TOWN MEETING WARRANT

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote
in town affairs—*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 11th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable, and four Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, toward the maintenance of a District Nurse, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of Chapters 80, 84 and 85 of the Public Laws, and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with the foregoing Chapters.

ARTICLE 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line maintenance of highways in this town, in accordance with the foregoing Chapters of the Public Laws.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in co-operation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the town will take relative to the laying out and construction of a highway between Main Street and the Ammonoosuc River from Saranac Street to Mill Street, or any points between said termini, and pay for the same by appropriation, or by the issuance of bonds or serial notes of the town.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will acquire and provide for an aircraft landing field for all purposes incident to aviation development, in accordance with Chapter 90 Laws of New Hampshire 1929.

ARTICLE 8. To see what action the town will take relative to increasing the salary of the Justice of the Littleton Municipal Court.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from Sleepy-Hollow to the highway leading by Hill-top to Partridge Lake, subject to gates and bars.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway on Mount Misery, from the farm known as the Powers' Farm to the farm of Abraham Choquette, subject to gates and bars.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading to the Blue Farm, so-called, subject to gates and bars.

ARTICLE 12. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give

any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 51 of the Laws of New Hampshire, 1929.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 14. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

TO THE CITIZENS OF LITTLETON:

The School Board hereby submits its annual report for your consideration. We accept our duties as purely administrative, to see that the funds placed in our keeping are spent wisely and for the best interest of all the boys and girls in our schools rather than the few. While all our efforts may not satisfy each one of you, we trust that this report as a whole will merit your approval.

The trend of the times is such that in our homes, our schools, our town, better equipment, better training for a broadening community life are demanding a more progressive policy in our school curriculum.

A forcible example of this is shown by the fact that with the added facilities of our high school and other community improvements, together with the splendid spirit of cooperation of the citizens of Littleton, for the first time in its history, the State Teachers' Association with an attendance of 1,800, was entertained in our town. We feel that the educational life of the whole North Country was stimulated by these contacts.

To keep our buildings, furnishings, and school materials in harmony with other community improvements and always with a forward vision, your school board believes that there should be a definite yearly provision made for repairs and replacement. For further detail we refer you to the report of our superintendent.

With the assistance of the treasurer, a very careful and conservative budget, which appears in full as a part of the financial report, has been prepared for your consideration.

The totals to raise are for debt and interest \$15,270.00;
for support of schools, \$53,500.00.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To G. H. Barrett, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my eighth annual report as Headmaster of Littleton High School.

The past year has been marked by several distinct changes and I feel achievements. The percentage of attendance has been excellent, averaging over 94.5 per cent. There continues however, to be a large amount of tardiness which I hope can be eliminated. The standard of scholarship is as good if not better than at any time for the past decade. We still maintain our standing with the College Entrance Certification Board whereby we can admit to all New England colleges on the Board by certificate.

The total registration of the school is somewhat larger than at any time since the union of the Bethlehem School District and the consequent withdrawal of many Bethlehem pupils to form a larger high school at Bethlehem. To date the total registration has been 191. It is in this connection that I wish to call to mind a situation which I believe will have to be met in the near future. More than 175 pupils overcrowds our classes and necessitates the use of student proctors. Neither of these conditions can be long tolerated if the standards of the school are to be maintained. I expect, from all the information that I can gather, an enrollment of 190 or 200 pupils for next year. If this expectation proves approximately correct, we shall find it absolutely necessary to employ an extra teacher and equip one more room with home room desks.

BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

The high school building has now been in use for nearly four years and has during this time amply justified its erection. It has made a more vital school, it has centralized and controlled the social activities of the school, it has made it possible to keep a much closer record of pupil activities. It has

made it possible to know where pupils are, and to know that if they are out of school that it is on permission slips. It has proved so well planned as not to necessitate any major changes. There is, however, when you consider the two large buildings, a vast amount of small repair work, cleaning, sweeping, etc. It is a question whether or not one man without some extra help during the year can do this.

New equipment has been added during the year as needed. The big expense so far as this phase is concerned, has been a new lathe and the automatic stoker. We have been able to make a good start toward getting the equipment of our commercial department in better shape. We are now in hopes to be so fixed that we shall retain no typewriter over four years. We are in very real need here of filing equipment, and equipment to teach filing, as well as chairs of the proper type for typewriting.

A new piano is very urgently needed in the music department, while a combined radio and phonograph would also be a wonderfully fine addition to our equipment.

More of the Clarin folding chairs could be made good use of.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

About the same extra curriculum activities have been sponsored by the school this year as last, with varying success. The Senior play, produced in November, was perhaps the best we have staged for years, while the Lyceum Course has been pretty much of a failure. Instrumental music has found and filled a very real place in the school. It has been carried on as last year under the direction of Mr. Wentworth who has come to us one day each week. The lessons have been paid for by the parents. I feel that this work is as valuable as any work in our course of study and should be placed upon the same basis. I wish it were possible for Mr. Wentworth to come to us for two days each week and be paid, as in Lancaster, wholly by the town. A combined orchestral concert given by Gorham, Groveton, Lancaster and Littleton will

be produced in May. The vocal music has been cared for by Miss McFague, who replaced Mrs. Jones, under the same plan as previously. Debating was continued last Spring under the guidance of Mr. Glazier, and this school year under the direction of Miss Fletcher. It is expected that a triangular debate between Whitefield, Lisbon and Littleton will be held in March on the subject of Installment Buying. Athletics have been carried on as usual with about the usual success.

The financial accounts of the classes and the special activities have been handled as last year, over \$4,300.00 having passed through the hands of Miss Craigie as high school treasurer. All of this money has been raised by teachers and pupils. None has come by way of the school appropriation.

All of our organizations are in good financial condition with the possible exception of the athletic association which has at present a deficit of about \$40.00. I expect that this will soon be cared for.

ANNUAL PRIZES, GIFTS, ETC.

The annual prize offered by the American Legion and the Auxiliary for leadership to the boy and girl in the graduating class went to Roland Smith and Julia Magoon. The Andrew Bingham Jr. cup went to John Glode. I am glad to record the vote of the Littleton Rotary Club to offer to the boy or girl in high school a prize for the best work of the year in French, and a prize for the best essay on International Friendship.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation manifested both within and without the school.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Littleton:

I herewith submit my second annual report of the progress and needs of our schools.

The total enrollment for the school year ending June 30, 1929 was 657, an increase of 26 pupils over the total for the preceding year. The complete figures for the current school year will probably show an increase over the high mark attained last year. With the exception of the high school, (see Headmaster's report) the increased number has been cared for in the regular classes without special difficulty. The prospects for further increase will depend largely on the plans of the Connecticut River Development Company.

The progressive policy mentioned a year ago has been followed with an increasing measure of success. During the Spring months the Kilburn School teachers together with the superintendent made a careful study of work in those grades and drew up a plan for departmental work. There is no change in the work done by the different grades. The changes are administrative only. For example, the fourth grade teacher has all the reading, music, and health instruction in grades 4, 5 and 6. In like manner arithmetic, geography, English and history are given in all three grades by the other two teachers. Grades 7 and 8 were re-organized along the same lines. The eighth grade teacher also has one class in the high school. The plan has proven successful beyond what we could naturally expect.

During the current school year and for several years past we have used six buildings for regular school purposes. The repair and upkeep of so many different plants is a real problem. Last year the major portion of the appropriation for repairs and new furniture was expended on the Apthorp, North Littleton and Pattenville buildings. The tower and front of the high school building were painted. This year it

will be necessary to paint all the remaining exterior wood-work, also two or three of the rooms and the halls.

The Kilburn building needs a new hall floor, and four rooms refinished. New furniture is also needed. Other minor repairs are necessary. These make up the larger items demanding attention before school opens next Fall.

I recommend that we continue the present regular system of upkeep and repair each year, also that we continue to replace inadequate and out of date equipment with new as rapidly as funds may be supplied.

The average citizen sometimes asks why all this expenditure for buildings, equipment and school material? Why spend all this money for administration and teaching? He might also ask why spend more than twenty times these amounts on luxuries and non-essentials? According to United States government statistics, only one and one-half per cent. of the people's total income is spent for the support of schools. Within the memory of many people now living school meant a roughly furnished room more and less heated in winter, a teacher, a few books, and a slate and pencil. Today, people demand large well heated, well ventilated, well lighted rooms with the best furniture money can buy. They also expect a large supply of text books, reference books and encyclopedias, together with all kinds of paper, pencils, pens, crayons and a host of other supplies.

In the upper grades and high schools where our young people are being prepared for still higher training and to take their places in the business and industrial life of the community, we find it necessary not only to supply the things mentioned above in larger measure, but also material for scientific experiments, typewriters with accessories, modern up to date kitchen utensils and machinery, sewing machines, carpenter tools, expensive shop equipment, power saws, lathes, etc., pianos, phonographs, moving pictures and radios. All of these things, and more, are vital in modern life and therefore have their legitimate place in our schools. The difference in the schools of fifty years ago and now is as great as that of the

modern auto compared to the ox cart of those days. Children of today need to be educated with and in all the good we can supply so that they shall be able to successfully meet all the problems and difficulties of a complex and changing civilization.

In closing I wish to commend the teachers for their faithfulness and loyalty which have contributed more than anything else to the success of our work. I also desire to express appreciation of the sympathy and practical service so generously given by the school board, and for the efficient work of all the helpers who have kept our buildings and offices in almost perfect running order.

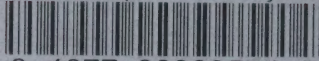
