10. To see what sums the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

11. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 2 per cent on all 1931 taxes paid on or before August 1, 1931.

12. To see what sums the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on Town notes.

13. To see what sums the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for removing rock from side of road.

14. To see what sums the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Bridge construction.

15. To see what sums the town will vote to raise and appropriate for new road machine.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

2. The increase in average membership is about 8 pupils.

3. The percent of attendance is unusually good. That for Corser Hill school is very high.

4. The average tardiness per pupil is about 1 less than last year.

The number of pupils enrolled in the public schools of the district was 41. The number of pupils residing in the district, and attending public schools outside was 6, distributed as follows: Concord High, 1; Hopkinton High, 4; Tilton, 1. The total number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools is 47. The per capita tax for December, 1931, will be \$94.

Medical Inspection

The annual medical inspection was made by Dr. L. H. Cogswell of Warner, and reported as follows:

Number of pupils examined, 40; teachers, 2; pupils 10% or more underweight, 20; defective vision, 8; defective hearing, 2; defective teeth, 24; pediculosis, 3.

A child with defective vision or hearing is greatly handicapped in school. Parents should make every effort to have such defects corrected. Failure in school work may be caused by them. Dental clinics are held in many towns. The rates for such work are about half the usual rates charged by dentists. In many places the local Red Cross, or other organizations, have assisted with funds.

There were no pupils who completed the eighth grade work this year.

The usual program of giving objective tests in common school subjects was followed. The pupils show a high average in brightness, and the town may well be proud of them. There is considerable popular misunderstanding of the results of the so-called general intelligence tests. What is really tested is the child's ability to do the usual work in books, his schoolability in other words. A high mark in such a test does not indicate that a pupil will become eminent even in his own community. Thousands of valedictorians have made no more than a moderate success in life. On the other hand a low mark does not indicate that a child may not become one of the town's most substantial citizens, or even eminent in the state or nation. Therefore too much importance should not be attached to the results of such tests. The ability tested by them is greatly modified by such factors as perseverance, honesty, good judgment, etc.

At the Corser Hill school there is immediate need of repairs to the toilet. If possible, arrangements should be made during the coming summer so that the tank may be drained into a dry stoned pit, as at the Putney Hill school. This would remove the necessity of dipping out, or pumping out the contents of the tank. There is also a need of adjustable desks in all the schools.

In conclusion we wish to state that we have found our work with the board very pleasant. Teachers and pupils have shown a spirit of loyalty and cooperation, and to this is due the successful school work of this year.
