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

# School Reports

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## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FOR THE YEAR 1923-1924

To the School Board of Deering, N. H.:

The report of the Superintendent of Schools for the year 1923-1924 is hereby respectfully submitted:—

The same schools were opened in September that were in session in June, and with the opening of the winter term, January 7, 1924, the Pond School was opened with Miss Almeda A. Holmes, teacher. The corps of teachers in September was entirely new to Deering, which is not as it should be, as it takes too long a time to make adjustments between locality, teacher and pupils. The cause of these changes has been carefully noted. Family matters caused one teacher to give up teaching, one left us to teach in the Hillsboro Town District, at a slightly higher salary, \$2.00 more per week. The other two could not have been held at any reasonable increase in salary. They wanted things which Deering does not have to offer, as they wished to be nearer home, and more convenient to certain attractive social features. Although they enjoyed the schools and the children, they told me they would not return under any consideration. The conclusions are that a slight increase in salary might have kept one teacher, one did not, and could not continue to teach, and salary was not a factor in the other cases. The people did all they could to make the year a happy one for these teachers, they were universally liked, and their departure was regretted.

Mrs. Frances Wheeler, a graduate of Milford High School, and a teacher of more than three years' experience, took the West Deering School, Mrs. Gertrude Perkins, a graduate of Marlow Academy, having four years' experience, took the North School, and Miss Jennie B.

Harwood, a graduate of the Manchester High School, came to East Deering after six years of school work. Miss Della Phifield, our only inexperienced teacher, was a high school graduate who had taken six weeks summer work at the Keene Normal School. She taught in Manselville.

We believe, considering our location, that the only way to keep good teachers for a term of years, is to hire local talent, and this cannot be done unless our graduates prepare for this work. For those who wish to do something worth while for our schools, we would recommend using their influence in getting our own girls to attend the regular course at Normal School or college.

Within a short time we have had four girls with only six weeks' Summer Normal Course, which is the minimum requirement just at present, and they have turned out very well indeed; but even they would have been of more help to our children had they taken a full Normal Course, as some of them intend to do. To get regular Normal Graduates we must be willing to pay \$25.00 per week, a total increase of \$7.00 per week per teacher. This would not all be paid by the District, as the State Department is willing to help out in this direction, in case we use the better qualified teachers. The reason this has not yet been done, is because previously there have not been a sufficient number of thoroughly prepared teachers for the larger places, which are always filled first, and so none were left over for us. However, there are indications that such will not be the case soon, and that there may be some well qualified teachers willing to go into the more remote districts.

There are three degrees of certification given by the State Board of Education, one of which a person must hold in order to be eligible to teach. A PERMIT is used as a temporary expedient, given in special cases, to one whose preparation is not entirely satisfactory, but who seems to be the best available candidate for the position. A LICENSE is given to one fulfilling the minimum requirements, and a CERTIFICATE is given to one whose qualifications are entirely satisfactory to the State Board. We had no teacher holding a certificate, four were

licensed, and one was given a permit. The permit was given to Mrs. Perkins, as her experience dated back some years, and it was thought best that she should have some modern training before receiving another form of certification.

The total amount paid for salaries was \$2934. Miss Phifield received \$17.00 per week and the others \$18.00 per week.

There were, during the year, four in the eighth grade, but only three were graduated, as Miss Bibby moved from town before the close of the year. The eighth grade graduates were Maurice Tucker, Wallace Wood, and Alice Putnam. All three entered high school in the Fall, Maurice and Alice going to Hillsboro, and Wallace to Weare.

Standard tests were given all schools, and in every case our pupils equalled or excelled the standard. Wallace Wood did especially well, averaging 100% in his High School entrance examinations in Grammar and Geography.

On June 6th., in the evening, graduation exercises were held in the Town Hall, and graduates were awarded diplomas for the first time. The exercises were very good, pupils from all grades and all schools taking part. The custom of awarding diplomas to the eighth grade graduates will doubtless be continued.

This year the Superintendent paid 59 visits to the school compared to 53 the previous year, and 42 the year before that. This was due to the increase in the number of schools. The average number of visits to each teacher for each year was 14. The three school board members made 33 visits, and there were 130 visits by parents and others. 53 visits were paid to the West Deering School, by parents and others, which was the largest number paid any school in the district.

The average attendance for all pupils, 92%, was fair, and ranged from 89% in the Pond School to 93% in Manselville and East Deering. The pupils of the North School deserve especial mention, as there were no tardy marks in that school for the entire year. The parents, children and teacher deserve and receive our sincere thanks, because we know they all had a hand in making such a fine record. The record of tardiness for the entire district follows:—North School, 0, West Deering, 16, Manselville, 23, and East Deering, 42. More than three cases of tardiness per pupil is a bad record for the year. All our schools except the East School had a better record than that, but the record of that school was bad, and it was largely due to just one pupil who had 22 tardy marks against his name. The excuse for this poor record is not the distance the children lived from school, because the worst offender lived near the school.

Flossie French is again on the Honor Roll of those neither absent nor tardy during the year, and this year she does not have the Honor alone as Leonard Cote and Alfred Trottier from the Manselville School, share the honor with her.

Throughout the State a large number of days have been lost from the school year due to holidays, storms, etc. The days we have lost varies from 7 at Manselville to 12 at East Deering, averaging 9 for all the schools, thus giving our children 171 days of school.

The East Deering School was painted inside and thoroughly repaired, and the outhouse enlarged and divided.

Eight of our pupils attended high school, five in

Hillsboro and three in Weare, and the Valedictorian in the graduating class in each of those high schools was a Deering girl. Two Deering children attended the Hillsboro Grammar School, and four attended the Frances-town grades, until the Pond School was opened.

The Medical examination discloses the fact that 6 of our children are unvaccinated. This is illegal and should be attended to at once. 11 had hypertrophied tonsils, of which three cases were treated, 23 had defective teeth, and only two had defective vision. It is hoped that the parents of the eight having tonsil trouble will attend to the matter right away, before serious results follow.

The spirit of cooperation has been shown in several ways this year, with its usual good results. It may be interesting to have a few instances mentioned. The teacher and pupils of the East Deering School sold candy and held entertainments, to raise money to purchase a wall clock, and new window shades. Pupils of the North School raised money for a frame for Roosevelt's picture, and for a pencil sharpener. The West Deering pupils purchased a wall clock and a frame for Roosevelt's picture. In May Mr. Harry Worth gave the school a flag pole, the boys helped peel it, Mr. Kiblin hauled it to the school, Mr. Edwin Colburn and Mr. Kiblin raised it, the boys cemented it into the ground, and the district furnished rope, pulley, snaps, paint and cement. Such cooperation is not common enough in these days, and was surely helpful to the school.

We again urge parents to visit the schools, to become acquainted with the teacher and her work, and we thank the Board and teachers for their real interest in the schools, and for their assistance in the work.
