TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Newfields Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two Non-Freezable fire extinguishers for the Town Hall.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purchase of a safe suitable for keeping Town Records.

5. To see if the Town shall vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to spend the sum of \$1,000 which sum was authorized raised and appropriated under article 5 of the warrant for the Town meeting held March 13, 1928 for the purpose of enlarging and repairing Old Town Hall but which purpose is now deemed inadvisable due to the presentation of the new Town Hall for additional equipment for the so-called New Town Hall. Among which equipment shall be included the erection of an appropriate sized flagpole and American flag.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Trust Fund from Isabel Paul and authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to receive and receipt for said Fund. The income of said Fund to be used for the care and upkeep of the Town Hall grounds.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the suppression of the White Pine Blister Rust.

8. On petition of Christopher J. O'Leary and sixteen others an Article on a proposed Town Water Supply.

(a) That a Committee of three shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, at the Town Meeting on March 11, 1930 (one of whom shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen) to be known as the Town Water Supply Committee.

(b) That there shall be appropriated at this said Town Meeting on March 11, 1930 the sum of \$100.00 which shall be used by this so-called Town Water Supply Committee in the conduct of an investigation relative to the proper means of providing a suitable water supply for the town of Newfields, N. H.

(c) That this committee shall report back to this current Town Meeting or the next annual Town Meeting, with its recommendations as to the best means of procurement of a Town Water Supply, with its recommendations as to the financing the purposed project, and with any other detailed recommendations that may properly come within the scope of an investigation by such a committee.

SCHOOLS

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The annual meeting of the School District was held March 16th, 1929 and the following officers were elected:

Alfred Conner, Moderator; Leslie F. Hayden, Clerk; Abbie A. Pease, Treasurer; Eugene C. Patridge, Auditor;

R. Althea Bean was elected a member of the school board for three years.

The School Board met and organized as follows: Helen M. Merrill, Chairman; R. Althea Bean, Secretary; C. A. Pollard, committee on repairs and fuel.

The School Board was fortunate to find a customer for the Piscassic school house in the early summer and a special meeting of the District held on the evening of July 13th authorized its sale for three hundred and fifty (\$350.00) dollars and empowered the School Board to execute a deed for the same. As a part of our report we append the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Newfields, N. H.:

It is a pleasure to submit my annual report as Superintendent of the Newfields schools, the eleventh in the series of such reports.

Your attention is called to the various tables of statistics which follow; they contain detailed information about the schools not easily printed in any other form.

The total enrollment of pupils for the current school year is thirty-seven; sixteen are in the grammar school and twenty-one in the primary school. For the first time in my experience, we have no pupils in grades seven and

eight, a circumstance which ensures better teaching for the other grades in the grammar school. Four pupils are in grades seven and eight in Exeter, where, of course, they receive the full benefit of a junior high school organization, a privilege which, in the nature of things, they cannot receive in a small village school.

It is our aim to direct our teaching to individual pupils, first by discovering needs and then by adaption of work and drill. This year, as in other years, our tests are designed to reveal these needs and we have given much attention to choosing the proper kind and amount of material for drill.

I am glad to be able to report that the discipline of the school, in session, on the playground, and on the street is good. Both by precept and example, our teachers offer much training in character and citizenship as well as in the subjects of our course of study.

For the first time, we have employed this year a registered nurse, experienced in school work, to make the health inspection usually made by a physician. Mrs. Dolbec has been painstaking and thorough in the inspection, in sending notices of defects to the parents, and in following up these notices with personal visits. As a result, the school is in better physical condition than usual. With strong co-operation on the part of parents, we have completed arrangements for the vaccination of all unvaccinated children later in the year. When this is finished we shall have, for the first time in ten years, a complete protection against an attack of smallpox on our children.

In the interest of good health and sanitary surroundings, I recommend once more that a part of the book closet be remodelled into a heated room where drinking water can be kept at all times, and where we can have facilities for washing. The interior of the schoolhouse is cleaner and more attractive than for many years. The painting and general repairing authorized by the School Board last summer have done much to make school life pleasant and wholesome. The experimental stage in the use of chemical toilets in school has now passed and I hope that before long we shall want to consider the matter of their use in our school. Even under the best of circum-

stances, this part of a school plant is difficult to care for; it may easily become unwholesome and offensive. I am sure that with this equipment we should have a pleasanter school and a safer plant, and I recommend that when the money can be spared for it, we make this improvement.

It is only by whole-hearted co-operation with parents that we can have the best schools and we are fortunate in enjoying in Newfields such parental interest in the schools.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks for the hearty support of parents, School Board, and teachers in the work of the past year.
