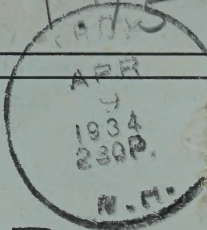

(TOWN WARRANT)
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth of March next, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid and permanent improvement of highways.

Article 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the payment of telephones in the homes of Town Officers, Firemen and Police, this meeting to determine the telephones to be paid for, if any.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the installation of a fire alarm system.

Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

VOTED That the selectmen are hereby authorized to sell either at public auction or private sale to such purchaser and for such price as they may determine any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds, and until such sale is made to administer such property in the interests of the town.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of extending the town water system to a point opposite the Lahiff home, at North Troy via the hill roads.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs to the Town Hall.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of snow fence.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway beginning at the Power Station at North Troy to a point twenty feet east of the Dawson bridge so-called.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway beginning at the Foster farm so-called, continuing by the Cobb farm to a point twenty feet north of the bridge at Woods mill, leading from the trunk line.

Article 23. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99, Section 22 of the Laws of 1933.

Article 24. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

During the past year we have demanded a great deal more practice than formerly, which accounts for the increase in payroll expenditures. Included in the expenditures given earlier in the town report, is amount paid by the department for fighting forest fires, amounting to \$465.41. Credited against this is the amount contributed by the state, \$222.42, making a net increase in the department expenses of \$242.99, for this reason.

We urge the citizens of the town to consider seriously the installation of a more adequate fire alarm system. We also advocate the raising of at least \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of the fire department, as we believe we should continue the emphasis on more frequent practice tryouts and we should purchase additional supplies, especially a supply of new hose.

We believe all of our apparatus is in good condition.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Troy School Board:

I submit herewith my sixteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools, this being the thirty-fourth in the series under union supervision.

The teaching force for the present year is the same as last year. The salaries were carefully readjusted by the school board so that the schools might receive the maximum State Aid to which the district was entitled.

The most important change for the school year was the addition of the third year to the high school. This has been carried on with no addition to the teaching force, and for the present school year will bring about a saving of over \$800.00 in high school tuitions.

A very satisfactory laboratory for chemistry and biology has been fitted up, and the same laboratory with some new equipment can be used next year for physics if the fourth year of high school should be offered next year.

The total enrollment for the present school year (1933-34) is 253, an increase of five over the first term for last year.

The steady increase in high school enrollment in spite of the fact that the total enrollment has decreased during the past few years is shown in the table below giving the totals for every third year since 1920-21.

As shown by this table in 1920 less than four percent of the total enrollment was in the high school. For the school year 1933-34 over twenty-one per cent of the Troy pupils are in the high school.

In line with other reductions in school expenses it was found necessary to have our supervisor of music visit the schools only once in two weeks instead of every week. Mrs. Whitcomb has adapted her work to the new schedule so that with the loyal cooperation she is receiving from the teachers the work is going very well, although we hope to have music supervision put back on full time as soon as possible.

Miss Harris has been carrying on her work as school nurse in a thorough follow-up of all cases needing attention. Her report shows the work that has been covered.

From December first to February Miss Harris had the assistance of Miss Josephine Cassidy of Keene who was assigned to this union by the C. W. A. funds.

The Federal funds for the distribution of milk have enabled over thirty pupils to receive free milk daily. Others who desire milk and can afford to pay for it buy it for 2½ cents per half pint bottle.

This distribution began in November and is expected to continue until June.

The distribution of Cod Liver oil began in January under the direction of Miss Harris.

The work of the schools has been very satisfactory during the present year. Where criticisms have been made the matters have been taken up in conference with the individual teacher. If parents would find time to visit the schools oftener I am sure they would have a much clearer idea of the many problems each teacher has to solve.

The school officials welcome any intelligent criticism from parents. As was the case last year the superintendent is at the office in the brick building every Thursday afternoon until at least a half hour after the close of school.

The school budget for the next year is being prepared with care to meet the present situation. While the amount of State Aid has been somewhat reduced during the past three years, the reduction would have been much greater if the school board had not carefully considered every item upon which such aid is granted, and figured their estimate to take advantage of whatever awards properly could come to the school district.

At this time I desire to thank the school board, teachers, pupils and all interested parents and citizens for their continued help and co-operation during the past year.
