You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To bring in your votes for

Town Clerk.

One Selectman for three years.

One Selectman for one year.

Tax Collector.

Town Treasurer.

Highway Agent.

One Library trustee for three years.

One Cemetery trustee for three years.

One Cemetery trustee for one year.

One Trust-fund trustee for three years.

Three Auditors.

At 12:30 o'clock p. m., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Third. To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes for the year 1923.

Fourth. To raise money to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the repair of highways and appropriate the same.

Sixth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the trunk line road.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate, and set apart an additional sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount required by section 4, chapter 35, laws of 1905, relating to State highways.

Eighth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the State aid road.

Ninth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of bridges in town.

Tenth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for permanent improvement on the Deerneck road, north of Deerneck bridge, providing a like amount be furnished by W. M. Parker.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for the proper observance of Memorial day and choose a committee to expend the same.

Twelfth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the income of the H. B. Burnham fund being expended for library or school benefit.

Thirteenth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the control of the White-pine Blister Rust.

## **Report of Superintendent of Schools.**

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*To the Auburn School Board:*

Herewith I have the honor of presenting my second annual school report.

Some progress has been made in the purchase of more text-books, and a little material for seat work for the lower grades.

At the end of the fall term I asked your teachers to hand in to me a report of the amount of work done in the various grades. Among other things, I find that your schools fall short in the amount of reading. One reason for this deficiency is the lack of sufficient readers, and also of supplementary reading material. Every child should have the privilege of an individual copy of all the texts used in his grade, without being obliged to share his book with someone else. Your schools need maps, more dictionaries, reference books, and a good selection of books for children to read during their spare moments. Give a child interesting reading, and plenty of it, and no worry will be necessary about his acquiring the art of reading. Once kindle his interest, and his ambition will burst forth into a glorious flame.

Auburn is fortunate in having retained the services of two of last year's teachers, and also in the new teachers hired for this year. All your teachers are high school graduates, with further training either at Normal school or College.

The teachers have at various times this year, perhaps to a greater extent than in the past, given socials, including programs for the evening. The citizens of the various parts of Auburn have been invited. These functions have

helped much in bringing the schools before the attention of the public, and in establishing a feeling of common interest for the schools. It is gratifying to think that the teachers find happiness in their work, and that the "suit-case" teacher is disappearing from the market to give place to the ones who stay the year round, and make their influence felt in the community.

Something should be done soon, next summer if possible, to remedy the cross-lights in the various schools. Your children's eyes are too important to allow them to be injured by a bad lighting system. The stoves in the different schools should be jacketed, and a simple system should be devised to let in fresh air, and let out the foul, without having to open the windows. Considering the number of victims caused by the "white plague," no school should exist without this provision. The expenses involved will be small, and the returns great.

Auburn has one schoolhouse of which you may be proud. I refer to the new school at the Lake district. Every citizen of Auburn ought to make it his duty to visit that school, and judge for himself the difference between that one and the others. Why not stop cutting the dog's tail a little at a time, and with a mighty effort build a similar school in the village, to which the children may be carried, and enjoy the privilege of being under one roof, in a modern, sanitary, well-lighted building?

School Number Seven ought to be closed, and the children carried to the school at the Lake district. It is cheaper in the long run to erect one good school building than to keep raising money every year repairing buildings which have had their day. The most progressive communities talk and carry out consolidation. Sooner or later it must come. Why not let Auburn be among the first?

The people of the Lake district still continue the Parent-Teacher Association organized last year. They are doing much for their school in the way of entertainments,

giving valuable and useful gifts, furnishing prizes for scholarship, improving the school grounds, and so forth. If these things are worth doing at the Lake district, why not do the same in the village?

One of the things which has ever stimulated and raised scholarship is the giving of prizes for excellence in specific subjects, and for scholarship. The Auburn people would be doing a great deal to promote excellence in school work, by giving money to establish a fund for this purpose, or perhaps make small private gifts of money every year to secure prizes. The best time to present the prizes would be at graduation. The Superintendent would be very much pleased to hear from citizens who may become interested in the suggestion. If this plan should materialize, the money could be kept in a bank, in charge of a permanent treasurer appointed by the School Board.

Last June Auburn made educational history for itself. I understand that the graduating exercises held were the first ever had. A most interesting program was carried out in the Town Hall, in the presence of a crowded house. The graduates all had a share in the exercises. The various schools furnished musical numbers. The Superintendent was the speaker of the occasion; he delivered an address the title of which was "A Plea for Further Education." May this precedent endure forever!

It goes without saying that everything which is worth while costs time, money, and effort. It also goes without saying that we could do without these things and apparently save money. But let me emphasize the word "apparently." Being penny-wise and pound-foolish never brought prosperity. Without education and training resulting from expenditures involved, our country would not be as prosperous as it is. We must invest before we may share dividends. Who would care to go back to the bad old days of ignorance, procrastination, and superstition to enjoy the benefits of apparent economy? Shall we exchange our engines of various kinds for the wheel-

barrow? Shall we exchange our electric lights for the tallow candle? Shall we exchange our telephone, wireless, and radio for the foot messenger of old? Shall we exchange our modern, well constructed, well lighted, well ventilated, well furnished school buildings for the little red schoolhouse of song and story? I hear the country's voice echo and re-echo, No! Let progress reign supreme!

I am thankful for the fine co-operation which the Auburn teachers have given me, and for the moral support of the boys, the girls, and the citizens. I also appreciate the kind and courteous way in which the School Board have dealt with me, and their share in our work to promote the educational interests and welfare of Auburn.
