HASSAN REMAINS POPULAR, LEADS GOP CHALLENGERS

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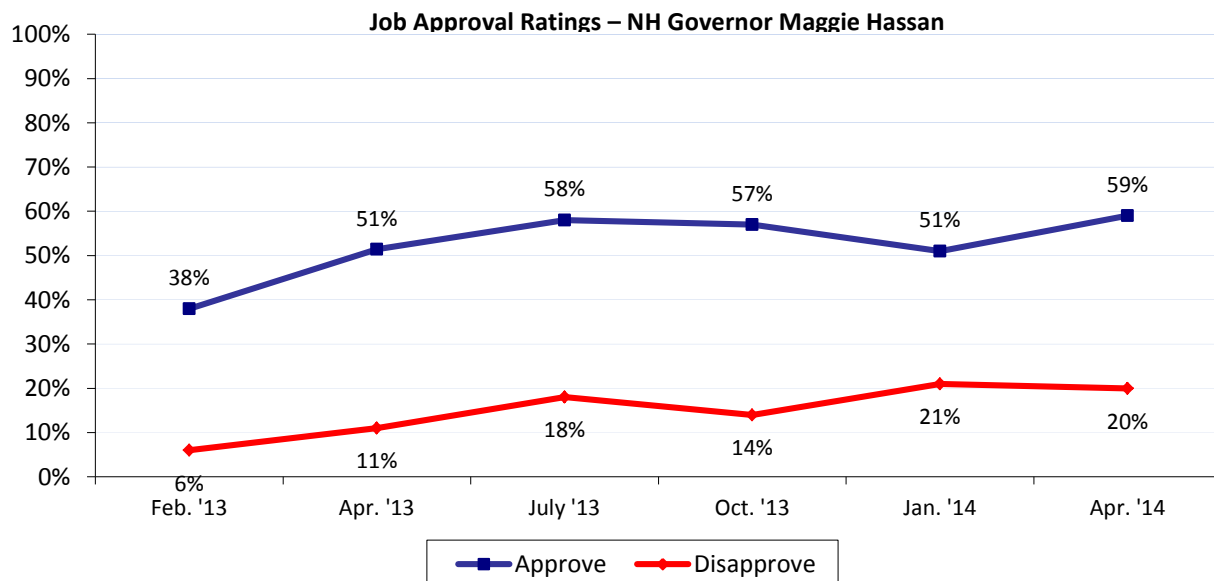
DURHAM, NH – A majority of Granite Staters approve of the job that Maggie Hassan is doing as Governor. Hassan currently leads three relatively unknown Republican challengers by double-digit margins. Most New Hampshire residents think the state is on the right track, but economic concerns remain the top problem facing the state.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and seven (507) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between April 1 and April 9, 2014. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent. The sample included 387 likely voters (with a +/- 5.0 percent margin of sampling error).

Gubernatorial Approval

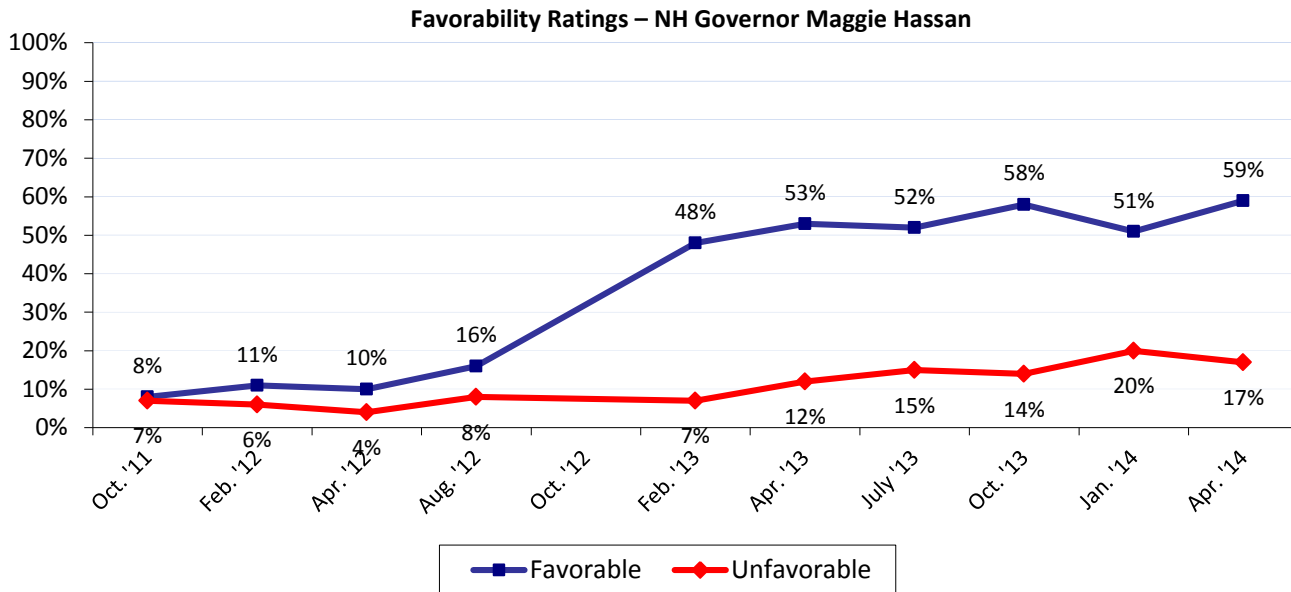
More than a year into her first term in office, Democratic Governor Maggie Hassan has the approval of a majority of New Hampshire residents. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 59% of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor, 20% disapprove, and 22% are neutral or don't know enough to say. Hassan's job approval rating has increased from 51% in January.

Liberals (78%), Democrats (77%), union households (77%) and people who oppose the Tea Party (76%) are most likely to say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor. Tea Party supporters (32%), Republicans (43%), conservatives (44%) and residents between 35 and 49 (46%) are most likely to disapprove of the governor.

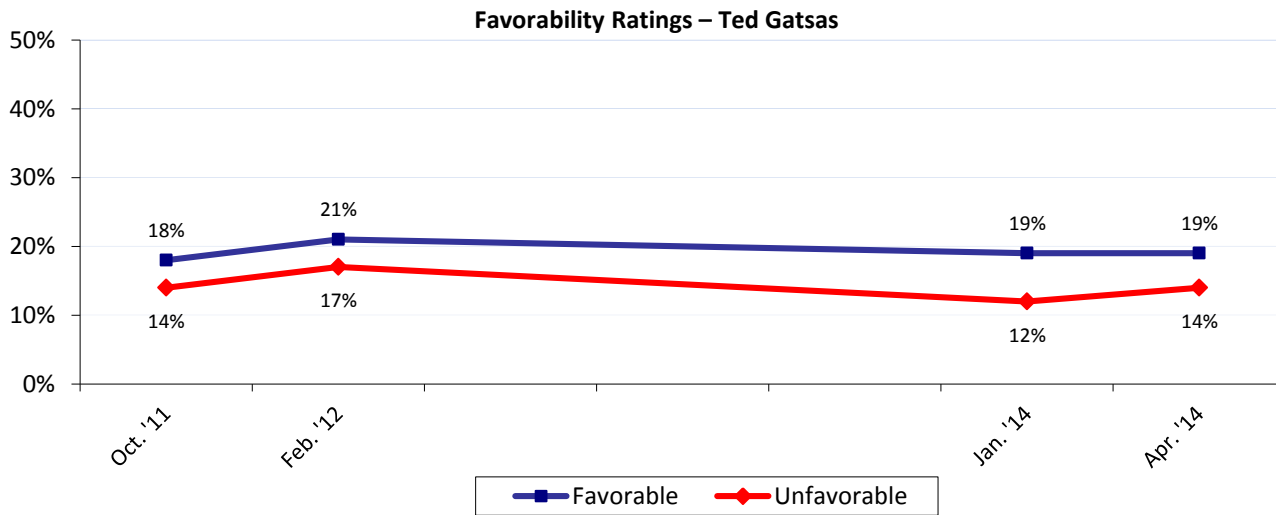
Hassan also continues to enjoy high favorability ratings. Currently, 59% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Hassan, 17% have an unfavorable opinion, 11% are neutral, and 13% say they don't know enough about her to say. Hassan's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, is a high +42%, which is up from +31% in January. Hassan is viewed favorably across the political spectrum-- she is very popular among Democrats (+72% net favorable) but also popular among Independents (+25%), and Republicans (+17%).



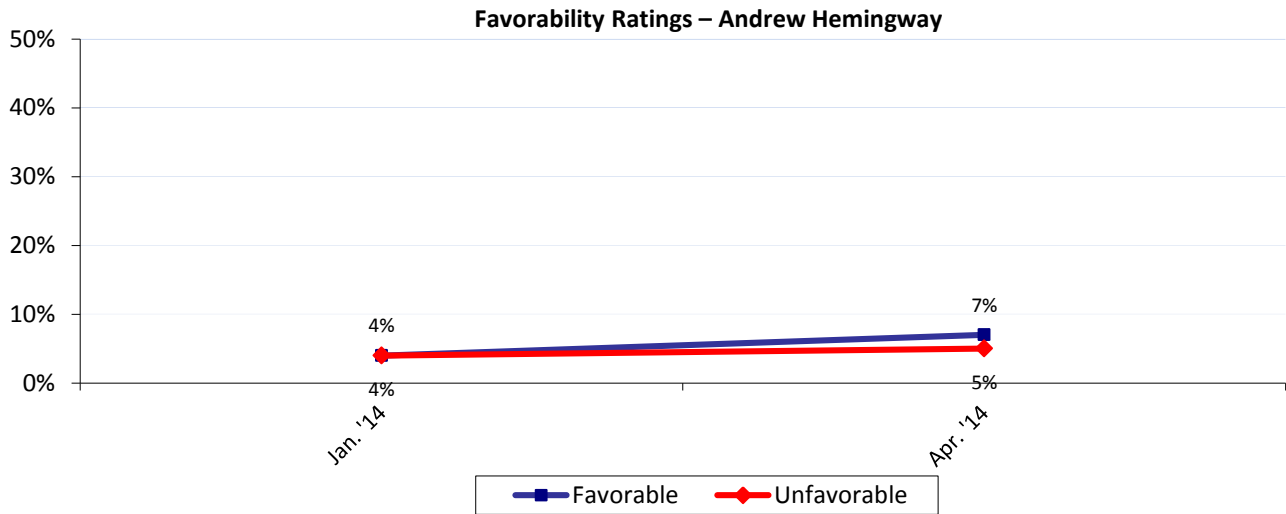
Potential GOP Challengers

In just over six months, Granite Staters will go to the polls to elect the state's Governor, who serves only a two-year term. While Governor Hassan has not made an official announcement that she will seek re-election, most believe she will run for a second term. It is unclear whether the Republican field for Governor is set. Political Activist Andrew Hemingway (R-Bristol) and businessman Walt Havenstein (R-Alton) have both officially entered the race. Mayor Ted Gatsas (R-Manchester) has also expressed some interest in challenging Governor Hassan. All three candidates are largely unknown to New Hampshire residents.

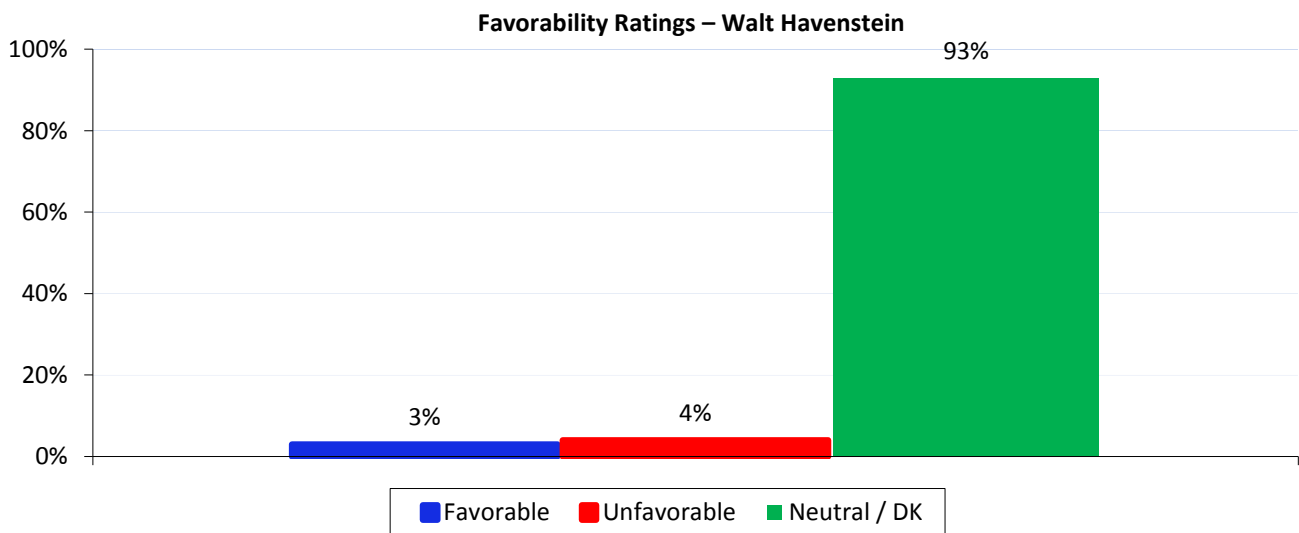
Despite being mayor of the state's largest city, only 19% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Gatsas, 14% have an unfavorable opinion, 12% are neutral and 55% don't know enough to say. His net favorability is +5% which is down from +7% in January. Gatsas' net favorability among 2014 likely voters is +4%.



Hemingway, who announced his candidacy in January, is still largely unknown -- only 7% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Hemingway, 5% have an unfavorable opinion, 4% are neutral and 84% don't know enough to say. His net favorability is +2%, which is up from 0% in January. Hemingway's net favorability among 2014 likely voters is +1%.



Havenstein, who announced his candidacy today is even less known -- only 3% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Havenstein, 4% have an unfavorable opinion, 4% are neutral and 89% don't know enough to say. His net favorability is -1%. Havenstein's net favorability among 2014 likely voters is also -1%.

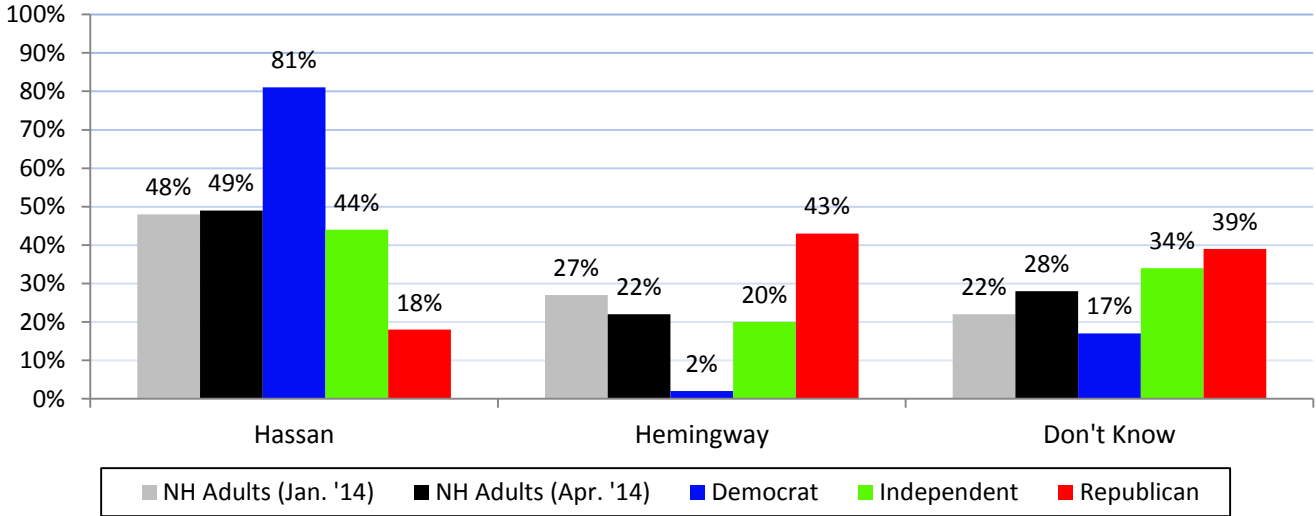


2014 Governor Trial Heats

Very few voters have decided who they will vote for in the 2014 gubernatorial election as 11% have definitely decided on someone, 9% are leaning toward someone and 80% are still trying to decide.

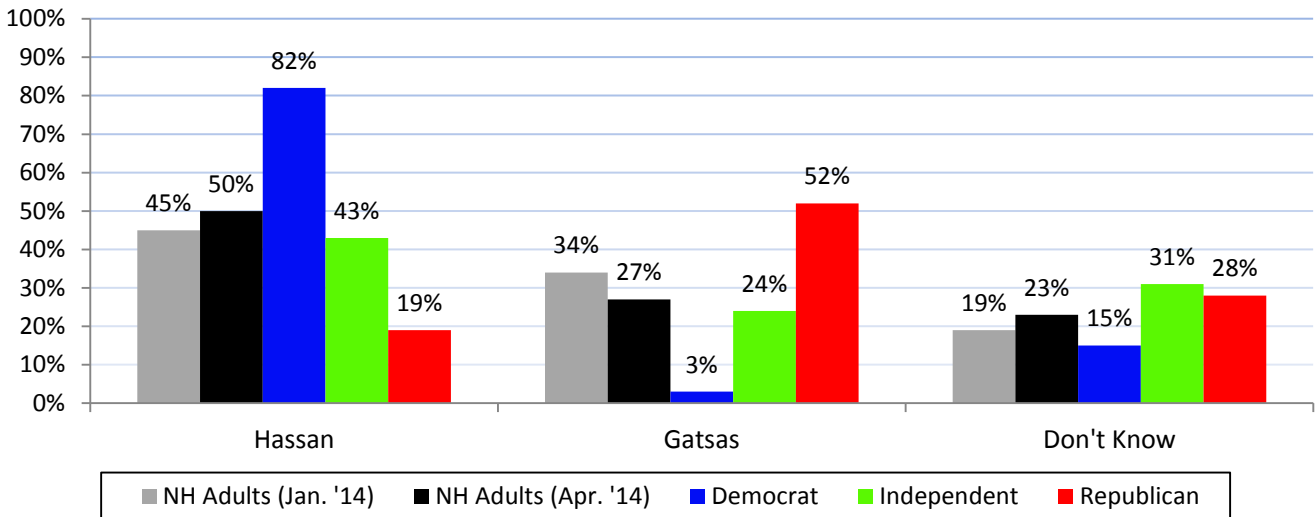
If the 2014 gubernatorial election were held today between Hassan and Hemingway, 49% of likely voters would vote for Hassan, 22% would vote for Hemingway, 1% would vote for someone else and 28% are undecided.

If the 2014 gubernatorial election were held today between Hassan and Gatsas, 50% of likely voters would vote for Hassan, 27% would vote for Gatsas, 1% would vote for someone else and 23% are undecided.

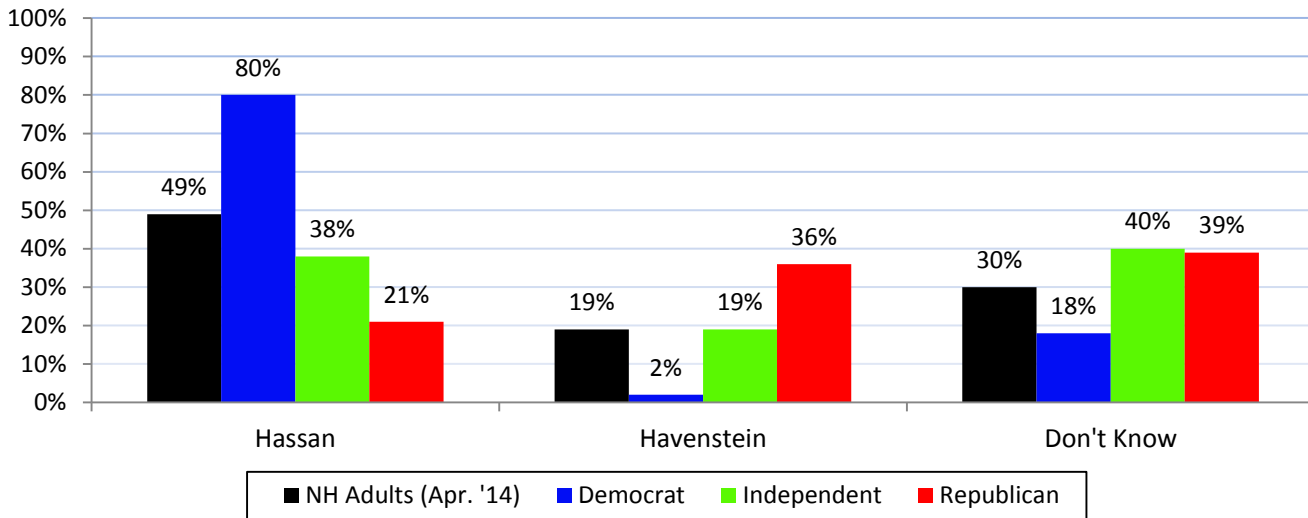
Governor - Hassan vs. Gatsas - Likely Voters



If Walt Havenstein were the Republican nominee, 49% of likely voters would vote for Hassan, 19% would vote for Havenstein, 2% would vote for someone else and 30% are undecided.

As would be expected in hypothetical matchups this early, Democrats and Republicans largely support their party's candidate and many Independents are undecided. Currently, Hassan also leads all three challengers among independents by double-digit margins and also is picking up about one in five Republicans in each matchup.

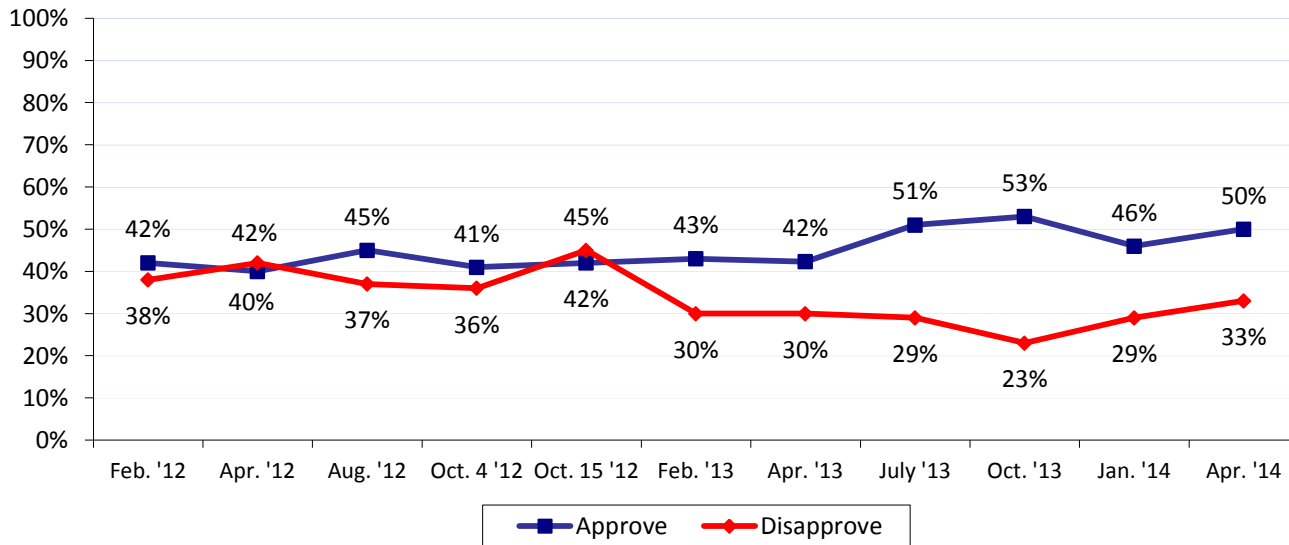
Governor - Hassan vs. Havenstein - Likely Voters



Approval of NH Legislature

Currently, 50% of New Hampshire adults approve of how the State Legislature is doing its job, 33% disapprove, and 17% are neutral or don't know enough to say. This represents a 4-point increase in approval since January. While a majority of Democrats (61%) approve of the state legislature, only 45% of Republicans and 37% of Independents approve of the job it is doing.

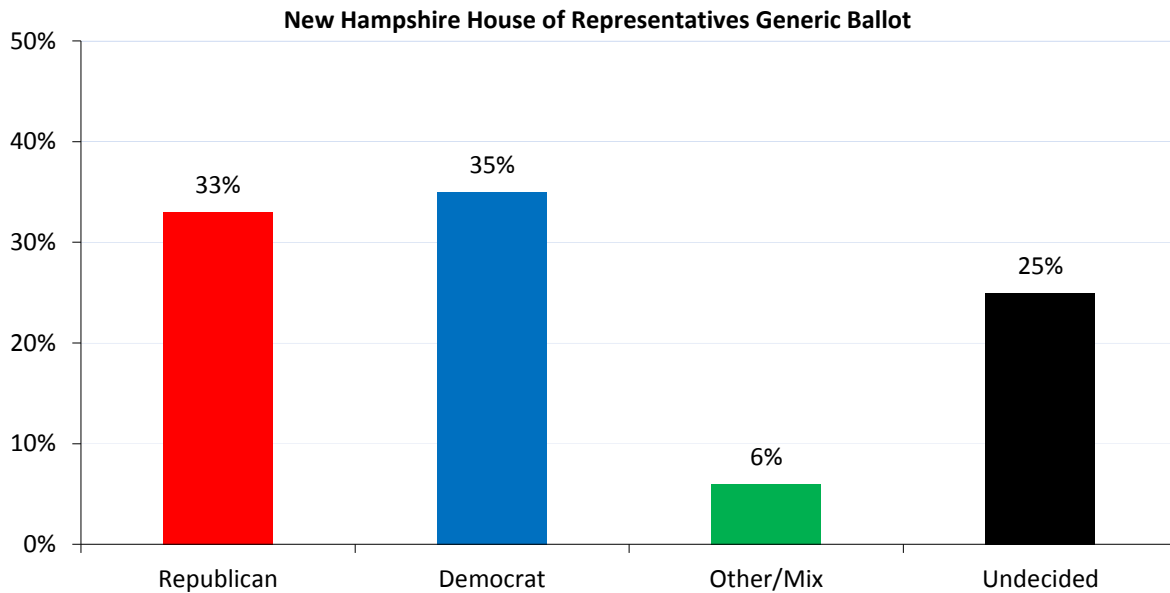
Approval Rating – NH Legislature



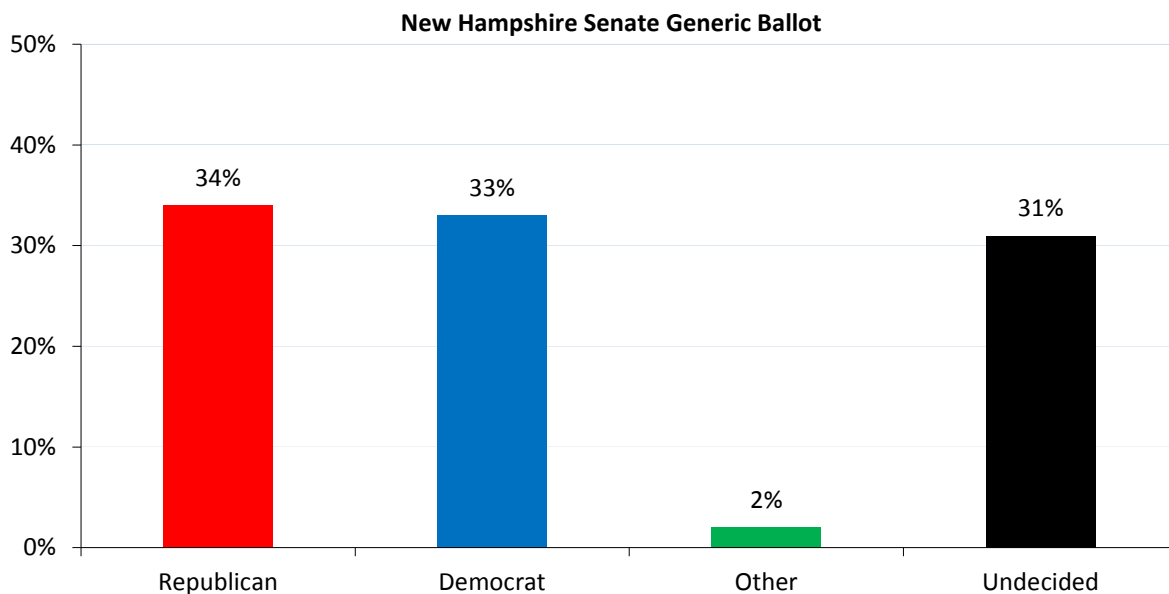
New Hampshire House of Representatives

Likely 2014 New Hampshire voters were asked which party's candidate they planned on supporting in the upcoming election for state representatives. Voters are currently divided on which party to support, with 33% supporting Republican candidates, 35% supporting Democratic candidates, 6% supporting another party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 25% undecided.

Based on an evaluation of past "generic ballot" polling in New Hampshire and actual election results, these results would translate into 214 seats for Republicans and 186 seats for Democrats. But this estimate, and the estimate for Senate seats, is highly dependent on actual turnout in November.

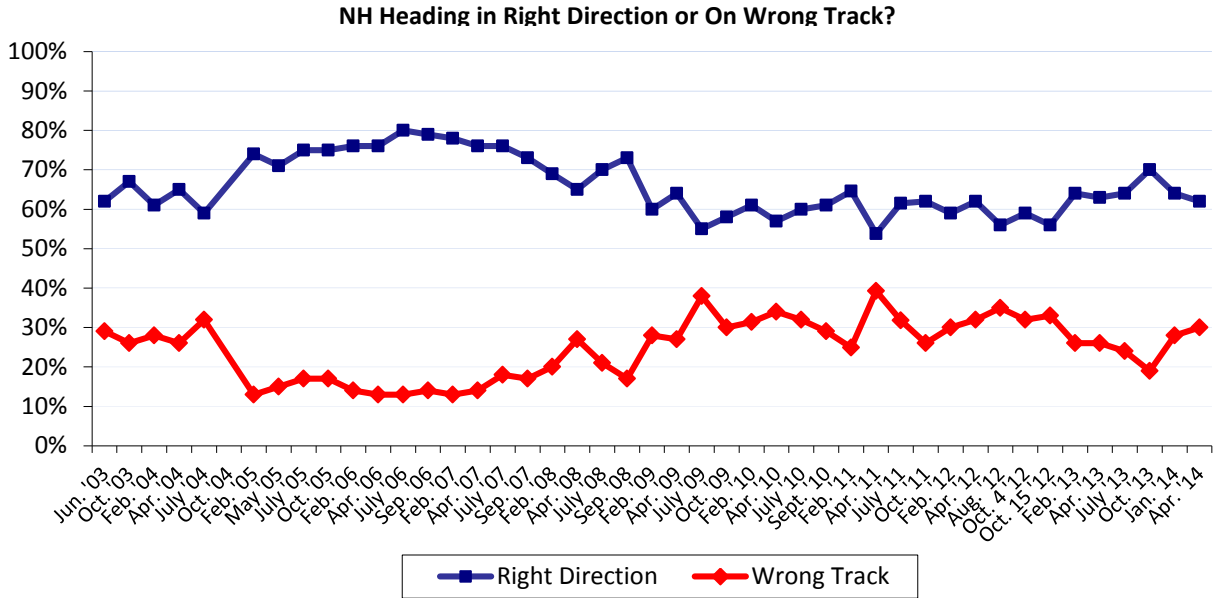


Likely 2014 New Hampshire voters are also evenly divided on which party to support for the State Senate, with 34% supporting Republican candidates, 33% supporting Democratic candidates, 2% supporting another party, and 31% are undecided. Based on an evaluation of past "generic ballot" polling in New Hampshire and actual election results, these results would translate into 15 seats for Republicans and 9 seats for Democrats.



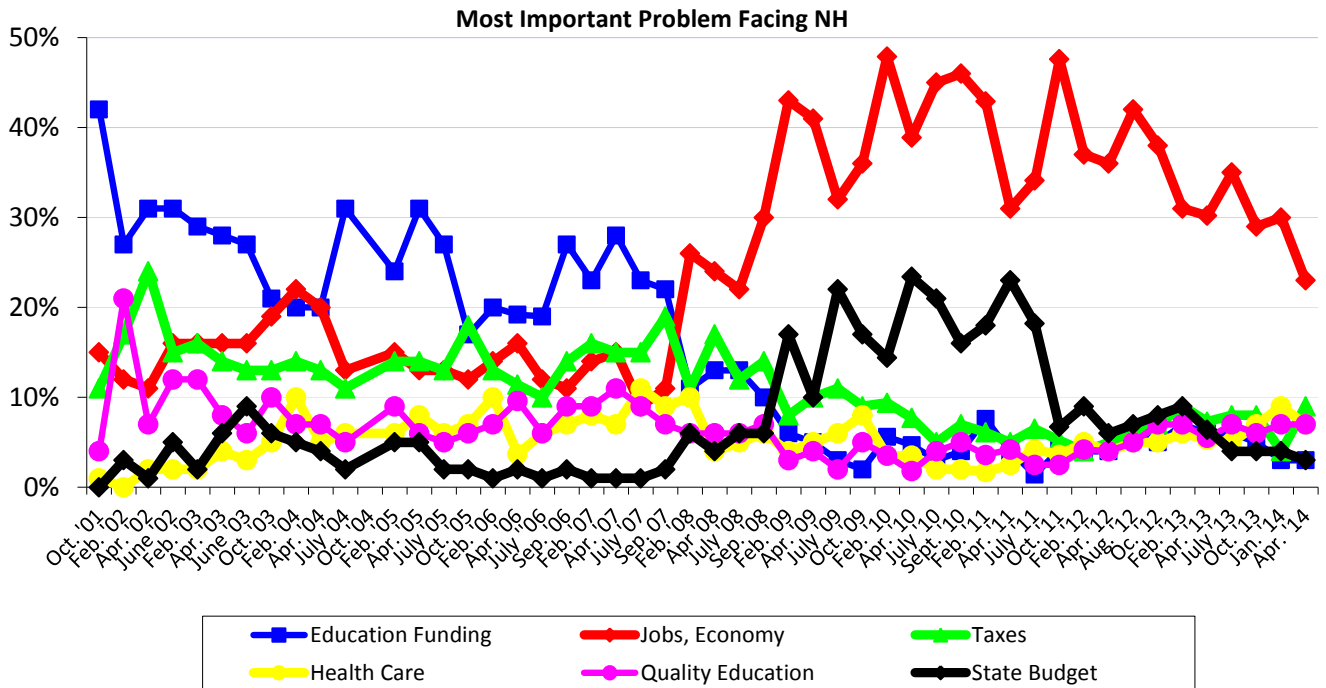
Right Direction or Wrong Track?

New Hampshire residents continue to believe the state as a whole is headed in the right direction. Currently, 62% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, 30% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 8% are unsure. The view that New Hampshire is headed in the right direction is bi-partisan -- majorities of Democrats (77%), Independents (52%), and Republicans (52%) say the state is headed in the right direction.



Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

The state's economy and unemployment continue to be seen as the most important problem facing the state. Currently, 23% of New Hampshire adults say that jobs and the economy is the most important issue facing the state, followed by taxes (9%), health care (7%), education quality (7%), the state budget (3%), and education funding (3%). Two other notable problems cited were infrastructure (5%) and drugs (4%).



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and seven (507) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between April 1 and April 9, 2014. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, age, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may sum to just above or below 100%. Respondent numbers in each demographic may not equal the total respondent number due to respondents choosing not to answer some demographic questions.

A historical analysis was done looking at the results of the "generic ballot" question and the actual number of seats won by Republicans in the New Hampshire House and Senate in the 2000 through 2012 elections was presented at the annual meeting of the American Association for Public Opinion Research Annual (AAPOR), and is available from the UNH Survey Center.

The model developed in this paper used for estimating House seats from the generic ballot question is:
 $\text{HOUSE SEATS} = -264.711 + (2\text{-party GOP estimate} * 986.291)$

In this Granite State Poll, the two party estimate of House vote percentage for Republicans, 48.5% (33% GOP / (33% GOP + 35% DEM) = 48.5%) is calculated and inserted into the formula above. This results in an estimate of 214 Republican House seats and 186 Democratic House seats.

The model developed for estimating Senate seats from the generic ballot question is:
 $\text{SENATE SEATS} = -20.355 + (2\text{-party GOP estimate} * 68.817)$

In this Granite State Poll, the two party estimate of Senate vote percentage for Republicans, 50.7% (34% GOP / (34% GOP + 33% DEM) = 50.7%) is calculated and inserted into the formula above. This results in an estimate of 15 Republican Senate seats and 9 Democratic Senate seats.
