(TOWN WARRANT) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town offairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the eighth of March next, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a selectman for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To choose a selectman for the ensuing three years.

Article 5. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Article 6. 'To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid and permanent improvement of highways in accordance with an act of legislature of 1905.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for state aid maintenance.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for trunk line maintenance.

Article 11. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the support of the fire department.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund to pay for the water bonds at maturity.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 22. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 23. To bring in your votes for the election of delegates-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, alternate district delegates, to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Troy School Board :

I submit herewith my fourteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools, this being the thirty-second in the series under union supervision.

The enrollment of the Troy schools for the fall term of 1931 was 247, the smallest for many years. The high school enrollment shows an increase over last year, being 39 this year where it was 37 last year.

The table submitted below may be of interest in showing the enrollment of the high school, elementary grades, and total registration for all schools since 1920.

This table shows that the high school grades enroll three times as many pupils as the same grades did in 1920-21, although the total enrollment is eighty-five less than that year. The total registration for all schools reached its highest point in the two years 1925-26 and 1926-27, of 355, but since 1927 there has been a steady decrease.

Two changes in the teaching force occurred at the opening of the present school year. Miss Charlotte Woodbury gave up her position as teacher of the sixth grade in the primary building to return to New York where she had previously taught, and Miss Runnells was released from her position in the fifth grade as she was married during the summer vacation.

Miss Hope M. Rosell of Concord, a graduate of the three year course at Keene Normal school was chosen to succeed Miss Woodbury, and Miss Esther M. Boyden of Troy, also a Keene graduate, with two years of teaching experience was selected for the fifth grade.

Miss Harris has been carrying on her work as school nurse in a very satisfactory manner. The pupils in all the schools are having the benefit of effective follow-up work.

I feel that Troy is fortunate in being able to retain Mrs. Whitcomb as supervisor of music. The work in this department is of lasting benefit, and is thoroughly appreciated by practically all the pupils.

Teacher changes in Troy have been few during the past several years, and I think the public is sometimes inclined to forget the sustained and loyal work done by these teachers in our schools year after year. Perhaps more frequent visits on the part of the parents would give them a clearer idea of just what this work means.

In making up your school budget for the next school year. I realize that the school board has given careful consideration to the financial situation existing at the present time, and have tried to lower the amount that the tax payers must raise without reducing the efficiency of the schools, and without losing any of the State aid to which the school district is entitled. Troy has been able, since State aid was first available in its present form in 1919, to secure a considerable amount each year because the school district has been able to meet the conditions under which State aid is granted. Since 1921 the maximum allotment to any school district has been \$6,000. The following table shows the amount which Troy School District has received since 1919.

The amounts shown above for the past thirteen years might easily have been considerably less if the school had been less carefully administered.

The important question that has been considered in making the budget for the coming year has been how to reduce the total amount to be raised by taxation in Troy without losing State aid which the school district should have.

During the present school year Troy, with the other towns in the 28th supervisory union, has arranged to have the schools in session a full school year of 180 school days. The effect of this ruling is that our teachers will teach thirty-seven weeks at the same salary for which they formerly taught thirty-six weeks. This, together with the smaller salary paid the two new teachers has already reduced the monthly pay-roll over \$104.00 as shown in the statistical table.

At this time I desire to thank the school board, teachers, pupils, and all interested parents and citizens for their cooperation during the past year.
