


The Seabrook Beach Village District was established on May 2, 1947 through a petition sponsored by the late Edwin V. Post and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the Town and inhabitants of the district. According to records the district was to have many municipal departments.

However, on May 10, 1947 Louis Thibault was elected Chief of Police for the precinct and in August of the same year two Haverhill residents were sworn in as special officers. In February of 1948 two residents of the beach were hired for police work. These officers were hired mostly for patrolling the beach. A sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) was voted to take care of police salaries (.50 cents per hour, the same rate of pay as for the Town Police).

At the annual meeting in March, 1956, there was an article in the warrant to construct a "fire station along with other facilities" with the cost of the building limited to twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000).

It was voted unanimously at the April, 1957 meeting that the municipal building provide "quarters for the town police" and in 1958 a lease was signed with the town police.

The Seabrook Municipal Court was held in the building for several years with Judge William Treat presiding. When Judge Treat retired the court then moved to Hampton and became a district court.

Over the years the area occupied by the police department had now become inadequate so a special precinct meeting was held in May of 1975 and it was voted to lease the meeting hall to the police department. From a May 1975 newspaper clipping giving an account of the meeting one of the beach commissioners explained quote "the precinct rents the police station to the Town for a dollar per year but doubted if the rent was ever collected."

Alas, in 1976 the Selectmen moved the police department to the fire station in an economy move but they later returned to their former quarters.

The addition on the northerly side was started in 1977. The new hall has been used by the Seabrook Women's Club who donated an electric stove, a refrigerator, table and chairs and other incidentals. The hall has also been used by the police department for courses on firearms, hunting, etc., as well as for their department meetings and seminars. Beach residents as well as town residents have used the hall for showers and parties as well as wedding receptions and graduation parties.

After thirty years of the police department occupying the precinct building the beach residents will certainly miss the daily presence of the officers and their vehicles in the neighborhood when they move to their new quarters on October 1, 1986.

Robie was born on January 7, 1907, in Seabrook the seventh of eight children. He moved from Newburyport, Massachusetts at an early age, lived in several Massachusetts towns and cities and attended Business High School in Washington, D.C. His career spanned from his earliest job with a traveling carnival, newspaper work at the Providence Journal, shoe factory worker and employee of the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to a news photographer. He worked for several newspapers until he retired at 68 years of age. Robie took great interest in town affairs, serving on numerous committees. He was PTA President in the early fifties and established the first dental clinic in the Seabrook Elementary School complete with a child's chair. He was a charter member of the Seabrook Lions, honorary member of the Seabrook Law Enforcement Association and a life member of the National Police Photographer's Association. He was an advocate of the Town Manager form of government and nuclear energy as a source of power. He returned to Seabrook in his early twenties and being a self-taught trumpet player established the well-known Beckman Band made up of local musicians. He played with area bands and orchestras for twenty-five years. Robie died on July 5, 1985. He leaves his wife Annie, three sons and three daughters.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote on the following: Shall the Municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below? Amend the Seabrook Home Rule Charter, Part II, by adding Section XXIV, PUBLIC WORKS, as follows:

There is hereby created the Department of Public Works. It shall consist of a Director of Public Works, who shall be head of the department, and all officers and employees assigned thereto. The Director shall be appointed by the Selectmen and shall reside within the Town during the period of his employment. He shall be allowed up to twelve months to establish residency once he becomes employed. All officers and employees shall preform their duties subject to the supervision of the Director.

- A. The department of Public Works shall have charge of and supervision over the construction, management, and control of the town's water system and all storm, water, and sanitary sewers, including the setting of rates which shall be done only with the approval of the Selectmen.
- B. The department shall have charge of the care, maintenance, and construction of public dumps, public parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, public beaches, public forests, shade and ornamental trees, and the collection of waste and refuse. These duties shall not, however, conflict and interfere with the duties and responsibilities of the Recreation Commission so long as said Commission continues in existence.
- C. The Department shall have charge of the street lighting system

and shall be responsible for the maintenance, repair and extension thereof.

- D. All physical properties of the Town, including water distribution, parks, playgrounds, and all municipal utilities not assigned to some other department or officer shall be and are hereby assigned to the Department of Public Works.
- E. The Director of Public Works shall be custodian of all tools, equipment and other personal property belonging to the Town and not assigned to the care of any other public officer.
- F. All persons currently holding office or performing duties in conflict with or duplicating the authority granted to the Department of Public Works herein, shall continue in office or in performance of these duties until the Selectmen appoint a director, at which time the said office and duties shall be discontinued.
- G. The effective date of this amendment will be July 1, 1985.

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown to adopt Article 10 as read. ADOPTED

ARTICLE 11: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such Town Property as is no longer used by the Town."

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Frederick B. Felch, to adopt Article 11 as read. ADOPTED

ARTICLE 12: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42III to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax title property in the first instance to former owners of the property or the heirs of said owners for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertising sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Selectmen."

ARTICLE 49: read by the Moderator, "On petition of Willard F. Boyle and Eighteen (18) other legal voters of the Town: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to withdraw a sum, not to exceed One Million Five Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$1,550,000) Dollars from the Capital Reserve Fund, known as the Sewer Fund, for the design plans and specifications for the proposed wasterwater collection, treatment and disposal facilities of a municipal sewerage system."

ARTICLE 14: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will appropriate Eighty-Six Thousand (\$86,000) Dollars as the total cost of three Coastal Zone Management (CZM) grants, to apply for Sixty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred (\$69,200) Dollars from the state and federal government as the 80% match towards said grant, and to raise Sixteen Thousand Eight Hundred (\$16,800) Dollars from taxes as the town's 20% match to the above CZM grants."

ARTICLE 15: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and sign a contract for the disposal and transportation of solid waste collected in Town with one of the three companies below. Other terms of said contract including cross indemnification and hold harmless provisions, shall be fully negotiated by the Selectmen in accordance with the best interest of the Town.

- 1. a twenty (20) year contract with Refuse Fuels Associates of Haverhill, Massachusetts, initially at a fee of Thirty-Six Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$36.50) per ton, which amount will be subject to anadjusted, annual escalation of the U.S. Consumer Price Index.
- 2. a three (3) year contract with Browning-Ferris Industries of Portsmouth, New Hampshire, initially at a fee of Thirty-Five Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$35.50) per ton, which amount will be subject to a straight annual escalation of the U.S. Consumer Price Index.
- 3. a twenty (20) year contract with Lakes Region Disposal Co. Inc., of Rochester, New Hampshire, initially at a fee of Thirty-Nine (\$39.00) Dollars per ton, which amount will be subject to a straight annual escalation of the U.S. Consumer Price Index and any increase of the Local gate fee. Explained by Eric Small.

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 15 as read and enter into the agreement with Refuse Fuels Assoc.(option #1). ADOPTED

ARTICLE 16: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars to purchase two 110 yard trailers for the purpose of hauling the Town's solid waste to an out of town disposal facility."

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown, to postpone

ARTICLE 17: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-Five Thousand (\$95,000) Dollars to purchase a 10 wheeler rubbish compactor to replace the current one."

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown, to postpone indefinitely. POSTPONED INDEFINITELY

ARTICLE 18: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to approve the plans for the new police station as presented by the Police Station Building Committee and release the funding for its construction in accordance with Article 29 of the 1984 annual town meeting."

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Frederick B. Felch, to adopt Article 18 as read.

Permission given Architect to explain plans for this Article.

Article 18 ADOPTED as read.

ARTICLE 19: read by the Moderator, "To see if the Town will vote to constitute a Board of Water Commissioners in accordance with RSA 38:16 which shall consist of the Selectmen of the Town. A person elected as Selectmen shall also be elected as a Water Commissioner and shall hold this office for the term of their office as Selectman. The Board of Water Commissioners shall give direction and shall exercise supervision over the Department of Public Works in the area of the Town's water works system."

Motion by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 19 as read.

Amendment to Article 19 by James C. Falconer, second by Clyde O. Brown, to delete the last sentence and wording as follows.

The Board of Water Commissioners shall give direction and shall execise control over the Department of Public Works in the area of the Town's water works system.

- All taxi businesses so licensed shall maintain an office in the Town and all vehicles licensed and used as taxis shall be garaged in the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire.
- 3. Each vehicles to be used as a taxi shall first be registered and insured as a taxi and bear a taxi registration plate or taxi identification. All documents and permits relating to the vehicles' use as a taxi shall be carried within said vehicle at all times.
- 4. Each taxi business shall file a certificate of insurance covering all its taxis with the Town Clerk no later than January 2 of each year, said coverage shall be a minimum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars for property damage and a minimum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars to Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000) Dollars for personal liability.
- 5. All vehicles licensed and used as taxis shall display identifying signs in letters not less than four inches high indicating the business name, telephone number, and unit number (e.g., Car 1, 2, etc.), as well as an illuminated roof light identifying the vehicle as a taxi.
- 6. All vehicles licensed and used as taxis shall be inspected periodically by the Seabrook Police Department by an officer(s) so designated by the Chief of Police for safety equipment and cleanliness. This is in addition to the standard equipment required for normal state inspection. Vehicles shall also contain a fire extinguisher in proper working order, first aid kit, a minimum of three road flares, 20 30 minute type, or safety markers. The interior and exterior of all vehicles shall present a clean respectable appearance at all times (weather permitting).
- 7. The name of the owner of the vehicle, registration number of the vehicle, and the rates of fare duly established, shall be conspicuously posted on a printed card in such manner for all patrons to read while in the car or office building of the taxi company.
- Taxicab rates shall be in such amount as are set from time to time by order of the Board of Selectmen.
- 9. The rates charged to passengers by owners or drivers shall be standard for all who are in the business of operating a taxi service within the limits of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire.

- Any changes in the fare schedule (in the Town of Seabrook only) require prior approval of the Board of Selectmen.
- 10. Every driver of a licensed taxi shall at all times when driving or waiting for employment display an identification card with taxi operator's number, as issued by the Town Clerk.
- 11. For every taxi business license granted by the Board of Selectmen, there shall be paid to the Town Clerk the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars plus Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per taxi vehicle and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each license granted to a driver of a taxi.
- 12. All licenses granted under these rules and orders shall expire on December 31st. after the date thereof. No permit can be transferred to another person without the written consent of the Board of Selectmen and the payment of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars transfer fee.
- 13. No person under eighteen (18) years of age will be considered for or granted a taxi operator's license.
- 14. Any owner of driver of a taxi convicted of procuring any alcoholic beverage for a minor shall lose his taxi license forthwith.
- 15. The driver of any taxi shall, upon request by any passenger, issue a receipt for the amount charged. Such receipt should indicate the name of the taxi, owner registration number of the vehicle amount of the fare charged and date of transaction.
- 16. The owner or licensed driver of a taxi shall not unreasonably refuse to carry a passenger for hire within the limits of the Town of Seabrook.
- 17. Any license granted under the provisions of these rules and orders may be revoked by the Board of Selectmen for just cause after written notice and reasonable opportunity of the licensee to be heard.
- 18. Any person who violates these rules and orders shall be fined One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each offense.
- 19. Whoever procures transportation within the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, in any licensed taxicab and who willfully refuses to pay upon demand the sum due and payable for such transportation under the provisions of this by-law shall be liable for a penalty not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each offense.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year $1985\ \text{has}$ seen a continued progress with many demands on our town departments.

It's been an especially busy year for your Tax Collector, Town Treasurer and Assessing Department personnel. We initiated a semiannual taxation which was very successful. For the first time, we didn't have to borrow money and realized \$535,000 in interest on reinvestment. Town Treasurer Carol Perkins was diligent in this phase.

A town-owned telephone system was installed in the town office. Also, a new computer and word processor were installed. The town office staff and Administrative Assistant attended numerous meetings and reviewed proposals prior to selecting an IBM system. They've been learning and re-programming their department work. We expect to process all tax and water bills "in house" in 1986.

The Selectmen signed a twenty year contract with Refuse Fuels, Haverhill, Massachusetts, to dispose of the solid waste. The present ramp at the refuse station needs to be re-designed and built with a protective roof to eliminate rain and snow. This would lessen the weight of each load. A special article will be drafted for the 1986 town warrant for your consideration to fund this project.

Each year the town votes to accept new roads, citizens request drainage in problem areas, bike paths and sidewalks are proposed and monies raised and appropriated for these projects. It is the concensus of the Selectmen that roads need to be properly surveyed before these improvements are made. Your Highway Agent requested the help of an engineer last March to assist him with the Ledge Road project, Pine Street, Lower Collins Road, Dixon Way/Old New Boston Road, Pickens' Avenue, Seabrook Beach drainage and Cross Beach Road. Selectmen advertised for civil engineers, five were interviewed and two companies were hired. We have met with them and reviewed their engineering designs and specifications. If the money is raised, we will proceed with these projects.

A survey of land in the Wildwood and Hillside Cemeteries has made more plots available, time clocks were purchased for all departments, a full time custodian was hired at the town office, rights-of-ways on Seabrook Beach were surveyed, and a retirement program was implemented for those town employees not covered by the New Hampshire Retirement System.

Continuing sewage problems at several apartment complexes required court appearances and legal costs to get them resolved -- some are still not being corrected.

The Selectmen hired a negotiator for all union contracts. Much of the Selectmen's time is required for grievances, hearings and negotiations. It will be on-going.

A three year contract has been signed with the Seabrook Police Association, the Firemen's Contract is nearly finished and the Seabrook Employees Association, Units A and B, are just beginning to be negotiated.

Robert Moore was hired as the Building Inspector. His presence at the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment meetings has been a help to these committees. Building permits, follow-ups and violations make this a very busy position.

The Mosquito Control Program has proven itself to be a necessity. A special green-head fly trap program was started in 1985. Lee Brooks has built these and will be adding more in 1986. It was a successful program. Since the old truck is in constant need of repairs, we hope you will fund a new one for his use.

It is rewarding to see our townspeople partaking of the recreation programs. This Community Center was well-planned and its value to the town will be realized more as the years go by. It is proposed to move the south wing of the Chase Homestead to another site. This would serve a dual purpose: we could clear the site for more parking and the building would be retained as a part of our town history.

The new police station will be completed in 1986. We anticipate completion in the early Fall. A fire station is in the planning stage with a warrant article in 1986 asking you to fund this building. We have out-grown our present quarters.

In December the Chief of Police and Administrative Assistant resigned their positions. The Selectmen engaged the New Hampshire Municipal Association to assist us in selecting and interviewing persons to fill these positions.

All town personnel have experienced a very busy year. It would be a benefit to the entire town to have a person available at all times to assist with the daily performance of town services. A person is needed who has a degree in business administration and town management. The Selectmen are unable to be present at all times to assist the department heads with daily decisions. There is a great need for a Town Manager to coordinate day to day activities. Please support us in this change in town government.



ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

This year the Assessing Office made a few changes in the personnel and work scheduling. Mr. Robert F. Quinn, Town Appraiser for the past eight years left in February and Mr. Richard Either was hired on a per diem basis. It became apparent that one clerk would not be able to handle the over-all volume of work created with the Building Inspector, Health Officer, Planning Board and Board of Adjustment being housed within the Assessing Office. This scheduling of changes along with the 1985 double billing system on property tax made it necessary to move all office and field work ahead one month of the usual format. Suzanne Eaton, former Clerk-Receptionist at the Community Recreation Center was hired to move into this position.

In June, Building Inspector Norman H. Brown left for a position with the State of Massachusetts. Those duties were then turned over to the Deputy Building Inspector until a new Inspector could be hired. In late June Mr. Robert S. Moore was hired to fill the position. In house and on the job training was required to help the new employees at this time. With some humanist moments, work continued well during this period.

Due to the untimely death of Mr. Sherwood Vermilya, Appraiser for the Seabrook Station, the valuation was delayed. Due to the foresight of the Assessing Department in case of emergency, Mr. David MacArthur of Concord, New Hampshire did the valuation of the Seabrook Station for 1985.

In late October a new computer system was installed in the Office. This will enable us to do all resident and property tax billing in house. At present we are placing all our information into the system and will be on line for the year 1986 for the first time.

At this time I wish to thank the following who have been a great help to me this past year: Mrs. Lydia Gould, Part-time Clerk; Mrs. Suzanne Eaton, Appraiser's Clerk; Mr. Norman H. Brown and Mr. Robert S. Moore, Building Inspectors; Mr. Walter I. Randall, Health Officer; Mrs. Jan Burnham, Secretary, Planning Board and Board of Adjustment. It has been a pleasure to work with them all this year.

REPORT OF POLICE CHIEF

The mission of the Police Department, we are told, is a combination goal of serving and protecting our citizens while efforts are made to suppress crime and delinquency. The Seabrook Police Department has focused on these goals in a variety of ways. Our intent is to provide expert service through operating rigorous training programs, identifying the needs of the community and prudent administrative leadership.

A primary concern this year was the revamping of the prosecution function in the department. New intake, processing, recording and court presentation of cases has streamlined the process. It may well be one of the more significant changesin furthering the goal of good case management and effective court management and presentation for the officers.

A second concern was the establishment of an on-going, productive relationship between the Department Youth Officer and the Town's Community Center Staff and the Recreation Committee. The townspeople have provided a central meeting and activity center for residents of all ages. We have observed a need to establish positive relationships between our agency and the local young people who spend considerable amounts of time at the center.

Finally, events beyond the control of the department caused us to reassess our ability to deal with emergency situations. Two outstanding situations encountered were Hurricane Gloria, which necessitated cooperation with several other towns under the direction of Civil Defense. A second event was the sudden "Wildcat Strike" accompanying the layoff of construction workers at Seabrook Station. From the vigilant storm watch of Gloria to the nervous anticipation of crowd control, it was reinforced in our minds that we can never do too much in the way of preparation to serve such vastly different and demanding needs.

OFFICE OF THE PROSECUTOR

During the past year this office underwent some progressive changes. For one, the reorganization of all files and records into a more efficient and controlled system was completed. The law library was also substantially expanded by the purchase of several law research and text books. Also obtained was membership in a professional association of New Hampshire prosecutors which has monthly meetings to stay current on case law, legislative actions and courtroom techniques and methods.

In-service schooling is a necessary part of staying abreast of changes in the law. In light of this the prosecutor attended four schools sponsored by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council in the areas of basic prosecution, DWI prosection, sexual assault prosecution and complaints and warrants. A full semester was spent at Northern Essex Community College taking a course in legal research and drafting.

There were also various seminars, some of which were taught by the prosecutor, while others were attended as a student. Among those taught were training sessions for newly-hired officers on the laws of arrest, constitutional law, criminal code, motor vehicle code and search and seizure. The entire Department was given a review session on complaints and affidavits. Those seminars attended as a student included one on fish and game laws and two sponsored by the New Hampshire Bar Association on laws of evidence and District Court practice.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

I submit the following report to the Board of Selectmen, the Citizens and Taxpayers of the Town of Seabrook, NH.

This years Civil Defense Report I would like to dedicate to two Civil Defense members who have passed on (William W. Moore and Gerald Frechette).

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Fire Chief, Police Chief, Water Department Superintendent, Road Agent, and many others who have been involved in assisting me with this office of our Town Government and its operations. The addition of a secretary to this office for 20 hours a week was necessary to the efficiency and operations of Emergency Management.

The Town Basic Emergency Plan for the Town has been submitted to the Selectmen for approval.

The Emergency Operations Center, The Fire Chief's Office and the Civil Defense Office has been renovated; new rugs in all three rooms and repainted.

I have been working with the Public Service people on a new radio system for all the Town Departments; so far it looks good on paper on what we will receive.

The Emergency Response Plan has had a couple of tests, and by the time you read this we will have gone through a Federal Evaluation Exercise.

Hurricane Gloria came through and treated us with kindness. She did some damage in and about the Town, but not too bad. This office was in full operation at the time, and the Police Department operated out of here also. I would like to thank all the people who volunteered to assist this office and its operations.

The Emergency Management Agency is still working close with me, and all of what monies were spent out in this office has been reimbursed 50% back to the Town.

The Seabrook Underwater Search and Rescue Team has been called out several times during the year, and I might add that they are doing an excellent job.

ROAD AGENTS REPORT 1985

Our first project for 1985, was at Park Place Village. Because of sewer problems we had to haul in sand and gravel to cover up where soil had been hauled away.

Gravel was hauled to the dump to cover up the Clam Shells. More sand was hauled to mix with salt for winter use.

A new shed, approximately 7' x 10' was built for the dump attendant. We cut brush and patched road holes and checked catch basins for drainage. We cleared land for more gravel, the area we were using was too close to the water wells, so we had to dig in a different section. We spent time on maintenance of vehicles. During February we laid out plots in the cemetery for future use. We took care of the snow storms and icy conditions when they occurred.

In March we began construction on Lower Collins Street and Adams Avenue. We dug drainage ditches and filled them with gravel, preparing the roads for culverts. Beginning in April we started raking and cleaning the cemeteries of leaves and limbs. We went along the beach and cleaned up the debris by hand, then we used the beach rake. We had clean-up week from April 15th. to and including April 29th., 1985. The proposals for the Archway at Wildwood Cemetery were sent out. The Archway was built before Memorial Day. During May the work was done in the cemeteries and the clean-up at the beach was continued. Work was done on enlarging the Sand and Salt shed, a new building of cement blocks was constructed, there are 3 bays, one for sand, salt and plows. During the year street signs were replaced because these signs get lost, damaged or stolen. Beginning June through Labor Day the Rubbish pick-ups were increased, using both trucks. During the summer we distribute barrels for trash at the beach, these barrels have to be emptied every day. We purchased a new John Deere Farm Tractor, and made use of it right away by mowing the sides of the roads, this saved money because we did not have to hire outside help. The tractor was used to grade roads. Our services were required by the Recreation Department to set up the stage for Old Home Day for the beauty pageant. We also put barrels for trash and barricades where needed. We installed culverts for drainage on Adams Avenue. This year a fall clean-up week was scheduled, this was from October 7th. until the 21st. This year we had a hurricane, named "Gloria" and we did a lot of hauling away brush and clearing roads as a result of this storm, in fact we spent most of the month cleaning up debris. The project of installing drainage at Lake Shore Drive, and reconstructing the catch basins consumed guite a bit of our time. The Beach Float was removed for the winter. The Water Department requested our services, with the Farm Tractor and the auger, which at that time was necessary to send two (2) men with the machine.

Batchelder Road was hot-topped and roads in the cemetery were hot-topped, Midway was the contractor. The installation of water lines in the cemeteries was done by the highway crew. Pickens Avenue and Lower Collins Street were graded as were the shoulders of the Town Roads. These roads will be hot-topped.

WELFARE OFFICER'S REPORT

Once again this year's budget proposal for welfare in 1986 reflects a decrease of more than \$20,000. You will again note that the recommendation of the Welfare Officer and Selectmen and adopted by the Budget Committee is for \$31,595. The Town actually expended \$32,685 in Fiscal '85. I am also pleased to report to you again this year that the Town has received a total of \$23,286 in reimbursements from persons who have re-paid the Town of Seabrook for welfare granted in various forms and the preponderance of these monies once again was from "CHINS" (Children In Need Of Services) cases which of course makes up the majority of the welfare budget. The lowering of the Town of Seabrook's welfare budget is primarily attributed to three things:

1) The Town now has a person hired to handle welfare cases

exclusively

The Selectmen and the Welfare Agent have vigorously pursued a collection and reimbursement policy against welfare

recipients who can afford to pay

3) The 1985 Legislature changed the law to make the State of New Hampshire responsible for "CHINS", including abused and neglected children. This law became effective in January of 1986

Next year's budget may show a decrease again as a result of this new law. This does not mean that welfare will be eliminated; indeed there are some provisions in the new law which may increase certain expenses and costs to the Town in the form of transients and aid to permanently disabled cases. 1986 will be a trial year for the new law and there may be more changes forthcoming from the Legislature.

By a careful review of the cases and a policy of requiring applicants to work when able to and requiring reimbursements when possible, it is hoped that welfare will not again reach the runaway proportions that it did in the past.

1985 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SEABROOK RECREATION COMMISSION

The members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission are: Vernon Small, Chairman; Salvatore Rubera, Vice Chairman; Charlotte Dow, Secretary; John Fowler, Jr., Parks Department; Earlene Locke, Selectlady; Harry Knowles Sr.; Diana Randall and Richard Beckman. The adminstrative staff of the Recreation Department are Sandra Beaudoin, Director and Ted Pickard, Assistant Director.

The year of 1985 was an active year of programs and facility development. It also was the first year in which the Community Center was under operation for a full twelve month period. During this period the Commission was able to evaluate, for the first time, actual annual utilities cost and useage by the Community. It was discovered that the Center was more energy efficient than the local utility companies anticipated. Through careful evaluation and comparison, the Commission was able to reduce projected 1986 operational cost.

During 1985 the Community Center was open seven days a week, except during the summer months in which it was closed on Sundays. Activities at the Center include programs for residents ages preschool through Senior Citizens. Actual and average participation for the year is outlined below.

The Commission and Recreation Department again coordinated the town's largest special event, Seabrook Old Home Days, in which over a thousand residents and friends attended. The 1985 Old Home Days began with a Miss Seabrook Contest at the Seabrook Fire Station on August 15th, sponsored by the local American Legion Auxiliary & Firemen's Association. Over 300 attended and witnessed Melissa Krenzer being crowned Miss Seabrook of 1985. The weekend event continued with a Junior Miss Seabrook Contest

held at the Seabrook Community Center, on August 16th, sponsored by the Legion Auxiliary Juniors. Over 200 attended and observed Sherrie Follansbee's victory as the first Junior Miss Seabrook. As the Old Home Days continued on the 17th, over 20 non-profit groups and local craftsmen provided booths of food, crafts and activities celebrating the traditional Old Home Day. Special activities and contests were held throughout the day and included - Softball Games & Tournaments, Pie Eating Contest, Pie Contest, Corn Husking Contests, Arm Wrestling Contest, Egg Throw, Skillet Throwing, Field Races, Bingo, Doll Carriage Parade, Horseshoe Pitching Contest, Entertainment, Barbecue, Monte Carlo, Teen Record Hop, Fireworks and more. On the 18th, the last day of the Old Home Days, The Seabrook Lion's Club held the Annual 10K Road Race and the BMX Raceway, Inc. held special BMX Races.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, Route 1, on Tuesday, March 11, 1986, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots until at least 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the same day, and to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, Route 1, on Thursday, March 13, 1986, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act on the articles below.

Further, you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, March 11, 1986, pursuant to RSA 659:49.

Article 1: To elect by non-partisan ballot: one (1) Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Road Agent for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Fire Chief for a term of one (1) year; three Constables for a term of one (1) year; two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; two (2) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the Budget Committee for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Supervisor of the Check List for a term of six (6) years; one (1) Moderator for a term of two (2) years; and one Trustee of Library for a term of three (3) years.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 2: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

1. To amend the official Seabrook Zoning Map under Section II of the Zoning Ordinance to incorporate a Zone 1A as follows:

All area of land currently in Zone 2 and located in the Lakeshore Drive area, to include Forest Drive, Ayer Circle, Forest Court, Pinecone Drive, Evergreen Drive, and Timber Court, as shown on the Revised Seabrook Zoning Map and more specifically shown on the Seabrook Property Tax Map and described as follows:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Lot 75 and running southerly along the easterly boundary of Lots 74 through 68, through Lakeshore Drive, along the southeastern boundary of Lot 146, thence turning westerly following the southern boundary of Lot 146 through 124, thence turning in a northerly direction running along the western boundary of Lot 123 through Lot 122, thence turning easterly at the northwest corner of Lot 122 and running to the southwest corner of Lot 119, thence turning northerly and running along the western boundary of Lots 119 through 116, thence turning easterly and following the northern boundary of Lots 115 through 112, thence turning southerly and following the northern boundary of Lot 111 through 96, thence turning easterly along the northern boundary of Lot 95 through Lot 75 to the point of beginning.

(All section references shall also refer to the comparable reference under the Code of the Town of Seabrook.)

(On the Official Ballot)

- Article 3: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:
 - 2. To amend the Zoning Ordinance by including an additional zone to be called "Zone IA" and more specifically to amend Section II to add to the list of use districts the "Zone IA" and amend Section III to include a use district as follows:
 - F. Zone lA.

In Zone 1A no buildings, structures or portions thereof shall be erected, altered, moved, or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used arranged, or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses:

- 1. Single family dwellings.
- 2. Two-family dwellings shall be permitted as a special exception by the Board of Adjustment only if adequate land for parking is available and the sewage disposal system complies with all town and state regulations covering two-family dwellings.
- 3. Dead storage of travel trailers not more than twenty-seven (27) feet in length and boats used by residents or tenants.
- 4. Accessory buildings not for human habitation which are incidental to the primary uses and accessory uses by owner or tenant incidental to the above permitted uses, such as swimming pools, which are not detrimental to a residential neighborhood.
- (All section references shall also refer to the comparable reference under the Code of the Town of Seabrook.)

(On the Official Ballot)

- Article 4: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:
 - 3. To amend the Zoning Ordinance Booklet by changing the numbering, titling, and formatting thereof, the entire text of which is as published by General Code Publishers Corp. in "The Code of the Town of Seabrook" on file with the Town Clerk, effective on passage; this amendment shall repeal, supersede, and replace by reference to said Code the prior Zoning Ordinance of Seabrook.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 5: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

1. To amend Part II, Section I entitled "Town Meeting Authority" so that the first sentence is deleted and replaced with the following sentence:

The form of government provided by this Charter may be either the Selectmen - Open Town Meeting with the Municipal Budget Act of the Selectmen - Town Manager - Open Town Meeting with the Municipal Budget Act, as may be more specifically voted at an Annual Town Meeting in accordance with the Revised Statutes Annotated.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 6: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

2. To amend Part III, Section XVIII entitled "Administrative Assistant" so that the first two sentences are deleted and replaced with the following two sentences:

The Town may have an Administrative Assistant. The individual holding that position is directly responsible to the Board of Selectmen or the Town Manager, as the case may be.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 7: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

3. To amend Part II, Section XXV B entitled "Overseer of the Poor" so that the first sentence is deleted and replaced with the following sentence:

The Selectmen, or the Town Manager, as the case may be, shall be the overseers of the poor and may appoint a person as Welfare Agent.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 8: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

4. To amend the Seabrook Home Rule Charter by changing the numbering, titling, and formatting of the Charter to conform to the text of the Charter as published by General Code Publishers Corp. in "The Code of the Town of Seabrook" on file with the Town Clerk, effective on passage; this amendment shall repeal, supersede, and replace by reference to said Code the prior Seabrook Home Rule Charter.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 9: Do you favor adoption of the town manager plan as provided in chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 10: On petition of Lillian L. Knowles and thirteen (13) other legal voters of the town: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund town notes.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to appoint such permanent police officers, firemen and employees for all other departments of the town as they deem necessary.

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

Article 15: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property located within the marshlands and to authorize the Selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertized sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Selectmen.

Article 16: To see if the town will vote to ratify the following amendments to the Public Health Regulations; which amendments were adopted on November 6, 1985, and February 5, 1986, respectively, by the Town Health Officer and the Board of Selectmen:

1. Amend Section B-1 to read as follows:

All dwellings and commercial, public or industrial buildings from which sewage will discharge must have a private sewage disposal system of a type, size and construction that meets or exceeds the minimum requirements of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission or such other requirements as may be necessary for the protection of the public health and safety as determined by the Health Officer for the proposed or actual use of said building. Any enlargements, changes, or intensification of the existing uses of a building shall require the private sewage disposal systems to be modified or enlarged so as to fully comply with the then existing requirements and regulations of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission (as they may be amended from time to time) as they apply to the said enlarged, changed, or intensified use. All said systems, whether original or later modified, shall be installed and used so as not to create a health or safety hazard.

2. Amend Section B-2 to read as follows:

Permits required to construct septic systems: Any persons intending to construct, retrofit, enlarge, or modify a private sewage disposal system shall first obtain approval from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for said new or modified system and then obtain a written permit to do so signed by the Town Health Officer. In the event that the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission does not require an approval or permit for any retrofit, enlargement, or modification of an existing system, the person applying for the town permit or constructing said system must satisfy all existing requirements or regulations of said commission for the installation or construction of the retrofit, enlargement, or modification of the existing system. The Town Health Officer shall, in all cases, determine compliance with these requirements and shall be authorized to hire such expert advice as may be necessary in these duties.

3. Amend the Public Health Regulations generally by adding an additional section to be designated as Section D entitled "Rules for the Sanitary Production and Distribution of Food" and to adopt thereunder all the provisions of the New Hampshire rules for the sanitary production and distribution of food specifically known as He-P2300 with the exception of He-P2301 and He-P2302. Said rules are specifically adopted and incorporated herewith as a part of this ordinance and reference is made therein for the specific provisions. Further, all food processing establishments and food service establishments shall be licensed by the Town Health Officer and shall be subject to the regulations contained herein.

Article 17: To see if the town will vote to adopt written Welfare Regulations as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 require the town to adopt written welfare regulations prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of the full text of the proposed regulations are on file with the Town Clerk.)

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to enact the following ordinance regulating the use of sailboats and windsurfers on Seabrook Beach in order to protect the health and safety of the general public. This ordinance shall be known as Chapter 229 of the Code of the Town of Seabrook.

229-1 Use of Sailboats and Windsurfers Restricted at Seabrook Beach

The individual use of sailboats and windsurfers from the beaches of Seabrook Beach shall be prohibited at all times.

229-2 Violation and Penalties

There shall be, in addition to any other penalties imposed by law, a fine of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each violation of this chapter.

229-3 Effective Date

This chapter shall be effective as of the date it is adopted at the Town Meeting.

Article 19: To see if the town will vote to enact an exemption for prisoners of war pursuant to RSA 261:157-a waiving the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who was captured and incarcerated for thirty days or more while serving in a qualifying war or armed conflict as defined in RSA 72:28 IV, and who was honorably discharged; provided the person has provided the Town Clerk with satisfactory proof of these circumstances.

Article 20: On petition of Milan W. Knowles, Sr., and seventeen (17) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the voters of Town Meeting will take on the following: That the voters instruct the Board of Selectmen to change the personnel policy to allow police officers to wear beards.

Article 21: To see if the town will vote to rescind the action of the town taken under Article 25 of the 1985 Town Meeting [to expend a portion of moneys raised in 1984 for the purchase of the Straw-Grasso parcel of land for a fire station] and to reconfirm the intent of the town vote raising this money under Article 31 of the 1984 Town Meeting.

Article 22: To see if the town will vote to rescind Article 31 of the 1977 Annual Town Meeting, being the \$50.00 exclusion from the Social Security Plan for election officials and workers, in order to eliminate the exclusion.

Article 23: On petition of Gertrude B. Humphrey and sixteen (16) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to sell a certain tract of land at Seabrook Beach to its abutters for Fifty Five Thousand Six Hundred (\$55,600.00) Dollars. Said land is bounded on the north by Lawrence Street, on the east by Atlantic Avenue, on the south by Haverhill Street, and on the west by several owners and was acquired by the town as a result of the adoption of Article 11 at the Adjourned Town Meeting held on March 17, 1951. Each abutter would buy the section of land directly east of their existing property and the sale would be subject to a restriction that it could never be built upon.

Article 24: On petition of George S. Mowbray, Jr., and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to accept as a public street, Brooks Road Extension, together with the improvements thereon.

Article 25: On petition of John A. Crandall and twenty two (22) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Whittier Drive, said street being shown as a proposed road on a plan approved by the Seabrook Planning Board and recorded in Rockingham Records No. D-11102.

Article 26: On petition of Corydon F. Perkins and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to increase the Weight Limit on Old New Boston Road to fifty five thousand (55,000) pounds, this includes portion of New Boston Road that lies easterly of existing gates and bars on New Boston Road to New Zealand Road; also to include any portions of True Road that lie between New Boston Road and New Zealand Road.

Article 27: On petition of Brenda L. Perkins and eleven (11) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to resolve: That the title to the parcel of real property located at Worthley Avenue, Seabrook, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, and more particularly described as follows:

A certain tract or parcel of land situated in the Town of Seabrook, aforesaid, taxed by the Selectmen/Assessors in 1976 to the Estate of Peter Juliano and described in the Invoice Books as Land - Worthley Avenue Known as Lester Fowler Land; Bought by the Town of Seabrook at a Tax Collector's sale held at the Town Office in said Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, on the first day of April, 1977;

and presently held by the Town of Seabrook as a result of said tax taking in 1977 and it being past the time for the redemption of said property by any alleged owner thereof, that the said title to the property be conveyed to and confirmed in the ownership of Ronald Welch, Sr., upon payment by the said Ronald Welch, Sr., of any and all unpaid taxes due to the Town of Seabrook.

Article 28: On petition of Robert R. Cushing, Jr., and twelve (12) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Seabrook and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan.

Article 29: On petition of Elizabeth A. Thibodeau and eleven (11) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to state that the emergency planning which has been done to date is ineffective in meeting the federal regulations of "providing reasonable assurance that adequate protective measures can and will be taken in the event of a radiological emergency" at Seabrook Station.

Article 30: On petition of Francis L. Thibodeau and eleven (11) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to require that: prior to the town's determination that the Radiological Emergency Response (Evacuation) Plan is approved and capable of being implemented, all officials, agencies, organizations, and individuals given an emergency response role in the plans sign a Letter of Agreement (as required by federal regulation NUREG 0654) indicating that they understand, are capable of and are willing to carry out their responsibilities listed in the town's Radiological Emergency Response Plan.

Article 31: On petition of Kevin Fleming and twelve (12) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to require that all town officials, agencies and department personnel NOT participate in nuclear emergency response exercises, drills or other related activities until the town's Radiological Emergency Response (Evacuation) Plan has been approved by Town Meeting.

Article 32: To see if the town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as an offset against the following debt service:

Bond Purpose Amount

1975 Water Bond Principal \$50,000

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 33: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of designing and constructing a new solid waste transfer station; and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into such contracts and agreements as are necessary for this purpose.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 34: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of designing and constructing a new fire station to be located on land owned by the town on Centennial Street; and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into such contracts and agreements as are necessary for this purpose.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 35: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of conducting the necessary re-appraisal of the taxable property in the Town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 36: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Sixty-Five Thousand (\$165,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of completing the construction of Ledge Road and Lower Collins Street.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission acted on a number of Wetlands Board applications this year.

In addition to review of proposed construction in wetland areas, the Commission is still actively pursuing the purchase of the Seabrook Sand Dunes. Although the acquistion process is taking longer than expected, the majority of the ground work has been completed. The Commission has also increased the available fund for the purchase by fifty percent. This increased funding in addition to a recently passed state ordinance should enable the Commission to purchase the majority of the property this year. Once purchased, the Commission has a completed management plan ready to implement. This we hope will help to preserve this unique piece of Seabrook's heritage.

The Commission is also currently involved in a project for the Office of State Planning consisting of mapping all the wetland areas in the Town of Seabrook. This and other projects like it will better enable our Commission and other town agencies to ascertain the impact of the Town's growth and the wetlands as a whole.

The Commissioners would like to thank the Townspeople of Seabrook for their support and foresight in constituting this commission. We hope that our efforts will not only benefit the town now but far into the future.

POLLUTION CONTROL COMMITTEE

The committee has worked diligently this year. Many meetings have been held. We have had some set-backs but feel that they have been only temporary. We were informed this year that the Public Service tunnels would not be available to us. We also learned that the Town of Hampton has had to refigure their program and the cost for us to join them would now be too great. We are certain that the Town of Seabrook would find it cheaper and more feasible to sewer the entire Town without joining in with any other projects. We should have our own treatment plant and our own outfall. We will be having a public meeting before the end of January, 1986, and will be placing several articles in the Town Warrant.

SEABROOK MOSQUITO CONTROL

Surveillance of freshwater breeding sites began on April 4th. Larvacide treatment of sites found to support larvae of man-biting mosquito species commenced two weeks later. Because of the light snowfall over the winter and a record-breaking dry spring, 'spring' Aedes mosquito breeding spots were greatly reduced and in many cases non-existent. Surveillance and larviciding of saltmarsh breeding sites began on April 30th. Treatments were done throughout the summer after these marsh breeding sites were activated by the monthly "high run" tides. The larvicide used mainly this season was Abate 5% granular sprayed from the motorized DM-9 backpack sprayers. Also Abate 4%EC (Liquid), Altosid briquets and Flit MLO were used in appropriate situations. A granular formulation of BTI was also employed with inconsistent results.

Christopher Taylor was hired as a licensed pesticide applicator in early May and worked full-time through July. After this he worked nights and week-ends on a part-time basis. In a normal mosquito season, a full-time applicator is necessary to assist the supervisor from April through September. This season was very, very dry, however.

Adult mosquito species populations were monitored weekly at three locations in town using CO-2 baited traps. Specimens were counted, identified and recorded with results being sent to the State health officials as part of the Eastern Equine Encephalitis monitoring program. The unusually dry spring led to extremely low numbers of the "Spring Aedes" species. Due to the already low water table and the relatively dry summer, Aedes vexans (a summer fresh water species) populations were also extremely low. However, the number of Coq. perturbans (permanent water breeders) was up from the previous year. As always, numbers of the saltmarsh species A. cantator and A. sollicitans were high the week following the "high run" tide. Overall, mosquito populations were the lowest in several years.

The adulticiding phase (evening treatments of public roadways with the spray truck) of the program commenced on June 18th. The entire town was completed 9 times in 1985 with spraying done on 12 different nights. During times of high <u>A. sollicitans</u> (vicious daytime biter) populations, additional spot adulticiding was done on certain woods roads and public athletic fields and parks. Cythion adulticide was sprayed using the Leco ULV sprayer mounted on the Town truck.

GREENHEAD FLY TRAPS

54 greenhead fly traps were constructed and placed along the perimeters of saltmarshes around town. Thousands of these vicious biting flies coming off the saltmarshes are trapped and die before they can reach higher ground. The flies are attracted to the shade of these black or dark green boxes, fly up inside and are trapped in the screened-in section where they die of dehydration.

STREAM CLEARANCE PROGRAM

The clearing of natural and man-made debris from streams to allow better flow and eliminating stagnant water areas is the goal of the stream clearance phase of mosquito control. This work did not really get off the ground this season because of lack of personnel. The sole applicant for the job left after a week and a half of work.

OPEN MARSH WATER MANAGEMENT STUDY GRANT

Funding for the OMWM study through a Coastal Zone Managment (CZM) grant was not approved as expected this year. This was very disappointing as research and successful implementation of OMWM has already been done in other N.E. states. It is proving to be a viable and more environmentally attractive alternative to chemical control of saltmarsh mosquitos.

Depending on funding from the Town, stream clearance will begin again with job notices going out earlier in an attempt to get more applicants. The search for suitable, effective Bti products will also continue. These hopefully will be integrated into the larvicide phase of the program, decreasing the need for the use of organophosphate materials.

BROWN LIBRARY

Nineteen eighty-five was a year of big changes at Brown Library. A whole new staff, consisting of Elizabeth Heath as Librarian, Joyce Fry as Acting Children's Supervisor and Sharon Rafferty as Library Assistant took over the reins and attempted to fill the void left by the resignation of the previous administration. Severe difficulties ensued part-way into the year due to serious illness but thanks to the cooperation of Ms. Rafferty and Ms. Fry the library ran well and without incident. Despite these setbacks, some major positive developments have taken place.

The Children's Room has undergone several improvements. The first and most obvious is the addition of carpeting which adds to the overall warmth both physically and visually. Secondly, the bare concrete has been covered with woodwork and both this and the room have been freshly painted. Thirdly, the children's book collection has been reorganized and reshelved. In addition, a window has been added which greatly improves the ambiance of the downstairs area.

Upstairs the adult collection has been reshelved to facilitate patron access to the books of their choice. The loft area has been changed from a non-productive storage area to a work/office space. A new desk has been purchased as has a typewriter table. A computer has been added for the use of the library staff. Outside, the parking lot has been repaired, enlarged and resurfaced.

During the year over 7,700 people came into the library. Despite short staffing, the library has purchased hundreds of new books and monthly circulation is now surpassing that of the previous years. The library has managed to acquire an average of approximately 85-90% of the

titles on the weekly "New York Times Best Seller List". Other notable titles purchased included the <u>Academic American Encyclopedia</u> and the <u>Value Land Investment Survey</u>. Three sets of story hours were given for local youngsters and a cassette recorder was purchased for loan to the public.

Nineteen eighty-five saw the librarian attending the annual conference of the New England Library Association and in addition to maintaining its' membership in the Seacoast Cooperative, the library has recently joined the Merrimack Inter-Library Cooperative. Four Library Trustees resigned: Caddie and Oliver Carter, James C. Falconer and Louise Knowles. Three new Trustees were appointed: Kevin Fleming, Betty Janvrin and Elinor Mawson.

REPORT OF THE CHASE HOMESTEAD STUDY COMMITTEE

Over the past two years this committee has studied the disposition of the Chase Homestead -- either to renovate and use it on the present site, move it (or a portion thereof) to another site for any of several uses, or to dispose of it altogether. The last of these suggestions was discarded by the committee as noted in last year's report. The town has very few buildings left which were built in the same era, and it was considered a shame to propose destroying any part of the town's heritage.

To leave it in its present location would not fit in with any further development of the Recreation Center and its future needs. It was decided to propose preserving the main portion and moving it to town owned land west of the Old South Meeting House to be used as a repository for some or all of the historic material which has been acquired by the Historical Society and is now crowded into the Boyd School on Washington Street. The Historical Society could be designated as overseers of the building and it could become the beginning of an "Historical District" of which the town could be justly proud.

In the past few years we have invested millions of dollars for new facilities for the town's various services, and rightly so, as we have needed them for a long time, but we should keep something of the town's proud past for future generations to see and study; and the cost would be minimal compared to new construction. We are submitting an article in this year's town warrant asking you to appropriate \$75,000 to accomplish the above. As noted in last year's report, this type of action falls in line with all of the past studies and master plans and has been recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board.

We again thank you for the privilege of serving you and hope you feel this will be a contribution to the Town's future.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Seabrook Seabrook, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1984, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Seabrook at December 31, 1984 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The combining, individual fund and account group financial statements and supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Seabrook. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

There were 463,868,513 gallons of water pumped in 1985. This was an 18,016,551 gallon increase over the previous year. This increase was due to increases in the commercial-industrial use which increased from 149,855,590 gallons in 1984 to 169,202,800 in 1985. Industrial-commercial customers who had the most significant increases over the previous year were: Public Service Co. with almost 16 million gallons, Bailey Co. with 3.5 million gallons, State of N.H. Rest Area with almost 1 million gallons. South Seas Restaurant, Collins Street Laundry, Phonecia Motor Inn and K.J.Quinn Co. also had increases which range from 300,000 gallons to 600,000 gallons.

There were 68 new services installed in 1985, six of which were the commercial-industrial type: Dexter-Hysol Corp., Exeter Instruments, Inc., Bocca Engineering, Meadow Stone Park, N.H. Feed and Tack Shop and Mid-Atlantic Realty Trust.

There were 18 water leaks repaired by the crew this year, the largest of which was an 8" x 10" main leak at the intersection of New Zealand Trailer Park and Route #107. The crew also assisted in the repair of about 34 private or customer leaks of which Staples Park's new 8" line and the 6" line to Mid-Atlantic were the largest. Both of these leaks occurred while being tested.

Only one fire hydrant was damaged in 1985. The hyrdant on Lower Collins Street along with parts of the water main had to be replaced.

The crew accomplished many special projects this year in addition to regular and routine work. The installation of two new surge control valves and well monitoring equipment in the True Road pump stations took the crew most of the spring to complete. About 200' of ledge in the trench had to be blasted and removed to install a 12" water main and fire hydrant on part of New Zealand Road and Stard Road. This project took most of the summer. In the fall the crew installed an 8" water main and fire hydrant on Riley Road. This project tied in the dead end line on Black Snake Road to the water main in our well field off Ledge Road. The winter project was the installing, chlorinating, testing and flushing of an 8" main into the Recreation Center to be used as a sprinkler line for fire protection. The crew also assisted, observed the installing, chlorinating of, flushed and tested the following major projects in 1985: 8" water main, hydrant and services at Route #286 Meadow-Stone Park; 10" water main and hydrant on Folly Mill Road at Dexter-Hysol; 6" water main and sleeve installation on Route #1 at Appliance Warehouse; 8" water mains to Amesbury Machine and Bocca Engineering on Batchelder Road.

The Department purchased a new utility truck and air-compressor through articles #35 and #36. Our 1977 pickup truck was sold at public auction and the old air-compressor was given to the Highway Department.

The furnishing and installing of a fourth rockwell pump was contracted to Lane New England Co. Problems with the well arose. After these problems are remedied the pump should be installed and go on line in 1986.

Water Department, con't -

Plans have been drawn up for a major project to increase water main size and fire protection on the north portion of Route #1 and parts of Dearborn Avenue and Gove Road. The work is expected to be contracted in 1986.

In the office, our clerk has been busy changing all accounts, domestic and metered, to reflect that the property owner receives and is responsible for paying the water bill. Also, along with the purchase of a new computer for the Town Office she has been entering all accounts for the 1986 billings.

New rules and regulations for the department have been drawn up this year along with regulations and specifications on backflow prevention. We are told by our engineers, Whitman and Howard, that these rules and regulations are among the best and most comprehensive in New England. These rules and regulations can be viewed in the Water Department Office during normal working hours at the public's convenience.

It should be noted that because of lack of rain water levels dropped significantly at our True Road and Route #107 well fields, even to the point that one pump at the Route #107 well field started to draw air for a short period of time. With this in mind, I would like to stress the importance of conserving and not wasting this precious resource. Again this year we had no restrictions on our use of water such as bans or moratoriums. If water levels keep dropping and customers do not voluntarily conserve, your water commissioners may be forced to impose such a ban on the outside use of water. Hopefully this will not be necessary if everyone does their part to conserve.

If anyone needs any suggestive measures on how to conserve, please feel free to call or stop by the Water Department Office.
