that purpose.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to purchase a truck for the Highway Department, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

24th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the construction of a cement sidewalk on the west side of Grove St., from its junction with the Old Dublin road, to the railroad crossing near the Town Tool House.

25th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the Governor and Council to route the Contoocook Valley State Highway via Middle Hancock Road.

26th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a Motor Chassis for the West Peterborough Fire Department and raise and appropriate money for the same.

27th. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will raise and appropriate to contest the proposed discontinuance of the Manchester and Keene Railroad and a part of the Peterborough Railroad, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### Chief Engineer's Report

To the Selectmen of Peterborough, N. H.:

Gentlemen: As chief of the Fire Department I wish to submit the following report for the year 1924.

The Department responded to 46 alarms during the year, 25 still or telephone calls and 21 gong alarms and we were very fortunate in not having more considering the long dry season that we had. I am glad to note an improvement around houses, shops and business places generally in relation to allowing rubbish to accumulate. With the carelessness of smokers and the increasing use of oils and gasolene people have got to learn to think of what they are doing, in other words they should use their brains to guide their hands.

The apparatus and equipment of the Department consists of one combination chemical and hose motor truck, one fire engine hand pump, "Aquarius," one hook and ladder truck, hand drawn, three hose reels, 14 hand extinguishers, two force pumps, 48 pails, 2400 feet of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch lines fire hose, 200 feet  $\frac{3}{4}$  chemical hose, 60 shovels 10 axes, 8 lanterns and one 50 foot two 35, one 22 and one 20 foot extension ladders, also 150 feet of wall ladders, four roof hook ladders, 2 large grab hooks with rope and chain, iron bars and hand hooks.

During the year we have bought 12 new rubber coats, 500 feet of new fire hose and gave the roof of the Central Station a coat of storm tite roof cement with a five year guarantee.

As forest fire warden I have issued 36 fire permits and considering the dry season the citizens were very thoughtful in not asking for them at such a time.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF PETERBOROUGH:

Herewith is submitted for your consideration my seventh annual report on the condition of your schools.

### Teachers

The current year is quite remarkable in that there was only one change in the teaching force over the preceding year. Mr. Trafton who had served very efficiently as headmaster of the school for a period of four years resigned his position to accept a better paying one as headmaster of the Lisbon, N. H. High school. Those officially connected with the school were very sorry to have Mr. Trafton leave, but wish him great success in his new position. After careful consideration of a number of candidates Mr. Clarence W. Sleeper, a graduate of New Hampshire University and a teacher of very successful experience, was elected to fill the vacancy.

Miss Bagley was granted a leave of absence to finish her training at the Keene Normal school, and Mrs. Margaret Popple, a former teacher in the first grade, was secured as substitute for the first fifteen weeks of school.

At the present time ten of the grade teachers, or 83 1-3% of the force, are normal graduates.

The force as at present constituted is faithful and efficient. Under the direction of Mr. Sleeper considerable work in a professional way has been accomplished. Meetings have been held every two weeks at which subjects of professional interest to all teachers have been considered. These meetings are open to all teachers in town, and have been of interest and help to all who have attended. Quite a number of excellent professional books have been loaned and given to the teachers' library at the Center school and these have been of help in keeping alive the professional ideals of the teachers. In these and other ways the teachers have shown their desire for professional improvement and more efficiency in their work.

#### THE WORK IN GENERAL

From time to time during the fall and winter standardized tests have been given in several of the school subjects. The first one in the fall was a reading test. The intent of this was to discover how much a pupil really comprehended of what he read, or his ability to get the thought from the printed page. Too frequently in the past the whole end and aim of reading in the schools has been to produce easy, fluent oral readers. Important as this end may be, and I am not one to minimize its true place in the school work, the real test of reading is the ability to get the thought from the printed page. This is especially true in view of the fact that so much of the procedure in American schools is dependent upon this ability. Knowledge of history, geography, all the social sciences, in fact, as well as mathematics and the natural sciences cannot be acquired without this ability. And, also, when we consider the fact that probably nine tenths of reading during adult life is silent reading the necessity of teaching proper reading habits is readily apparent. This test in silent reading revealed the following facts: Out of 244 pupils examined in grades three to eight inclusive, 112, or about 46%, equalled or surpassed the standard set for the grade; 51 of these 112 would be ranked as high average or very superior readers.

A test in the fundamental operations in arithmetic was also given. This was to test the pupils accuracy in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division involving whole numbers, fractions and decimals; 221 pupils were examined. Out of these 141, or 63% equalled or surpassed the standard set for the grade. In this test absolute accuracy in every detail was required.

The better showing in the arithmetic is probably due to the fact that for a number of years we have been trying to emphasize drill work in the fundamentals, and the result of this is beginning to show. We have begun this year systematic work in careful silent reading, and trust that when a second test is given in the spring considerable improvement will be shown.

A test in spelling is now being conducted, the detailed report of which is not yet at hand. Tests in other subjects will be given from time to time during the year.

Such tests as the above are useful not only in giving us a basis for comparing our schools with others over the country, but also they are of great help in discovering individual weaknesses, and in judging somewhat of the merits of different methods of instruction. Great care and much investigation has been involved in compiling them and they are now being used very extensively.

#### PROMOTIONS

Out of 449 pupils last June, 59 failed of promotion, or 13.2%. This is about the average for non-promotions over the state as a whole, which runs from 12 to 14%, varying, of course, from year to year.

It would be of very great interest to know how many pupils there are in our schools who would be capable of more rapid progress through the grades. No doubt there are quite a number. How shall we provide for the exceptional child is being recognized as a problem of great importance. Heretofore our efforts have been centered upon the dull child but it is now being recognized that the bright child presents an equally important problem. That there are these two groups of children, and other groups between these extremes, is well known, and it is equally certain that our school system is not equipped to deal adequately with the situation. Many plans have been proposed and tried out, some of them containing features of much excellence. However, with conditions as they are in the matter of school facilities here any adequate attempt at the solution of this problem is out of the question.

#### CHANGES

The Junior High School opened in September with an enrollment of 78 pupils. Of course, it was out of the question to expect one teacher to do justice to such a proposition, so ways and means had to be devised to handle the situation so far as possible. The manual training department which had occupied the room on the third floor was removed to the boys' basement, and this room in the attic is now being used as a recitation room. A student teacher from the Keene Normal school is employed for nine week periods to help out in the seventh and eighth grades. Of course considered from almost any viewpoint this solution of the problem is only a makeshift, and entirely inadequate to cope with the situation. However, until such time as adequate accommodations are provided such, of necessity, must be the nature of most of the solutions to our school problems. The manual training room in the basement is just about half large enough, besides several other unreasonable features.

Other changes in organization will soon become imperative, one or two of which ought to be adjusted at once. The enrollment at the North school is becoming entirely too unwieldly for one teacher. About 38 are enrolled there now, and with six grades represented in the school it needs no argument to show the handicap pupils and teachers are working under. The logical solution of the problem, probably, would be the removal of the fifth and sixth grades to the village. One hesitates, however, to recommend this, in view of the crowded condition in the Center building. However, this condition at the North ought not to continue long. Like conditions of overcrowding prevail at the West in both rooms, the condition in the intermediate room being the worst at the present time. 41 are enrolled in this room, five being seated at a long table in the front of the room. If there was only one grade this, in a way, would not be so bad, but with three grades in the room the condition can easily be imagined. The primary room also has 40 children enrolled in three grades, and the first and second grades have been put on part time for the last two years. This is a bad situation and should be remedied.

Problems such as the above are intimately tied up with the situation here in the Center school, and the longer the situation here is delayed the more acute are these other problems apt to grow. Of course a new building is imperative and the longer it is put off the more the education and training of the children all over town will have to suffer. It seems to be a question of taking it out of the children or taking it out of our pockets.

#### REPAIRS

The matter of adequate repairs to the school plant is one that is becoming more and more pressing. Some of the school property is getting into a condition where the touch and go method of making repairs is no longer adequate. A carefully thought out plan, systematically followed, is what is needed. To enumerate only a few of the things needing attention at the Center building.

(1) Some adequate system of fire protection installed.

(2) The entire heating and ventilating system thoroughly gone over and defects remedied.

(3) A suitable system of toilet facilities provided.

(4) The treads to nearly all the main stairways, and some sections of the floors need renewing.

(5) Rooms equipped with suitable blackboards.

(6) The first and third grade rooms and the High School equipped with suitable, modern school furniture.

(7) The general appearance of the whole building, inside and out, made to correspond, in some measure, to a decent standard of civic pride.

Other items might easily be mentioned, not only in this building but in others. This may seem a large program, but unless it is attacked in a large way, the condition will become still more deplorable.

Many smaller details, also, should be attended to, some of which are included in the headmaster's report. To mention one thing in addition. If a pupil on the second or third floor wants a drink of water he has to go down to the basement to satisfy his thirst. This is certainly not conducive to efficient administration or dicipline, not to mention other objections.

Two drinking fountains located in the basement have to meet the need of some 350 people. There should be, at least, a drinking fountain on each floor. The other school buildings in town, also, should receive attention, but space will not permit the mention of the needs in detail. Many of the things have been discussed in previous reports. The main point is that it is not sufficient to spend a little here and a little there and consider the job done. \$5000 or \$6000 could easily be spent on the Center building alone in the way of needed repairs. Of course, the whole question is involved in the problem of a new building for the High and Junior High schools, and so long as that remains in its present undetermined state many other problems have to wait. In regard to the whole High school question it certainly would seem to be the course of common sense to lay aside all preconceived opinions of this and that and get down to a discussion of the real needs of the situation, and to formulate a plan to meet these needs. We certainly have played with the problem long enough, so long, in fact that our dexterity in evading the issue has become well known.

#### ATTENDANCE

There were 520 different pupils registered in the schools last year, with an average membership of 451.9 and an average attendance of 413.1. The per cent of attendance was 91.4, the same as the year before, though the enrollment, average membership and average attendance was greater. The cases of tardiness were reduced from 816 to 486 for the year, or a little over one per pupil in average membership. Figured in per cent this means a reduction of about 40%. This certainly is encouraging. An average of 6 days was lost during the year on account of holidays and other no school days.

"The reasons for discharges are (a) removal from town, (b) consent of parents. Assuming that all seniors graduate and the incoming freshmen class numbering 25, the tentative enrollment for next year will be 91. \*\*\*\*\*

"School Spirit. One of the big problems of the school is the development of a school spirit. The past tendency has been to form groups or cliques within the school to the detriment of the entire school group. This problem cannot be solved in a day or week but will take a long time. To accomplish this end we have embodied in the weekly timetable a period we call 'Organization Period.' The membership comprises the pupil body. Officers have been elected and they preside at the meetings. Programs are arranged for each meeting and outside speakers are invited in once a month. The Robert Frost Literary Society has been kept alive and their programs occur in this period. One new phase of school life attempted this year was the revival of the school paper. The school is indebted to Mr. Govette for his co-operation in starting the 'Torch.' School cheering has been encouraged and developed for purposes of unifying the student body. One very important phase of school life is athletics. I cannot say enough in emphasis of athletics for physical development and health, health being the first aim of secondary education as suggested by the National Education Association. Many things are taught through athletics which are of great value and which cannot be possibly acquired in the school room. The school is deeply indebted to Mr. Sweeney and Mr. Paquet for their efficient coaching and interest in the school teams. All of the foregoing tend to build up a group loyalty which is of first importance to a good High School.

"Practically the same amount of work has been accomplished in sewing this year as was reported last. The noon lunches are proving very successful. The prices have been reduced and there has been a greater demand. On several occasions during Mrs. Lewis' absence the freshmen girls have taken entire responsibility for the lunch and have acquitted themselves exceedingly well.

"Miss Grimes takes great interest in the boys' glee club, the orchestra and the ukulele band. All of these organizations have rehearsals once a week.

"Recommendations. The present school laboratory is in great need of a hood. The foul gases and odors penetrate the entire building under the present conditions. Another room especially equipped for a biological laboratory is badly needed. More hooks for hanging wraps and compartments for rubbers and overshoes should be provided in the upper hallway. A standpipe on each floor with sufficient hose would be a necessity in case of fire. Above everything else is needed a complete system of electric gongs to warn occupants of the entire building in case of fire. Under the present system only the pupils on the second floor can clearly hear the alarm.

"For next year I favor the addition of another period to the day, making it an eight period instead of a seven period day. This may be easily accomplished by opening school at 8:45 A. M., shortening each afternoon period five minutes and closing at 3:40 instead of 3:30 P. M."

In drawing the work is progressing along the lines heretofore followed with special emphasis on color harmony. For this latter the Taylor System of Color Harmony is followed as a guide.

In Manual Training Mrs. Carll reports: "We are making larger things this year than usual. This requires more time, but the work is of more interest to the pupils, and the object he makes is more useful. As a person works with the boys he notices many things regarding the sawing, planing and joining of the pieces of wood, things which develop the reasoning powers of the boys. It is a pleasure to question the boys and watch them reason out the best way to do their work." \* \* \* \* One of the seventh grade boys says he wishes he could have a work bench at home now, he could make so many useful articles. He wants to be a cabinet maker, and I am sure he would be a good one, for he is very particular, and much interested in his work.

"Among the articles the boys are making are flower stands, with an extra shelf for books, book stands, coat and hat racks, shelves for feeding birds, bird houses, jumpers, taborets, a piano bench, a porch swing, medicine cabinet, and a writing desk. "We are trying to do the best we can in our little room down in the basement. It is much too small, and very cold in winter. We hope we may have a better place to work in some time."

Regarding the music Miss Grimes writes: "From the first grade up to the High School the course of study is planned most thoroughly, the details of time and tune being worked out and the theories being put into practice in the melodious songs used in every grade and in the individual work and sight reading.

In the first grade the children are learning to sing rote songs, striving for correctness of pitch, and familiarity with the first five tones of the scale.

"In the second grade the remaining tones of the scale are memorized, rote songs are continued and books are used for the first time; much individual sight singing is done.

"In the third and fourth grades the problems in time and tune become more complicated. Two part singing is introduced in the fourth grade.

"In the fifth and sixth grades two part singing is more thoroughly developed and the principles learned in time and tune in the preceding grades are reviewed.

"In the seventh and eighth grades three part songs are sung. The theoretical principles are not only accumulating but involve a knowledge of all that has gone before. In these grades music of a more difficult type is studied."

### SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

#### March 1924—March, 1925

### To the Citizens of Peterborough:

The purpose of the School Board remains unchanged from that of one year ago: it is still to make the best of existing conditions, and to aim at permanent improvement. For schools like all other institutions are not in a really good condition unless they are perceptibly growing better.

At the close of the school year in June, 1924, a detailed inspection was made of all the school buildings. This resulted in a thorough renovation in August. Every building was given inside an old-fashioned New England house-cleaning. Chairs, tables, and desks were repaired, and then varnished over, both for sanitation and for economy. Locks and doors were adjusted so far as possible to conform to the school law of exit.

At the Center building the principal exit was fitted up with a panic-bolt, so that doors swing outward at once on pressure from within. Additional fire extinguishers have been placed on the third floor. During the summer, the toilet plumbing was over-hauled by Mr. A. E. Fish, new urinals installed by Parkhurst Bros., and both basements rendered more sanitary thereby. New steam valves were placed in some of the rooms, and it is believed that these have served to increase the heating efficiency and lessen expense at the same time.

In September the entire building was inspected by Deputy Commissioner J. N. Pringle of the State Department, and after personal consultation with him the School Board decided to use the Manual Training room on the third floor as a recitation room for the relief of the 7th and 8th grades. This change made it necessary to reserve a part of the boys' basement for the bench-work.

Some forty class-room chairs have been added to the seating equipment in the building, and since these are light and movable, and for the use of High School pupils as well as others, there is no excuse for any one's being without a seat.

The room thus set free is still used by the drawing teacher as her headquarters, but is usually in charge of a Normal student-teacher. These changes seemed to be the best way in which to meet the existing emergency of numbers in the 7th and 8th grades.

The other school buildings in town are in a fairly good state of repair, but should there ever be a surplus in the treasury it would be possible to add various comforts and conveniences, especially at the North and Wilson Corner schools. Transportation conditions have improved during the past year, and as was stated last year improvement would mean added expense. The men in charge, however, certainly deserve credit for the care and promptness with which they have performed their trips.

The school system as a whole is chiefly defective **now** in its organization from Grades VII to XII. Last year was one of accomplishment in the organization of the system for the first six years by the addition of the portable building. The foundation of a working system is now in place. The outstanding obstacle which makes impossible its completion is, of course, lack of sufficient room. It is hardly necessary in this report to enter into detailed discussion. The citizens already know the facts. And it is probably true beyond question that every one at heart desires to make the school system and the school buildings a credit to Peterborough.

Taking everything into consideration the year as a whole has not been marked by the amount of material accomplishment which characterized last year's work. It has been devoted rather to meeting emergencies and relieving bad conditions due to numbers. Such periods are bound to come, however, and progress necessarily is less rapid under such circumstances. And schools like other municipal institutions are in danger of standing still.

This is a partial list of the books, in addition to which there are various Readers and Spellers, and maps and charts. Under equipment there are fifteen primary chairs, three portable blackboards, one music blackboard, five benches, manualtraining bench with iron vices, planes, gauges, saws, and clamps. There are also some physical laboratory appliances, and mounted specimens of insects and birds.

One of the gifts which deserves special mention is a stereoptican lantern of Bausch and Lomb manufacture with a double projector feature. This is dedicated to the schools, and for the good of the town in general.

Appreciation is due Mrs. Clara Cross Marston also for the valuable gift of a cornet for the use of the school orchestra, and for gifts to the laboratory of a set of beakers, some scales, and appliances used in photography.

### THE PHOENIX PROPERTY

On the first of May, 1923, the Phoenix Property came under the management of the School Board. One cottage and the double house have been occupied most of the time by rentpaying tenants. The total receipts from this source to the first of January, 1925, are \$316.25. The total expenditures for repairs, shingling, etc., are \$190.32. Balance on hand to this account, \$125.93.

The west cottage still remains vacant, since it is altogether unfit for rental without being thoroughly renovated. It has not been deemed wise up-to-date to spend money upon it, until some decision is reached in regard to the permanent development of the property.

Some effort has been made to improve the unsightly condition of the grounds. And while progress may seem extremely slow to on-lookers, it has gone forward as rapidly as has been expedient. A few of the bricks have been given away, and about 15,000 have been sold, which sale netted \$106. The old flume has been leveled so as to make it less dangerous, and in the early spring further removal of wood, iron, and useless brick is planned.

The District is indebted to the generosity of the Phoenix Associates for defraying the expense of trimming the trees on the Main street side so as to render them safe as well as more attractive. The wood has been taken to the Center school for fuel. To them also it is indebted for the garden plot of perennials and the shrubs about the site of the old mill.

#### School Building Program

The School Board feels that the time is now at hand when some sort of solution to the housing problem must be reached. It has already been delayed sufficiently long to give every thinking citizen time for individual conclusion. Unquestionably the most desirable solution is a new High School building. This would satisfy for many years to come all possible demands of changing educational requirements and of population. The building on the hill with its wide corridors will make a very satisfactory grade school for an equally long period. The tremendous question is, Will Peterborough be any more able financially, three or five years hence to meet the situation than at the present moment? Why evade a decision?

High School buildings, equipment, and furnishings are fairly well standardized in these days, and adequate plans can be furnished at very short notice by architects who specialize in school buildings. Given, the appropriation; whether it is \$100,000 or more, and the house is easily possible.

Peterborough needs no unnecessarily elaborate school plant. Just a school house, well-planned, substantial, and adapted to up-to-date educational requirements for Grades VII to XII. This means at least six standard class-rooms, with adequate accommodations for a Household Arts department, a Commercial department, a Manual Training shop, a combination Chemical and Physical laboratory, suitable office, rest-room, and supply-room provision, and an assembly room. Why not decide, then, whether this is a financial possibility **now**, or three or five years hence. If it is possible within this period, why not meet the situation at once, and let us have a High School building ready for use on the first of September, 1926.

Should the building proposition be deemed financially unwise, or inexpedient for any other reason, there is still one mode of relief in sight whereby one serious demand for more room at the Center can be met to some extent. And that is by the addition of another portable house. This would mean an expenditure of \$2,200. It would be possible by this means to separate Grades VII and VIII, but High School class rooms would still remain inconvenient and unsatisfactory. It would tend to give some freedom of choice, however, and would be by far much better than nothing.

This report discusses housing conditions, for it seems to be more specifically its purpose than to discuss the question of location, which is provided for in the warrant.

### IN CONCLUSION

Standards of excellence **can** be maintained even in old buildings. If a school lacks dignity, the teaching influence alone can correct it. If rooms and corridors are noisy and disorderly, the administration is at fault. If pupils are constantly deficient in their studies, the cause too often is hazy, indefinite teaching. School children **do** exactly what they are required to do. They **know** exactly what comes back to them from being taught. School standards should be under constant survey. This is the business of supervision. Results attest its efficiency, or its inefficiency.
