

This exceeds the balance of payments by \$159 43

Hence it appears, that during the past year, the Town Farm has not only supported the Paupers, and paid its own expenses, but has yielded a nett surplus income of \$159.43. A part of this surplus has been expended in improving the condition of the farm itself, while the residue remains on the farm in the shape of *produce*.

As the ordinary current expenses of the past year, exclusive of the payment of former debts, and of the construction of *new* Highways and Bridges, has been but \$421.08, your Auditors would recommend to the Town to raise, for the current expenses of the coming year, the sum of \$500.

The Auditors have found the foregoing accounts of the Selectmen and Overseers of the Poor, correctly cast and duly vouched.
