TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bow in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Bow on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges in addition to amount required by law.
4. To see if the town will accept state aid and raise such amounts as recommended by State Highway Department for state aid construction and state aid maintenance.
5. To see if the town will raise \$2,000 for electric street lights in use at present time.
6. To see if the town will accept cemetery trust funds from Estate of Annette H. Clough, \$200.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise such sum of money as may be necessary to extend the electric lights from Colby's Corner on Wood Hill, past Downing Place as far as residence of John L. Parker. (By petition.)
8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
9. To see if the town will take over the care of the Green Cemetery at Bow Center and accept trust funds.
10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

In accordance with the statutes (New Hampshire Laws of 1907, Chapter 147) you are requested to take measures to suppress the brown tail moth and the gipsy moth on your premises. The law declares these insects to be a public nuisance and orders their suppression by property owners. Suppression is enforceable by law up to a cost of one-half of 1% of the tax valuation of the property concerned.

Necessary measures must be completed on or before March 20.

This notice is sent to all property owners in accordance with instructions of the Division of Insect Suppression, of the State Department of Agriculture.

The Brown Tail Moth

This pest is present in numbers on apple and pear trees and on many shade trees. Through the winter it occupies webs as big as a hen's egg, attached to the tips of twigs. All such webs should be cut off carefully, gathered up and burned.

The Gipsy Moth

The gipsy moth is found through the winter in the form of egg-masses attached to the trunks of trees, stones, piazza posts, or other locations. Each egg-mass is $\frac{3}{4}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch long, is covered with fine hairs and is the color of chamois skin. Egg-masses should be painted with creosote. Scraping them off will not destroy them, because the eggs will hatch even though lying on the ground.

Obligation of Property Owners

If the insects described above are not suppressed on or before March 20, the duly constituted authorities have the right to enter upon the property and to take such measures as may be necessary. The property owner will be liable for the expense in connection with such action within the limits prescribed by law.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my eleventh annual report of the schools of Bow for the year ending June 30, 1930.

There were maintained during the year, seven schools, for a school-year of 37 weeks, with two changes in the teaching force.

The total school enrollment was 133, with a daily average attendance of 93.78 per cent.

The schools were in session on an average of 360 half-days, a gain of 10 half-days.

Of the teachers employed, six have state certificates, six are graduates of a normal school, one has attended summer institutes for teachers, one has taken a correspondence course for teachers, and one is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire.

One school had two changes in the teaching force, due largely to the lack of parental guidance and discipline and in part to the failure of the teachers to manage a school of this kind. However, the third teacher maintained good discipline and secured excellent results.

HEALTH AND SANITATION.

Disraeli, a wise statesman, studying the influences affecting national prosperity, said: "Public health is the foundation on which reposes the happiness of the people and the prosperity of a country. The care of the public health is the first duty of a statesman." He might have added that the care of public health is not only the duty of a statesman but also of every citizen.

Hygiene, sanitation and physiology are taught in all our schools, with emphasis placed upon pure foods, pure water, need of ventilation, and proper care of the body.

Health inspection conducted by the school nurse is a great aid to the teacher in imparting the laws of health.

Health inspection of the school children by our school nurse covers diseases and defects of most every kind, such as common contagious colds, acute cases of contagious skin or

eye disease, defective eyesight, hearing and teeth, adenoids, enlarged tonsils, malnutrition, tuberculosis, weakness of the heart, curvature of the spine, nervousness and in fact nearly all contagious.

The school nurse, Miss Douillette, has, with the coöperation of parents, succeeded in having many of these defects remedied by a physician or surgeon, who has generously contributed his services for little or no compensation.

The school nurse is working faithfully and successfully for good health in school and home.

CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS.

In sparsely settled places in our state the one-teacher school may be needed for some years to come.

From the report of the State Board of Education we find that there are 44 less one-teacher schools in 1930 than there were in 1929. Other schools might have been consolidated to the advantage of the children.

Following are some of the advantages of a consolidated school: the building is large, well lighted and heated, with grounds well cared for; the number of pupils is large enough so that the teacher may have one or two grades instead of five to eight, as is usually the case in a one-teacher school, thereby giving more time for each class and therefore better results; it makes games and plays more interesting and arouses a spirit of emulation in the classroom work; attendance increases, tardiness, absence and truancy decrease.

A large school may have an enlarged curriculum and better equipment, making the teaching of practical subjects like manual training and home economics profitable. Better teachers can be employed in the large schools because wages are higher, the classes fewer, and the opportunity for advancement and social enjoyments greater.

The transportation of pupils should receive the utmost care; the vehicle should be comfortable, safe, and driven by a reliable driver; the pupils should be taken from and returned to a place in the public highway nearest to their home.

The public school is one of the most important institutions in American life and is worthy of the most careful considera-

tion. The most important problem is the planning of a school system which will best prepare the young men and women for their life's work. Changes in methods or institutions should not be made just to have something new and different, but only after a most thorough consideration. Neither should a method or practice be retained after it has outlived its usefulness. It behooves the citizens to study the problems of the progressive and non-progressive school and decide which they will choose.

ATTENDANCE AND CHILD-LABOR LAW.

The school attendance law of the state, demanding that every child shall have at least eight full years of schooling, has been well enforced. The cases of non-attendance were confined to a few families who gave, as a reason, want of means to furnish the child with proper clothing and food. The child-labor laws have been strictly obeyed by all the local industries, and no violation of this law has been reported.

The teachers were efficient and did good work, as is shown by the standard tests which were given throughout the year.

The good work accomplished in our schools shows the wisdom of the school board in retaining experienced and successful teachers.

Parents and citizens are invited to visit the schools frequently. Parents, by frequent visits to the school, would form a personal acquaintance with the teacher and learn at first hand the real situation of the classroom, and thereby be able to talk over frankly with the teacher the interest of the child. These visits would clear up misunderstandings, if any exist, and would make school work more profitable for the child and give to the teacher a greater interest in him.

In conclusion, I express my appreciation for the coöperation and assistance given to me by the teachers, the school board and the citizens.

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my third annual report of the schools of Bow for the year ending June 30, 1930.

Each pupil is given a physical examination at the beginning of the fall term and a record is kept stating the condition of the pupil examined. Follow-up work is carried on throughout the year. Notices are sent to parents if defects are found. Home visits are made and help given to parents in having the defects corrected. Weight charts are placed in each school room and underweights are given special attention, advising of food and diet.

Pupils are watched closely to protect them against communicable diseases.

Through the coöperation of Dr. Bugbee and the Memorial Hospital, a number of tonsils and adenoid cases have been corrected. Children have been taken to eye clinics and fitted to glasses. This was made possible through the assistance of Mr. Jay H. Corliss, Secretary of the State Board of Public Welfare.
