Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a town clerk.
- 2nd. To choose by ballot and major vote three selectmen, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year.
- 3rd. To choose by ballot and major vote one trustee of the Robinson Female Seminary for the term of seven years.
- 4th. To choose by ballot and major vote one trustee of the trust funds held by the town of Exeter, to hold office for three years.
- 5th. To choose all other necessary town officers, auditors or committees for the ensuing year.
- 6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing highways, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building sidewalks, for building drains and sewers, for oiling the streets, for payment of the town debt, for lighting the streets, for defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of Union soldiers, for preventing the spread of insect pests within the town, and for other charges arising within the town, and for the payment of the firemen for the ensuing year.
- 7th. To hear the reports of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8th. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the use of the Robinson Female Seminary during the coming year.
- 9th. To bring in your ballots upon each of the questions submitted by the Convention to Revise the Constitution relative to the amendments proposed by said Convention at a session held on January 28, 1921.

Question 1

Do you approve of empowering the legislature to impose **and** levy taxes on incomes, which taxes may be classified, **graduated** and progressive, with reasonable exemptions?

Question 2

Do you approve of providing in terms that taxes on **property** when passing by will or inheritance may be classified, **graduated** and progressive, and with reasonable exemptions?

Question 3

Do you approve of providing that the whole number of **members** in the House of Representatives shall not be less **than** 300 nor more than 325; that representation shall be in **in** proportion to the population, the legislature to make the **apportionment** of representatives at the session following **each** federal census; and of providing that there shall be required for each representative additional to the first, three **times** the number of inhabitants required for one representative, with the proviso that a town, ward or place, which has less than the number of inhabitants required to entitle it to a representative all of the time may send a representative a **proportionate** part of the time?

Question 4

Do you approve of striking out the word male in Article 27 relating to the qualification for voting and of providing that **women** may hold office?

10th. On petition of Ralph E. Meras and thirty-five others: **To** see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a **term** of five years any person or company that will establish **any** new industry in Exeter within the next five years, employing at least twenty-five persons, for at least eight months **of** each year for which such exemption is made.

11th. On petition of Dana W. Baker and fifteen others: **To** see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$300 for Band **Concerts** to be played by the Exeter Brass Band.

12th. On petition of J. Frank DeMeritt and eighteen others: **To** see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk, like

the present one in front of the Exeter & Hampton Electric Company's Block, beginning where the present cement sidewalk terminates and continuing westerly on said side of Water Street as far as Odd Fellows' Block, and appropriate money for the same.

13th. On petition of Joas Jette and ten others: To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer from the foot of Hall Place to the foot of Chestnut Hill on Pleasant Street.

14th. On petition of Lewis Perry and ten others: To see what action the town will take on the following propositions:

(1) To see if the town will consent to the deflection of the Gilman Park Road from its present position to one which brings its entrance on Court Street about thirty-five feet farther to the east than the present entrance, this deflection to start in the Gilman Park Road at a point about one hundred and forty feet south of the fence-line of Court Street, and to take the course of a very shallow curve having its centre at about the junction of Elliott and Court Streets and continuing the curve of the Thompson Gymnasium driveway already laid out;

(2) To see if the town will give to the Academy that part of the Gilman Park Road lying between the fence-lines which would be disused if the proposed change were made, and that the Academy give to the town a corresponding piece of land that would be occupied by the new section of the road;

(3) To see if the deflection in the road should be of the same width throughout its length as the remainder of the Gilman Park Road between the fence-lines, and that the actual roadway and side-walks should be of the same width and character as at present (except that there would be a break in the west sidewalk for the entrance of the Thompson Gymnasium drive);

(4) To see if the Academy be allowed to remove two small maple trees that would stand in the centre of the proposed roadway.

It is understood that if the above petition is granted, the Phillips Exeter Academy will pay the whole cost of making the new road and any damages that may result from the change.

15th. On petition of Charles Kenik and seventeen others: To see if the town will vote to place two electric lights on McKinley Street.

16th. On petition of William P. Whitley and twenty others: To see if the town will put electric street light on Columbus Avenue between Spruce Street and Epping Road.

17th. On petition of Charles F. Glover and sixteen others: To see if the town will vote to install an electric light in the park near Locust Avenue and appropriate money for the same.

18th. On petition of Lester E. Williams and fourteen others: To see if the town will vote to install an electric light on Brentwood Road near Peter Kenik's barn, another said light near the Nudd house, another said light near the bridge at Colcord's ice-houses, and another said light in front of the home of said Lester E. Williams,—and to appropriate a sufficient amount of money for the same.

19th. On petition of J. Frank Swasey and nineteen others: To see if the town will vote to install two additional electric lights on Newmarket Road, beginning at the residence of Edward A. Smith.

20th. On petition of Alfred J. Eno and thirteen others: To see if the town will vote to place two electric lights on Upper Front Street, one near the residence of P. Biladeau and one near the Eno Brick Yard.

21st. On petition of William J. Toland and fifteen others: To see if the town will vote to increase the pay of the firemen to \$100 a year and appropriate money for the same.

22nd. On petition of Albert J. Weeks and ten others: To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to reimburse William B. Kenniston for money expended by him in the repair of damages to his house, caused by the falling of an elm tree, November 3, 1920, amounting to \$313.62.

23rd. On petition of Chester H. Smith and twenty-seven others: To see if the town will vote to permit the West End Neighborhood Club to equip a part of the Common at the intersection of Park Street and the Epping Road for playground purposes, and to appoint a committee to confer with the club and agree on the location of the playground.

24th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be required to meet the additional expense incurred by the committee appointed to remodel the Town Hall for the American Legion.

Several new features have been adopted at the Library this year. For a long time the librarians have been considering the possibility of starting a children's room. Various plans have been discussed, but nothing has materialized until this fall, when the magazine room was converted into a children's room. Although the room is much too small, it has proved to be a step in the right direction, and the success of the undertaking is without question. The room has been so well patronized that a special librarian is required to take charge. This room was opened on November 4, and during that month there were over one thousand books given out. The greatest number of books loaned in one day in the children's room was eighty-one.

Also on November 4, the stacks were opened to the public and, although the accommodations are not all that are required for the open shelf system, the privilege of selecting their own books seems to be appreciated by the majority of people.

A library school was held at New Hampshire College from August 16 to August 21 for special instruction in library work. The trustees voted to send the first assistant to attend this course and she brought back many helpful suggestions.

Some changes have been made in the staff. One assistant has resigned and also the substitute, and their places have been filled by two new members.

Robinson Female Seminary

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Robinson Female Seminary:

The total enrollment in the Seminary to date is 280, the largest for the month of March since the number of classes was limited to six.

The number of pupils enrolled in the lower classes is so large that proper teaching of these pupils is a most difficult problem. In these classes results have been much less satisfactory than they were three years ago, when there was one more teacher on the staff than we now have.

Conditions at that time indicated that it might be possible to conduct the work of the school with one less teacher, therefore, the teachers suggested that they would be glad to attempt to carry on the work without the help of the assistant in the Domestic Arts Department. The attempt was not successful and this year particularly has proved the impossibility of giving proper attention to pupils taking the subjects of the beginning classes.

It frequently happens that capabilities of pupils vary to such a degree that it is inadvisable to make two divisions of equal size in one class. This has been the case this year with the first class, numbering 74. The recitation schedule, also, has made it necessary to conduct classes of 40 in some subjects in rooms too small to accommodate them.

As conditions next year are likely to be practically identical with those of the present year, the only possibility of reasonably satisfactory work seems to be through the restoration of the assistant in the Domestic Arts Department.

From the point of view of school work, the hours of the school sessions this year, eight-thirty to eleven fifty-five A. M., and one-thirty to three-thirty P. M., have been an improvement over the former hours.

At the beginning of the morning session, a short study period, when all teachers are free to help such pupils as need assistance, is a great advantage. Time also is given to pupils for study and organization of work for the day when their minds are fresh. General directions to classes are given at this time, so that full time is left for the recitation period.

Pupils travelling on the electric car at the noon hour do not lose fifteen or twenty minutes of the last period of the morning as they have done in former years. This daily loss of a third of the recitation has been a great disadvantage to pupils who were obliged to leave the recitation, and the interruption of the class caused by their withdrawal has been a detriment to those remaining.

Both pupils and parents are found to favor the new hours in the proportion of two to one.

In comparison with many schools the Seminary has been fortunate to a remarkable degree in recent years in retaining its experienced teachers. However efficient a teacher may be, there is inevitable loss in adjustments that must be made when a new teacher is elected. That the Seminary has had few changes in its Staff of efficient and satisfactory teachers is a cause for profound thankfulness.

The resignation of Miss Mary E. DeGross, who found it necessary to go to California, was the only one received last June from a full time teacher. Miss Dorothy Rice, a graduate of New Hampshire College, was elected to this position. The special teachers of music and drawing, Miss Elinor A. Johnson and Miss Edith M. Patten, resigned at the close of the school year. To these positions were elected: Miss Florence

Homer, an experienced teacher, and Miss Catherine Kearney, a graduate of the Keene Normal School.
