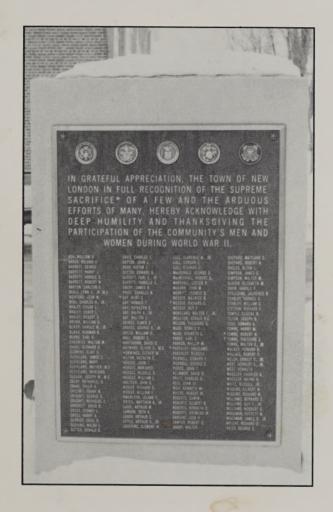

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

1992 is the year that your present, as well as your past, Selectmen have been waiting for. Our trash has plagued us for at least the past ten years but now, thanks to the perseverance of all the Selectmen involved during this period, it is out of the ground water and in a specially prepared area. Due to questioning of and negotiating with the State over the past several years, the closure of the Landfill has been accomplished with a saving to the Town of about a million and a half dollars over the original estimate. There will be some additional expense incurred as the test wells surrounding the area will have to be monitored until there is no longer any chance of further contamination. We urge you to take a nostalgic drive down Mountain Road to see what has been done.

In August of 1992 the employees of the Police and Highway Departments voted 8-5 in favor of joining the AFSCME union. The Board of Selectmen has hired a professional labor negotiator. Negotiations are in progress at the present time.

Another event of the summer of 1992 was the conversion to a new computer system. With this conversion we have added the modules of Accounts Payable, General Ledger, Budget Development and Town Clerk Receipting. The conversion of the property tax records was done manually and we would like to extend our thanks to two volunteers. Dave Eberly and Frank Finger spent many hours in this effort and helped to make the conversion a smooth one.

During 1992 the Selectmen issued a total of 125 building permits--12 new residential dwellings, 1 relocation of a beach, 4 demolitions, 7 renewals and 101 miscellaneous additions/alterations.

With your indulgence, and the fact that I am on the home stretch of my career as a Selectman, I would like to reminisce about some of the "happenings" I am pleased to have been a part of over the past nine years-Ausbon Sargent's gift of the Colby Common, construction of the Transfer Station, Recycling, Town Office Building, computerizing the Town records, Mary Haddad Bandstand, renovation of the Police Station, Revaluation of the Town, hiring an Administrative Assistant, Landfill Closure, formation of a Business Advisory Committee for the Selectmen, initiation of Joint Meetings with Selectmen of all towns in the Kearsarge Regional School Districts and, last but not the least, is the settlement of over fifteen million dollars of suits against the Town. As

you can see, it has been a very interesting nine years.

A Selectman would be of no value at all without the help of the people who work at running the Town. I have many to thank--Alf Jacobson, Marilyn Andrews, Jim Moreland, Peter Bianchi, Sally Fifield, Doug Atkins, Sally Rockwood, Shelby Blunt, Fred Welch, April Whittaker, Lois Marshall, Grace Granger, Jill Lynch, Sallie Johnson, Carol Spotts, Ben Bucklin, Bob Wright, Walt Reney, Ralph Marshall, Stu Sidmore, Debbie Wheeler, Bill Green, Alchard Lee, Doug Mathewson, Peter Stanley and of course all the others who have, or are now, working in the Police, Dispatch, Highway, Transfer Station, Library, Sewer and Water Precinct Departments. Then there are the hundreds of volunteers who have served or are serving on our many, many Boards and Committees. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve with you.

And to the citizens and voters of New London, I wish to extend my thanks to you for all your past support. I challenge you to stay involved and/or to get more involved. And I urge you to be aware of how vital your vote is to you, your Town, your State and your Nation. No one in the world has a vote that is more valuable than yours. Please don't misuse it. Vote responsibly and treat your vote as one of your most valuable assets.

TOWN MEETING - MARCH 10, 1992

BALLOTING - WHIPPLE MEMORIAL HALL

Moderator Hilary P. Cleveland called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. after having sworn in the Supervisors of the Checklist. The ballot box was examined and determined to be empty.

Moderator Cleveland entertained a motion to consider Article 1:
A. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
B. To vote by ballot on amendments to the New London Zoning Ordinance.

At 2:00 p.m. a motion was made and seconded to recess the town meeting and to reconvene on Wednesday, March 11, 1992, at 7:00 p.m. in the Kearsarge Middle School Gymnasium, to act upon Articles 2 through 34. Motion was passed.

Polls closed at 7:00 p.m. and counting of the ballots commenced at 8:00 p.m. At 10:00 p.m. Moderator Cleveland read the results of the balloting.

BALLOT RESULTS ON AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW LONDON ZONING ORDINANCE.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 1:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 1 amends Article XX <u>Wetlands</u> <u>Conservation Overlay District</u>, Paragraph E. <u>Special Provisions</u>, Subparagraph (1) to include any access way, driveway or street, regardless of width, which crosses a wetland to be consiered as a Special Exception, and to add a criteria which would require the applicant to demonstrate that there is not an access way, driveway or street layout which does not cross a wetland and that the proposed crossing would create the least impact on the wetland compared with other possible wetland crossing locations.

The amended subparagraph (1) would read:

"Any access way, driveway or street, regardless of width, and utility right-of-way easements, including power lines and pripe lines. In addition to the usual criteria used by the Zoning Board ofAdjustment in evaluating an application for a Special Exception, the applicant must demonstrate to the Zoning Board of Adjustment that there is not a layout of the access way, driveway or street, which conforms with New London's regulations, which does not cross a wetland, and that the proposed crossing would create the least impact on the wetland compared with other possible wetland crossing locations."

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 1 will allow any road or driveway, regardless of width, which is proposed to cross a wetland to be reviewed as a Special Exception by the Zoning Board of Adjustment and provides specific criteria for the Board to use in evaluating such a proposal.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 2:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 2 amends the Zoning Ordinance to incorporate a new Shore Land Overlay District. This Shore Land Overlay District encompasses the area three hundred (300) feet inland from all lakes and ponds over ten (10) acres in size and includes provisions for: permitted uses; setbacks for structures, roads and on-site sewage disposal systems; shore frontage requirements; standards for common waterfront areas; erosion control; and natural buffer requirements. This amendment involves adding a new Article XXIII Shore Land Overlay District amending Article III Definitions.

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 2 will add provisions for the protection of sensitive shoreland areas through setbacks and retention of a natural vegetative buffer along the shoreline with the goal of continuing to maintain high water quality in New London's lakes and ponds.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 3:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 3 revises the Zoning Ordinance to reorganize all the non-conforming use, structure, and lot provisions into one article. This new article would revise the language on the resumption after discontinuance of a non-conforming use; add a provision that a non-conforming use shall not be expanded; add a provision that would prohibit by a conforming use; add a provision which would allow a non-conforming use which has been destroyed by a natural disaster to be replaced within three years; reinserts the existing provision addressing alteration and expansion of a non-conforming structure; adds a provision which would allow a non-conforming building destroyed by a natural disaster to be replaced within three years; and reinserts into this article the existing provision from Article II-14 addressing non-conforming lots of record.

This amendment involves deleting Article II <u>General Provisions</u>, Paragraph 14 <u>Lots of Record</u>, deleting Article XIII <u>Non-conforming Uses</u>, and adding a new Article XIII <u>Legal Non-conforming Uses</u>, Non-conforming <u>Buildings and Non-conforming Lots</u>.

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 3 will reorganize all of the provisions addressing non-conforming uses, structures and losts into one article and provide guidance on several non-conforming provisions which the current ordinanace does not address.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 4:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 4 amends Article II <u>General Provisions</u>, Paragraph 15 to retitle the paragraph as <u>Temporary Ancillary Sales</u> and to revise it to include paragraphs addressing Yard Sales, Tent/Sidewalk Sales, Fund Raising Events for Non-Profit Organizations, Auctions and Permits. For each type of ancillary sale, provisions are made for the number of permitted events per year, the length of each event, and any permitted temporary signs.

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 4 will provide new specific guidelines for the conduct of temporary tent/sidewalk sales, temporary fund raising events for non-profit organizations and temporary auctions. Currently the Zoning Ordinance does not address these types of temporary sales. This amendment is an attempt to provide the Selectmen as well as the citizens with the guidelines for such temporary events.

PETITIONED ZONING AMENDMENT

Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment No. 1 as proposed by petitioned for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

PETITIONED AMENDMENT NO. 1:

Amend Article XX Wetlands Conservation Overlay District, Paragraph F. Special Provisions, subparagraph (2) to read as follows:

XX.F. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

(2) Areas designated as poorly drained soils may be used to fulfill 25 percent of the minimum lot size required by the use district of the zoning ordinance, unless Town water and sewer serve the lot. If Town water and sewer serve the lot, then areas designated as poorly drained soils may be used to fulfill 50 percent of the minimum lot size required by the use district of the zoning ordinance.

YES - 451

NO - 259

RATIONALE:

Currently lots served by Town water and sewer which have some poorly drained soils are as severely restricted as those using septic systems and wells. These restrictions are designed to prevent overburdening poorly drained soils. Town water and sewer fulfill a major part of this objective. This amendment would preserve the integrity and intent of the Wetlands Conservation Overlay District, and provide a more fair and equitable treatment for owners of lots served by Town sewer and water.

THE NEW LONDON PLANNING BOARD APPROVES THIS PETITIONED AMENDMENT BY A VOTE OF 4-1.

CONTINUATION OF TOWN MEETING - MARCH 11, 1992 KEARSARGE MIDDLE SCHOOL AT 7:00 P.M.

Moderator Hilary Cleveland called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. and announced the voting results to those assembled. She also announced that because Douglas Atkins has been elected to the Board of Selectmen, he has resigned from the Budget Committee. Moderator Cleveland appointed Barbara K. Davis as his replacement until March 1993.

Moderator Cleveland announced the Kearsarge Regional School Meeting will be postponed until Saturday, April 11, 1992, at 9:00 a.m.

ARTICLE 24: "To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a fire vehicle purchase and to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be placed in this fund."

(7 cents per thousand)

ARTICLE 25: "To see if the Town will vote to establish a Captial Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of updating the Town's Master Plan, and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be placed in this fund."

(1 cent per thousand)

ARTICLE 26: "To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of expansion/improvements to Town Buildings and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in this fund."

(4 cents per thousand)

ARTICLE 27: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$382,328 for sewage collection and disposal."

ARTICLE 28: "To see if the Town will vote to support having the Kearsarge Regional School District Annual Meeting held simultaneously at several places, in order to encourage sustained voter participation; one such place to be designated the central meeting place and the others as subsidiary meeting places. Communications between all places shall be continuously available, and the voters at all places shall have the opportunity to participate in the District Meeting in a manner satisfactory to the officers calling the meeting."

ARTICLE 29: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for the payment of bonded debt, principal and interest."

ARTICLE 30: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to pay for interest on temporary loans during the year."

(1 cent per thousand)

ARTICLE 31: "To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a single section of Old Route 11 that abuts the "Lash" property, Tax Map 98 Lot 37 and Tax Map 87 Lot 1, subject to the continuation of all utility usages and drainage now existing, all in accordance with RSA 231:43 and RSA 231:46."

ARTICLE 32: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town of New London by Tax Collector's Deed, by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such manner as determined by the Board of Selectmen as justice may require, in accordance with RSA 80:80."

ARTICLE 33: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to incur debts from time to time during the 1993 fiscal year to an aggregate amount not exceeding the 1992 tax levy, for temporary loans in anticipation of 1993 taxes, and to issue notes of the Town therefore, and to refund the same, all as provided in the Municipal Finance Act; the Selectmen, and the Treasurer to be authorized to sell such notes."

ARTICLE 34: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State Grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also, to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money provided:

- 1. that such grants or other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds,
- 2. that a Public Hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt or expenditure of such grants or money,
- 3. that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitations and expenditure of Town monies, all as prescribed by RSA 31:95b."

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of New London New London, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town of New London as of and for the year ended December 31, 1991, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Assets Account Group results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of New London as of December 31, 1991, and the results of its operations (and cash flows of nonexpendable trust funds) for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town as of December 31, 1991, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON DISPATCH CENTER

Activity in the New London Communications Center for 1992 again showed a generally steady growth. Once again in 1992 we were in need of hiring a few parttime dispatchers. Training can be quite time consuming, and we are hoping that the part time employees we currently have on staff will be with us for awhile. We have changed our paperwork system somewhat as it pertains to the New London Police Department in anticipation of someday becoming a computerized dispatch center.

Changes in the dispatch center are still underway upon the installation of a new dispatch console in the fall of 1992. The console houses the radio and other pieces of dispatch equipment and will allow for a more efficient operation in the dispatcher's duties once everything is in place. We did have somewhat of a setback in getting things organized due to the dilemma we are facing with audio alarms that the communications center currently monitors. We must find a way to relocate the alarms. One proposal of a new alarm receiver fell through at the last minute and we are still researching alternatives. Once this is decided upon we should be able to put the communications center back together again, with everything in it's place.

Below you will find some year end statistics for the year 1992 as compared with 1991. Other than incoming phone calls and ambulance calls, these statistics pertain only to the Town of New London, it does not include activity handled by the dispatcher for the four other towns that we currently dispatch for.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE 1992 Information Booth Report

The New London Information Booth is supported by the Town of New London and the New London Area Chamber of Commerce and is administered by the Information Directors of the Chamber. The purpose of the booth is to provide area literature, answers to questions, directory assistance, dining and lodging information, and mercantile and recreational information to visitors, tourists, and residents of the New London Area. It is the intent of Information Booth Attendants to provide a welcoming climate to visitors together with whatever help they might require. Frequently, considerable effort is necessary to satisfy the various informational requests from visitors and citizens alike.

In 1992 the information Booth was open daily 10:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., from June 20 through Labor Day weekend and on weekends only from the third weekend of September through the three day Columbus Day weekend. A total of 3633 individuals visited the Information Booth during the 89 days of operation in 1992. This compares with 3669 visitors in 1991 and 3571 in 1990. On August first, the busiest day of the summer, 151 persons came to the Information Booth. Visitors came from 43 states and 26 foreign countries including 66 from Canada. The greatest number of visitors came from New Hampshire with the second greatest number being from Massachusetts. Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, and Florida came next in order of frequency of visitation.

In addition to serving the informational needs of visitors, a number of telephone inquiries were answered daily from the Information Booth. Booth personnel also sold tickets for events sponsored by local non-profit organizations.

In addition to operation of the Information Booth, the New London Area Chamber of Commerce, through its information directors, also answers mail requests for information and performs the same service via telephone on a seven day a week 24 hours a day basis.

REPORT FROM THE NEW LONDON COMMONS COMMITTEE

The New London Commons Committee was organized by the New London Board of Selectmen in May of 1992. The purpose was to study the use currently being made of the two Town Commons (The Ausbon Sargent Common and the "Little Common" behind the New London Information Booth) and the Mary Haddad Bandstand, and to make recommendations regarding future use. The eight member group reviewed the deed to the property, interviewed several individuals regarding Ausbon Sargent's wishes for the land he donated, interviewed over 120 townspeople, formally surveyed the New London Garden Club and New London Hospital Auxiliary memberships, spoke with private and commercial abutters and contacted other towns regarding use of their common spaces.

The unanimous conclusions of the Committee were as follows:

- The Commons are a wonderful Town resource which should be enjoyed by all citizens.
- Reasonable guidelines should be established for use of the Commons in order to protect, maintain and improve their condition; not to discourage use.
- Use should be by non-profit organizations working in the interests of the Town, and by citizens of New London.
- 4. There is no significant amount of opposition to the present use of the Commons, although the Committee's recommended guidelines addressed concerns over the amount of time that "equipment" remain on the properties.
- 5. The Committee's recommended guidelines should be used for a year, after which time the Committee should meet with the Selectmen and the Town Administration to review the effectiveness of these guidelines.

The review meeting is planned for August, 1993. Anyone who would like to review the guidelines and/or comment on use of the Town Commons should contact any member of the Common Committee before the meeting.

THE AUSBON SARGENT LAND PRESERVATION TRUST (ASLPT)

During October 1992, the ASLPT celebrated its fifth year of operation - an important milestone. Membership continues to sustain a high level of support from New London residents, property owners and businesses.

The year was filled with many highlights. The ASLPT was featured in the March/April issue of <u>Sierra</u>, a national publication of the Sierra Club. We received a \$500 donation from the New London Service Organization in recognition of Esther Currier's Third-of-a-Century Award. The Trust was selected as a finalist for the Walter J. Dunfey Awards for Excellence in Management. The New London Garden Club presented ASLPT with \$1,000 to help fund markers which will identify protected properties.

The ASLPT was proud to be part of the successful C.O.R.E. Land Plan. C.O.R.E. represented the alliance of ASLPT, the New London Conservation Commission (NLCC), the New London Outing Club and Knights Hill Nature Park to purchase 56 acres of open space along Knights Hill Road. We also continue to work closely with NLCC, providing assistance with all conservation and trail easements.

Townspeople can become more familiar with ASLPT's accomplishments by calling 526-6555 or writing to PO Box 2040, New London, NH 03257. Our printed materials include: a map of protected properties, general brochure, estate & tax planning materials, case studies and a detailed informational packet.

ASLPT accomplishes this through education, easements, grants and bequests. ASLPT promotes sensible land use, conservation and protection by cooperating with and assisting individuals and organizations who affect the land."

1992 Health Officer's Report to the Town of New London

The primary activities of your Health Officer continue to be associated with prevention and elimination of environmental health problems. During 1992 a total of 70 septic system plans were reviewed. This included 25 plans for construction of new septic systems and of these 15 were for replacement of failed systems or replacement of systems which were otherwise inadequate. Just ten plans were for new housing construction. In addition 31 plans for new lots in a development were reviewed prior to the land being offered for sale. A total of 56 sites were visited in 1992 with the observation and recording of soil characteristics in over 91 test pits. Although the new construction septic plans were the least number submitted in the last several years, the overall activity matched the five year average of 55.6 sites visited per year and an increase over the 1991 number of 40 sites visited.

Inspections of child care facilities, investigation of complaints, investigation of dog bite reports and answering citizens' inquiries constitute the remaining bulk of environmental health activities performed by your Health Officer during 1992.

In the epidemiological aspects of public health you should be aware that the Mid-Atlantic or "raccoon" strain of rabies has reached New Hampshire with a number of cases having been reported in the State this last year. This strain of rabies is especially well adapted to spreading among raccoons which can spill over into domestic animals. Cats have been particularly prone to infection from raccoons. Dogs have also been infected but dogs are more likely to be immunized against rabies as it is required for licensing. However, as a public health measure to protect humans against rabies infection, as of January 1, 1993 all cats are required by law to be immunized against rabies. Because cats are not required to be licensed, this law will be very difficult to enforce but I urge

everyone to get her/his cats immunized against rabies as soon as possible. This will protect your cat and all the people who might come in contact with a rabies infected pet.

Other areas of public health concern which should be addressed positively by citizens of New London are: to help lower the incidence of lung cancer by elimination of the inhalation of cigarette smoke both first and second hand, and by testing our houses for radon followed by remediation if necessary; helping to lower the incidence of giardiasis and intestinal tract cancer by supporting appropriate changes in our town water system (i.e. switching to a groundwater source or complete treatment of the surface water now used).

Donald C. Lamson is the Assistant Health Officer in New London and is authorized to act in my absence. I am most appreciative of his services at times when I have been out of town.

NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The New London Conservation Commission had another busy

and successful year in 1992.

We were very proud to be involved in the C.O.R.E. project, the purchase of 56 acres abutting Knight's Hill Nature Park. The Commission donated \$20,000.00 for the purchase of this land and will be the recipient of a conservation easement on the entire parcel, with about one half of the acreage being kept forever wild, guaranteeing that the forest will be there for all to enjoy in the future.

One of our big concerns has been to make sure that the quality of the water in our lakes is maintained at its present high level. We were pleased that the town's people have recognized the importance of this and passed the Shore Land Overlay District Amendment to the Zoning Ordinace last March. In conjunction with this, we have been busy working to get baseline documentation, using photographs, of all the shoreline frontage in New London. This will take some time to complete, but has been endorsed by the three major lake associations.

We have expanded our educational programming in the last year. In addition to our Winter and Spring walks, we have sponsored one program a month in conjunction with Knight's Hill Nature Park. These programs, featuring Rick Glatz, the naturalist from the park, have been well attended and well

received.

We were very proud to have been awarded a grant from the New Hampshire Forest Stewardship program to develop an interpretive trail on the Webb property. We will be working on this throughout the winter and it will be completed by early summer.

Our on going trail maintenance problem was superbly handled by Bob Nelson and his group of dedicated volunteers. Many hours of clearing brush and laying planks were put in by

a great group of people and we thank them profusely.

New London's contribution to the Greenway project also got off the ground this year thanks to much time and effort put in by Dan Allen. We now have a rough trail connecting through to Springfield and Wilmot. We want to thank Dan for a great job.

The New London Conservation Commission meets on the third Wednesday of the month, at 9:15 AM downstairs in the Town Hall. We welcome anyone who is intersted in joining us.

Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council: 1992 Report to Member Communities

Who We Are

There are nine Regional Planning Commissions in New Hampshire and 12 in Vermont. Like the others, the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission is a private, non-profit corporation enabled by state legislation. Our organization consists of the following people:

Board of Directors: Each member town is entitled to at least two members on the Board of Directors. This Board is the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission, and approves the annual work program and budget. This group meets three or four times per year.

Executive Committee: Most of the authority for overseeing day to day operations of UVLSRPC has been delegated to this Committee, made up of members of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee meets monthly.

Staff: There are five full-time and four part-time staff members. The full-time staff include four planners and a secretary/receptionist. The part time staff include a bookkeeper, map/graphics person, and two planners.

Service Standards

In our day-to-day operations, we are:

- · Objective: We have no axe to grind. We don't work for developers. We work for you.
- Flexible: What we know, we share. What we don't know, we find out. When we can't
 provide a service, we know who can.
- · Responsive: When you call, write, or drop by, we respond.
- Competent: UVLSRPC has a qualified, experienced staff, familiar with the area, the towns, the people, the issues.
- Stable: Consultants come and go we will celebrate our 30th year of service in 1993.

Where The Money Goes

On the next two pages are charts which show where our funds come from and where the money goes. Most of the money comes from four major sources: dues, the states of New Hampshire and Vermont, local technical assistance via contracts with member communities, and transportation planning. Overall, your dues support just about one-fourth of our operation. For each dollar of dues, we obtain about three dollars of additional funding which we use for services to the region.

Where the money goes is simple: people. We invest most of the money in our staff, buying brains, education, and experience. The rest pays for an office, telephones, small computers, and mapping equipment - the basics necessary for the people to do the job.

What We Do

Overall, our duties fall into two categories:

- · Provide services to member Towns
- · Address regional issues.

Services to Towns

- Questions: We spend a lot of time on the telephone, at meetings, and in our office answering
 questions about planning issues, based on our cumulative experience and expertise.
- Answers: We provide detailed answers to detailed questions. Examples include: reviewing
 an ordinance, providing a linkage to a state or federal program, reviewing a proposed
 development project, explaining how a certain aspect of planning usually works, investigating
 what is appropriate in a given situation, exploring alternative solutions for a particular
 problem.
- Information: in addition to staff expertise, we maintain a library of pertinent planning information. We are a US Census data affiliate.
- In-Depth Support: we do transportation planning, master plans, ordinances, natural resource planning, capital improvement programs, impact fee studies, opinion surveys, impact studies for large projects, and other special studies of many sorts. A number of towns also take advantage of our circuit rider planning program. Usually, we must charge in addition to dues for support in depth, to meet our expenses and break even. This type of support is available only to member communities. We do not do any work for private companies or individuals. These services are available at far less cost than comparable expertise from a private consulting firm.

Regional Issues

 We also provide a forum for regional issues. Currently we are working regionally on transportation planning, economic development, solid waste, energy, and studies related to Lake Sunapee and the Connecticut River. We are almost always able to support these efforts with state funds and/or special grants.

Additional Areas of Special Expertise

- Transportation Planning Regional transportation planning is at the top of the list of
 regional concerns and priorities. We prepared a Regional Transportation Plan during 1992.
 We are working with member towns, the New Hampshire Department of Transportation, and
 the Vermont Agency of Transportation to assure that local and regional concerns are heard
 and addressed.
- GIS Geographic Information Systems We work with a number of member towns to
 provide maps and analyses for Master Plans, utilities, and special land evaluation studies.
- · Environmental Planning Includes solid waste and water quality planning.
- Land Preservation Support and cooperation with area land preservation efforts.

UVLSRPC Activities During 1992

Changed our name from Council to Regional Planning Commission, to help clarify exactly who we are and what we do.

Provided consultation and help to over two-thirds of member communities. (Which two-thirds this is varies - not all communities request help every year.)

Met repeatedly with state officials and agency representatives to influence policy and help keep the region an active participant in many ongoing programs. This included activity with transportation, solid waste, economic development, and environmental regulatory agencies in both New Hampshire and Vermont.

Maintained a library of regional data, and answered numerous requests for information, including detailed results of the 1990 US Census.

Used the Geographical Information System (GIS) to perform mapping and analyses for a number of member towns.

Worked with the Greater Upper Valley Solid Waste Management District, for Vermont member towns, in finding an appropriate regional site for a landfill. This site is now undergoing hydrogeologic testing.

Assisted the Upper Valley Solid Waste District (on the New Hampshire side) in dealing with solid waste issues. Provided general staff support for the District.

Helped facilitate a bi-state cooperative solid waste disposal agreement between Lebanon, Hartford, and surrounding towns. This agreement is being reviewed by affected towns.

Continued to provide administrative support for the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Collection program.

Worked in cooperation with the Sullivan County Economic Development Commission. Participated in preparation of an Overall Economic Development Plan for Sullivan County, a major step towards obtaining Federal Economic Development Authority funds for member towns in Sullivan County.

Sponsored local sessions of the NH Municipal Law Lecture series.

Administered several Community Development Block Grants. These grants brought several million dollars worth of rehabilitation and municipal improvement funds into the region between 1985 and 1992.

Used the Regional Transportation Coordinating Committee to develop regional policies and recommendations for the Regional Transportation Plan.

Provided technical assistance to Advance Transit.

Completed revisions to our Regional Plan, as required by law.

Complied with applicable Vermont Act 200 requirements at the local, regional, and state level, including participation in the Council of Regional Commissions.

Participated in the Vermont Act 250 environmental review process for a number of regionally significant projects.

Sponsored local planning board training sessions in both New Hampshire and Vermont.

Continued working with the communities around Lake Sunapee to develop a watershed management study.

Worked closely with the Upper Valley Land Trust, Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, and the Trust for New Hampshire Lands to protect open space and conserve important parcels of land.

Continued to participate in and work with the Connecticut River Valley Resource Commission. This commission allows New Hampshire towns in the Connecticut River Valley to join together in addressing issues such as growth, development, and preservation of the natural environment. We coordinated a joint inventory of river-related features among the Vermont Regional Planning Commissions bordering the River.

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission also provides specific services to communities on a contract basis. During 1992, as requested by member communities, we:

- conducted impact studies regarding proposed development,
- · provided assistance with Master Plans,
- · worked on amendments/updates to local ordinances and regulations,
- · drafted new ordinances.
- supplied regularly scheduled "circuit rider" planning services, and
- · provided general mapping, drafting, and other technical assistance.

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission looks forward to serving your community during the coming year. Please feel free to contact us for more information about specific activities in your community, or whenever we can be of assistance.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The New London Planning Board held eighteen regular business meetings and one work session during 1992. Over the past year, the Planning Board conducted public hearings and approved the following applications:

- * One Major Subdivision/Cluster Development consisting of nine lots;
- * Five Minor Subdivisions totaling eleven lots;
- * Three Site Plan Reviews for Home Occupations:
- * One Site Plan Review for Commercial Use;
- * One Site Plan Review for Residential Use:
- * One Driveway Permit Waiver.

Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance were developed by the Planning Board, reviewed at public hearings and presented to voters on the ballot at the Town Meeting.

The annual update of the Capital Improvements Program covering the 1993 through 2002 period was approved by the Planning Board following review and recommendations by the Capital Improvement Program Committee.

The Planning Board would like to thank those citizens who took the time and made the effort to provide the Planning Board with their input during the past year. As always, the Planning Board welcomes comments and feedback from any and all parties in the community as the Planning Board tries to manage the future land use growth and development of New London.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON FIRE DEPARTMENT

At noon, on Wednesday December 16, 1992 the new Ladder/Pumper arrived at the fire station. Immediately, personnel began loading supply hose, attack hose, water, breathing apparatus, tools and equipment onto the truck. As we were saying good-bye to the salesperson at 5:00 PM, all of our pagers went off in unison - talk about timing. As it turned out, it was just a car fire, but boy were we ready!

Whenever plans, hopes and dreams finally come to fruition, they seldom measure up quite like you had imagined. In this case, our new truck exceeds every standard we had established or expected. Although it appears large, it actually maneuvers better than our other pumper and is incredibly simple and safe to operate. In addition, it has been nice to be able to hold a meeting or practice in the station during the winter months without having to move a truck outside (like having an instant addition to the station).

We will be having an open house at the fire station on the last weekend in February, so you can inspect the new truck and meet your next Fire Chief. There will be food and refreshments, and stuff for the kids. Weather permitting, we will demonstrate operations with the new truck outside.

Over the last year, we have had a marked increase in the number of electrical fires, most of which could be attributed to poor quality wiring and carelessness. If you have wiring done in your home or business, be sure you use a licensed electrician. If you do your own wiring, use reference material that will show you how to wire to code and avoid dangerous mistakes, and then have your work inspected by a licensed electrician. In addition, wiring that is visible in your attic, basement, or garage should never be used to support the weight of any object, such as hanging clothes, tools or bicycles. This could result in a short circuit and fire.

This is my sixth and final year as Fire Chief. The individual planning to succeed me, currently holding the rank of Captain, is

very well trained, experienced, frugal, and conservative. With your support and encouragement, the New London Fire Department will continue to serve you as it has in the past.

Director Report of Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

1992 was below average for wildfires reported in our state. Our largest fire was in May in Rumney where a suspicious origin fire burned approximately 150 acres with a total cost of approximately \$30,000. The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted many other communities in wildland fire suppression as well.

Our fire lookout towers reported 289 fires, burning a total of 136 acres. Our major causes of fires were fires kindled without a permit, unknown causes and children.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done." Violation of this statute is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are liable for all fire suppression costs.

Local fire departments are responsible for suppressing fires. The small average fire size of .47 acre/fire is a tribute to early detection by the public or our fire tower system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments. Please help your Warden and fire department by requesting and obtaining a fire permit before kindling an open fire.

The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted 28 towns with a total fo \$20,000 in 50/50 cost share grants for fire fighter safety items and wildland suppression equipment in 1992.

1992 REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

In 1992 we continued to change, update and streamline our operations. The Staff of every division continually comes up with ideas, cost savings and problem solving in connection with job productivity.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of New London for the opportunity to serve New London in an official capacity. Further, I would like to thank everyone who provided ideas and assistance during the year.

As in the past, we invite you to stop and become familiar with our operation anytime. Any questions, comments or concerns are always welcome.

CEMETERY DIVISION

The Cemetery Division continued maintenance of Old Main Street, Elkins and West Part Cemeteries, as well as the maintenance of Bucklin and Elkins Beaches and Town Parks.

During the Spring of 1992, installation of Veteran stones continued in all cemeteries.

1992 brought the beginning of landscaping in problem areas. This work consisted of replacing loan and grass seeding. We seem to be experiencing success and will continue until all areas have been repaired.

HIGHWAY DIVISION

For the New London Highway Department, 1992 was another busy year. Because of the unique weather of January, February and March, the highway department battled ice in ditches and frozen culverts in many areas of New London.

Spring, Summer and Fall found us devoting some time to ditches and culverts that presented major drainage problems.

The paving program was continued this year. Road preparation of drainage repair and rock digging began on intended roads. The end of 1992 added Old Main and Pearl Streets, County, Barrett, Hayes, Tracy, and Page Roads, Balsam and Job Seamans Acres to the list of completed roads under the paving program.

Major repair to Bog Road also began. The first 8/10 of a mile from Old Main Street intersection to just beyond the intersection of Forest Acres Road was ground in place, graded and rolled. Gravel was added near Messer pond and crushed glass from the Recycling Program was used in place of gravel to build up the road an level dips. The entire 8/10 of a mile was paved with a 2" base course of asphalt. Plans for 1993 include tree removal and shoulder work on this section and begin work on another portion of the road. Anticipated completion time for this project is 2 to 3 years.

To keep gravel roads in better shape, more time was spent grading. Calcium applications continue to help control dust. Pine Hill Road has experienced problems with soft areas and extensive potholes. The road was dug up in the soft sections and Geotextile was installed to help stabilize the road base. Crushed gravel was applied, the road was then graded and compacted. The crown and shoulders were redefined and a top course of 3/4" crushed manufactured gravel was placed and compacted. If this procedure is effective, we will target other problem roads.

Lamson Lane also experienced some icing problems this year. Brush was cut, banks were removed and ditching was done to help control the icing.

During the winter of 1992 the Highway Division designed and assembled the new refuse containers that were placed on the Town Commons and Beaches this summer.

RECYCLING DIVISION

The Recycling Department continued to be very successful and effective during the past year. A new baler was installed which enabled us to make larger bales of cardboard and to begin baling newspaper which we were unable to do previously. Paper Tech in Hopkinton, New Hampshire is purchasing the newspaper and cardboard. Recycled products produced by this company are on display in Recycling Building at the Transfer Station. A loading dock and door were installed on the back of the building to make final disposal of cardboard and paper more efficient.

As noted in the Highway Report, our own crushed glass was used in place of gravel on the rebuilt section of Bog Road.

Finally, in closing, I want to thank the Staff of Highway, Recycling and Cemeteries for their commitment to jobs well done.

NH/VT SOLID WASTE PROJECT

1992 ANNUAL REPORT OF ACTIVITIES

1992 has proven to be another challenging year for the Solid Waste Project, but some promising and positive trends and events have occurred which could result in more stability for future operations and costs.

The continued shortfall of trash, about 41,000 tons verses the 47,5000 that is guaranteed, still keeps our unit cost for disposal very high. The depressed economy, recycling, and diversion of waste are the continuing causes for the shortfall.

Several approaches are being pursued to help solve this problem:

- 1. A new contract with Wheelabrator, which would reduce the annual trash level commitment, provide up to a 40% recycling credit against the new GAT, and proportionate the division of expenses according to use. The draft contract is currently being reviewed by the Project attorney and a Special Project Subcommittee. It is expected to be in the hands of all the Representatives and Town Boards in January.
- Under consideration is a program to attract new towns by offering short-term pricing concessions to compete in the current spot tonnage market.
- 3. Cutting costs in the operation of the landfill. This has been achieved by a reduction in leachate disposal costs and operating the landfill with our own employee, as opposed to an expensive outside contractor.

A long protracted law suit filed against the Project to collect cost overruns on the original building of the ash landfill in the amount of \$1,100,000.00 was settled in 1992. The final settlement was for \$615,000.00. Unfortunately, when we add legal and technical witness costs, the total expenditure to the Project was \$1.465,000.00.

This year we had to expand the capacity of the ash landfill. Because of a rong permitting process, aggravated by a series of suits filed by a hand full of people opposed to the Project, we faced a dilemma of getting the project built in this year's construction season. The expense of not doing this would have cost the member towns a million dollars in excess ash disposal fees.

The contract was awarded to Mirra Construction Company with Nobis Engineering as our engineer. The expansion project is substantially complete and it is ON TIME and UNDER BUDGET!

The five year bond issue to finance this construction and the cost overruns incurred during the first stage was voted upon in both Districts. In Vermont, the bonding was passed by a strong margin and in New Hampshire, the required two third's vote of support was met to approve the bonding. This was accomplished due to a series of public meetings and the support of the Districts' Representatives, and in spite of an injunction to block the awarding of the contract for the construction of Stage II. The Project went to court and the injunction was ruled to be without merit.

This year also saw a dramatic turnover in staff at the Project office. Project Director John Cook, Recycling Planner Carl Hirth, Business Manager Kimberly Allen, and Administrative Assistant Dodi Carr all resigned from their positions for various reasons. The new personnel include Allen Dusault, Project Director; Judy Haber, Business Manager; Char Fontaine, Office Coordinator, and Paula Pietroniro, Administrative Assistant.

Although the challenges will continue because it seems to be the nature of the business, 1993 should see a continuation of the positive trend in terms of cost reductions and general operations. Including the costs of the new bond issue, the 1993 budget, adopted by the Joint Committee, is up less than 2%. During the Public hearings we projected a new tipping fee of \$98.00 per ton. The actual tipping fee for 1993 will be \$96.50. A new contract with Wheelabrator could reduce this by \$10.00 to \$12.00.

Mr. David Boyer, a consultant from Environmental Collaborative, is currently completing the Solid Waste Management Plan for the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties Solid Waste Management District (SW/WCSWMD). Initiated by Carl Hirth, this plan is to be submitted to the Vermont Agency of Natural Resources by January 1, 1993 for the purposes of Planning Grant Activities. The plan includes an overview of the current solid waste situation in the SW/WCSWMD, strategies for waste reduction, and management and its implementation of unregulated hazardous and special wastes.

REPORT FROM THE NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB

The New London Garden Club has 125 Active Members, 28 Associate Members, 8 Honorary Members and at this time 14 prospective members on the waiting list.

In the past year there were nine instructive programs including "Gardening with Wild Flowers", "Propagation of House Plants", "Bring Back the Bluebirds", "Designing a Basic Flower Garden and Border", "Annuals and Perennials", "Lilacs for All Uses", "Celias Garden on the Isle of Shoals", "Bonsai Trees", and "Gardening Ideas for Small Spaces".

Special projects were the Annual Antique Show and Sale, Civic Beautification (care of 17 gardens and landscaping the Town Hall), Christmas Decorations for Public Buildings, Christmas Remembrances for Shut-Ins, Hospital Day Flower Booth, Scholarships to the University of NH and Community Conservation Camps, Volunteer Care of Flowers and Plants at New London Hospital and Clough Extended Care, Birthday Party for Extended Care Patients, and the purchase of new Gardening Books for Tracy Memorial Library.

Added to the above activities were two garden tours, a field trip to the Concord (MA) Antiquarian Society, the Annual Garden Club Luncheon and Decorating Tracy Memorial Library for the Annual Garden Club Christmas Party.

Members of the Garden Club are to be commended for helping to make the Town of New London so beautiful through their Civic Gardening, Civic Beautification Contest and Decorating Public Buildings for the Holiday Season. And, we want to thank all of the officials and empoyees of the Town for helping us make many of our projects possible

HISTORY AND ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

During 1992, one more volunteer was added to the archives staff. Arrolyn Hayes Vernon is a great addition with knowledge and expertise. Hope Howard and Barbara Stearnes continue to be of great help.

Oral history taping and transcribing continued with six new tapes being made in 1992, making a total of 181 oral history tapes and transcriptions in the archives. Thank you to all involved.

The Anthony Colby portrait is in excellent condition after the refurbishing job done by Nicholas Issak, a professional restorer. Research for the history of the portrait is underway and will be kept with the portrait.

All mail requests have been researched and responded to. A number of people have found their way to the archives to do their own research - some for articles and academic papers and others for genealogy research.

Accessions for the archives continue with a display of snow photographs taken of New London, several Colby Academy yearbooks and photographs, Kings Daughters material and old hymnals and also the early town conservation records, including maps (which is listed as the Esther Currier Collection). Check lists and a registered voter ledger are also new in the archives.

Period photographs were copied to enhance the decor at Baynhams.

If you are interested in writing the history of your house, we are interested too! We would like a copy of it for the House Project. Two house histories have been given during the year and several more are being worked on If you have questions, feel free to contact us.

The archives has supplied the Information Booth with historical booklets and copies of $\underline{\text{Mirror To America}}$. These all may be purchased at the Town Hall.

Many old tax maps have been sent (and more to go) to be reduced in size. They will then be manageable in a $11" \times 17"$ notebook and give more needed space to use in the archives.

An interesting and valuable presentation of microfilming records was given by New England Micrographics, Inc. Available space will be at a premium in time and microfilming could help in solving this problem. It would also be useful for security purposes.

A new dehumidifier was purchased. This is a necessary item as proper humidity must be maintained for an archival environment.

I attended a workshop in Concord, Basic Record Keeping for Archives, given by the New Hampshire Historical Society. I also attended a two day Genealogical Conference in Sturbridge sponsored by the New England Historical Genealogical Society.

Members of the History and Archives Committee are made aware at monthly meetings of happenings in the archives as well as partaking in committee projects such as the sign and plaque problem at the Harvey dam site.

I urge people to think twice before discarding items pertaining to New London or New London residents - even in the smallest way such as a letter. These small items are a vital part in making a complete picture of the town. When in doubt, please ask us. Nothing is too small nor unimportant.

Recreation Commission

The Recreation Commission oversees the operations and the waterfront programs at the Elkins Beach on Pleasant Lake and Bucklin Beach on Little Lake Sunapee.

The 1992 season saw a change in swim lesson format with lessons being offered in the morning at Elkins beach and then in the afternoon at Bucklin Beach. This flexible scheduled gave many more children an opportunity to become involved with our Red Cross swimming programs and we look to continue this format again this summer. Sign-ups for swim lessons were held together with the Outing Club Tennis lesson sign-ups providing a coordinated effort for local parents and we will try to do this again in the future.

The beaches were guarded weekends only beginning with Memorial Day and opened full time once schools closed in mid-June. Guard hours were extended to 5 PM from the 4 PM end of coverage in previous years. Morning beach openings were pushed back to 9:30 AM to accommodate this change. Beaches were open 7 days a week through the summer until Labor Day.

We put another large float into service at Bucklin Beach this year and hope to have swim lanes and a competitive swim program for children organized for this year. We are also trying to expand our program offerings to teenagers and will promote an adult evening beach volleyball drop-in league this summer.

We are truly appreciative of the fine job Nancy Brook has done in keeping our waterfronts safe, well run and fun places to be during the summer. We also had great cooperation from Richard Lee and the Public Works crew with recycling, new signs and beach maintenance. As always your continued support, comments and suggestions are always welcome at any of our monthly meetings or in writing through the Selectman's office.

NEW LONDON SEWER COMMISSION REPORT 1992

The New London Sewer Department had a very productive and successful year. The interdepartmental cooperation, between many different town departments, assisted in this success. We would like to take this time to say thank you to: Richard Lee and the Highway Department; Richard LaPorte and the Water Department; the New London Police Department and Dispatchers; the New London Fire Department; and the staff at the Town Offices. Also a special thanks to Tony Bergeron and the Sunapee Highway Department for their assistance on the Job Creeks project.

The Commission is committed to an ongoing improvement of the preventative maintenance program. This year more maintenance was accomplished. Work was done on: all emergency backup equipment; pumps in all stations, specifically resurfacing of impellers and seal water modifications; updating of electrical panels and control systems; and an improvement in safety standards. This June saw the installation of a Townline metering vault. The vault enables access to improved metering and recording devises. This establishes for the Town a very critical monitoring point in our System prior to entry into the Town of Sunapee.

The Commission continues to meet with the subcommittee from the Sunapee Commission on a regular basis for the purpose of reviewing and updating the Intermunicipal Agreement between the two Towns. This is a very time consuming project and a special thanks to all involved.

Through the efforts of our new Administrative Assistant, April Whittaker, and with the cooperation and assistance of our Road Agent, Richard Lee, much has been accomplished in our cemeteries.

In the spring it was agreed to fill and grade all existing gravesites and to returf the graves from past years. In view of unpredictable weather and unavailability of water it is a very difficult task to grow grass in our cemeteries. The application of new sod on recent graves will greatly assist in the overall appearance of all cemeteries.

The Old Main Street Cemetery fences were replaced or repaired and new or repaired gates were attached and made in good working order. In 1993 it is planned to scrape and paint the fences. The Elkins Cemetery fence is also scheduled to be repaired or replaced in 1993.

Several trees and shrubs have been removed, particularly those that border or infringe on abutting lots. Through the direction and guidance of our tree warden, Robert Fraley, several new trees have been planted with the anticipation of more selected plantings for 1993.

The perimeter of Old Main Street has received clean up activity and the roads are expected to have attention this year.

In 1992 we had 28 interments in all cemeteries.

The fruition of a long time commission dream has come to pass in 1992. All old and broken monuments in all cemeteries have either received new foundations or have been uprighted to give a picture of care. It is with pride and a true sense of community spirit that we can all walk through our cemeteries and view the last resting place of our friends and loved ones as was intended by our forefathers.

REPORT OF TREE WARDEN

In the year 1992 the Town spent \$4580.00 pruning, fertilizing and cabling trees mostly along Main Street and around the library.

The Town also spent \$3064.90 planting new trees along Main Street, Tracy Road and the Transfer Station as well as both West Part and Old Main Street Cemeteries.

We were fortunate to receive gifts for tree planting totalling \$1000.00. These monies came as memorials or from commercial sources in recognition of the Town's effort to provide a significant tree care program.

The Town also received ten Flowering Crabapples from the State Urban Forestry Service in an experimental controlled planting demonstration. These trees will be distributed throughout the community as they mature.

Also the Town enjoyed receiving Tree City USA award for the sixth consecutive year.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY 1992 Annual Report

Tracy Memorial Library continues to charm the citizens of New London and the surrounding environs, providing not only efficient and friendly library services in a lovely building, but offering space for public meetings and stimulating programs. "Book Browsers," a series in which four widely divergent books were discussed, was well attended and enthusiastically received. A brilliant series of lectures on Islam, sponsored by the Friends of the Library, was enjoyed by over seventy-five adults per session. "Philosophical Discussions for Older People, "lecture/discussion seminars funded by the New Hampshire Humanities Council, was also well attended, and the Great Decisions foreign policy discussion program, expanded into three groups, was once again a success.

The Meeting Room was used by 39 different groups for a total of 271 times. This number does not include any of the children's programs, such as the always spectacular Christmas puppet show, Tomie dePaola's visit, the preschool story-hours, the after-school and the summer reading programs. The Library staff also used the room for various functions, including a beautiful reception for all the elementary and middle school teachers in New London and the annual party to honor the volunteers, who are a most valuable asset and absolutely necessary to the successful operation of the Library.

In honor of the late Emerson Greenaway, the "Dean of Librarians," internationally honored and respected, and a devoted supporter of Tracy Library, the Board of Trustees and the Friends of the Library launched the Emerson Greenaway Project to raise \$30,000 to automate the Library.

A look at the statistics for the Library in 1992 makes it imperative that we computerize. Our circulation increased from 72,447 in 1991 to 83,765 in 1992 (circulation in 1970 was 13,625). The Library registered 606 new borrowers. In addition, 130 temporary cards were issued to short-term borrowers, such as summer visitors and Colby-Sawyer students. New acquisitions numbered 1556 for books and 75 for non-print items such as audio-books, compact discs and video cassettes.

As always, without the generous support of the Town and of all our patrons we could not function, and we are indeed most grateful.

During the year, Elizabeth Jones, Auxiliary member and Director of Volunteers, coordinates the in-hospital activities of the many volunteers who are so generous with their time. These volunteers assist where needed, doing those many tasks that help make things run more smoothly.

There are flowers and plants that always look fresh in patient's rooms and throughout the hospital. Under the direction of Doris Stevens, this task is accomplished by Garden Club Auxilians.

Mary Wachter and Leni Gillespie chair the group of Auxilians who work at least once a year on a Red Cross Bloodmobile Drive.

The Auxiliary is an active, viable organization that is dedicated to the well being of our hospital. Yet, without the wonderful support and generosity of the community, our efforts would be meaningless. For this we are most grateful. THANK YOU.

Meetings are held the first Wednesday of each month from October through June beginning at 9:30 am in Cleveland Hall of the First Baptist Church. They include a work session,, business meeting and informational program and are open to everyone.

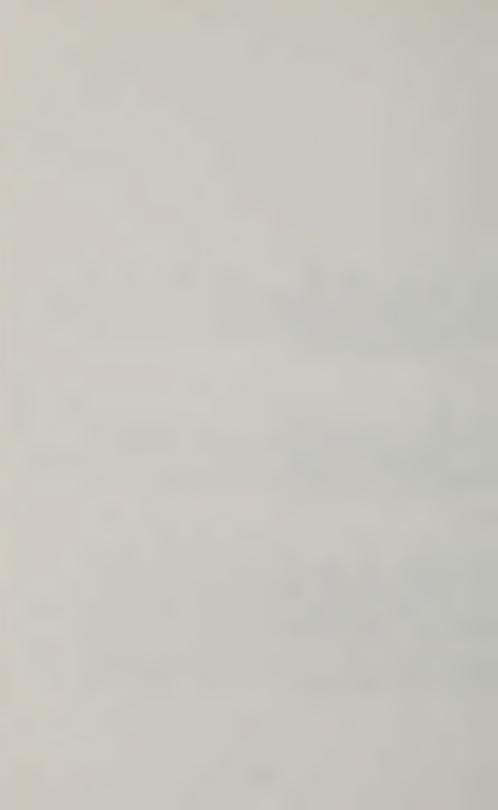

ANNUAL REPORT for the year ending 31 DECEMBER 1992

Founded 1925

Providing water service to customers in the Towns of New London and Springfield

The Annual Meeting of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct in March of 1992 saw the election of Kenneth R. Jacques as Water Commissioner for a three year term. Voters also approved to change the purpose (in name) of the existing Water Storage Tank Capital Reserve Fund to the Safe Drinking Water Act Compliance Capital Reserve Fund. This change broadens the scope for the usage of the Fund to cover any measures necessary to meet compliance standards. With this, voters approved \$255,000 (two hundred and fifty-five thousand dollars) to be added to the already existing and newly named fund. (\$55,000 from the General Fund surplus and \$200,000 raised by taxes)

New installation applications continued at the same slow pace as in the past two years. The revised version of the Rules and Regulations and Rates for the Precinct have been printed and are available at the Precinct office. The Precinct personnel did have to deal with two separate instances of vandalism at the Morgan Pond dam early this summer. Retention boards at the dam were removed or displaced, allowing for large quantities of water to be wasted. Due to a quick response, we were able to avoid a potentially serious problem. The system to retain water at the dam site has been repaired and redesigned to be tamper resistant.

Effective January 1, 1993 the Phase II Rule for water sampling per the Safe Drinking Water Act expands. The rule establishes Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCL's) and monitoring requirements for seventeen pesticides (twelve new and five revised), eight organic contaminants and PCB's. The rule also establishes treatment technique requirements for two contaminants and deletes the MCL for silver. Community water systems will be required to monitor for nitrates and nitrites. The estimated cost for each source is approximately \$5,000, as reflected in the budget for 1993, though the Commissioners are investigating the possibility of utilizing existing data to avoid some of the sampling requirements.

The Commissioners, after the informational meeting on January 29, 1992, pursued negotiations with the owners of Colby Point regarding the location of a well field on that property. This included a meeting with the Precinct Engineers (Dufresne/Henry), along with site visits to view the operations of existing wells and pumping facilities. These locations on a lake shore and a river bank were in Milton and Wilton, New Hampshire respectively.

Though the Engineer and Commissioners did not consider a waiver for avoidance or an exemption viable options for the Precinct, each was reviewed at length due to voter concern at the last Annual Meeting. Dufresne/Henry prepared a Filtration Avoidance Addendum to the Report on the Water Supply Alternative Study. A notice of intent to file for avoidance was submitted to the Department of Environmental Services. Raw water quality sample results and discussions with the State regarding Avoidance indicated the inability of the system to meet basic waiver requirements.

Field truthing of the Fracture Trace Study for supplemental water to the Morgan Pond source was completed in late Spring. No conclusions could be drawn regarding the availability, quantity or quality of water in the area around the reservoirs. Pursuing this further would involve high exploratory costs with no guaranteed positive results.

On October 26, 1992, the Precinct engineer, Dufresne/Henry formally requested a two year exemption for meeting the June 29, 1993 deadline for compliance with the Surface Water Treatment Rule: As of this writing the request is being reviewed by the State and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Progress towards compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act has been slow and tedious, but has moved forward. The Department of Environmental Services for the State of New Hampshire realizes that this Precinct will soon render a major decision, how to provide safe and clean drinking water to the towns of New London and Springfield (served by the Precinct), while complying with all Federal requirements. The Commissioners believe that they and the Precinct Engineer, along with all parties involved, have rationally evaluated and pursued available options in the best interest of the Precinct to this point in time. The Commissioners request that all registered voters please attend the Annual, and any subsequent meetings, so that they may reach a well informed, educated decision on the issues before us.

Gentlemen:

I have reviewed the accompanying balance sheet of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct as of December 31, 1992 and 1991, and the related statements of revenue and expenditures and cash flows for the years then ended, in accordance with standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All information in these financial statements is the representation of the management of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct.

A review consists principally of inquiries of Precinct personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an audit in accordance with generally-accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, I do not express such an opinion.

As described in Note 1, the financial statements referred to above do not provide for depreciation of equipment and facility assets, which should be included to conform with generally-accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded is not known, and cannot be determined objectively.

Based on my review, except for the omission of depreciation as explained in the above paragraph, I am not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with generally-accepted accounting principles.

The income accounts of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct are maintained on a cash basis, recording income as it is collected. The income accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year-end by recognizing and recording changes in accounts receivable.

Expense accounts record items only when cash is disbursed. The expense accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year-end by recognizing and recording changes in accounts payable.

The inventory of supplies is priced at cost. Based on a physical inventory taken once a year at year-end, the increase (or decrease) in the inventory value decreases (or increases) the supplies expense. The policy of the Precinct is to maintain a uniform level of supplies inventory for Precinct use in its operations.

Purchased facilities and equipment are recorded at cost; gifts and contributions of water facilities are recorded at fair market value at the time received. The Precinct does not make provision for depreciation expense, as required by generally-accepted accounting principles.

Assets abandoned or disposed of are written off at cost against the appropriate asset account, and the Plant and Equipment Fund balance is reduced accordingly.

The accounts of the Precinct are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are presented with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. The Precinct has three funds:

Operating Fund, the general operating fund of the Town. All receipts and tax revenues that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures and capital improvement costs that are not paid by other funds.

Plant and Equipment Fund, in which additions and disposals of equipment and facilities are accounted for. As noted above, the Precinct does not record depreciation of these fixed assets as required by generally-accepted accounting principles.

Capital Reserve Fund, a fiduciary-type fund, for which the Town of New London's Trustees of Trust Funds are the trustees. Additions to the Capital Reserve Fund are designated and authorized by Precinct voters at the Annual Meeting; similarly, withdrawal and use of the funds are authorized by Precinct voters at the Annual Meeting.

Total fund balances comprise two parts, appropriated and unappropriated. The appropriated balance represents the unexpended portion of current and prior-year appropriations which, in the judgment of Precinct Management, will be expended in future years. The unappropriated balance is the unencumbered balance of the fund.

Note 2 - Capital Reserve Funds

At the Precinct Meeting on March 17, 1992, the voters approved (by a 2/3 vote) a change in the purpose of the Water Storage Tank Capital Reserve Fund to the Safe Drinking Water Act Compliance Capital Reserve Fund. This is the sole Capital Reserve Fund of the Precinct.
