To the inhabitants of the Town of Belmont in the County of Belknap, in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall, in said Belmont, on Tuesday, the 8th of March next, at 9 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, and one Trustee of Public Library for three years.
3. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from the Roberts place on Durrel Mountain Road, to Frank Brooks place on the Province Road.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray all expenditures as listed in the Budget and make appropriations for the same.
5. To see what the Town will vote to do with its Parsonage Fund.
6. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on Taxes paid on or before July 1st, 1932.

7. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm its present indebtedness.
 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for Band Concerts.
 10. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to hire an engineer to survey for a water supply as recommended by the State Board of Health.
 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise money by a bond issue to carry out the recommend of the engineer.
 12. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools. This is my seventeenth report to you.

ATTENDANCE

Greater co-operation on the part of parents and the greater pleasure which children find in the schools in these days have reduced the number of unnecessary absences to a minimum. We have little truancy today. Our attendance last year was better than the year previous. This improvement was due to fewer colds and minor ailments. We made a poorer showing in tardinesses. The names of the sixteen children who have perfect records for the year will be found printed on another page.

TEACHERS

We had the unusual experience of no teacher replacement this year. I do not recall a similar experience since I have been your superintendent. We were, indeed, fortunate as we have an excellent group. The work in all our schools is progressing finely.

A year ago our total registration was 224. The decrease is due to the fact that the Ladd Hill children are now attend-

ing school in Laconia. There are now 24 Belmont children in the Laconia elementary schools and 8 in the high school.

HIGH SCHOOL

Our high school has increased in numbers one-third over last year. We now have an enrollment of 28. There is every reason to believe that we shall have an enrollment next year of at least 35.

The enlarged enrollment made the need of another class room imperative. One end of the basement was partitioned off and a very good room made. It has proved much more satisfactory than was anticipated. The room, however, is very much in need of furniture.

It was apparent that an additional teacher would be needed. Mr. Robert Hislop, a graduate of Bates, with an excellent record, was secured for the position. Mr. Hislop took over the work in English for which he is particularly well prepared.

The school is steadily improving. Certainly we are having the best year we have so far had. I want to commend the teachers for their good spirit and the students for their effort and fine deportment.

LADD HILL

For several years one group of children who would naturally attend the Ladd Hill school have been transported to Laconia at the expense of the district, the tuition expense being assumed by the parents. After long consideration the school board decided to close the Ladd Hill school for this year and transport all the children to Laconia and assume, of course, the tuition expense. Excellent transportation was secured.

This arrangement on the whole has proved much more satisfactory. The cost of transportation and tuition is not materially greater than was the cost of the maintenance of the school and the transportation referred to above.

FINANCES

Expenditures for schools, like all other town and city expenditures, are rightfully receiving at the present time careful scrutiny. For the school year 1930-31 the per pupil cost of the Belmont elementary schools (grades one to eight) was \$60.13. The median for the state was \$83.66. There are in the state 240 school districts. Only 15 districts had a lower per pupil cost than did Belmont. Surely there is no indication of extravagant expenditures here. In this connection it should be noted that practically one-third of our total expenditures for our elementary schools is met by our apportionment of state aid.

The per pupil cost of our high school is \$149.82. The state median is \$125.61. Our high cost is due to the comparatively small enrollment. There are, however, 15 high schools in the state where the per pupil cost is greater.

There appears a probability of a sizable deficit for this current year, unless it is covered by a special appropriation at the coming school meeting. This deficit is largely due to the expense of an additional teacher in the high school and a deficit of \$600.00 carried over from last year.

Our state aid apportionment for next year will be approximately \$4,300.00.

In conclusion I wish to express my keen appreciation of the co-operation and help of school board and teachers.
