REPORT OF THE
BOARD OF EDUCATION,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1892.

Whole number of pupils registered, 115

Cost per pupil \$9.60.

Whole number of schools in town, 7.

Average weeks of school in town 21.4.

There were twelve teachers employed the past year ; six reside in town.

We wish to urge upon parents and friends the practical benefit of visiting the school-room when school is in session, thereby proving to scholars and teachers your interest in their work. I assure the friends who never do visit the schools they miss the pleasure we all experience when we do our duty. One can tell by the appearance of a school if the parents ever visit it or have an interest in the work done.

We also suggest that the parents and guardians impress upon the children the importance of school business. They should be absent seldom, and tardy *never*.

The summer term of No. 1 school was taught by Miss Clintie Emory of Lyndeboro', this was Miss Emory's second term in this school and was quite successful though broken up considerably by sickness. Winter term taught by Miss Lillie Butler, L. This was Miss Butler's first experience in teaching. She brought to the work a conscientious desire to succeed in her chosen calling, and gained the love and respect of her scholars, consequently had a good school. The primer class of three little boys was an interesting feature, two of them but five years old could repeat the names of all the Presidents from Washington to Harrison.

We doubt if ten of the legal voters of this town can do the same.

Miss Jennie Joslin of L., taught the summer term in No. 2. As she has adopted teaching as a profession she did good work. She created a great interest among the scholars in Botany, a study of the flowers and trees about us, thus learning them to read some of the beautiful stories of nature. The school found, pressed, and mounted seventy-five different kinds of flowers.

The winter term was taught by Miss Mabel Hadley. She has taught several terms before in this school, and is a live, interested teacher. The recitations showed good work had been done in this school, not only *this* year, but years before. Though small in numbers, it is good as to quality. Miss Hadley introduced singing into school which is a very pleasant feature.

Miss Carrie Proctor, of Hillsborough, taught the spring term in No. 3. This term was much broken up by sickness, but the examination at close of school showed progress had been made.

Miss Ida M. Mason, of Greenville, kept the fall term. Miss Mason is a hard working, conscientious teacher. We are sorry the scholars did not appreciate her efforts in their behalf. Hereafter, they will remember many useful facts she helped them to learn.

The winter term, Miss Clara Blood of Wilton, teacher. Miss Blood has had much experience in teaching; just the person for this school. We believe this term's work justified our action in employing her, and shall endeavor to keep her as teacher as long as we can. It is too bad that there are so many cases of tardiness in this school; the fall term 32, and winter 50.

The spring term of No. 4, taught by Miss Prince of New Boston. A good report of her work is received. Fall term by Miss Emory. The examination at the close showed thorough work had been done. This is a small school, but a very interesting one. Miss Emory had singing in school. Some one kindly loaned her an organ during the term, thereby helping to make school pleasant.

No. 5, both terms taught by Miss Katie Herlihy of Wilton. She is an experienced teacher and the school made a good appearance at the close of the school year. Order was good and

attendance also, only 5 tardy marks against 13 scholars during the fall term, and 8 in the summer. The people of this school district show commendable interest in their school by cleaning and repairing school room free of cost to the town, by visiting and in every way doing their best to have a good school.

No. 6, Miss Maud Harrison, of Wilton, taught, who kept up her reputation as a good teacher. This continues the banner school in town. No tardy marks in summer, and but two in winter. Record of recitations being 100, in most of the studies. Nearly all the parents visited the school during both terms. We were pleased that there were so large classes in physiology and history. Important studies that have been sadly neglected in this town in past years.

Miss Marion Hartshorn taught the summer term of No. 7. Had only four scholars, mostly small ones, and the term was much broken by sickness. Good reports come to us of Miss Hartshorn's work. This was her first experience in the business. We think she will make a successful teacher.

Miss Lu Butler teacher of winter term. She never taught before. We learn she kept a good school and know she exercised a good deal of pluck and perseverance, and must have given general satisfaction. We were sorry to see by the registers so little interest taken by the parents. Not a single visit by one of them during the winter term. The record of tardiness among the boys is bad.

There was much sickness in town the past year. We are glad to report no fatal cases among our scholars.

Trusting the past year has been a prosperous one for our school children, let us push on towards a higher grade in our schools. A union of efforts by parents, scholars, and teachers will bring success. A lack of interest in either one will prevent it.

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
