## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

---

The supervisory district of Pittsfield, Pembroke and Allenstown was dissolved by the withdrawal of Pittsfield, and we have been without a superintendent since the first of July last, the end of the supervisory year. The school board tried to form a new district but without success. The schools ought to have a superintendent and arrangements should be made the coming year, if practicable, to secure one.

At the beginning of the fall term there was a large increase in the attendance at the Suncook schools. There was not room enough in the five schools to accommodate the scholars and a sixth school had to be opened. A vacant room in the new school building adjoining the grammar room was fitted up for a schoolroom, with a seating capacity of thirty-four and a school started therein. All six schools have been in session during the fall and winter terms, and it looks as if they would all be needed for the coming year.

The Buck Street school was re-opened last fall and has been continued since. This makes eleven schools that have been maintained for the last two terms, or two more than last year, and they will undoubtedly all have to be maintained the ensuing year.

Only three of last year's teachers could be re-engaged in the fall, so the board had to hire eight new teachers. We were very fortunate in our selection of teachers, and notwithstanding the absence of a superintendent and the scant supervision which the school board was able to give them, the schools are in good condition and satisfactory progress has been made.

A small class completed the course of study last June

and gave appropriate graduating exercises in academy hall. A large class will graduate the coming June.

Pembroke Academy is by contract the high school of the district. The attendance there of Pembroke scholars during the past year has numbered twenty-eight for each term. There will probably be a considerable increase in this attendance the coming year.

A change in arithmetic used in the schools was made at the beginning of the winter term. Nichols' arithmetic, which had been recently introduced upon the recommendation of Superintendent Whitford, was taken out and Hamilton's arithmetic put in its place, to the satisfaction of both teachers and pupils. Frequent changes of text books are not advisable, but in this case Nichols' arithmetic had proven so ill adapted to our schools, and such a hindrance to progress that the best interests of the schools required an immediate change.

Notwithstanding the increased expense attendant upon the maintenance of two additional schools and the fitting up of a new schoolroom and the changing of arithmetics, and the large additional number of school books required by the increased school attendance, we end the financial year with a balance in the treasury of \$1,199.33.

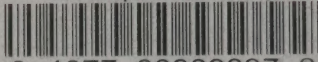
