

ARTICLES IN TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hollis qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lower Town Hall in said Town, on the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2nd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and all other Town Officers and Committees.
 - 4th. To appropriate money for schools.
 - 5th. To appropriate money for Library.
 - 6th. To appropriate money for Memorial Day.
- 7th. To see if the Town will vote to abate the Taxes of any who may apply.
- 8th. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money for repairing Highways as required by State Law to procure State Aid.
- 9th. To see if the Town will appropriate money for the better accommodation of the Public Library or act anything in relation thereto.
- 10th. To see if the Town will appropriate money to defray the expense of introducing water into the North Cemetery or act in relation thereto.
- 11th. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money to reimburse P. C. Baker for cattle bitten by dog.
- 12th. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money to purchase Markers for soldiers' graves or act in relation thereto.



REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education, in submitting this annual report to the citizens of Hollis, feel that they can give assurance that good and efficient work has been rendererd by a corps of teachers who were interested in their work and, when their efforts have been supplemented by parental cooperation, very satisfactory progress has been made. Parents cannot too fully realize how much depends upon the home influence. Laws governing the schools are made by the teachers, and others, in view of discipline and best conditions for intellectual work and should be thus considered by parents and scholars alike. The work has continued by the same corps of instructors except in the Centre Primary School when Miss Annie Newton of Asburnham, Mass., succeeded Miss Edith M. Flagg.

Little has been done the past year in way of change of text books. While all change is not true progress, all progress denotes change.

The new often becomes obsolete and must be discarded in order to keep abreast of the times in changed conditions. Our geographies had become worn and a change was demanded. The past decade and a half has wrought such wonderful changes in the geography of the world, new states, new territory and new possessions have been added to our domains, so the old books were not correct instruments in acquiring accurate knowledge. We always intend to exercise due consideration in making changes and in providing school supplies else the expense becomes too great.

The enrollment of the High School has increased to twenty-six. A class of five came up from the Grammar School making a first class in the High School, or four classes in all, when we previously had but three. While this is encouraging as indicating determination on part of the scholars to obtain higher education, it makes the work of the principal more arduous and difficult. As every moment must be utilized and the work hurried to get through with all the classes. A class of thirteen is expected to graduate in June, being the largest class for many years. The Junior Class numbers but three and the first and second classes five each.

There has been no apparent lack of interest in the school. A beautiful and valuable collection of ferns, numbering more than a hundred, was given to the school by the late Dexter Greenwood. All such things help as they come along year after year and afford aid in instruction.

Some needed repairs were made on the school house in No. 6. The piazza was rebuilt and the house painted in the interior and on the exterior. No very great repairs were made on any of the other school buildings.

On the following page will be found the usual tabulated statement of schools.
