## Town Meeting Warrant

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 14th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Highway Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take relative to the Water and Light Commissioners furnishing water and light for town buildings, school buildings, public library, community house, hospital and nurses' home.

Article 4. To see if the town will approve of the Water and Light Commissioners furnishing electric



power to the Citizens Reality Co., of Littleton, in accordance with its contract with the R. Wallace & Sons Co., to furnish the same.

Article 5. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 155, Laws of 1909, or Chapter 158, 162 or 168, Laws of 1913, or Chapters 51 or 93. Laws of 1915.

Article 6. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Trunk line maintenance of highways in this town in accordance with Chap. 133, Laws of 1911, Sec. 27.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in co-operation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 9. To see if the town will ratify the following vote of a special meeting of the town held July 29, 1921, viz:-

“VOTED, that the town approves of and ratifies the action of the selectmen, in taking and appropriating by condemnation proceedings, under Chap, 255

of the Laws of 1903, certain lands in Franconia, N. H., belonging to Amos N. Blandin and Joseph H. Beales, to provide for and protect its water supply, and it hereby authorizes its selectmen to borrow, upon the credit of the town, such sum of money as is required to pay the damages and other expenses occasioned by said condemnation, and to issue the negotiable notes or bonds of the town, upon such rates of interest as they think proper, for the same, payable in accordance with the provisions of Chap. 129 of the Laws of 1917; said indebtedness to be a charge against and paid from the earnings of the Water & Light Commissioners.”;

or what other or further action it will take relative to the raising by taxation or borrowing on the credit of the town, sufficient monies to pay the charges awarded said Amos N. Blandin and Joseph H. Beales for land taken and appropriated by said town to protect its water supply in accordance with Chap. 255 of the Laws of 1903.

Article 10. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 11. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

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**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION**

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit our annual report of the schools, which you have placed under our care. We refer you to the Superintendent's report, for details of the educational part of the work.

**Repairs and Permanent Improvements:**

During the period of extremely high prices, the repairs and improvements upon the school houses were kept down as low as possible. Only those things which were considered actually necessary were done.

Following is a list of the repairs and improvements which were carried out last year:

1. New heating and plumbing installed at the Kilburn building.
2. New furnace installed at North Littleton.
3. The three rural school houses painted inside, cleaned and necessary repairs made.
4. Porch enclosed and new fence at Mitchell.
5. Portable building erected at High school.

The committee wish to make this statement regarding the installation of heating and plumbing at the Kilburn building. We were authorized by vote of the district at the last meeting to issue bonds to the sum of \$5,000.00 to care for this expense. We did not have to issue bonds, but paid for these improvements out of the money for current funds.

Your committee did not care to be held responsible for conditions which existed at the High school building. Classes were being held on the third floor of the building. As there was no fire escape to this floor, it brought about a condition which was not only a violation of the laws of the state, but a fire hazard as well. A study of the situation convinced us that the best solution of the problem would be to provide a room somewhere else. The portable building erected on the school grounds takes care of this situation. This building was loaned to the town by the state department of education with no expense attached except the freight charges and the cost of erecting the building.

The legislature of 1919 changed the school fiscal year so that the year now extends from July 1 to June 30.

To comply with this law, and make available the state aid which is allotted to the town, it is necessary that a sum of money be raised sufficient to run the schools an additional half year. The regular budget which is recommended will be used as usual for expenses for one school year.

The increase in the budget which is asked for this year is necessary because the amount which is given by the state has been reduced from \$13,000.00 to \$6,000.00. It is necessary that we raise this additional sum to take the place of the amount heretofore received from the state.

The committee wish to thank the citizens for the hearty support which they have received in the management of the schools.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Committee of Littleton:

The report made at this time is a brief summary of the work from September 1, 1921 to date. Some of the topics discussed are:

1. School Enrollment: The number of pupils enrolled in all the schools at the present time is 736. Table number I, which is added to this report, gives the enrollment by schools and also a comparison for three years. It will be seen from this table that the crowded conditions which have obtained previously in the first four grades, have been relieved by the transfer of pupils to the Parochial school. A sixth grade was added to the Mitchell shortly after the opening of schools in the fall. The number of pupils in the sixth grade in the High school was somewhat decreased by this change, and better working conditions resulted. It will be seen from the table also that the number of pupils in grades seven and eight of the High school is too large to expect a teacher to do her best work, or that the pupils will get the most from their school work. No immediate relief is in sight, but possibly some change can be made another year which will relieve the present crowded conditions. At North Littleton the enrollment was so large that we were faced with two distinct problems; first, the school-room was not large enough to accommodate



the whole school, and second, the number of pupils was so great that one teacher could not do the work of the eight elementary grades. To relieve these conditions, we found it necessary to add another teacher to this school. That part of the building used for community purposes was made available to the school, so that the addition of this teacher became possible.

II. Attendance: The attendance in the different schools was very good for the fall term. One hundred and twenty nine pupils in the elementary schools had perfect attendance for the term and were awarded roll of honor badges. Ninety pupils in the High school had perfect attendance for the term. An epidemic of whooping cough has caused a great deal of absence thus far during the winter term. All cases of truancy have been looked after by Miss Gillette, and when it was found that pupils were kept out of school without a good reason, they were made to attend.

III. Teachers: Twenty-nine full time teachers are employed in the schools. The training and experience of these teachers are shown in table number 2, which is added to this report. These teachers have been earnest in their work and have shown an excellent spirit of interest and cooperation. I feel that the most important factor in the success of the school is the teacher. A good teacher exerts a great influence towards shaping the character of boys and girls. The most effective moral training we can carry on in our schools will be that influence received from the unconscious imitation of a strong teacher. It will be good policy to hold able teachers when we have them, and to select the best when necessary to make a change. The only way to do this will be to make the conditions so attractive that teachers will strive for a position in the town.

The High school is making good progress under the efficient leadership of Mr. Mountfort. An account of the work will be found in his report.

IV. Teachers' Meetings: Several meetings of the elementary teachers have been held, at which problems relating to the work of the schools have been discussed. The High school teachers have met as a separate group under the direction of Mr. Mountfort.

V. Program of Study: Some changes have been made in the program of study. It was found necessary to discontinue the work in French which has been carried on in grades seven and eight. Regular instruction in English and arithmetic is now being given these grades. Reading tests were given to all children in grades four to eight inclusive, and tests in arithmetic were given to the pupils in grades seven and eight. The results of these tests showed that time might well be spent on these subjects to advantage. These results were discussed at a meeting of the teachers and the need for emphasis upon these subjects was talked over, also the best method for bringing about good results. Tests will be given again near the close of the year to note any progress that has been made.

VI. Instruction: The instruction in music has been carried on by each teacher. Good results can be obtained in this way by some teachers who have the ability and the training to teach music. Teachers who do not have the ability and training are working at a disadvantage. I believe the value of the instruction of music is not the teaching of the technique to pupils with the idea that all are to become musicians, but rather the development of that talent at the proper age. Many children who otherwise might never make any effort to learn music, will develop a love for it and a desire to continue its study. They will carry with them all through their lives something that will make

hours of leisure a pleasure and enjoyment. A supervisor of music to direct the work of the teachers, and one who can train the children for special occasions would be the best means of getting the desired results. To make the instruction in some subjects more effective it was necessary that quite a number of new textbooks be purchased. We have added books in English, history, arithmetic and some new geographies.

VII. Noon Lunches: Hot lunches are served at the High school under the direction of Miss Dore and Miss Bronson. Over fifty children are served each day at a cost of three cents per pupil. It will be a pleasant sight for any parent or citizen to visit the building to witness the serving of these lunches, and note the efficient manner in which they are carried on with the facilities that are available. A hot lunch is also served in each of the rural schools under the direction of the teacher.

VIII. Janitor Service: The janitor service at the present time in the four village buildings is of the best. Representatives of the state educational department visited the High and Kilburn buildings last fall; they remarked upon the neatness of the buildings and the efficient work which is being done by Mr. West. Mr. Clark is doing excellent work at the Apthorp building, and Mr. Bronson at the Mitchell. A good test of this service, as well as of the heating systems was made during the recent week of extremely cold weather. All of the buildings were warm and comfortable and no sessions of school were lost at that time.

An account of the work of medical inspection and the work of the school nurse will be found in the reports of Dr. Page and Miss Gillette, which are included as a part of this report.

I wish to thank the members of the committee for their advice and cooperation in my work for the schools.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Mr. Vernon K. Brackett, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my first report as Headmaster of Littleton high school. It covers the period from September 1, 1921 to January 31, 1922 inclusive.

The total registration in the High school this year has been 191, an increase of 15 over the preceding year. A portable building takes care of the increase. The class room on the third floor has been declared unfit for use. The teachers and students have cooperated and endeavored to keep up the school work and extra curricula activities, which I found to be good. The Agora has a large membership and has held two very interesting meetings. "The Record", the school paper, continues to function and represents a great amount of honest hard work on the part of the board and teacher of English. The various athletic teams have met with fair success. Basketball in this town this year has proven to be a failure financially, and immediate steps will have to be taken to help finance the team if it completes its schedule. The team is doing very good work under the direction of Mr. Macaulay. I wish to extend our appreciation of the kindness and interest of the Selectmen in allowing the teams to practice in the town hall. A girls' basketball team is progressing slowly and will very soon play its first game. The girls seem to be very much interested in this sport.

A school orchestra has been showing steady improvement under the instruction of Mrs. Wright. She is doing remarkably good work along this line. It has made one public appearance. We do, however, feel the lack of a music teacher in the high school. I would recommend that the Board engage the services of one another year.

We are trying out several new activities in the High school, among which is a Fixit Club. The club

is designed to help aid boys and girls to go to a post secondary school, by finding chances to work. Already the people of Littleton have sent in many calls, and seem to be trying to cooperate in every way to make this plan a success. An Outing Club has been started and the students are working with Judge Heald to make Skyline Farm a rendezvous for winter sports. We expect to hold a small carnival soon. We have hopes that this will be a beginning of a series of successful carnivals to be given in Littleton.

We have purchased a new American flag and it has been placed on a staff in the assembly room. Our assembly exercises start with the flag salute by the whole school.

An Honor Roll has been established. First honors comprise the group who receive an average of 90 and nothing below 85. The second honor group comprises the list who receive an average of 85, and nothing below 80. For the first marking period, four students composed the highest group, and thirty the second group. For the period just ended, eight students made up the first group and thirty-one students the second group. Thus you will readily see a marked improvement of the second marking period over the first. This would indicate that the Honor Roll has proven its worth. It has been an incentive for the students to do better work.

Some new courses have been adopted, one in economics and business practices. We have hopes that this may become of very great civic and economic importance. Another course has been introduced in all English classes called, "Manners and Conduct in School and Out of School." The interest and enthusiasm that has been aroused by this course is tremendous. It has proven of great value to all students.

I deeply appreciate the good work and the wonderful spirit of cooperation and loyalty which all the

teachers have shown during this year with the work which we are trying to accomplish. Our slogan is, "Littleton High School must be the best."

We have made very good use of the fine work of the vocational departments, the Commercial, Woodworking and Domestic Arts departments. These have helped to make the academic departments stronger by correlating their work. All teachers use the Commercial department for forms and typewriting. Some townspeople have work done there, and I think it has proven its efficiency. Freshmen commercials have penmanship taught them, and an exhibition will be held later to show the wonderful improvement which the students have made. Boys have wired some lights in the new rooms and it shows that, contrary to some statements which we sometimes hear, they can do something worth while. The Domestic Science department girls have made candy for sale for the piano fund.

Later in the year we are planning a public speaking exhibition in order to compete for the prizes which some public spirited citizens have kindly offered.

I should recommend a few changes in the course of study now offered in this school. I feel that it would prove more beneficial if we could offer a more comprehensive course in mathematics for those intending to enter college or technical school.

A renewed effort should be made to conserve the health of the student. Our athletics as they now exist help only the few, and usually those who participate are the ones who need physical training the least. A good supplementary program of physical training would prove to be a very great help.

The High school has not fulfilled its mission when it has given its graduate his diploma. It should keep him constantly in view, alert to assist his moral, intellectual and financial advancement. Accordingly we

are trying to keep a careful and complete record of each graduate and assist him whenever possible.

I want to mention at this time the excellent work which the town library is doing to make the work of our High school better. It is an important factor in our work.

The Community House, its directors, matron and superintendent are of great value to the High school in working out its problems. We little know or appreciate, I think, of the excellent work of this Community House. Let us hope that some day it will be recognized and those responsible will have a public token of commendation. I wish to commend them upon their excellent work.

A skating rink has been made for the school children on the Community House grounds by Mr. Mozrall and to see the crowds that gather there would answer the question, "Is it popular.?"

I wish to thank you and the School Board, for the teaching staff and myself, for the excellent work you have done for us. I am deeply indebted to you, sir, for your kind, frank and sympathetic advice, and I gratefully acknowledge your cordial cooperation in all things undertaken for the good of the High school. It is a privilege and a pleasure to work with your help, in and for Littleton.

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### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

A summary of the school health work shows that an encouraging number of defects have been corrected.

The follow-up work of the school nurse has involved visits to the schools and to homes to bring about treatment and correction of defects. The nurse has also visited the schools to aid the teachers in suspected cases of communicable diseases. First aid treatments have been given at the schools and at the office. A first aid box with the necessary supplies has been provided for each building for accidents which may happen on the playground.

A number of children have been furnished with clothing to enable them to attend school. Some of the under weight children, or tuberculosis suspects, have been supplied with milk and eggs. A number also have taken advantage of the free tuberculosis clinic.

One of the foremost needs at the present time, in order that the health work in the schools may be done to the best advantage, is the establishment of a nutrition clinic. We hope to establish one in order that better preventive work may be done. Portable scales are also needed in order that the preventive work may be carried out in the rural schools.

Some new physical exercise records have been procured and have been used as an incentive to this work. We are hoping to accomplish more regarding the posture of the children by the extended use of the records.

Hot noon lunches are still popular and splendidly carried on in all the schools. The Junior Red Cross sewing classes continue at the Community House. Through the Junior Red Cross in the schools we hope to work out a more comprehensive plan in health work than ever has been accomplished before.

The splendid cooperation of the teachers is in no small way responsible for the success which we have obtained in our relations with the school.

#### LIBRARY NOTES

The library has completed another year of service to the public, and a survey of the year's work will determine whether the library is keeping pace with the

standards of other libraries of like size and similar conditions. As the circulation determines to a large extent the work accomplished, we have before us statistics proving that the work for the past year must have been the most advanced, as the highest circulation has been reached this year, an increase of two thousand more than last year, which also was a year of much increase, so that now the circulation attained is 36,276; and the Library Commission has compiled statistics showing the per capita circulation of towns in New Hampshire, and Littleton with an eight per cent capita is the fifth in a group of five towns of similar size, and two of those are towns where a college and large school add to the population. This rating compared with towns of like size in New York state is nearly double. These statistics are interesting and convincing to those making comparisons, and it is evident that the library is not in any way retrogressive, but is forging ahead, and this all accomplished with a record of less money expended for hours of labor than in most libraries of like rating, as all or nearly all libraries with as large a circulation have two attendants all the time and often three or four during rush hours. This advance in circulation is a most important step as it reaches more people and proves that the library is sought by the many rather than the few; but there are many activities now being accepted by progressive libraries; which as yet we are not in a position to enter upon. One of the difficulties during this past year, and a difficulty dating back to the increase in the price of all library supplies, is the increasing demand for books—books that would be of more service to those doing special work—books for reference much needed by both the public and library attendants, and books for the pleasure readers. These demands bring the library to a critical state if it is to do the work of supplying the public in a satisfactory way.

While this year shows such an increase in circulation, it also shows much retrenching in the number of books added, only about one-half as many as in previous years with a lesser demand; and not only are there less in number of new books to draw from, but the number of old books has been reduced, as so many have been discarded owing to the worn out condition, and it has not been possible to keep the books rebound owing to the increased cost of rebinding, so it can readily be seen that a critical state of supply and demand has been reached. It surely would be unwise for a library that has acquired a position of usefulness so that it has a standing in library activities beyond the general average, to now consider retrenching. It is the duty of the library, supported by the public, to not only keep the usefulness already acquired, but to advance. It is a non-disputable fact, that the reading rooms are recognized by the many people coming here during the summer season, as among the best equipped in the state, and it would be poor advertising for those having the progressiveness of the town in charge, to ask the public library to retrench on such essentials as the magazines and periodicals. In these times of special work, there should be more of the specialized periodicals added.

We are informed by the publishers that there will be no appreciable reduction in the cost of new publications, and only a small reduction on reprints, rebinds, magazines and periodicals, so for the present year those having this library in charge will find it necessary to do skillful planning to keep to the former standard if it can be done even then, and this should be added, that it must be done.

Several gifts have come to the library for various uses. Rev. J. E. Johnson gave \$25 as the beginning of a fund for more shelves in the general reading room and \$25 more have been added to this, and it is thought that by summer some of the shelving may be



available. Ten dollars were given for shelves in the young folks' reading room, relieving somewhat the overcrowded situation. Five dollars were given by Mr. and Mrs. Collins of Sky-line in appreciation of the use of the library during the summer months. Mrs. Fred White, who has passed the winter season in town, also gave \$5.00 finding the library of use for her needs. Twenty volumes of books have been given by friends, and the usual number of periodicals, all proving most acceptable. Through special interest of Mrs. D. W. Harrington the picture of the first church in Littleton, which had been in the library, was re-framed, and the key to the church, which was given by the late D. C. Remich, was remounted and both are now hanging in the young folks' room, where they may be conveniently viewed by those interested; also the picture of the flag and what it represents to Americans, is in the same place, a reminder to all of our civic duty. The Daughters of the American Revolution purchased a flag which was placed over the Memorial Tablet given by them some years before. This is the first flag to come into possession of the library. The picture of Mount Lafayette, painted by the late Mr. Weisman, a painting of much merit, and given by Mrs. Clay, the painting having been purchased by the late W. H. Mitchell, has also been hung in the young folks' reading room. All these gifts have been most encouraging to those having the welfare of the library in charge, and a most sincere appreciation is extended the donors, which I am sure voices the sentiment of the public as well, for whatever comes to the library in the way of benefits is of wide significance and reaches many people.

Reminders to the library patrons may not at this time be amiss, as we all have a duty toward aiding in the effectiveness of the work and the upkeep and care of the building and its belongings, a little more care of the books and magazines, a little more thoughtfulness

for the place and what it is and what it stands for to the community; a quiet entrance and exit, and the request of long standing for no loud or continuous talking in reading rooms or around the desk; also a gentle hint to those having fines, to try and pay if possible when they become due, and not expect those in attendance to be constantly reminding of the duty. It is your personal duty and not a duty devolving on those at the desk. Much more could be added to the desk fines if all would do their part. It has been said that the personal duty in public places is an asset acquired only with constant thoughtfulness, but once acquired becomes a public benefaction. So it is for the general public benefit that we must all work, striving for a still higher place than already acquired, and this will necessitate the cooperation of all.

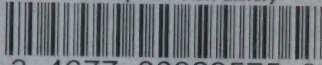
