THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ALLENSTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the municipal building in said Allenstown on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:-

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to give a one percent discount on all 1967 property taxes paid within thirty (30) days after the tax rate is approved.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit of the Town accounts made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the Budget.)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in the Town.
- 7. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Committee of eight citizens to inspect and evaluate the Fire Station for the purpose of repairing or replacing the present building. This Committee to report its findings and recommendations at the 1968 Town Meeting.
- 8. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen hundred Dollars (\$1,300.00) for the purpose of installing a fire alarm box on Route U. S. 3 at a central location for use of the Shopping Plaza Complex. This sum includes one new Alarm box, one half mile of alarm wire and the cost of labor for installation of the same. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)
- 9. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Chief to increase the pay scale of the firemen to the same rate which is paid by the other towns in the tri-town compact (Pembroke and Hooksett), which is \$1.75 per hour. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)

10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to gravel, grade and roadmix Sunnyside Avenue for a distance of two hundred fifty feet (250') from the Dube-Pfefferle line in a westerly direction to the end of the street: and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

11. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to gravel, grade and roadmix Notre Dame Avenue for a distance of two hundred feet (200') southerly on said Avenue from a point south of Ridge Road: and to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine hundred fifty Dollars (\$950.00) for this purpose. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)

- 12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to re-open and gravel the southern section of Letendre Avenue from the end of the present travelled way to Granite Street, a distance of approximately Three hundred feet (300'): and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Pole No. 4 on Sunnyside Avenue; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 14. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street

light and a street sign on Pole No. 2-33 at the bottom of Ray Court, on River Road: and to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 15. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to help support the operation of the emergency ambulance by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 2860, Pembroke, New Hampshire. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three hundred seventeen Dollars (\$317.00) for the Concord Hospital. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)
- 17. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to approve of the issuance by the State Racing Commission of a license for conducting Harness Horse racing in the Town and the sale of pari-mutual pools in connection with said racing, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 18. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to approve of the issuance by the State Racing Commission of a license for conducting Thoroughbred racing in the Town and the sale of pari-mutual pools in connection with said racing, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

In accordance with the vote of the 1958 Town Meeting a motion will be in order at 10:00 A.M. to adjourn the reading of the Warrant to 7:00 P.M., Saturday, March 18, at the Municipal Building.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Allenstown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Trustees of Trust Funds and Library.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1965 - December 31, 1966: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1965 and December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$6,710.02 in 1966.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, are presented in Exhibits A-3 & A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$6, 151.36, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,897.44 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,253.92.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Municipal Court: (Exhibit E)

A Statement of the accounts of the Municipal Court for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit E.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current (Deficit) - Surplus:

The current financial condition of the Town changed from a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$1,728.27, to a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$481.75 in 1966, as shown herewith:

Surety Bond:

The surety bond of the Town Clerk should be increased from \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00.

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that there was a net overdraft of appropriations in the amount of \$3,897.44, - in other words, total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount as indicated herewith:

Included in the net overdraft was an overdraft of \$1,755.17 in the "overlay" assessment. Because the amount of overlay is fixed by the Board of Selectmen, rather than appropriated by the town meeting, the net overdraft of appropriations should be reduced by the overdraft in the "overlay" assessment, leaving a net overdraft of budgetary appropriations of \$2,142.27, as shown herewith:

In cases of this sort the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (R.S.A. 32:10) require that the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, petition the State Tax Commission for a certificate of emergency which would authorize the expenditures made in excess of budgetary appropriations. Our records do not indicate that this procedure was followed. Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Allenstown for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Meeting September 9, 1840, at the house of John Clark. Nathanl Shackford was chosen moderator for said meeting, William Clark chosen grand juror, and Ira B. Osgood petit juror.

Another meeting held September 26, 1840, John Clark chosen moderator and John Perkins chosen petit juror.

Meeting held first Monday of November 1840, to choose seven persons to be electors of the President and Vice President. John Weeks, Stephen Perley, Samuel Hatch, Andrew Pierce, John Scott, Francis Holbrook and Samuel Burns all had 79 votes each. All were elected.

PETITION FOR THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS

April 21, 1843, State of New Hampshire. County of Merrimack.

To the selectmen of Allenstown, Gentlemen:

Whereas the town of Allenstown has never been divided into school districts and still neglects to do so. We therefore citizens and legal voters in said town, request you as soon as possible to divide said town into as many school districts as you may think proper, and to establish the same by miles and bounds and to cause a record thereof to be made.

John Perkins, A.O. Evans, Daniel Batchelder, Rufus Flint, Israel Marden, Samuel

Kennison, Samuel Kennison, Jr., Simeon Philbrick, Joseph Cate, Jr., Jonathan Philbrick, and Nathaniel Smith.

Upon the foregoing application, selectmen do order that the territory of this town be divided into four school districts, to be bounded and called as follow: School district no. 1, is bounded thus: beginning at the north corner of said town thence westerly by Epsom line to the north-east corner of the 11th lot in the first range, thence south by the easterly line of said lot, and also by the easterly line of lot no. 12 in the second range to the south-easterly corner of said lot, thence by said Rangeway to Deerfield line, thence by Deerfield line to the first mentioned bound.

School district no. 2, is bounded thus: beginning at the southerly corner of said town, thence westerly by Hooksett line to the southerly corner of lot no. 12 in the fourth range, thence northerly by the third range to the northeast corner of said lot, thence easterly by the range way to Deerfield line thence by the Deerfield line to the bounds just mentioned.

School district no. 3 is bounded thus: beginning at the northeasterly corner of lot no. 11 in the first range, thence westerly by Epsom line to Suncook river, at the northwesterly corner of said town, thence southerly by said river to the mouth of Boat Meadow Brook so called, thence easterly by said brook to the third range way, thence easterly by said rangeway to the northeasterly corner of lot no. 12, in the fourth range, thence northerly by the easterly line of lot no. 11 in the third range, thence westerly by said range to the southeasterly corner of lot no. 12 in the second range, thence northerly by

the easterly line of said lot and also by the easterly line of lot no. 11 in the first range, to the first mentioned bond at Epsom line.

School district no. 4 is bounded thus: beginning at the mouth of Boat Meadow Brook so called at Suncook river, thence easterly by said brook to the third rangeway, thence by said rangeway to the northeasterly corner of lot 12 in the fourth range, thence by the easterly line of said lot no. 12, to the southeasterly corner of said lot at Hooksett line, thence westerly by Hooksett line to the Merrimack river at the southwesterly corner of said town, thence northwesterly by said river to the mouth of the Suncook river, thence northerly by the Suncook river to the mouth of Boat Meadow Brook at the first mentioned bound.

John Tenant, Alvin Dowst and John Leavitt, selectmen. Recorded April 1843.

The town started to have a Superintending Committee with John Perkins, Sterling Sargent and Frederick Cogswell the first to have this position.

Chosen by ballots John Tennant, Alvin Dowst and Sam Kennison Jr. as selectmen.

For State Representative - Charles Rowell 40, Daniel Batchelder 24, John Tennant 9, Ira Osgood 8, Moses Brown 8.

Chose John Perkins, Sterling Sargent, Frederick Cogswell, Superintending Comm., John Perkins collector of taxes, by hand vote, chose John Perkins, Nathaniel Shackford constables. Chose Philip Sargent, John Appleton, John Rand, Israel Marden, John Perkins and John Leavitt highway surveyors.

Chose John Rand, John Leavitt fence viewers. Chose John Tennant, Sam Kennison Jr., and SethEmery wood surveyors, chose Charles Rowell and Henry Dowst auditors.

Voted to take the surplus revenue money which the town has now on hand amounting to \$231.00 toward defraying town charges, and to keep the rest at interest.

Voted to raise \$50.00 for town charges, voted to raise \$150.00 including what the law requires for schooling. Voted to raise 75 cents on a poll tax and on the rateable estate in proportion to repair roads and bridges.

Voted to accept division of school districts. Voted to divide the non resident school money into four parts to each list. Voted to auction Widow ——— to Simeon Batchelder for 96 cents a week. Voted other paupers be left to the selectmen. Voted that the selectmen act to either settle

or defend the suit of Abner Colby vs. Allenstown. Voted that the selectmen settle with Jacob Woods, about building the Lear bridge in 1842, if they can agree with him as they may think best. Voted that Amos Blaisdell and Luther Blanchard have their school tax to pay out of town, provided their children go out of town to school. Voted meeting dissolved.

August 1844. The selectmen licensed Dan Batchelder to sell wine and spirituous liquors in his store, as the following will show:

We the subscribers, selectmen of the town of Allenstown, hereby license and authorized Daniel Batchelder, of said town to sell wine and spirituous liquors in his store, now occupied by him, in any quantity not less than one pint to be void. Delivered and carried away therefrom for the term of one year from this date, for medical purposes.

August 1844 - The selectmen licensed Thomas Martin to keep a tavern, as follows: The undersigned selectmen of the town of Allenstown, do hereby license Thomas Martin, to keep a tavern at the dwelling house where he now resides, to mix and sell liquors to persons of temperate habits, and for medical purposes, for one year from this time.

September 9, 1844 - Meeting at Capt. J. Clark's house. Joseph Pease chosen grand juror and John Clark, petit juror for the Court of Common Pleas.

September 28, 1844 - Meeting at Capt. J. Clark's house. Samuel Kennison Jr. chosen petit juror to the Circuit Court of the U.S.A. to be held at Exeter.

November 4, 1844 - Meeting at town house at 1 o'clock; Dan Batchelder chosen moderator. It was voted that Allenstown

take no notice of the pauper cases, where Allenstown has been notified by other towns. 34 votes were against changing the Constitution of New Hampshire, 28 were in favor. 40 votes against the abolishment of capital punishment, 26 were in favor. Votes for the six Electors of the President and the Vice President of the U.S. were as follows: William Badger, John McNeil, Elisah Currier, Isaac Hale, Elisah Sawyer and John Putnam all received 63 votes each.

Receipts and assets were to the amount of \$777.94, expenses \$750.14, for a balance at the end of the year of \$27.80. Expenses in parts for State tax \$69.00, for County tax \$73.89, for school \$161.86, for roads \$100.03, for paupers \$172.53, for services as superintending comm. John Perkins \$2.00, Fred Cogswell \$5.50, for 46 soldiers their rations on muster day \$23.00, 35 soldiers for military duty on muster day \$35.00, John Whipple cost and damages of the suit commenced by Abner Colby, \$16.50.

1878 SCHOOL HOUSE

No. 1 - The outside doors of the school house shall be opened by the janitor as the person appointed for the purpose at 30 minutes before 9 A.M. and not before each school day and shall remain open until the close of the school for the day, when they shall be locked. During this time the scholars shall have access to the

basement and the out buildings but these shall be kept fastened at all other times.

No. 2 - The school house shall not be opened and used for any purpose than the regular instructions of the public schools except by consent of the Prudential Committee as by vote of the district.

TEACHERS

No. 1 - The teachers shall be present in their respective rooms 5 minutes before 9 A.M. and 1 P.M. at which times, the school rooms shall be unlocked and not before. On leaving the rooms at the close of each session they shall see that the doors of their rooms be securely fastened.

No. 2 - The teachers shall visit daily the basement and the out buildings, and shall see that they are kept clean and neat. Any defacement or deplacement of these houses, or any injury done to the school house or the fences shall be reported at once to the Prudential Committee and the teachers may inflict such punishment for this injury as in their judgement is required.

No. 3 - The teachers shall see that their respective school rooms are kept clean and neat at all times either by the janitor or the pupils detailed for that purpose.

No. 4 - The teachers may at their discretion require a written excuse from a parent or guardian for tardiness, absences or dismissal.

PUPILS

No. 1 - The pupils shall be punctual at school and shall be present during each days session unless prevented by hecessity. Habitual absences or tardiness shall be reported by the teachers to the Superintending Committee.

- No. 2 No profane or obscene language shall be used or smoking allowed in or about the school house.
- No. 3 The pupils are required to submit modestly to all the rules and regulations of the teachers.
- No. 4 Any pupil who may injure the school house, out buildings or fence, the furniture or apparatus, the parents or guardian of such pupil shall repair the injury to the satisfaction of the Prudential Committee. In case of any disagreement between the parties in regard to such repairs it may be referred to the Selectmen or the Superintending Committee where decision will be final. If the parent or guardian shall refuse to make such repairs as so ordered it may be done by the Prudential Committee and the same shall be assessed upon his next annual tax bill.


JANITOR

The janitor shall see that the house is properly cleaned, and the outside doors leading to the basement and the doors of the out houses are unlocked 30 minutes before 9 A.M. and not before. He shall also see that they are properly fastened at the close of each day's session.

CIVIL DEFENSE

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT ALLENSTOWN - 1966

With our men giving up their lives in Vietnam for freedom, we find ourselves wondering if the world will ever be at peace. The only comfort we have is that should a nuclear attack occur, we can depend on our Civil Defense Fall-out Shelter. Our community has one of the largest shelters in New Hampshire. Through the generosity of Mr. Moody Dole, we have, at our disposal the basement and first floor of the Dole-Suncook Mill, located on Canal Street, Allenstown, N. H.

This shelter has been equipped with innumerable items for our survival and comfort should the need arise. These items have been supplied by the Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense. In the near future, blankets and cots will also be stocked. In 1966, the Corps of Engineers updated the shelter, and space to accommodate 4,900 persons was provided.

Communication with Area 6 Headquarters has been established. Radio communication is maintained every Tuesday night from 7 to 8 p.m., where messages are received and transmitted with other Civil Defense units in the area. Approximately every three months, an "Early Warning" exercise is conducted. This warning originates at the "North American Air Defense Headquarters" (NORAD), at

Colorado Springs, Colorado. This message is received through our Red Phone system.

In the near future, a Disc will be added to the board on the fire department alarm system. This disc will ring 14 blows, advising the community of an incoming danger.

Aside from the shelter, Civil Defense, plays an important role in the community. We work very closely with our Fire Department, using the same base station. A scuba team is available to the town to better protect the community.

This past year, a fire trailer and a five ton truck, have been purchased through the Office of Civil Defense. With the help of the fire department, the truck, has been equipped with a 1,600 gallon water tank to help during the drought season, when water shortage is a problem. These two items add 2,200 gallons of water to our fire department. The Civil Defense office is also part owner of a chain saw, which was purchased together with the Fire Department and the Road Agent.

All this equipment has been purchased with the money allowed in last year's budget.

In closing, I would like to thank the people of our community and especially the members of the Fire Department, for the encouragement and support they have given me this past year. I also urge more people to become interested in this project because someday it might save our people from disaster.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres --- a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

School enrollments in Allenstown. Hooksett, and Pembroke have increased over 48 per cent in the past 5 years. These towns have not only highly desirable business areas, (when zoning permits) but have equally desirable residential sections. All the reports I have seen indicate that increased growth may be expected to continue and, probably, at an accelerated rate. This means many problems for our schools which must be met, one way or another, at increased costs. It is a matter of opinion whether good to excellent schools attract people or whether people force the making of better schools. A modern educational system, modern at all levels, is the greatest asset any community can have. Changes in our educational system will take place either on a hit-or-miss basis as necessity demands or on a more carefully planned program, which can look into the future as well as care for the present.

The state average high school cost has been estimated at \$589. Pembroke Academy has set its rate at \$585, an increase of \$65. Continued increases are to be expected as costs in general spiral and teachers' salaries continue upward. Then too, the Academy must charge enough to write off its debt over a reasonable period of years. The yearly increase in rates could be substantial as it is this year.

The past year proved to be the most difficult one to hire teachers. The worst is yet to come! Recruiters from the west coast and even Hawaii are booking interviews in this area now. Competition for teachers is literally nation-wide!

We appreciate your fine support of the Allenstown School.

ANNUAL FIRE DEPARTMENT

REPORT



To the Residents of Allenstown:

I would like to begin this report to you with a tribute to Armand Brisbois who retired this year from his post of Deputy Chief of the Department. We have been fortunate to have his services over the years and owe much to him.

After considerable study, we revised our "red phone" system this year. It is now connected to the answering service with the result that we have 24 hour service - 365 days of the year. The fire station and the home of the Chief are also connected to provide better coverage.

A new alarm system has been installed and is in operation. Arrangements can be made to tie in any business or industrial establishment to this system. I strongly urge all businessmen to seriously consider tying into the system as prompt notification of a fire results in our getting there faster -- and it is the first few minutes which are the most valuable in firefighting.

We now have equipment available for the administration of oxygen. This is available to you in emergencies and we ask that you call us when oxygen is needed.

The Department has appointed a training afficer Lieut. Paul Dandurand, who will be responsible for keeping up with the latest methods and techinques of firefighting and for training your firemen in these methods. We feel this will result in still further improvement in our service to the Town.

Last year we purchased 500 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ hose and 1,000 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hose, the latter to replace hose on hand which was considered to be unfit for sustained use. We also purchased and installed safety belts on the trucks to reduce the danger to the men riding on the back of the apparatus.

The fire station was repainted during the year. I would like to take this opportunity to point out that the town will soon have to make a major decision concerning the station. Its present age and condition will not permit us to continue a "piece-meal" type of maintenance much longer; we will either have to do a major structural overhaul on it or replace it with a new station. Your Department earnestly recommends that a new station be built, one which will be adequate to serve the town now and in the future.

We fought 16 more fires this year than in the preceding year. During this time, two trucks broke down and major repairs were needed to keep them in operating condition. Your cooperation and generosity kept the repair bills at a minimum, however, it was a budget item we had not counted on. Your fire department recommends a review of the equipment and a plan for adding new equipment necessary for the protection of the town as well as for the replacement of obsolete equipment.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Allenstown for their wonderful cooperation during the past year.
