You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of soldiers' graves, and the proper observance of Memorial Day.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed one hundred dollars, to be given to the Laconia Hospital. (By request.)
8. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of further equipment for snow removal.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Sanbornton:

I herewith submit my seventh report as your superintendent of schools.

The year ending June 30th, 1928, five schools were in session for the required 36 weeks with an average membership of 72 pupils, and a total enrollment of 83.

The largest enrollment in the past ten years, 125, was in 1922-23. There were then eight schools maintained and the average membership that year was 91 with 21 tuition pupils, thirteen of whom were in high schools. The total school cost that year was \$7,950.04, the most the town has paid for its schools any year until 1927 when the cost was about \$300 more with five schools maintained. The teachers' salaries in 1927 were \$1,000 less than in 1923, but transportation was \$700 more and tuition charges were \$500 more.

It is rather remarkable, that with the increased cost of nearly every commodity, that the total cost of schools should remain practically stable as seen from the following table with the variations occurring in teachers' salaries, transportation and tuition charges.

It will be noticed that the increase in total cost from 1923 to 1927 was \$291.00. In the town as a whole, with school costs deducted, the increase maintenance cost for the same period has been \$8,154.00. School costs in Sanbornton have been kept remarkably stable.

It will be noticed that transportation charges since 1923 have been quite stable regardless of number of schools, but that tuition charges have increased with the exception of 1925. This latter fact is a compliment to schools and parents. To the schools, because they have created a desire in the minds of children for advanced education; and to parents because they are gratifying this desire of their children. In the year 1928 there were 30 boys and girls for whom tuition was being paid.

The total enrollment in the local schools has averaged 98 in the past six years, 82 being the lowest and 125 the highest.

The average membership has been 78 in the past six years, 68 being the lowest and 91 the highest. The total number has not varied much from year to year, but the number enrolled in different schools has varied widely.

In 1928 the Chapel school had 16; this present year it has 32. A few years ago the school at the Square was closed, because it had only 6 pupils; this year it has 29. The Brook school was closed for several years and now has 20 pupils. Several schools are now closed that once had from 16 to 20 pupils. The school population is decidedly evasive—here today, somewhere else tomorrow.

At the present time there are four schools maintained and none of them have less than 20 pupils. This is very unusual in New Hampshire in these days to have all the rural schools in a town with so large a membership.

I am aware that it is not a popular thing to say, but nevertheless will say it: for real efficiency the four

schools now maintained should be in two, two-room buildings. The cost of such an arrangement would probably be not less than at present, but each teacher would have fewer grades, with more time for each recitation and more time for individual work, thus being able to accomplish more work and secure better progress.

The probability is, that at the Chapel next September there will be from 36 to 40 pupils. There should be two rooms there. The town owns eight unused school houses. Six of these probably never will be used for schools again, possibly none of them and should be sold. The proceeds would go far toward purchasing a good portable school building such as is in common use in many places. Such a building would serve a good purpose, and meet the demands from year to year of a fluctuating school population.

If there be any that think Sanbornton schools are costing too much let me call your attention to the following: In 1927-28 Sanbornton, out of every \$1,000 of its equalized valuation, paid \$7.76 for schools. There were only 69 towns and cities in the state paying less and 173 paying more.

The average total school cost per pupil in Sanbornton for the past five years has been \$77.94 and 1927 was \$74.24, while in the state as a whole the average total per pupil cost in 1927 was \$111.02. With this wide difference it is evident that Sanbornton is not yet very extravagant in its school costs, or else other places are exceedingly so.

The four schools now maintained are doing good work: the interest is excellent and attendance, except during the "flu" sickness, has been exceptionally good. The equipment of the schools is gradually being improved and enlarged. The interests of the pupils are being broadened and better teachers employed. I must again call your attention to the urgent need of better and more sanitary toilets. With the increased number of pupils in each school the greater becomes the need.

Two schools are serving hot lunches at noon. This has been made possible by the active interest of the teachers and splendid cooperation of parents.

I would like to see some attention given to beautifying school grounds. School grounds and buildings advertise a town.

The Meadow school grounds should be graded to avoid the unhealthy condition surrounding the building.

I feel pleased with the character of work being done in the Sanbornton schools at present and for the most part with results. With the cooperation of parents, teachers, school board and citizens generally we have been enabled to improve Sanbornton schools. With that continued cooperation they can be still further improved.
