Recommendations

Serious consideration should be given the Flaghole school house. This is the smallest building in use at the present time. There are nineteen pupils in attendance and there is every indication that within a year or two this number will be increased. The building should be made larger by lengthening it ten or twelve feet and making changes as to lighting so as to make it modern in every respect. It is badly overcrowded just now.

I think the time has arrived when a regular teacher should replace the cadet teachers at Boston Hill. I would recommend that such a change be made at the opening of the school year 1931-32.

The amount of money being paid for transportation and high school tuition for the current year is more than was raised at the last school meeting. These are items that are hard to anticipate and yet these increased costs must be met. I suggest that \$600.00 be raised at the coming meeting, the use of which be made immediately available to meet the increased costs of these two items.

The year has been a very pleasant one, the teachers, parents and the school board have been real factors in the success of the Andover schools.
