To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, 1996 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

NOTE: By law, the meeting must open before the voting starts. Therefore, the meeting and polls will open at 10:00 o'clock for the consideration of Article 1. At 12:00 noon the meeting will recess, but the polls will remain open until 7:00 p.m. The meeting will reconvene at the Kearsarge Middle School Gymnasium on Wednesday, March 13 at 7:00 p.m. to act upon Articles 2 through 30.

ARTICLE 2.

"To see if the Town will vote to suspend the reading of the individual Articles of the Warrant and to refer them by number." (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 3.

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for General Government operations." **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 11.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$8,500)** eight thousand five hundred dollars to be added to the previously established Conservation Commission Land Acquisition Fund and to authorize the expenditure of **(\$6,000)** six thousand dollars from said fund to be used to survey and purchase a conservation easement consisting of a portion of Tax Map 81, Lot 1 of approximately 9 acres of land comprising a 300+/- foot strip of land adjoining the Esther Currier Wildlife Management area at Low Plain.” (This area is the marsh area that can be seen from Route 11) **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 12.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$5,500)** five thousand five hundred dollars to purchase a strip of land (3 rods wide by 326+/- feet long) known as Tax Map 89, Lot 6 for the purpose of gaining permanent access to Town owned property. **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 13.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$3,642)** three thousand six hundred forty two dollars for the purpose of reducing the principal on the 1979 Sewer Bond and to authorize the transfer of **(\$3,642)** three thousand six hundred forty two dollars from the December 31, 1995 fund balance for this purpose.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 14.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$22,000)** twenty two thousand dollars for the purchase of a police cruiser.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 15.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$9,000)** nine thousand dollars for the purchase of a flail mower for the Highway Department.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 16.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$15,000)** fifteen thousand dollars to purchase and install a sprinkler system at the Fire Station.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 17.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$22,925)** twenty-two thousand nine hundred twenty five dollars to digitize the Town tax maps, link databases and purchase viewing software.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 18.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$16,500)** sixteen thousand five hundred dollars to scrape and paint the Tracy Library.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 19.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$10,000)** ten thousand dollars to be added to the previously established Town History/Publication Fund. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the History is published or 1999, whichever is sooner.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 20.

“To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town History/Publication Fund to include all accumulated interest in the amount of \$356.23 for the year 1995 and to add accrued interest during 1996 to the said fund.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 21.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$8,200)** eight thousand two hundred dollars to be added to the previously established non-lapsing Master Plan Update fund. This money will be placed in a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7 VI and will not lapse until the plan is completed or in 1997, whichever is sooner.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 22.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$6,500)** six thousand five hundred dollars to be added to the previously established non-lapsing Master Plan Update Fund and to authorize the withdrawal of **(\$6,500)** six thousand five hundred dollars from the Master Plan Update Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose, thereby discontinuing said fund, and transfer any accumulated interest to date of withdrawal to the general fund.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 23.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds to be placed in the previously established Capital Reserve Funds as follows:”

The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 24.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$6,000)** six thousand dollars for the purpose of installing waterlines and performing general road repair work in the Old Main Street Cemetery, and to appoint the Cemetery Trustees as agents to expend and to authorize the withdrawal of **(\$6,000)** six thousand dollars from the General Cemetery Maintenance Fund for this purpose.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 25.

“To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Town Hall Generator Replacement and to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$5,000)** five thousand dollars to be placed in this fund.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 26.

“To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of establishing a fund for future Sidewalk Installation and to raise and appropriate the sum of **(\$5,000)** five thousand dollars to be placed in this fund.” **The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 27.

“To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing agreement under Section 218 of the Social Security Act by excluding the services performed by election workers for a calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$1,000.” (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 28.

“To see if the Town will vote to rescind the unissued, previously authorized balance of **\$239,882** from the following warrant articles” (dollar amounts were not needed to complete the projects but amounts remaining on the books are liabilities):

Article 2 of the 1989 Town Meeting approved an appropriation of \$81,600 for Goosehole Road construction, including bonds or notes authorized not to exceed \$81,600. In 1990, the Town issued \$72,000 leaving **\$9,600** as authorized - unissued.

Article 2 of the 1990 Town Meeting appropriated \$1,285,300 for an addition to the Tracy Memorial Library to be financed by long-term borrowing of \$916,405 and donations of \$368,895. Only \$906,239 of the \$916,405 authorized was issued, leaving a balance of **\$10,166** authorized - unissued.

Article 2 of the 1992 Town Meeting approved an appropriation of \$213,116 for the closure of the landfill. Only \$48,000 of the \$213,116 authorized was issued leaving a balance of **\$165,116** authorized - unissued.

Article 2 of the 1993 Town Meeting appropriated \$400,000 for sewer line construction to be financed by long-term borrowing. During 1993, the Town issued \$345,000 leaving **\$55,000** as authorized - unissued. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 29.

“To see if the Town will authorize the following exchange of property: To exchange a portion of property owned by the Town of New London, described as Tax Map 94, Lot 7, consisting of .38 acres, with a portion of property owned by Bob Bell, described as Tax Map 94, Lot 8, consisting of .98 acres.” **The Board of Selectmen, Conservation Commission and Planning Board support this land exchange.** (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 30.

“To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees heretofore chosen, to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact and other business that may legally come before said meeting.” (Majority vote required.)

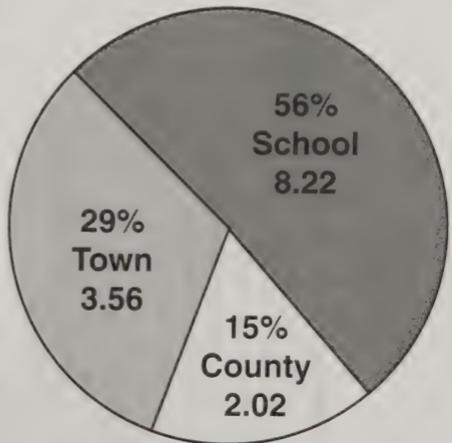

BALLOT RESULTS ON AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW LONDON ZONING ORDINANCE

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 1:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 1 amends Article II General Provisions, Paragraph 5. Height Regulation to allow a radio tower up to and including seventy feet in height as a permitted use in all districts and to allow a radio tower in excess of seventy feet in height in all districts by Special Exception.

YES - 448 NO - 144

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 1 is an attempt to bring New London's Zoning Ordinance height limitations as they apply to radio towers more in line with the rulings of the Federal Communications Commission.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 2:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 2 amends Article XIV Enforcement, Paragraph A. Authority, Sub-paragraph 3. Permits to require a building permit for interior alterations valued greater than \$5,000.

YES - 308 NO - 295

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 2 is an attempt to keep track of substantial internal building improvements which affect overall property valuation and local property taxes.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 3:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 3 amends Article V Residential Districts, Paragraph C. Yard Requirements, Sub-paragraph 2. to add a sideyard setback requirement for an interior lot in the R-2 District served by public water and sewer.

YES - 485 NO - 85

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 3 will add a sideyard setback requirement for an interior lot in the R-2 District served by public water and sewer. In an apparent oversight, the Zoning Ordinance as written does not provide for such a setback.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 4:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 4 amends Article V Residential Districts, Paragraph C. Yard Requirements, to eliminate Sub-paragraph 4 which provides that on any side yard not abutting a street, a detached private garage may be erected and maintained within the rear quarter of the lot if not closer to the side lot line than four (4) feet.

YES - 471 NO - 113

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 4 will eliminate what they think is an antiquated and confusing provision of the zoning ordinance.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 5:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 5 amends Article XX Wetlands Conservation Overlay District, Paragraph B. Overlay District Boundaries, Sub-paragraph i to delete lakes and ponds from being included as wetlands since they are afforded protection by the Shore Land Overlay District.

YES - 514 NO - 72

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 5 will eliminate jurisdictional confusion between the Wetlands Conservation Overlay District and the Shore Land Overlay District by deleting lakes and ponds from being included as wetlands since they are already included and protected by the Shore Land Overlay District.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 6:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 6 amends Article III Definitions, Paragraph 34. Frontage to clarify that frontage refers to road frontage, that lake shore frontage is not considered frontage under this definition, and that the orientation of the house has no bearing on the determination of frontage.

YES - 516 NO - 66

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 6 will clarify the distinction between road frontage and shore frontage.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the New London Zoning Ordinance?

AMENDMENT NO. 7:

The Planning Board's Amendment No. 7 amends Article XX Wetlands Conservation Overlay District to: 1) amend Paragraph B. Overlay District Boundaries to add a new sub-paragraph v. Wetland buffers as defined in 2) below to the Overlay District Boundaries, and 2) amend Paragraph F. Special Provisions to add a new sub-paragraph (5) to provide for wetland buffers as follows: a) 200 feet from all designated prime

wetlands (there are three designated prime wetlands in New London: the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog, the Low Plains Wetland and the Goosehole Marsh), and b) 150 feet from wetlands comprised of very poorly drained soils which adjoin or are connected to designated prime wetlands. Additionally, this amendment provides for consideration of a reduction of the buffer distance through the Special Exception rather than Variance process.

YES - 467 NO - 119

RATIONALE: The Planning Board's Amendment No. 7 will provide additional protection of the designated prime wetlands and the adjoining wetlands comprised of very poorly drained soils by requiring retention of a naturally vegetated buffer around those wetlands. Currently building construction is permitted with no setback or buffer from those identified wetlands.

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of New London as of and for the year ended December 31, 1994, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of New London as of December 31, 1994, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of New London. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

During 1995 the Town did not have to borrow short term in anticipation of tax receipts, in part, by depositing funds not immediately needed for current operations in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool. Total Town receipts of \$8,773,927.70 in 1995 increased \$753,558.16 over 1994 or 9.6%. Disbursements of \$8,239,109.16 increased \$400,027.90 or 5.1% over 1994. No new notes were given by the Town in 1995.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1995 has been a busy year encompassing many interesting events that have yielded us both disappointing and rewarding results. Working with the consultant to explore possible organizational alternatives for the Kearsarge Regional School District has been the time consumer of the year. By the time you have this report, you will have received our report on this matter, so it will not be repeated here. We learned about the state laws governing schools and how they are interpreted by the respective state agencies. Learning about the educational process and how it works was an eye opener in itself. However, the message that keeps repeating over and over is that until the Department of Education, the Legislature of New Hampshire or the Supreme Court of this state changes the method of funding education, unrest will continue to disrupt the member towns in regional school districts. Working with the educational problem was like training a young child to dance - one step forward, two steps back. This, to say the least, has been a very frustrating experience.

The sad part of our year was the death of our Chief of Police, Stuart F. Sidmore, Jr. Stu was a friend to all and he is dearly missed by his fellow police officers, co-workers and friends. His funeral service, conducted by the New Hampshire Chiefs of Police, was an outstanding memorial tribute for his family and friends. Our thanks also go to the Merrimack Sheriff's Department for providing services at the funeral and relieving our police force so they could attend.

The Police and Dispatch Departments have had changes in staff: David Seastrand has become Chief of Police, Ben Cushing is the Dispatch Supervisor and Chris Currier is now in charge of the DARE program. Good luck to this new team in the many challenges they will have in the future.

The employees have chosen representatives from their respective departments to participate on an Employees Action Committee. This committee offers a forum to any and all employees to bring forward ideas, suggestions and complaints for review, discussion and action.

A working Joint Loss Management Committee made up of 1/2 management, 1/2 non-management has been working hard since April and has completed a plan that will help to keep New London a safe place to work.

Congratulations to Lois Marshall, our Town Clerk and Tax Collector, who at the New England Municipal Clerks Institute was elected to be Vice Chair and Secretary to the Board of Directors.

The Solid Waste District has had another year of turmoil and additional legal expenses, but thanks to legal arbitration and the efforts of our representatives: Bryan Jones, Mark Kaplan and Ilene Healy there may be some light at the end of the tunnel and even a reduction of costs that we pay to dispose of solid waste. This group has given much time and effort on behalf of the Town of New London.

A committee, which includes Sydney Crook, Peter Stanley and April Whittaker, has been working with a group from Sutton to investigate the Kezar Lake watershed and the protection thereof. 1996 should see the development of this committee's recommendations. Thanks to Prent Horne and Ted Parkhurst for shouldering the responsibility of testing Kezar Lake on a regular basis. It would appear that based on the tests taken this past summer there will be no need to treat the lake this year. Thanks for the good work!!!

Bob Nelson was appointed Director of Emergency Management. He has developed an Emergency Management Plan which was approved in 1995. At the end of the year, Bob requested that Lois Rockwood be appointed Deputy Director (approved.)

At the Transfer Station, you have seen an expansion of the recycling to accommodate a safer operation. When completed, you will no longer have to compete with machinery to do your recycling.

The Highway Department has completed the much needed salt and sand shed for protection of an environmental hazard. The Town crew to date, under the leadership of Richard Lee, has done an outstanding job in keeping the roads and sidewalks clear of the unexpected major snowfall dumped on us so far this winter.

Last June, we hosted eight participants from all corners of the world who were in the United States to gain insights into how government works in the States. ROAD AGENT REPORT FOR 1995

CEMETERY DIVISION

In 1995, we were able to hire the same two gentlemen that worked for us during 1994 in the cemeteries. They started in late May and were able to get the cemeteries ready for Memorial Day weekend which is a big one for us. During the summer they repaired and reset some of the stones, along with the mowing, trimming and the addition of loam in some of the low spots. They worked until fall to help clean up most of the leaves.

HIGHWAY DIVISION

The Highway Department had a very busy year in 1995. We hired a summer helper which worked out very well. She was able to take care of the Commons, Transfer Station, Bucklin Beach and other areas that we mow. She was also very helpful in other minor maintenance areas. During the spring we had clean up and some repairs to do. The summer of 1995 was busy doing culvert repairs and replacement on many roads in town. We also built a couple of drain systems to cure problems we have had for a long time. These were on Hastings Landing Road, Barrett Road and Edmunds Road. Our major job this summer was to grind and pave Shaker Street and Barrett Road. During these jobs we dug rocks, cleaned ditches and installed new culverts. Also on Shaker Street we redesigned the intersection of Mountain Road to make it more of a T Style. The stop is now on Mountain Road not on Shaker Street. In addition we helped install a new water main into the firehouse. We also paved the following roads: Old King Hill Road North, Old King Hill Road, Hominy Pot Road, the Route 11 end of Old Main Street, Hillside Road, Hastings Landing, Lovering Lane, Whipple Court, Lyon Brook Drive, and Edmunds Road. During the fall we were doing regular maintenance and had some minor washouts the first two weekends, but on the third, had some major ones. Sections of Pleasant Street, Lamson Lane, Bunker Road, Columbus Avenue, Forest Acres and Stoney Brook Road also endured washouts. We made most of the repairs and then had snow. There will be a lot of repair work to complete in the spring of 1996.

RECYCLING DIVISION

The recycling department has been very busy during the past year. The volume of recycling has continued to increase. The amount we were paid for cardboard and newspaper soared early in the year and dropped at the end of the year. As you have seen, the addition at the Transfer Station is complete. We will move the bailer in and be in operation early in 1996. Also what you do not see at the Transfer Station is our Used Oil Furnace. This is at the Highway Department to heat one of our truck garages. We are now accepting used motor oil at the Highway Department ONLY and in see-through plastic jugs such as milk bottles. The hours are Monday-Friday 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. We will not accept oil that is contaminated with water or antifreeze. We do not accept old gasoline.

In closing, I would like to thank all my staff, the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of New London. If you have any questions or comments, we are always ready to listen.

1995 NH/VT Solid Waste Project Report

The past year was one of significant accomplishment providing benefits to all member towns over the next 12 years as the contract for Solid Waste disposal at Wheelabrator's incinerator in Claremont plays out. Two major negotiations with Wheelabrator were completed.

The first established a resolution to some long standing disputes dating back to 1992 that had to be completed before contract negotiations could begin. The second reached agreement on a new accord with Wheelabrator that sets the stage for much lower costs for the disposal of waste in the years ahead. The impact of these concluded negotiations if ratified by the member towns will result in the lowering of the tipping fee. This is the first time in the life of the Project that such a reduction has been achieved.

The resolution of a troublesome dispute initiated by some NH District member towns (the Project comprises a NH District and a VT District) was also notable, though costly. This dispute finally went to arbitration and the decisions handed down were strongly against the group seeking to change the governance of the Project. It is good to have this issue completed.

Looking ahead, much work is still to be done in building a cooperative spirit between the two Districts, and within the NH District. There is also an important problem to be settled with the Town of Acworth who unilaterally withdrew from the Project and NH District leaving in question their financial obligations to the Project and the NH District. This action has precipitated a legal response from the Project and the issue should be in court sometime late in 1996.

It will be the challenge of the new management organization now running the Project to find a way through these difficult problems and to ensure that the new low cost operation continues.

DISPATCH CENTER

The New London Dispatch Center became operational as of March 31, 1975. The Departments dispatched through Dispatch were New London Police, New London Fire, New London Ambulance and the New London Highway as well as the Wilmot Police and Wilmot Fire Departments. Dispatch received a total of 7,126 phone calls in the first nine months of operation.

Twenty years later the New London Dispatch Center received 40,297 phone calls and dispatches for the following Departments: New London Police, New London Fire, New London Ambulance, New London Highway, New London Sewer, New London/Springfield Water Precinct, Sunapee Police, Sunapee Fire, Sunapee Fast Squad, Newbury Police, Newbury Fire, Wilmot Police, Wilmot Fire, Wilmot Fast Squad, Sutton Police, Springfield Police and the Springfield Fast Squad Departments.

As you can see there has been tremendous growth in the Dispatch Center over the past twenty years. The staff is a dedicated group of individuals that stands by our mission statement; "We are the lifeline between public safety agencies and the communities we serve. Constantly improving quality through teamwork and dedication."

The Dispatch Center is currently looking into computer programs that will update our systems. We have made great strides this past year with computers but still have a lot of work ahead of us.

The staff would like to thank the Citizens of New London, as well as the other communities we serve, for their continued support.

The New London Emergency Management Committee, formerly known as the Civil Defense Committee, has been meeting monthly during 1995.

The Emergency Management Plan for the Town has been reviewed, revised and expanded. The purpose of the Plan is to make each organization and department aware of its responsibilities in all hazard/emergency operations. This Plan, upon being implemented by the Selectmen, will provide the basis for coordinating protection actions prior to, during and after any type of disaster. The Plan is prepared to conform to guidelines established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA); U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission; and the New Hampshire Emergency Management Agency; and is in concert with the State of New Hampshire Emergency Management Plan.

The Pleasant Lake Dam Emergency Action Plan was prepared cooperatively with Ross Stevens, and has been submitted to the State of New Hampshire Water Resources Divisions for their approval.

State sponsored training programs on related subjects have been attended by members of this Committee. Planning meetings were held with representatives from the Red Cross, the State Office of Emergency Planning, the Kearsarge Regional School District, Colby-Sawyer College, the Health Officer and the New London/Springfield Water Precinct and Sewer Commission.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1995

What is Carbon Monoxide? Carbon Monoxide (co) is a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is produced in the combustion of a fuel. Infants, senior citizens and people with coronary or respiratory problems are at greater risk, however everyone can be affected.

Carbon Monoxide is produced by appliances such as gas or oil furnaces, gas refrigerators, clothes dryers and water heaters, fireplaces, charcoal grills, gas ranges, wood burning stoves and space heaters. It can also enter your home if your car is left running in an attached garage.

You can protect yourself and your family from Carbon Monoxide poisoning by never using a barbecue grill indoors, check the vents on all heaters and appliances and have your heating system checked and serviced by a qualified technician.

Do not use unvented space heaters to heat your home and install a U.L. approved Carbon Monoxide detector, New London Fire Department recommends one with a digital read out. However, if your home does not have a smoke detector, install one of them instead, because more people die in house fires each year than of Carbon Monoxide poisoning.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER 1995 REPORT

In calendar year 1995, our three, (3) leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

SEWER COMMISSION REPORT FOR 1995

During 1995 the Sewer Commission has continued its commitment toward actively improving, upgrading and installing modernized equipment. This is part of the Commission's goal of having in place a comprehensive preventative maintenance program. In conjunction with this goal, the Commission has developed a long term replacement/rehabilitation plan in its budget in an attempt to control the increase to the user fees on an annual basis.

The Georges Mills pump station received the bulk of the preventative maintenance work this year. This pump station, located in a brick building across from Lake Sunapee on Route 11, takes all the wastewater from New London and pumps it up and over the hill in Georges Mills to the Town of Sunapee for treatment. This pump station has a complicated control and alarm system. This year the entire control system was updated and an overhaul and rebuilding of the two major pumps at this sight was done.

The Sewer Commission continued with its project of opening up and clearing all its right-of-ways in the system. Although this might appear esthetically offensive at first, it is a necessary part of keeping the underground piping system free and clear of roots and allows the department access to inspect and repair any of these structures. This clearing of the right-of-ways will be a continuing project annually.

The Commission continues to meet regularly with representatives from the Town of Sunapee Water and Sewer Commission. The Joint group this year took a comprehensive look at the reed system in place at Sunapee, used to dewater and filter some of the biosolids. These reeds need to be cut back and cleaned around once every seven years. These reeds have worked very efficiently for the system. They are now seven years old and in need of cleaning. This project will be undertaken during the reeds dormant state. With some help from mother nature, these reeds will be replanted and ready for spring.

1995, although having a dry summer, was a very wet year in large doses both in the spring and the fall. It was noted at these times of large rainfall that the flow from New London increased significantly. The Sewer Commission would like to take this opportunity to state that it is against the Town Ordinance to have any sump pump from any building discharging into a town sewer system. These pumps are to be daylighted onto the private owners property. The Commission has a right to send a representative to inspect a property at any time for violation of this ordinance. The Commission is asking all users to please look at their sump pump setup and if in violation of the ordinance, to voluntarily remove and reinstall this pump into another discharge system. Thank you.

The New London Sewer Commission meets regularly on every Wednesday morning from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. Your comments and suggestions are helpful to the Commission to serve the users and community better.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT FOR 1995

Our biggest health concern in New London for 1995 was the arrival of the rabies epidemic among our wild animals, particularly raccoons. One raccoon, suspected of being infected, was sent to the State Public Health Laboratory for testing with positive results. This proved that the local animals were now in the throes of the epidemic. However, only those animals causing human exposure to the disease could be sent for lab diagnosis due to the high expense of testing and the low level of financial support that our State provides for Public Health Services. Nevertheless, a large number of probably rabid animals, mostly raccoons, which died around human habitation or were destroyed because of their rabid-like actions, were incinerated by Pleasant Lake Veterinary Clinic. The services of Dr. Brian Prescott and his staff in performing this important function for the New London area, safely eliminated possible sources of infection from the local environment and are greatly appreciated. Although the peak of our local rabies epidemic has passed, we will probably see an elevated level of infections among foxes during the coming year as the fox strain of rabies invades from the North. Stay away from strangely acting and overly friendly acting wild animals is the rule to avoid infection from rabid wild animals. You are also urged not to let dogs run free which would allow them to tangle with rabid wild animals and to keep all cats and dogs up to date with their rabies vaccinations.

The 1995 rate of infections of giardiasis were at a low endemic level. This public health threat will be essentially eliminated for New London/Springfield Water Precinct users next spring when the new public water supply source and pumping system will be on line. All aspects of the new system are in place with the exception of the pumping station which is presently being constructed. The new system will preclude the introduction of infectious agents into the drinking water at the source and will eliminate the presence in the water of precursors to the formation of carcinogenic trihalomethanes (especially chloroform).

During 1995 seventy-nine sets of septic system plans were reviewed prior to submission to the State. Of these 29 were for new construction or subdivisions with 21 for replacement systems and 29 were reviewed as revised and resubmitted plans. During the year 51 sites were visited to observe and record test pit data on 128 test pits. This compares to 37 sites with 61 test pits in 1994.

Smoking is still one of the most serious public health problems facing our community as well as the rest of the world. Public health policy is directed towards prevention of smoking among juveniles and teenagers and the protection of the non-smoking public from being subjected to the dangers of second-hand smoke. The New London Area Smoke Free Coalition is working towards these goals in New London and surrounding towns.

Radon, present in bedrock containing uranium, which is common in the New London area, like tobacco smoke, is a long term carcinogen. Combined with smoking, the risk of lung cancer is greatly increased over the threat of radon or smoking alone, both of which are similarly severe. Radon gets into homes through openings in basement walls and floors or from water pumped into the house from a bedrock well drilled in uranium contained granite. Inexpensive radon test kits for room air are available from local stores. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Service Laboratory will perform a radon test on water at a nominal cost. Sample vials can be obtained from Concord or picked up at the New London Town Hall from the Health Officer's mail basket.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY
1995 Annual Report

Tracy Memorial Library completed another active, productive year, experiencing again, significant growth in circulation of materials and in use of the buildings and services. In total, we circulated 107,019 items, which is most likely the highest per capita circulation of any public library in the State. We added 1769 new items to the collection; 612 books were delivered to homebound patrons; we borrowed 403 items from other libraries for our patrons and loaned 579 items to other libraries.

During the past year 1033 adults attended library-sponsored programs, and 5543 children participated in 157 programs. Many other local and regional groups also made use of the Library's meeting room.

In April we accepted regretfully the resignation of part-time library assistant, Holly Rice. Linda Miller and Beth Perkins, who are sharing the position Holly vacated, are welcome additions to the staff.

For many reasons we are grateful to the Friends of Tracy Library. The \$16,500 raised in the membership drive and book sale allowed us to purchase a fax machine and an overhead projector, as well as many special materials for the collection. Additionally, the Friends sponsored the quarterly Newsletter and several Library programs, including both winter and summer sessions of "Great Decisions," a spring and fall series of "Book Browsers," the Fall Lecture Series by Colby-Sawyer faculty members, and a special lecture by author Thomas Mallon. The Friends also continue to devote countless hours of volunteer effort, assisting with the day-to-day operation of the Library and with special events and projects.

The Library's offerings for children included several weekly pre-school story hours, after-school programs, the summer reading program, bedtime stories, "arts and sciences" programs, the special holiday puppet show and party, and, of course, Tomie dePaola's annual visit.

Two enhancements to the building are the result of special gifts. One donation allowed us to provide lighting both on our flag and in the display cases, which have contained a series of marvelous collections graciously loaned by our patrons. We were also delighted to accept the gift of a baby grand piano, which now fills the bay window of the meeting room. Its Library debut occurred during the annual Holiday Tea, for which Ruth Sisson provided very special music.

After several years of preparation, automation of the Library's catalog and circulation is nearly complete and should be on-line by summer of 1996. The staff looks forward to the extra services it can provide when the system is in place.

The Board and staff of Tracy Memorial Library thank the citizens of New London for their generous support.

RECREATION COMMISSION 1995 REPORT

The Recreation Commission continued with its current mission of overseeing the Town beaches - Elkins and Bucklin, including facility upkeep and staffing, from Memorial Day through Labor Day.

The 1995 Beach program followed the similar format used in recent years. Beach Director, Judy Hatch, joined by Waterfront Supervisor, Eric Ensign, did a phenomenal job in staffing the beaches and implementing Red Cross instructional swimming. Lessons were offered with mornings at Elkins and afternoons at Bucklin. The beaches were especially crowded in Summer '95 with continuous days of high temperatures and little rainfall.

For the first time, the Commission chose to inform residents and taxpayers of the beach schedule, regulations and information on swim lessons via a postal mailing. A brief message from the Commission helped to communicate to the public at the start of the '95 beach season. This format proved to be both beneficial and efficient, and will continue for the '96 season.

The Commission and staff continued to assist other Town organizations utilize the beach facilities, specifically New London Hospital, Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust, Crop Walk and ABC Childcare. The Commission is especially grateful to the New London Garden Club for their continued work in beautifying the beach areas.

At Bucklin beach, major plumbing within the bath house was necessary. At Elkins beach, Richard Lee had new doors put on the bath house and Bob MacMichael repaired the screen doors. Eric Ensign worked to rebuild the jetty at Elkins.

The appropriation of \$2,390.00 from Article 5 of the 1995 Town Warrant allowed for improvements at Elkins beach. A new play structure and a wooden bench were purchased as permanent fixtures. In addition, Robert Bell formed a berm to re-direct water from the grove to the lake for the purpose of decreasing beach erosion. He met with the Town Conservation Commission and Pleasant Lake Protective Association for their approval. The Conservation Commission requested that any new "sand" needed at the beaches be replaced by the use of pea-sized gravel.

The Commission is excited about where the next few years will lead. We believe that there are many more, year-round recreational activities which could be offered by the Town. Thus, we submitted a proposal to the Selectboard in November for a Recreation Director to help accomplish this goal. We have been directed to work with a committee resulting from the "Goals 2001" meeting to develop a specified proposal for 1996. We have also initiated dialogue to revitalize ice-skating within the town.

The Commission looks to 1996 for a few new members and continues to welcome the community at any monthly meetings.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT 1995

Luther Child retired after many years of devoted service to the Commission. Ruth White was appointed to replace him. Sue Andrews and Karen Ebel were each reappointed for 3 years. Karen was also reappointed to the Planning Board as the voting representative of the Commission. Terence Dancy was elected Chairman and Fred Sladen as Secretary.

In May, the Esther Currier Wildlife Management Area at Low Plain was dedicated. This was the culmination of the efforts of many people so that this outstanding nature preserve would be protected for the enjoyment of future generations. The work of Debbie Stanley and the Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust both on this project and for the Commission throughout the year is acknowledged with many thanks.

The Webb Forest Interpretive Trail has now been cleared and blazed along its entire 4-mile route. More than 30 numbered trail markers have been installed. This new trail, together with a trail map to be available next spring, are designed to inform about good sustainable forest practices. This is a valuable addition to our extensive trail system.

Plans for a forest maintenance program for the Phillips Memorial Preserve was reviewed with neighboring property owners who had expressed concern that the Commission's proposals were too ambitious. At a subsequent tour of the preserve, we had the chance to explain the very limited extent of the intended program. Further action on this program is deferred until winter 1996.

The numbers of people using our trails are increasing, as indicated by the many hundreds of maps distributed to visitors at both the Low Plain and Philbrick-Cricenti Bog and the sales of the new map of the trail system.

Our continuing program for assuring the long term protection of the Town's "prime wetlands" included working with the Planning Board on a Zoning Ordinance amendment that establishes a no-disturbance buffer strip around these properties. Also, agreement in principle subject to Town approval, has been reached on the purchase of a conservation easement on a 9-acre wetland area adjacent to the Esther Currier Wildlife Management Area.

The Commission is actively involved with the Town of Sutton in studies of Lyon Brook watershed as affecting Kezar Lake. Also, we are participants in ongoing studies on non-point source pollution of Lake Sunapee Protective Association.

The trail maintenance continues to be an important role for the Commission. Work on the board replacement in the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog is a major effort. Also the display of regularly updated wildlife and plant information at the entrance of both the Bog and Low Plain has been reestablished. The work of dedicated volunteers continues to assure the quality of this extensive trail network. Cooperation of the Garden Club and the SRK Greenway Coalition is gratefully acknowledged.

The Commission was honored by the New England Wild Flower Society at its 1995 Annual Meeting with the Homer Lucas Landscape Award for its work on the preservation of the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog. The Commission also received an award from the Lake Sunapee Protective Association for contributions to protecting the environment.

HISTORY AND ARCHIVES

During 1995 this committee held its monthly meetings in conjunction with the committee for the update of the Town History. These meetings, held the first Wednesday of the month, have concentrated on organization and procedure, sending business and organization questionnaires, refining the Family Register form and listening to a second possible publisher - just to mention a few items of business. Betty and Lindsay Collins are still giving countless hours in compiling a list of eligible residents to be included in the Family Register. Several other volunteers have been helping them. Doris Cutter has been adding addresses to the list as well as working with obituaries and information from family folders. Arrolyn Vernon has also been doing many tasks pertinent to the new history. All the time and energy given by the members of both committees and others are greatly appreciated. This is not an easy job and in months to follow, the call will go out for others to help with upcoming jobs. We hope you will respond favorably to this project.

During the year, a resident of Grantham, interested in the procedure of producing a town history, was a visitor to the archives. Also, a member of the Henniker Historical Society came to learn of ways to set up an archives and also shared their problems of finding a suitable meeting place and storage place for the society.

Once again a brief history of New London, using photographs in the archives was given to a group of gentlemen from Eritrea, Columbia, Georgia, India, Philippines, Romania, Sri Lanka and Turkey. This session was part of their five day stay in New London to learn about small town government.

This year the archives has received more photographs and New London memorabilia (examples: April and May 1945 New London airplane observation charts during WWII; 1995 Veterans Monument Dedication material from the Masons). Histories of Bedford, Grantham, Grafton and Lebanon were donated or purchased. Our collection is growing! A cookbook display was set up in the Tracy Library by several members of the committee using cookbooks of New London origin. There were more than you might think! More research of houses and land is still being done by Hope Howard and Barbara Stearns is keeping the Historical Society materials in order as well as being in charge of the Oral History project. The archives has purchased a five foot table (space is at a premium) and five more folding chairs.

We are very pleased and grateful when people make donations of New London connected items. It makes our town archives grow and we, the volunteers, are proud of what we have. We hope you are too. "The latch string is out" to YOU. I am but a phone call away and would be happy to show YOUR archives.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS REPORT

The Trustees of the Trust Funds have revised the investment policy of the Cemetery Trust Fund and Library Trust Fund this year. First, custodial fees have been eliminated.

Second, it was agreed to put approximately two thirds of the assets into US Treasury securities. We have laddered these bonds over a seven to ten year period. This process will average major changes in interest rates. Each year about ten percent of the bond portfolio will mature and be reinvested.

Third, because growth of principal continues to be an objective, it was decided to place one-third of the Trusts into a Standard and Poor 500 index fund. Index funds have outperformed seventy-five percent of all mutual funds for the past ten years. The Trustees decided, therefore, that this diversification would help the long term performance of the Trusts. This change has been completed in the Cemetery Fund. Budgetary restraints precluded changes in the Library Fund until 1996. Equity changes in the Library Fund have begun and will be completed during the fourth quarter of this year.

NEW LONDON INFORMATION BOOTH 1995 REPORT

The present New London Information Booth was built by the then New London Chamber of Commerce (now The New London Area Chamber of Commerce) in 1979. Built on town property, the Information Booth is owned by the Town of New London and maintained and managed by the New London Area Chamber of Commerce. The cost of running the booth is shared by the Chamber and the Town of New London. A new roof and exterior painting were much needed repairs accomplished by the Chamber in the spring of 1995. The beautiful flower gardens around the booth are provided and cared for by the New London Garden Club.

In the summer of 1995 the Information Booth opened on June 17th and was open daily through Labor Day from 10:00 to 4:30 and on weekends only from September 17th through October 9th, Columbus Day weekend. This was a total of 86 days of operation which compares with the eight year average of 85.6 days of operation. Total 1995 visitors to the Booth was over 3,648 visitors. This produced an average of 43 visitors per day which is slightly higher than the seven year average 42.69 persons per day visiting the Booth for directions, brochures and maps, tickets to local events and all manner of information.

This year visitors to the Information Booth came from 44 states and 31 foreign countries. The pattern of visitation from the U.S. has been quite constant over the last several years with most of our visitors coming from New Hampshire. Next in frequency came visitors from Massachusetts followed by Connecticut, New York and New Jersey. As was true last year, the largest number of foreign visitors came from England with Canada next and followed by Germany, France and Australia.

The Information Booth has also become a central volunteer ticket agency for the various non-profit organizations having events during the summer.

In addition to managing the Information Booth, the New London Area Chamber of Commerce provides telephone information to callers from all over North America and occasionally foreign countries as well. Over 579 calls were taken at the Information Booth during its open hours and by the Information Directors on a 24 hours per day, 7 days per week basis throughout the year. These calls answer all sorts of requests for information and also generate a large mailing of brochures about the New London area, especially to people seeking relocation information.

The support of the Town, the Chamber of Commerce, the Garden Club and the few good people who substituted in the Booth to give us occasional much needed days off is greatly appreciated.

NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB



The New London Garden Club was founded in 1928 by Dr. Anna Littlefield with the following purpose in mind: to encourage and aid in all civic beautification whether it be on our own or in cooperation with other interested agencies; to protect and perpetuate desirable plants and birds; to promote and encourage a knowledge and love of gardening, horticulture and flower arranging; to stimulate an interest and a desire in all people to work with and for nature.

Below is a synopsis of the many ways in which the club works towards these purposes.

CIVIC BEAUTIFICATION

We have planted and/or maintained plantings at the following locations: Bandstand/Sargent Stone; Bucklin Beach; Crockett's Corner; Elkins Post Office and Beach; Hospital Cutting Garden; Daily Flower Care Inside Hospital; K.R.E.S.; K.R.M.S.; Fire Station-new landscaping; New London Highway Department; Information Booth; Town Parking Lot; Post Office; Town Hall and Offices; Transfer Station; Norris Corner; Old Main Street Triangle; Tracy Library - inside and out; Homan's Corner-plants and weekly maintenance donated by Moore's Landscape Gardeners.

The club receives no funding from the Town for any of these projects, but is very appreciative of the support it receives from the Town Highway Department in providing compost and mulch from the Town's compost and mulch supply, cleaning up plant debris after our "Digger Days" in May and October and moving shrubs during landscaping projects. THE GENEVIEVE TEACHOUT MADDEN SCHOLARSHIP

The club provided 2 scholarships of \$1,000 each to two deserving students in the Department of Plant Sciences at the University of New Hampshire.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

With the hope of making gardening and horticulture information available to all, the club has donated a subscription to Horticulture Magazine and funds for the purchase of books related to gardening, flower arranging and horticulture. Please look for some of these books in the Reference area of the library.

CHRISTMAS WREATH WORKSHOP

In November, 40 wreaths were made to decorate Town buildings, churches and schools, as well as a room decoration for each resident of the Clough Extended Care.

HOSPITAL DAY BOOTH

Over \$600.00 was raised and donated to the New London Hospital through the sale of plants which were donated by club members and local garden centers and nurseries, and the sale of flower arrangements made by many of our talented members.

HAY ESTATE

Working on the gardens at the Hay Estate has been a wonderful "hands on" learning experience for all involved!

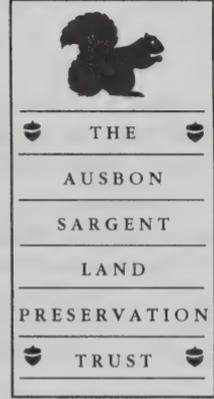
ANTIQUÉ SHOW

**THE AUSBON SARGENT LAND PRESERVATION TRUST
(ASLPT)**



In keeping with its mission to help preserve the rural character of the Kearsarge/Sunapee Region by working with local governments and landowners, the ASLPT presented the deed to the 98.8 acre Low Plain Natural Area to the Town on January 9, 1995. The land abuts existing Town-owned property and the combined 200 acre parcel was dedicated on May 6, 1995 as the “Esther Currier Wildlife Management Area at Low Plain.” Acting as transition title holder, in 1993 the ASLPT borrowed monies to purchase the Low Plain. With lots of help from dedicated members of the New London Conservation Commission, the ASLPT coordinated the \$310,000 fundraising campaign. Not only were we able to pay off the loan but the Town was presented with a \$9,000 stewardship endowment for the Low Plain.

Scenic vistas, significant wetlands, extraordinary open spaces, productive farm and forest lands, quiet meadows and wildlife habitats are important assets to New London. During 1995, the ASLPT was fortunate to work with several landowners to permanently protect some of these resources. Dr. Lincoln Gordon donated a conservation easement assuring that 20.6 acres located on the northeast side of Lake Sunapee remains undeveloped. Whit and Polly Spaulding’s 2.8 acre gift to the New England Forestry Foundation (NEFF) resulted in another ASLPT easement holding. By donating an easement on 40 acres, two special friends of the ASLPT helped protect Lyon Brook and the Kezar Lake Watershed. The ASLPT also assisted the New London Conservation Commission with the Pelfor Corporation and the Monetta Properties, Inc. conservation easements.

All of the appropriated funds from the Town of New London have been used to provide home care visits, hospice volunteer training and supervision, and well child clinic visits to people who had no insurance or inadequate insurance or funds. Other visits were subsidized by donations or paid by commercial insurance or from state and federal grant funds.

Thirty VNA employees; two VNA Trustees, Neil Atkins and Michael Work; one HCH Trustee, Mary Teach; one CHS Trustee, Sonja Jacobson and many volunteers live in New London. We depend heavily on the selfless support of these volunteers and employees who contribute hours to the success of our programs. For them and our Trustees, we are grateful.

Keeping in mind our mission to “support and enhance the health, well-being, dignity and independence of senior adults”, your young COA both grew and expanded again in 1995, is now over 1200 members strong.

COA's services to its clients remain its main priority — rides, small repairs, telephone reassurance calls, friendly visits, Good Day respite day care, office information and referral service and the important monthly newsletter. Our number of clients has increased by about 14% to 165 and the units of service to these seniors by 35% to over 2000.

Its variety of offerings now include “life enrichment” events such as a monthly luncheon and speaker program in area churches, regular quilting sessions, wintertime bridge lessons, holiday social events at Christmas time and Valentine's Day, a “Family Scrapbook” program in area libraries, intergenerational involvements and community receptions in each of our nine towns. Attendance at events such as these totaled over 1300 in 1995.

Important happenings in 1995: The Board of Directors updated and revised COA's by-laws. Our newsletter was enlarged to 8 pages, thanks to the support of our business advertisers. An Advisory Board of area professionals was formed to assist COA in specialized matters. Our Vice President was named by Governor Merrill to the N.H. State Committee on Aging, having been a N.H. delegate to the White House Conference in May. The Board conducted a survey of the interest and needs of its members to aid it in planning COA's future.

Essential financial support came from different sources: One quarter from our 9 towns, one quarter from the townspeople who supported our annual fund drive, one quarter was grants from foundations and organizations and the last quarter was from our newsletter advertisers, our grateful clients and fund raising events, etc.

Our greatest resource remains our faithful, generous and conscientious corps of talented volunteers, over 200 of them. Without them we simply could not “enhance” the lives of our senior adults. COA's Board of Directors is very gratified by the wide spectrum of support it is now receiving from every volunteer, from every town, from so many organizations and individuals. Your older neighbors are the appreciative beneficiaries. Thank you.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AUXILIARY
Responding to the Dynamic of Change

New London Hospital has responded to the dynamic of change! Both inside and outside, workmen are everywhere, and the Auxiliary is behind the changes 100%.

This year, the Auxiliary pledged \$230,000 over a period of five years to fund the construction of a new entrance and lobby for the hospital. To date, \$65,000 has been donated toward this pledge through our fundraising efforts.

We awarded \$9,000 in financial aid this year. Three high school students won scholarships. One plans to attend Colby-Sawyer College School of Nursing, another to attend Russell Sage College in New York to study occupational therapy and another to attend Colby College in Maine to study biology. Two hospital employees were also awarded scholarships. One is studying at UNH to become a licensed dietitian and the other is working on her bachelor of nursing at Graceland College. Two families that are enrolled in the hospital's child care program were awarded scholarships as well.

The Auxiliary, 427 members as of June 1995, has the resources to reach out to the community in support of Hospital Day, the Spring and Fall Rummage Sales, Tina Cricenti Golf Classic, Easy Aces Bridge Tourney, knitting and sewing projects, Barn pillow rentals, volunteer help in the Clough Center, holiday wrapping and decorating, and myriad volunteer efforts within the hospital coordinated by Carolyn Lockhart to the hospital's volunteer office.

The rummage sales continue to become bigger and better each year, our most recent sale raising \$15,000. The hospital benefits from the funds, and the community benefits from the economical source of clothing and household goods.

We await the challenge of an ever increasing membership, provocative monthly programs and helping to build a healthy future for our hospital.

UPPER VALLEY LAKE SUNAPEE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission is a voluntary association of 31 towns, 4 Vermont and 27 New Hampshire Communities. The Commission is concerned with the development of comprehensive plans for beneficial and balanced economic, environmental and social growth in the Region. It functions as a research, resource, and informational agency, and when appropriate, acts to obtain Federal, State and other approvals, grants-in-aid, loans and similar assistance for individual member towns and for the Region. The Commission provides technical assistance to member communities in the areas of planning (land use, transportation, water quality, etc.), mapping, community development, grantsmanship and grant administration. In addition, regional publications, such as our Regional Profile; regional studies, such as our Regional Transportation Plan; and regional projects, such as the Lake Sunapee Watershed Management Plan, are undertaken to the benefit of more than one community.

In the past year, services such as our Planning Board training series, and a library which features maps, as well as planning resources and US Census data, were available to all of our member communities.

In 1995, our work specifically for the Town of New London included:

- Provided information on subdivision development exactions.
- Assisted the Planning Board by providing a circuit-riding planner to help with plan reviews and drafting amendments to local land use controls.
- Supplied aerial photography for Hay Estate project.
- Prepared zoning amendments.
- Developed build out analysis summary and map for 2001 community meeting
- Produced GIS maps of conservation.
- Provided data for revision of Population Chapter of Town Plan.

Our Commission looks forward to continuing to serve New London in the coming year.

REPORT TO VOTERS -1995

The annual meeting of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct in March of 1995 saw the election of Kenneth R. Jacques as Water Commissioner for a three year term. Also elected on the same ballot were Anna Green as Treasurer, Susan J. Craigie as Clerk and Peter Stanley as Moderator, all one year terms. After passing the proposed budget in Article Four, there were no other articles requiring funding and the meeting quickly came to a close.

In 1995 the Board of Commissioners approved fifteen (15) Applications for service. In May the Board did receive a petition for annexation to the Precinct. It was the opinion of the Board, based on the 1992 Dufresne-Henry report, that the on going construction of the new water supply and storage would allow for growth in the foreseeable future, but only in the bounds of the Precinct as it currently exists. The Commissioners conveyed their concerns to the Joint Board of Selectmen and on that basis they denied the petition.

A great deal of time and energy has been devoted towards complying with the Safe Drinking Water Act. The 1994 Report to Voters told of legal action being carried out and completed in the first quarter of 1995. This was done as documents were filed with the courts on March 22 and later recorded thus concluding the necessary eminent domain proceedings.

In January the sixth well was installed and the 5 day pump test was performed on the entire well field, the results of which showed that the water is of extremely high quality.

In August, the Water Main and Pump Station were put out to bid. In September the Water Main contract was awarded to United Construction of Newport, NH for the sum of two hundred eighty-eight thousand forty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$288,042.50). A contract award was also given to Weststate Construction of Newbury, New Hampshire for the pump station for the sum of three hundred eighty-one thousand dollars (\$381,000).

Included in the pump station contract were the pumps for the individual wells, well heads, electrical connections and piping, to be installed in such a manner as to be recessed below the ground level and accessed through manhole covers.

The end of December saw the completion of a majority of the Water Main including the tank tie-in. Clean-up, restoration and service connections have been put on hold until warmer weather in the spring. The pump station, however is progressing more slowly, but the Commissioners hope to see completion in late winter or early spring.

The three phase power necessary to run the pump station necessitated the setting of poles and stringing of wire around the back side of Little Lake Sunapee. This was contracted out to PSNH for one hundred twelve thousand (\$112,000) and as of December was nearing completion.

In December, the Precinct received the sum of one hundred sixty-four thousand two hundred thirty-four dollars (\$164,234.00) from the State of New Hampshire for partial reimbursement for monies spent towards complying with the Safe Drinking Water Act, as allowed for in RSA 486-A.

The Board of Commissioners wish to thank the voters for the opportunity to serve the Precinct, and look forward to continued service in 1996. Thank you.

I have reviewed the accompanying balance sheet of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct as of December 31, 1995 and 1994 and the related statements of revenue, expenses and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. All information included in these financial statements is the representation of the management of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct.

A review consists principally of inquiries of Precinct personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. Accordingly, I do not express such an opinion.

Based on my review, with the exception of the matter described in the following paragraph, I am not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

As disclosed in Note 1 to the financial statements, generally accepted accounting principles require that depreciation be provided on the facility and equipment assets. The effect of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles on financial position, results of operations, and cash flows have not been determined.

NOTE 1 - ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the New London-Springfield Water System Precinct (Precinct) have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below:

Fund Accounting - To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Precinct, the accounts of the Precinct are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by each fund group.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Precinct are reported in self-balancing fund groups as follows:

- o Operating Fund - This fund serves as the general operating fund of the Precinct. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.
- o Plant Fund - This group of accounts is used to account for all fixed assets of the Precinct other than those being accounted for in the Capital Projects Funds. These items are purchased through transfer from the Operating Fund.
- o Capital Project Fund - This fund is used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition and/or construction of the Colby Point Project. This fund includes the Safe Drinking Water Act Compliance Capital Reserve Fund that is being expended on the Colby Point Project.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - The Precinct considers all short-term, highly liquid investments with remaining maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Depreciation - Plant and equipment is stated at cost. Assets acquired by gift or bequest are recorded at the fair market value at the date of transfer. Depreciation is not provided for on the assets which is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. Assets sold or otherwise disposed of are removed from the accounts at their original cost.

Inventory - The inventory of supplies are valued at cost.

Total Columns - The combined Financial Statements include a total column that is described as memorandum only. Data in these columns do not present financial position, results of operations, or changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Interfund transactions have not been eliminated from the total column of each financial statement.

NOTE 1 - ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Budgetary Data - The Precinct budgets revenue, expenditures, and other sources and uses of the Operating Fund. Appropriations in the Operating Fund are charged for encumbrances when commitments are made. Fund balances are reserved for outstanding encumbrances, which serve as authorizations for expenditures in the subsequent year. Budgetary comparisons in the financial statements are presented on a modified accrual basis of accounting. All unencumbered budget appropriation lapse at the end of each fiscal year.

NOTE 2 - CREDIT RISK

The Precinct cash was deposited in various institutions during the year. At various times the amount on deposit in these institutions exceeded the \$100,000 federally insured limit.

NOTE 3 - PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Activity for the fixed assets which are capitalized by the Precinct is summarized below:

NOTE 4 - BONDS PAYABLE

On December 20, 1994 the Precinct secured \$935,000 from the New Hampshire Municipal Bond Bank for the issuance of 1994 Series F Bonds. Interest is payable semi-annually. Presented below is a summary of the debt service requirements to maturity by year:

NOTE 5 - REVENUE FROM STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Precinct applied for and received from the State of New Hampshire's Department of Environmental Services a 20% reimbursement for monies spent from June, 1986 through December, 1994 toward compliance with the Safe Water Drinking Act.

NOTE 6 - COMMITMENT

The Precinct reached a settlement with the Cleveland Company, Inc. Over an eminent domain action for easements to Colby Point. The Precinct agreed to pay as just compensation \$25,000 upon delivery of the proper easement and ten annual payments of \$12,500. At the commencement of the eleventh year and each five years thereafter the annual payment will be adjusted based on the average of two factors; the Consumer Price Index and the percentage increase in gallonage pumped. In no event shall the annual payment be less than \$12,500 nor greater than 30% of \$12,500 for year 11 through 15 and 30% greater of the amount calculated in year 11 for years 16 through 20. At the expiration of 20 years, the Precinct shall have the option to renew the Agreement every five years up to ninety-nine years, upon the same terms and conditions except annual payments which shall be renegotiated.

The Precinct charged the initial \$25,000 payment to the cost of the Colby Point project and the \$12,500 to operations during 1995.
