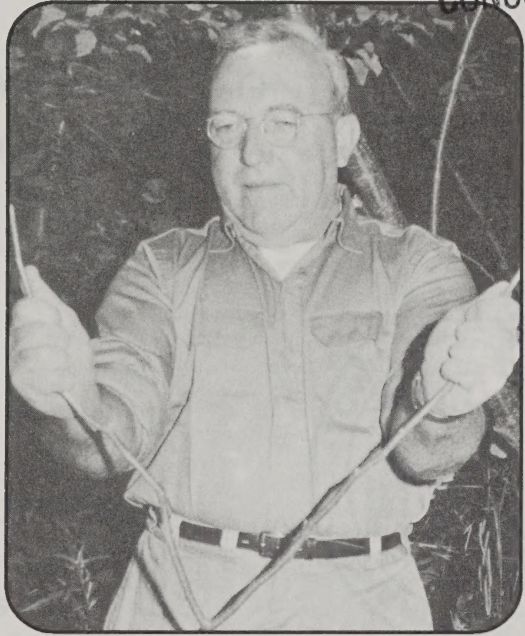

God's Been Good to Me

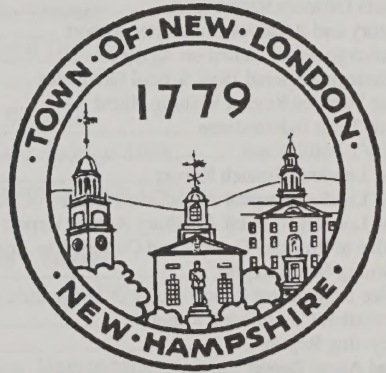
I'm mindful of the blessings that come my way each day.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

We take this opportunity to highlight what we believe to be some of the more significant events of the past year and to clarify the role of Selectmen in the operation of the Town.

1993 started with budgetary meetings with department heads, followed by meetings with the Budget Committee, and public hearings now in progress. This involves the demands for Town services, and the cost increases involved along with other requests for tax monies, and preparation of the warrant for Town Meeting. Great focus this year has been on the resurfacing of several roads and the reclamation of others. Preparations were made for the Household Hazardous Waste collection. The collective bargaining process with the newly formed union went on for over 6 months. Meetings were held with employee groups for review of personnel policies and benefits. Safe and economical disposal of solid waste continues to present a major challenge and we are most appreciative of the work being done by our representatives on the NH/VT Solid Waste Project and their efforts to cope with a bad situation. There have been several meetings with the area Selectmen to discuss mutual problems. The short and long term needs of the Town's buildings and their utilization are being addressed. Several deficiencies have been identified and some require immediate attention. A small task force has been appointed to study the present and future space needs of all components of the Town government. Recent events have caused us to look closely at the safety of our employees. Part of the topsoil layers of the closed Landfill has shifted. In consultation with the construction company, engineering firm, and NHDES, temporary repairs have been made and a solution will have to be looked at in the spring.

The year also involved the Selectmen in the appointment of Lorraine Cleveland as Administrative Assistant to the Board. She has brought with her a high degree of professionalism and a sound background in the operation of a small town. Her services have been invaluable.

We sense that the role of the Board of Selectmen is not always well understood and that the perception of its "power" is exaggerated. A Board, by State law, functions as the Town's executive branch in carrying out the wishes of the voters as expressed at the town meeting where the voters exercise their legislative powers.

The Board of Selectmen has very limited powers and these are specified by State laws. Primarily we watchdog the expenditures, we implement the wishes of the voters, and we are responsible for Town services as well as the safety of the residents. In addition we have to be highly cognizant of possible liability on the part of the town.

Weekly meetings involve the review and approval of vendor and payroll disbursements, consideration of requests for various types of permits as well as requests for use of Town property, and meet on a regular schedule with department heads. We hold public hearings as prescribed by law and send out bids for specific town projects which are later acted upon. We make appointments and fill vacancies as they occur. Also at these meetings we meet with individuals or groups wishing to bring issues to our attention.

Frequently these cannot be responded to immediately and they are taken under advisement to allow for more thorough consideration, examination of past records, or legal advice. Periodically we meet with the Fire Department, Water Department, Sewer Department, Library Board, Committee Chairmen, as well as Town Counsel as needed.

Normal meetings are open to the public under the "Right To Know Law." This same law allows for "non-public sessions" for certain specific reasons, most commonly to discuss personnel issues which if done in public session might damage an individual's reputation.

The assumption that the Selectmen run the Town is a gross over statement. The Board is just one group managing the affairs of the Town. There are over 100 individuals serving in elected and appointed positions, who because of their willingness, interest and expertise share in the responsibility. Without their dedication this Town could not function, and we salute them one and all.

We remain ever aware of the Town portion of the tax bills. We continue with the capital reserve allocations which prevent spikes in the tax rate by planning for high ticket items. We constantly look for improvements in Town operations and more economical ways to facilitate them.

We take this opportunity to express our thanks to the staff in the office. It has not been an easy year and they have willingly shouldered the extra burden.

At 12:00 noon a motion was made and seconded to recess the meeting and reconvene on Wednesday, March 10, 1993, at 7:00 p.m. in the Kearsarge Middle School Gymnasium, to act upon Articles 2 through 34. However, the polls would remain open until 7:00 p.m. The motion passed.

Polls closed at 7:00 p.m. and counting of the ballots commenced at 8:00 p.m. At 9:45 p.m. Moderator Cleveland read the results of the balloting.

BALLOT RESULTS ON AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW LONDON ZONING ORDINANCE.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO.1:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 1 consists of a number of revisions to Article XXIII Shore Land Overlay District and an amendment to Article III to add a definition of beach. The amendments to the Shore Land Overlay District include adding replenishment of existing beaches as a permitted use and to specify the conditions under which beach replenishment is permitted; prohibiting construction of a new beach or the expansion of an existing beach; adding provisions which encourage existing lawns and open areas within fifty feet of the shore to be replanted in natural vegetative cover; and adding provisions addressing construction of new retaining walls and terraces within fifty feet of the shore.

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 1 will add provisions to further protect the sensitive shore land areas with the goal of continuing to maintain high water quality in New London's lakes and ponds.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO.2:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 2 amends Article XX Wetlands Conservation Overlay District, Section B. Overlay District Boundaries, sub-paragraph i. to include lakes and ponds in the overlay district boundaries to read as follows:

- "i. Lakes, ponds, swamps marshes, or bogs with an area of 2,000 square feet or more. No area limitation is applicable if

swamps, marshes, or bogs are contiguous to surface waters such as lakes, ponds, and streams."

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 2 will correct an oversight of not previously including lakes and ponds in the boundaries of what constitutes a wetland area

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO.3:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 3 revises the Zoning Ordinance to add a new Article XXIV Validity of Overlapping Regulations to read as follows:

"ARTICLE XXIV
Validity of Overlapping Regulations

Whenever the provisions of this Ordinance or rulings made under the authority hereof differ from those of other ordinances or regulations of the Town or State, then that provision or ruling which imposes the greater restriction or higher standard shall govern."

RATIONALE:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 3 will add a new article addressing which provision governs when there are conflicting Town or State regulations.

PETITIONED ZONING AMENDMENT

Are you in favor of the adoption of petitioned Amendment No. 1 as proposed by petition for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

PETITIONED AMENDMENT NO. 1: Add to Article II, General Provisions, a new Paragraph 16 as follows:

"The use of helicopters is prohibited in any zone in the Town of New London, with the exception of emergency or disaster use by the Hospital, the New London Police, the State Police, the National Guard or any other Medical or Disaster Unit."

RATIONALE:

The recent decisions by the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment, allowing increased airplane and helicopter use at Eagles' Nest, further emphasize New London's loss of the "small town rural charm" that has attracted so many year-round residents. The additional air activity will bring an increase in noise pollution; any increase in noise pollution will have a deleterious effect on the quality of life and the property values in New London.

At this time, there is nothing in the New London Zoning Ordinance that prevents helicopters, which need neither air strips nor pads, from landing or taking off in any part of New London, with the exception of Eagles' Nest, where the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment have already given their approval.

We, the undersigned, think it is important to recognize the strong possibility of an increase in helicopter usagae, and to establish controls before it is too late. This petitioned Amendment will prevent additional helicopter activity within the boundaries of the Town of New London, thus protecting the residents from a further increase in noise pollution.

THE NEW LONDON PLANNING BOARD DISAPPROVES THIS PETITIONED AMENDMENT BY A VOTE OF 4-1.

CONTINUATION OF TOWN MEETING - MARCH 10, 1993
KEARSARGE MIDDLE SCHOOL AT 7:00 P.M.

Moderator Hilary Cleveland called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and read the election results from Tuesday, March 9, 1993.

ARTICLE 2: It was moved and seconded. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$400,000 and to authorize the Board of Sewer Commissioners to expend said sum for the purpose of constructing a sanitary sewer line in the Birch Acres/Job Seamans/Pleasant Street area of New London; such sum to include the purchase of land and easements. Said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes not to exceed 15 years under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire RSA 33:1, etc., as amended); and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen and Sewer Commissioners to apply for, accept, and expend any Federal, State, or other available funds towards the project, according to the terms under which they are received, and to borrow in anticipation of the receipt of such aid or the issuance of such bonds or notes, by the issuance of notes or notes payable in anticipation of such bonds, notes or aid as provided by the Municipal Finance Act, as amended; and further notwithstanding that the bonds, or notes shall be a general obligation of the Town, the Board of Sewer Commissioners is hereby directed to establish betterment assessments sufficient to pay 100% of the principal and interest due with respect to the bonds or notes issued hereunder against those served or receiving a special benefit from the lines to be constructed

hereunder in accordance with RSA 149-I:7; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Sewer Commissioners to take all other actions as may be necessary to carry out the project in the best interests of the Town of New London."

(2/3rds vote by Ballot)

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the eighth day of March at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2.

"Recreational vehicle" means a vehicle which is (a) built on a single chassis; (b) 400 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection; (c) designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck; and (d) designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel or seasonal use.

2. Amend Article XXII Floodplain Overlay District, by adding a new subparagraph G.2.d. to read:

"d. Recreational vehicles placed on sites within Zones A1-30, AH, and AE shall either (i) be on the site for fewer than 180 consecutive days, (ii) be fully licensed and ready for highway use, or (iii) meet all standards of Section 60.3 (b) (1) of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations and the elevation and anchoring requirements for manufactured homes in Paragraph (c) (6) of Section 60.3.

Section 60.3(b) (1) states that the community shall require permits for all proposed construction and other developments including the placement of manufactured homes, within Zone A of the community's FHBM or the FIRM.

Section 60.3 (c) (6) states that the community shall require that manufactured homes that are placed or substantially improved within Zones A1-30, AH, and AE on the community's FIRM on sites (i) outside of a manufactured home park or subdivision; (ii) in a new manufactured home park or subdivision; (iii) in an expansion to an existing manufactured home park or subdivision; or (iv) in an existing manufactured home park or subdivision on which a manufactured home has incurred substantial damage as the result of a flood, be elevated on a permanent foundation such that the lowest floor of the manufactured home is elevated to or above the base flood elevation and be securely anchored to an adequately anchored foundation system to resist flotation, collapse, and lateral movement." (APPROVED BY THE PLANNING BOARD)

Rationale: The Planning Board's amendment will allow the community to continue to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by incorporating changes mandated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

NOTE: By law, the meeting must open before the voting starts. Therefore, the meeting and polls will open at 10:00 o'clock for the consideration of Articles 1 and 2. At 12:00 noon the Meeting will recess, but the polls will remain open until 7:00 p.m. The Meeting will reconvene at the Kearsarge Middle School Gymnasium on Wednesday, March 9, 1994 at 7:00 p.m. to act upon Articles 3 through 43.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S OPINION ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of New London as of and for the year ended December 31, 1992, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of New London as of December 31, 1992, and the results of its operations (and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds) for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of New London. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON DISPATCH CENTER

The New London Dispatch Center experienced quite a few changes this year beginning with the purchase of a personal computer to which we have been busily programming and entering the necessary data which is enabling the dispatch center to run more efficiently. The software we are currently using is a word processing program. This has allowed us to store most of our records in the computer. In the future this should certainly aid the Town of New London in saving space which would normally be used for the storage of records.

At some point in the future we hope to update the software to a law enforcement type of program which would again improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the dispatch center. This type of software would also allow us to keep up with the continuous increases in state and federal mandates regarding law enforcement record keeping.

Effective April 1993 we began dispatching for the Springfield Police Department. This addition brings us to a total of six police departments, four fire departments, four rescue squads, and one ambulance service as well as numerous other highway, water, and sewer departments.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

New London Information Booth

This is the report of activities of the Information Booth for the summer of 1993. The Information Booth is sponsored by the New London Area Chamber of Commerce with additional financial support from the Town of New London. The Booth is managed and mostly manned by the Chamber's Information Directors who also provide telephone and mail information services throughout the year, supported only by the Area Chamber of Commerce. The Booth attendants provide a variety of information to both visitors and local residents including local directions, dining and lodging information, mercantile and recreational information and literature about the local area and the state.

The Information Booth opened on June 19, 1993 and operated continuously through Labor Day and then weekends from September 18 through Columbus Day, October 11, for a total of 89 days. Daily hours were from 10:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. During the period of operation a total of 3726 visitors were recorded, producing an average of 41.87 visitors per day. In addition, at least 459 phone calls were answered from the booth. (It is nearly impossible to record all telephone calls and visitors when the Booth is full of people asking questions.) These 1993 figures compare with a five year average of 84.8 days open with 3622.4 visitors giving an average of 42.79 visitors per day.

In 1993 visitors came from 46 states and 29 foreign countries including Canada. The only states not represented were Alaska, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Wyoming. Our most frequently recorded visitation was from New Hampshire (752) with MA(552), CT(221), NY(194), NJ(125), PA(79), FL(76), VT(74), CA(54), MD(46), VA(38), RI(37), OH(31), IL(27), and ME(24) following in decreasing order with the number in parenthesis. The top eight states have been in the same order with similar numbers for the last few years. Of visitations from foreign countries, Canada, as would be expected, had the most visitors to New London with 55. England was second with 39 followed by Germany with 23 and France, Netherlands and

Scotland each with eight.

The busiest day of 1993 was July 24th which is a bit earlier than in past years when the busiest day ranged from July 28th to August 5th.

Other services provided by the information booth included the sale of tickets to events being staged by various cultural and civic organizations. These included Summer Music Associates Concerts, the Rotary sponsored Circus and Rotary Barbecue, K.A.T. Company performances, Lions Club Hospital Day Breakfast, Hospital Day Chicken Barbecue and the Elkins Fish and Game Club Barbecue. In addition 128 Foot Paths maps, 2 Mirror To America town histories and 58 New London historical pamphlets were sold.

The appearance of the Information Booth was greatly enhanced by the plantings around the building provided and maintained by the New London Garden Club. We all are very much indebted to members of the Garden Club who so faithfully, cared for the flowers around the Information Booth and in the various planters on the porch.

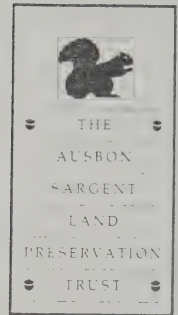

THE AUSBON SARGENT LAND
PRESERVATION TRUST(ASLPT)

1993 was another busy and exciting year for the ASLPT! The year began with a request for assistance from the New London Conservation Commission (NLCC) to help protect the Low Plain Natural Area. The ASLPT and the NLCC rallied the support of the Elkins Fish & Game Club and the NH Fish & Game Department to form the Low Plain Alliance. With the security of 18 individual guarantors and financing by New London Trust, the ASLPT, acting as transition title hold, purchased the Low Plain Natural Area on August 3, 1993. Once the loan is paid off, title will be transferred to the Town of New London.

The ASLPT is pleased to report that several New London land protection projects were completed. Conservation easements were donated by Peg Carroll (33.8 acres), Nancy and Kit Tatum (21.8 acres) and Chuck and Barbara Deming (125 acres). The Trust is saddened by the deaths of conservation easement donors Dorothy Adams, Richard Emerson, Jr. and Murray Sargent.

Signs were erected on properties protected by the ASLPT. Each sign includes a reference number which is keyed to a map. For a copy of the map, please stop by the ASLPT office located in the Kidder Building. The signs were funded by gifts from the New London Garden Club and Esther Currier's New London Service Organization Third of a Century Award.

We would like to thank everyone who has given generously to the ASLPT. Your support does make a difference!

HEALTH OFFICERS REPORT -1993

"Public health is what we, as a society, do collectively to assure the conditions in which people can be healthy"

Responsibility for assuring the safe and aesthetically acceptable disposal of human waste is the health officer's most time consuming duty involving the observation of all test pits for septic system construction and the review of plans to check for accurate representation of test pit data and to assure compliance with New London's environmental regulations. It is significant to note that in 1993 the number of inspections for new housing construction was 21 which is more than double the 10 in 1992, and is hopefully a positive economic indicator.

One public health problem will be eliminated in 1994 by action taken in 1993. The New London-Springfield Water Precinct voted to construct wells on Colby Point together with the necessary storage tank, pumps etc. to implement a new groundwater source for the system which will eliminate the threat of giardiasis and exposure to elevated levels of carcinogenic trihalo-methane by water system users.

The health effects of smoking, including heart disease and cancer, remain one of our major public health problems. These effects are declining as more people quit smoking and more public and private buildings become smoke free. However, the battle is far from won and continued progress in elimination of smoking as a public health hazard is strongly encouraged by all levels of public health interests.

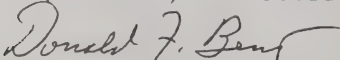
In 1994 we are particularly concerned about the threat of rabies to the people and animals of this area. The raccoon strain of rabies, so called because of the ease of transmission in this animal species, has reached Weare, N.H and could easily reach our area in 1994. A fox strain is also coming in our direction from the northwest of Vermont and will probably infect our wild fox population in the next two years. We are preparing plans and people to handle

this situation when it arrives. I urge you to have all cats and dogs immunized against rabies to protect you and your animals against this nearly always fatal disease. In addition, do not feed wild animals nor leave food and trash where raccoons and other wild animals will be attracted to human areas. If you see overly friendly or strangely acting raccoons, skunks, bats, foxes or other wild or domestic animals as well (cows, horses, llamas, etc.) do not have contact with the animal and call your veterinarian or the health officer. Already one New Hampshire family of five, whose cat died of rabies, has undergone post-exposure immunization at a total cost of \$7500. The cost of immunizing your cat against rabies would be at least 300 times cheaper and would protect more than just yourselves and your cats. Both dog and cat rabies immunization is now required by New Hampshire law.

Radon, in the New London area, is a public health problem which mostly goes unrecognized. Although, as a cause of lung cancer, radon is as serious a threat to the individual as smoking, most people are reluctant to find out if their home's living spaces contain dangerous levels of radon. Radon can come up through the ground from bedrock into your home and/or come out of your drinking water usually from drilled rock wells in this area. Radon test kits for your home are available in local stores at reasonable prices and drinking water can be tested for radon at the state water laboratories at a cost of \$15.00.

1993 was an exciting year for the Conservation Commission. We were finally able to see our long term goal of permanent protection of the Low Plain Natural Area take a giant leap forward. Working in conjunction with several other agencies, The Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust, the Elkins Fish and Game Club, and the State Fish and Game Department and with invaluable help from Upland Properties, the property has now been purchased and with the completion of the fundraising efforts, title will be turned over to the town. The marsh will be renamed, The Esther Currier Wildlife Management Area at Low Plain. Many years ago, Esther recognized the value of the area and laid the ground work for the protection we are going to achieve. The self-guiding trail that she laid out in the late 1970's is still the main attraction for the many visitors to the area each year.

Our many other responsibilities have kept us busy throughout the year. We have continued to monitor all properties that we hold conservation easements on, including the Webb property of almost 1000 acres. We were very busy reviewing Wetland Board Applications this summer, most connected with the drawdown of Pleasant Lake. We continue to be involved in the town planning process. And as always, there is much trail work and bridge repair to be done. We are very appreciative of all the hours the many volunteers have put into the upkeep of our trail system.

1993 Annual Report
Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission is a voluntary association of 31 towns, four in Vermont and 27 New Hampshire communities. The Commission is concerned with the development of comprehensive plans for beneficial and balanced economic, environmental and social growth in the Region. It functions as a research, resource, and informational agency, and when appropriate, acts to obtain Federal, State and other approvals, grants-in-aid, loans and similar assistance for individual member towns and for the Region. The Commission provides technical assistance to member communities in the areas of planning (land use, transportation, water quality, etc.), mapping, community development, grantsmanship and grant administration. In addition, regional publications, such as our **Regional Profile**, regional studies, such as our Regional Transportation Plan, and regional projects, such as the Lake Sunapee Watershed Management Plan, are undertaken to the benefit of more than one community.

In the past year, services such as our Planning Board training series, and library which features maps, planning resources and US Census data, were available to all of our member communities. A complete list of services and regional projects which benefit our members follows the list of services provided directly to residents of New London.

In 1993, our work specifically for the Town of New London included:

Continue to provide circuit rider services.

Prepared Capital Improvements Plan Update.

Assisted the Planning Board with amendments to the Subdivision Regulations and Driveway Regulations.

Provided assistance to the Planning Board on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

In December, will provide wetlands map of the Town using Landsat vegetative data.

Our Commission looks forward to continuing to serve New London in the coming year.

Services Which Benefit All Member Communities

-Completed a Regional Buildout Analysis which investigated the impacts on population, traffic and number of dwelling units and school aged children assuming the region were totally built out under zoning ordinances in each town.

-Continued the Lake Sunapee Watershed Management Plan which analyzes the full build-out of the watershed on lake water quality and evaluates alternative lake protection strategies.

-Updated the **Regional Profile**, our regional compendium of population, housing, economic and other data, including 1990 census data.

-Continued our regional transportation planning programs in New Hampshire and Vermont.

-Studied virtually all signalized intersections in the Region.

-Training topics covered in this year's training sessions offered to New Hampshire Planning Board members included integrating GIS in to community planning, capital improvements programming and basics for new planning board members. A workshop was held for Vermont

zoning board members and zoning administrators on the granting of conditional uses and variances.

-Through our Economic Initiative Project, work has begun to develop a one page data summary of each town in the region to be used to document the community's economic vision and to promote the community.

-Consult and help residents of member communities as, and when, asked.

-Meet with state officials and agency representatives to influence policy and to help keep the Region an active participant in many ongoing programs. This includes activity with transportation, solid waste, economic development, and environmental regulatory agencies in both New Hampshire and Vermont.

-Maintain a library of regional data, maps and planning resources, and answer many requests for information. .

-Use the Geographical Information System(GIS) to perform mapping and analyses for member towns.

-Assist the Upper Valley Solid Waste District in dealing with solid waste issues. Provide general staff support for the District.

-Provide administrative support for the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program.

-Work in cooperation with the Sullivan County Economic Development Commission.

-Sponsor local sessions of the NH Municipal Law Lecture Series.

-Provide technical assistance to Advance Transit.

-Use the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee to develop regional policies and recommendations for the Regional Transportation Plan.

-Revise and update the Regional Plan.

-Comply with applicable Vermont Act 200 requirements at the local, regional and state level, including participation in the Council of Regional Commissions.

-Participate in Vermont Act 250 reviews.

-Sponsor planning board training sessions in New Hampshire and Vermont.

-Work with Upper Valley Land Trust and the Society for the Protection of NH Forests to protect open space and conserve important parcels of land.

-Participate in and work with the Connecticut River Valley Resource Commission.

-Review land use controls and master plans, and suggest amendments.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The New London Planning Board held 23 regular meetings during 1993. During these meetings the Planning Board held numerous Public Hearings at which the following applications were approved:

- * Two Major subdivisions;
- * Three Minor subdivisions;
- * Three Site Plan Reviews for Commercial Use
- * Seven Annexations;
- * One Driveway Waiver;
- * Removal of trees on scenic roads;
- * One Cutting Plan into the Shoreland Overlay District.

The annual update of the Capital Improvements Program was conducted by the Capital Improvement Committee for the period of 1994 to 2003. The update was reviewed by the entire Planning Board and accepted.

The Planning Board proposed several amendments to the Zoning Ordinance which were placed on the ballot at Town Meeting for approval by the voters.

As required by law, work has begun on updating the Town's Master Plan. Any input from citizens during this process would be most appreciated by the Board.

As a reminder, the Planning Board holds regular meetings on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. Your attendance and contributions are always welcome.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.


The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

1993 REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

Cemetery Division

The cemetery Division continued the maintenance of all town cemeteries, beaches and parks in town. During the year, we painted all the buildings along with mowing and trimming. As I mentioned in my 1992 report, we have begun the landscaping of problem areas. In West Part Cemetery we cleaned up the lower corner which had become overgrown. This area will be loamed and seeded for appearance and maintenance purposes.

Highway Division

The New London Highway Department experienced a very busy 1993. March brought a major snow storm. Due to some accurate weather forecasting we were prepared for this challenge. It should be noted that several local contractors assisted with the removal of snow in congested areas of New London. Thank you to them, and to the Towns people for their patience during that storm. The spring brought warm weather quickly and we experienced a fast snow melt coupled with heavy rains. This in turn caused some substantial erosion problems that needed repair. During the summer we began work on Seamans Road. This road was on our five-year major repair list. Culverts and new catch basins were installed, ditching and road bank work was done. We also removed some of the larger rocks in this road. Because we planned this work in advance, it enabled the Kearsarge Telephone Company to do some underground cable work, as well as the Water and Waste Water Departments. After all parties involved had completed their work we contracted with Frank Whitcomb Construction Company to grind the existing pavement and mix it with the road gravel. It was then treated with liquid calcium and compacted. Finally it was paved with 3 inches of asphalt. We would like to thank everyone involved in this major construction work. Ditches were cleaned and new culverts were also installed in other areas of town. Another major concern was addressed this year. We contracted for design and installation of guard rails on two bridges in Elkins. Previously, the guard rail consisted of boards which allowed limited protection. This job was completed just before the onset of winter. Ledge was removed and a major ditching job was completed on Old Main Street. This was in preparation for gravel and treatment with liquid calcium for compacting and dust control.

Recycling Division

The Recycling Department continued to grow and recycle more. Our cardboard and paper are sold to Paper Tech in Contoocook, which in turn manufactures jewelry box liners, paper towel and toilet tissue winding tubes. The cardboard becomes "super pack" which is used to pack fruit. Our glass is crushed by the Town in a new crusher that was designed and built by the Highway Department. Many hours were spent by Merle Kenyon, Bob Harrington and myself fabricating and assembling this machine. Our stockpiled crushed glass will be used in the final phase of Bog Road, our 1994 major road construction project.

As always, If you have questions regarding procedures or regulations at the Transfer Station, please ask the staff members. They are ready and willing to help you.

I would like to thank the Recycling and Disposal Division for working shorthanded and extra hard to keep up.

Finally, in closing, I want to thank the staff of Highway, Recycling and Cemeteries for their commitment to jobs well done.

NH/VT SOLID WASTE PROJECT
1992 Annual Report of Activities

1993 has been a year that the Project made the bold and timely decision to file for bankruptcy protection. This action stayed a termination threatened by Wheelabrator allowing the continuation of uninterrupted deliveries of Districts waste to the incinerator. It has also allowed a comprehensive assessment of the Project's financial position by the Boston based accounting firm, Coopers & Lybrand. They are also assisting in the development of a reorganization plan to assist in insuring the continued viability of the Districts. Although, as of this writing, there is no final word on the bankruptcy disposition by the Federal bankruptcy court, whatever the outcome the Project's re-examination of its finances and further documentation of monies owed the Project from Wheelabrator will have long term benefit for the member cities and towns.

Other developments for the year include:

- o The total waste tonnage delivered to the Claremont incinerator is projected to surpass 42,000 tons.
- o The Stage II area of the Newport ash landfill became operational.
- o The Stage I area of the landfill received an interim cap.
- o The Project reduced its per gallon leachate disposal costs at the Windsor Waste Water Treatment Plant to 7.5 cents a gallon.
- o The Project completed a study of the amount of recycling occurring in the District and found that approximately 15% of the member towns waste is being recycled.
- o The Project and Districts decisively rejected a proposed new contract submitted by Wheelabrator. It was found not to reflect accurately negotiated points of agreement.
- o A demonstration project of raising sheep at the ash landfill to show the compatibility of the site with livestock production appears to have been successful (based on the much greater weight gain of these sheep to those of a control group raised at a nearby farm).

These are some of the many activities and developments of this year. More importantly the ground work for many new initiatives was laid that focus attention on reducing future disposal costs while recovering substantial monies owed the Districts.

NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB REPORT

We are pleased to report that the New London Garden Club, a member of the New Hampshire Federation of Garden Clubs and the National Council of State Garden Clubs, has completed another successful civic year. Of concern to the Town of New London are the 18 town areas the Garden Club Members plant and maintain.

Bucklin Beach - Crockett's Corner - Elkins Beach and Post Office - Homan's Corner - Kearsarge Elementary and Middle Schools - New London Post Office - Fire Station - Hospital, Inside and Cutting Garden - Bandstand and Sargent Stone - Information Booth - Transfer Station - Town Hall and Offices - Parking Lot - Highway Department - Norris Corner - Old Main Street Triangle - Tracy Memorial Library, Inside and Outside.

The continuing effort to beautify the Town includes the Annual Civic Beautification Contest for residential and commercial properties on Main Street resulting in attractive signs placed on the recipient's properties in the fall.

Added to their civic efforts is the Christmas Greens Workshop from which 35 wreaths are assembled and placed on Town buildings as well as local churches and the hospital and extended care unit.

All of the above are a result of a large number of individual members devoting many hours of volunteer time to help make New London an outstanding community.

Materials about New London continue to find their way to the town archives: New London Outing Club records; King's Daughters material; K.R.H.S. annual reports; two old fire department logs and 1928 by-laws; Hospital Aid material; Historical Society records re: Concord Coach, steam pumper and old hearse; New London Republican Club information; the 1944 Civil Defense report; and Baynham's Christmas with Herrod's sign. It is hoped that others will donate items to make our archives even better!

Copies of photographs have been made and added to our files. The Archives has purchased a complete set of current town photographs which may also be found on note paper sold locally.

The Anthony Colby portrait referred to in last year's report is now on loan to the Tracy Memorial Library. A violin made by Claude Goings which is in the archives was used as a subject in a painting. A series of oral tapes were loaned. Members of clubs and businesses have been in to use records in the archives. It is hoped that more will do so in the future.

In the genealogy area it has been very busy - started several people in beginning research, answered numerous requests by mail, and provided information to researchers who were amazed at the amount of information available in the archives. Just recently, we received from South Carolina a paper read at the Unitarian Church in Charleston (Gage Hall Centennial Celebration). The author was a visitor in the archives during the summer and has included a paragraph about the town of New London and information about the years Alva Gage spent in New London.

The volunteers are each busy with a project - Barbara Stearns is consolidating Historical Society

material; Hope Howard has compiled a West Part Cemetery notebook, worked on West Part land (deeds), and most recently organized and indexed deeds located in the archives; Arrolyn Vernon has familiarized herself with the records of producing MIRROR TO AMERICA, organized a New London cookbook display at Tracy Memorial Library, and as secretary of the History and Archives Committee, she has been a moving force during the beginning stages of an update to the town history for 1950-1999.

The History and Archives Committee has planted the seed for this new town history. Meetings for the past six months have been spent listening to speakers who have given us pertinent information concerning this subject. In this current town report will be found a warrant article for the purpose of generating the funds for the production of this new history. Your support will be appreciated. The committee looks forward to the busy years ahead and with your cooperation it will be a top notch history.

WELFARE REPORT

During 1993 there were 18 requests for emergency welfare assistance from the town ranging from emergency transportation to housing costs. The total cost was \$4,953.53 with \$68.75 reimbursed to the town.

KEARSARGE AREA COUNCIL ON AGING, INC.

The Kearsarge Area Council on Aging, Inc. became incorporated as a non-profit corporation in July, 1992, and opened its office at 125 Main Street, New London, on August 1, 1992. Its mission is to serve the senior citizens and their families in nine area towns (Andover, Danbury, Grantham, Newbury, New London, Springfield, Sunapee, Sutton, and Wilmot), to respond to the needs and interests of older people. At year end, 1993, COA has more than 1000 registered members.

To fulfill its mission, a variety of programs have been instituted. The monthly newsletter to communicate information, plans, and programs is mailed to each registered member. A corps of volunteers drive seniors to various destinations, primarily to medical appointments. Mr. Fixits do nuisance home repairs, stressing safety and energy-saving needs to their clients. Seniors share their hobbies and life experiences in area schools, providing a forum for intergenerational understanding. The office is not only the source of information, but refers inquirers to other sources as the need requires; it also provides still another opportunity for seniors to volunteer, to use those talents they've developed over their lifetimes.

New programs that have been developed and will be started in the early months of 1994 are a Telephone Reassurance Program, connecting homebound seniors with a COA caller on a daily basis; a once-a-week Alzheimers' Respite Day Care Center to be initially housed in Foulkes Hall of the Kearsarge Community Presbyterian Church; and a renewed emphasis on a Senior Directory that will list providers of services of particular interest to seniors and list businesses that grant senior discounts. Moreover, greater cohesion among the members of the nine towns will be fostered, first with a mid-winter Valentine luncheon sponsored by the towns of New London, Grantham, and Sutton.

The financial support during 1993 came from generous individuals, six area towns, organizations, businesses and several grants. The volunteer support has been outstanding; without each one's effort, the hundreds of services could not have been provided, nor could the COA organization be so well poised for its growth. The need for such growth has now become obvious.

Thank you to each and every supporter; your continued support, comments and suggestions will always be welcome.

We would also like to extend a special thanks to Richard Lee and the Public Works crew for their patience and helpfulness during this past year.

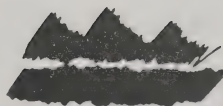

The New London Hospital Auxiliary will always be younger than the New London Hospital! As the Hospital celebrates its 75th anniversary, we note our 68th year of service to the Hospital.

Our 400 plus members work tirelessly all year long, in so many different areas. Hospital Day, Easy Aces Bridge Tourney, Tennis Tournament, Barn Players' Pillow Rentals, Artists' Notepaper Sales, Tina Cricenti Golf Tournament, and our two Rummage Sales continue to be successful and lucrative events. Our October, 1993 Rummage Sale netted \$11,500, an increase of \$650 over the same event last year, in spite of the additional expense of hiring workers and trucks. The Tina Cricenti Golf Tournament in August had 136 players - a popular event, in spite of the blistering heat that day!

Renovations to the Medical-Surgical wing of the Hospital are complete, and the Auxiliary has fulfilled its pledge of \$50,000 for the redecoration of patient rooms. We also matched Hospital funds to repaint and carpet the Admitting area of the Hospital.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON POLICE DEPARTMENT

Albeit hard to believe, I have just completed my fourth year here in the Town of New London as Chief of Police. This also completes my seventeenth year with the police department. During the past seventeen years I have seen many changes and much growth in the Town. New London has become a substantial shopping center for area towns which brings an increased amount of traffic and of course people to Town. Due to the expansion of small business in the Town we have dealt with more crimes pertinent to commerce in the area.

Once again the D.A.R.E. program, under Sergeant David Seastrand, is doing well and has the support of the school and town's people. We received the Gold Circle Partnership Achievement Award again this year which is an award issued for collaborative effort between the school and police department in working in the areas of growth and development with the youth of our community.

The department is now sponsoring a police cadet program which is part of the Boy Scouts of America. Senior Patrol Officer, Donald Kimtis, heads this program which currently has twelve young recruits enrolled. Two of the youths involved attended the Police Cadet Academy at Daniel Webster College this year. The members of the New London Police Department area very happy to be involved with the youth in the area on a positive note.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY
1993 Annual Report

With the generous support of the Town, the patrons and the Friends of Tracy Library, we continue to serve the community in a myriad of ways - intellectual, social and cultural. The Friends of Tracy Library sponsored a stimulating and provocative lecture series on "The New World Order," with speakers from Dartmouth College. A grant from the New England Foundation for the Humanities allowed us to offer "Deciding Justice," exciting reading/discussion seminars which focused on the Supreme Court process. For the second year the "Book Browsers" met to discuss current books of interest; the discussions were well attended and enthusiastically reviewed. During the summer the Friends sponsored the popular "Great Decisions" discussions on foreign policy, and Richard Lederer and Kathy Lowe-Bloch presented "Dances with Words," a magical evening of language and music.

The Meeting Room, an attractive and functional addition to the Library, was used by 36 different groups for a total of 312 meetings; and this number does not include the Library's use of the room for such adult programs as described above, for the annual Volunteer Party and for the many high-quality children's programs offered: pre-school story hours; after-school and summer reading programs; the spectacular children's Christmas party and puppet show; Tomie dePaola's eagerly awaited summer visit.

This year the Board of Trustees and Staff hosted the second annual Holiday Tea for the Town and all our Friends - a beautiful and delightful "tradition" from Mrs. Jane Tracy's past, one which we hope to continue. The Library was also the site of a festive holiday gathering of Town employees and elected officials.

We are proceeding, slowly but surely, with the automation of the Library - depending, as always, on the support of the entire community and the help of the volunteers. Ah, those volunteers! Their dedication and perseverance so help us to run the Library. We are, as always, grateful to them and all our patrons for their support.

A final look at the statistics for the Library in 1993 will impress. Our circulation increased from 83,765 in 1992 to 89,133 in 1993 (circulation in 1970 was 13,625!). The Library registered nearly 700 new borrowers. In addition, 117 temporary cards were issued to short-term borrowers, such as summer visitors and Colby-Sawyer students. New acquisitions numbered 1552 for books and 130 for non-print items such as audio-books, compact discs and video cassettes.

The Annual Meeting of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct in March of 1993 saw the election of James A. Cricenti as Water Commissioner (three year term), along with Anna Green, Treasurer, Susan J. Craigie, Clerk, Alf Jacobson, Auditor and Peter Stanley, Moderator (all one year terms). The voters approved \$230,000 (two hundred thirty thousand dollars) to be added to the Safe Drinking Water Act Compliance Capital Reserve Fund (\$30,000 from the General Fund surplus and \$200,000 raised by taxes).

New installation applications are still at the same slow pace as the past few years. In the fourth quarter of 1993 Precinct personnel discovered that some water meters in the system were reading the amount of water used incorrectly. Working with the meter manufacturer and installer, the problem meters were repaired and the customers reimbursed accordingly. Only 32 of the over 900 meters were actually affected. The Precinct also assumed ownership of the Trussell Hill Estate water mains during 1993, an asset valued at \$250,000 (two hundred fifty thousand dollars).

After the March 1993 Annual Meeting the Commissioners refiled for an exemption (extension) with a new compliance schedule for the Surface Water Treatment Rule of the Safe Drinking Water Act, as amended. In July the Commissioners, on behalf of the Precinct, petitioned the Superior Court to hold a Special Meeting. This request was granted in August and the Special Meeting was scheduled for, and held on, September 15, 1993. Over two hundred and fifty voters attended the meeting and approved, by a greater than 2/3 (two thirds) majority, the Colby Point groundwater option for \$1,800,000 dollars (one million, eight hundred thousand dollars).

On October 27, 1993 the Department of Environmental Services granted the Precinct an exemption (extension) from the Surface Water Treatment Rule and accepted the submitted compliance schedule. With this, the Commissioners contracted for the Preliminary Design Phase of the ground water supply. This phase involved field investigations, surveying and preliminary engineering. Test borings and gravel packed test wells were installed during December and into early January and will provide the information needed to identify final well placement, size and number of wells.

The Commissioners would like to take this opportunity to express their thanks to the voters who attended the Special Meeting, listened to the information presented and supported the recommendations before them. We again request that all registered voters please attend the Annual Meeting so that they may stay well informed on the issues and participate in the business before the Precinct.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000) for the purchase of a new, 4-wheel drive Pick-up Truck. This amount to be funded from the General fund surplus of December 31, 1993.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the upgrade of the Precinct's office driveway. This amount to be funded from the General Fund surplus of December 31, 1993.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Precinct will vote to appoint the Board of Commissioners as agents of the Precinct, as prescribed in RSA 35:15, to withdraw and to expend the Capital Reserve Fund as established for compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act, as amended, in the amount of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) plus accrued interest (appropriated in Article 5 at 1993 Annual Precinct meeting) and to withdraw eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000) plus accrued interest, as previously voted in Article 8.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the voters of the Precinct will vote to authorize the Commissioners to pursue and secure any Federal, State, Private Funds or Grants as may become available to the Precinct during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b. and to expend those funds and grants as necessary for the purpose of complying with the Safe Drinking Water Act, as amended. (Note: a hearing would be required before any acceptance and expenditure of any funds)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Precinct will vote to eliminate the office of Auditor, continuing with the procedure of having an Accounting Firm provide an annual Accountants Report.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Precinct will vote to authorize the Commissioners to issue notes and incur debt in anticipation of taxes and revenues in order to pay current maintenance and operating expenses, as provided in RSA 33:7.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(For the Years Ended December 31, 1993 and 1992)

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The income accounts of the New London-Springfield water System Precinct are maintained on a cash basis, recording income as it is collected. The income accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year-end by recognizing and recording changes in accounts receivable.

Expense accounts record items only when cash is disbursed. The expense accounts are converted to an accrual basis at year-end by recognizing and recording changes in accounts payable and inventories.

The inventory of supplies is priced at cost. Based on a physical inventory taken once a year at year-end, the increase (or decrease) in the inventory value decreases (or increases) the supplies expense. The policy of the Precinct is to maintain a uniform level of supplies inventory for Precinct use in its operations.

Purchased facilities and equipment are recorded at cost; gifts and contributions of water facilities are recorded at fair market value at the time received. The Precinct does not make provision for depreciation expense, as required by generally-accepted accounting principles.

Assets abandoned or disposed of are written off at cost against the appropriate asset account, and the Plant and Equipment Fund balance is reduced accordingly.

The accounts of the Precinct are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are presented with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate.

Amounts in the "Totals (Memo Only)" columns in the combined financial statements are presented for analytical purposes only, since the summation includes interfund transactions that have not been eliminated. Consequently, amounts in the "Totals (Memo Only)" columns are not comparable to a consolidation and do not represent the total resources available or total revenues and expenditures of the Precinct.

The Precinct has four funds:

Operating Fund, the general operating fund of the Town. All receipts and tax revenues that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures and capital improvement costs that are not paid by other funds.

Plant and Equipment Fund, in which additions and disposals of equipment and facilities are accounted for. As noted above, the Precinct does not record depreciation of these fixed assets as required by generally-accepted accounting principles.

Capital Reserve Fund, a fiduciary-type fund, for which the Town of New London's Trustees of Trust Funds are the trustees. Additions to the Capital Reserve Fund are designated and authorized by Precinct voters at the Annual Meeting; similarly, withdrawal and use of the funds are authorized by Precinct voters at the Annual Meeting.

Capital Projects Fund. At a special meeting on September 15, 1993, Precinct voters appropriated \$1,800,000 for the purpose of complying with the Safe Drinking Water Act, said sum to be spent for the design, testing, and construction of a ground water supply system utilizing the Colby Point aquifer at Little Lake Sunapee. To pay for this capital project, voters authorized the use of all but \$30,000 of the capital Reserve Fund (including accrued interest thereon) established for the compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act, and authorized the issuance of serial bonds or notes in a sum not to exceed \$978,000 for a period not to exceed 20 years. At December 31, 1993, the investments of the Capital reserve Fund totalled \$873,588, of which \$843,588 was payable to the Capital Projects Fund per the authorization of the September 15 Precinct Meeting. Also as of December 31, 1993, no bonds or notes had been issued by the Precinct for financing the Colby Point Project.

Total fund balances comprise two parts, appropriated and un-appropriated. The appropriated balance represents the unexpended portion of current and prior-year funded appropriations which, in the judgment of Precinct Management, will be expended in future years. The unappropriated balance is the unencumbered balance of the fund.

Note 2 - Capital Reserve Funds

At the Precinct Meeting on March 17, 1992, the voters approved a change in the purpose of the Water Storage Tank Capital Reserve Fund to the Safe Drinking Water Act Compliance Capital Reserve Fund. This is the sole Capital Reserve Fund of the Precinct.

The history of the Fund is as follows:

At the Special Precinct Meeting on September 15, 1993, the voters appointed the Commissioners as Agents of the Precinct to withdraw and expend all the Safe Drinking Water Act Compliance Capital Reserve Funds (including interest earned thereon), except for \$30,000 appropriated to the Fund from Operating Fund Surplus at the Annual Precinct Meeting in March 1993. (The exception of this \$30,000 was due to an oversight in the wording of Articles 1 and 2 of the 1993 Special Meeting.) As of December 31, 1993, no cash had yet been transferred from the Capital Reserve Fund investments to the Capital Projects Fund for expenditure on the Colby Point Project.

Note 3 - Interfund Receivables and Interfund Payables

During the course of normal operations, the Precinct has transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources. To the extent certain transactions have not been paid or received as of December 31, balances of interfund amounts receivable or payable have been recorded. As of December 31, 1993, the Capital Projects Fund had a receivable of \$843,588, due from the Capital Reserve Fund. This amount represents the difference between the total cash and short-term investments of the Capital Reserve Fund at December 31 (\$873,588) and the \$30,000 of the Capital Reserve Fund not yet authorized by Precinct voters to be withdrawn for expenditure by the Capital Projects Fund.

Note 4 - Colby Point Project Costs

Costs incurred for the Colby Point Project by the Capital Projects Fund are capitalized. Upon completion of the Project, such costs will be transferred to the Plant and Equipment Fund.

Note 5 - Precinct Tax

The Precinct Tax has no restrictions. However, income from this tax is used primarily to pay principal and interest on outstanding debt, to pay for facilities and equipment, and to increase capital reserve funds. The tax is reported as Other Income to avoid distortion of gain or loss from water operations.
