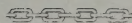

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE (L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges including town officers' salaries, expenses of town officers, election and registration, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, snow pathing, street lights, general expenses of highway department, town poor, interest on temporary loans and on long term notes and on principal of trust funds used by town.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid maintenance.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid construction.
6. To see if the town will vote to pay long term notes amounting to \$2,000.00.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be used in the further improvement of the Wash Pond or Page Road (so-called), and what method they will adopt to expend the same. (By request).

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the public library the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

13. To hear reports of auditors and committees and act thereon.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to finish the tractor building.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for tarring Butman's Hill if suitable arrangements can be made with the New Hampshire highway department by the Selectmen.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on Central street, The work to be done under the supervision of the selectmen.

(By petition.)

17. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to expend on the road leading

from Leighton's corner (so-called) to the main road running from the Emerson store to South Danville, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

(By request.)

18. To see if the town will vote to abandon the right of way over the land of Lillian M. Keezer, at the corner of Main Street and the Farm road.

19. To see if the town will vote to extend the electric lights on the Farm road, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with the Derry Electric Company.

(By request.)

20. To see if the town will vote to install a street light beside the drive leading to the residence of Jane R. Davis.

(By request.)

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

Herewith I submit to you my third annual report, together with the reports of the Headmaster of the High School, Miss Augusta Nichols; the Music Supervisor, Mrs. Eva W. Thompson; and School Nurse, Miss Helen Thomas.

There were two changes among the teachers in the elementary schools effective in September. Miss Idella Ingraham replaced Miss Rita Baker at No. 2 School; and Miss Madeliene Kean replaced Miss Neva Harvey at No. 3 School. Miss Baker and Miss Harvey had both resigned in June. Through a contract with the Plymouth Normal School, Miss Augusta Nichols was employed as Headmaster at the High School and Mr. Albert Gauthier as assistant. Miss Nichols and Mr. Gauthier have been assisted in the teaching by six seniors from the three-year and four-year classes at Plymouth and Keene Normal Schools.

There were 175 pupils enrolled in the schools last year. This is seven less than the enrollment of year before last. The attendance averaged 93.5 per cent of the membership. This was slightly below the average for the state for this period and was caused by the amount of illness we had during the winter and early spring.

Nine pupils graduated from the eighth grade last June and all of these entered High School. It now frequently happens that nearly all of the graduates enter High School. The great majority of parents feel that their children should at least have a High School training. This is indicative of the conviction regarding actual worth of the time spent in High School. At the present time there are about twenty-

five hundred High School graduates annually in this state; of these about one half go on to post secondary institutions. This indicates that the High School is no longer the end of educational necessities and desires.

The following table shows the number of pupils in attendance in high and elementary schools in Hampstead during a period of years:

Number of pupils enrolled in 1926—169.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1927—180.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1928—182.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1929—175.

The comparative cost of schools is of interest to the public. The per pupil cost in the Hampstead elementary schools last year was \$68.24. In the 244 school districts of the state, 57 had a per pupil cost equal to or lower than ours while 187 had a greater cost. The median cost per pupil for the whole state was \$83.35. The cost per pupil in the High School last year was \$190.25. The median High School cost per pupil for the entire state was \$136.10.

An increasing number of school districts in this state have been arranging a school calendar which would provide for thirty-six actual weeks of school or 180 days. We are at the present time about one week short of this ideal.

The school district at its last meeting appointed a committee which together with the School Board should make recommendations on consolidation of schools. The Junior High is a consolidated school as far as the seventh and eighth grades are concerned. The pupils in this school have advantages which it would be impossible to give them if they were scattered in the various elementary buildings. Advantages equally as great would come to the pupils of the first

six grades if they were in one building. In case of consolidation each teacher would give her entire time to two grades instead of six.

New Hampshire has had a decade of exceptional educational progress, and the State Board of Education, under the leadership of its chairman, Orton B. Brown, and State Commissioner, Ernest W. Butterfield has had an interesting and important Review of the achievements of the ten years.

At a meeting held recently at the Concord High School and at which meeting nearly three hundred school board members and superintendents attended, the following facts were emphasized:

New Hampshire adopted a new school code in 1919, which has been in operation for ten years. The code has raised the quality of the schools in the less favored districts, financially. It magnified need of higher efficiency in the rural and elementary city schools. It gave added power and increased support to the State Department of Education, especially authorized it to create standards of attainment for secondary and private schools.

The code of 1919 provided equal length of school year for cities and rural communities, and no school in the state is in session less than thirty-six weeks. Now, boys and girls in the most remote districts in New Hampshire are as well prepared for high school as those of the cities. The high school attendance increased forty per cent in ten years, and twice as many high school students go to college as ten years ago. The high school enrollments have increased six times as many as in elementary schools.

In 1919 few one-room schools had a teacher who had a normal school education; now a majority of these schools are taught by normal school graduates.

In 1919 many children were far from H. S. opportunities; now 90 per cent are within easy driving distance of a high school. Now all schools have the advantage of school superintendents who are college graduates, who have taught at least five years, who have satisfactory personal and professional records, and give their entire time to school supervision.

No new untrained teachers are employed and only trained teachers of successful experience are retained.

Before 1919 one-fifth of the schools changed teachers during the year. The mid-year change of teachers in 1919 was 540. In 1928 it was only 98.

In nothing has there been greater progress than in the professional service rendered by the State Normal Schools at Plymouth and Keene. They are graduating students from the four-year course and every graduate is engaged in the state at once. They also graduate students from 2-year and 3-year courses for elementary and junior high schools, and they are all employed in the state.

In only eight of the forty-eight states is the state tax for local public schools as low as in New Hampshire. In the state five times as much tax money is paid teachers as is expended for school buildings; and twenty-six times as much for teachers as for all administrative expenses.

The work of the schools is progressing well this year. Achievement tests show that good progress is being made. The work of the High School has been very fine. The pupils have entered into the work of the school in a splendid manner.

Our schools are engaged in moral training all day. Character education is a by-product of all other education and far more important than the direct pro-

duct. Children reflect in their behavior the influences that reach them. To spend five or six hours a day in a class room where the virtues of courtesy, politeness, kindness, sympathy, unselfishness, thoughtfulness, orderliness, truthfulness, sincerity, industry, patience and justice are practised unconsciously, is of inestimable moral value.

In conclusion I would thank the School Board for their generous support and commend the time and energy that they have expended so generously for the good of the schools. I would also commend the effective and loyal work of the teachers in guiding the pupils forward on the road to citizenship. The work of the year has been very pleasant.
