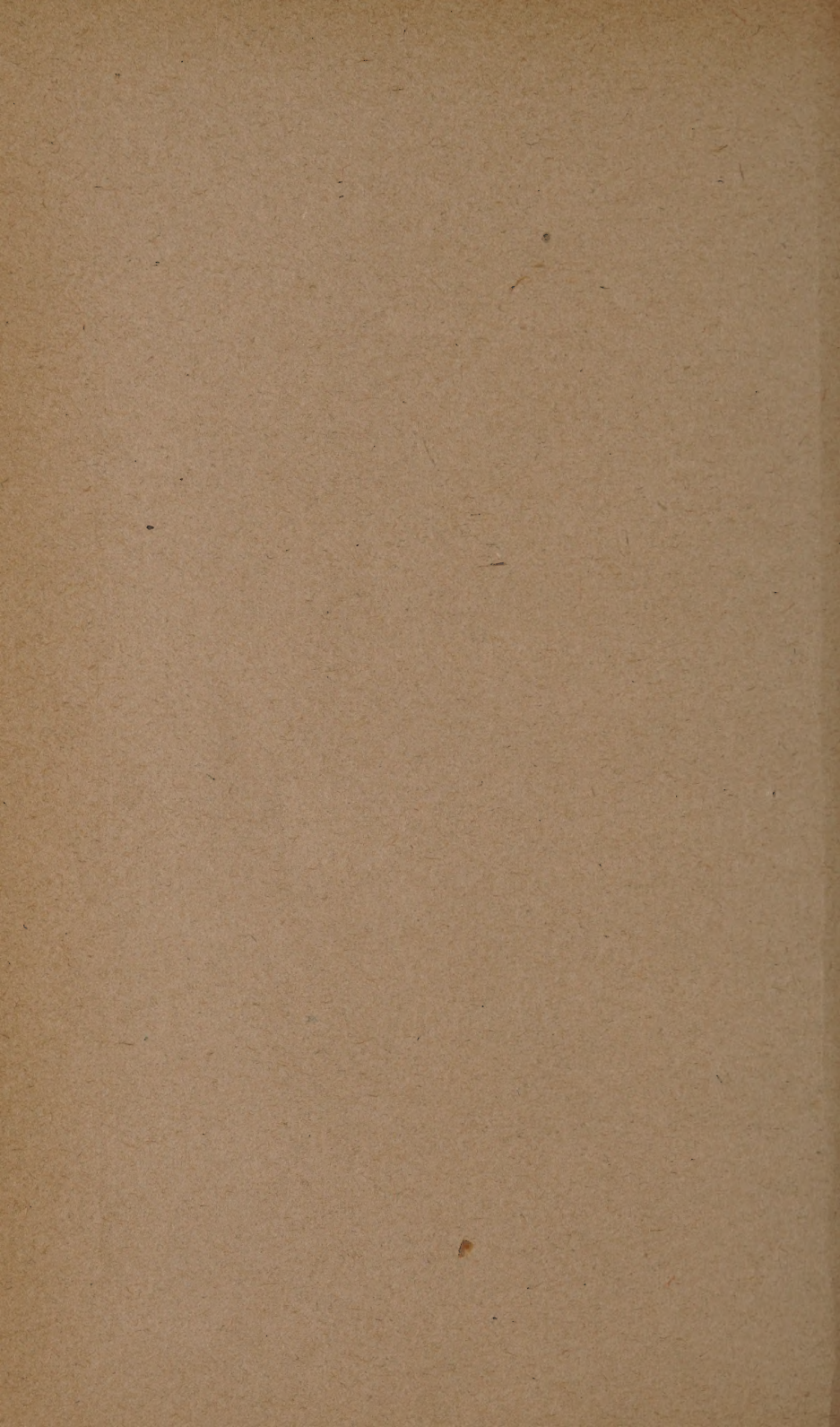

Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a town clerk.

2nd. To choose by ballot and major vote one selectman, for three years.

3rd. To choose by ballot and major vote one trustee of the Robinson Female Seminary for the term of seven years.

4th. To choose by ballot and major vote one trustee of the trust funds held by the town of Exeter, to hold office for three years.

5th. To choose all other necessary town officers, auditors or committees for the ensuing year.

6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing highways, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building sidewalks, for building drains and sewers, for oiling the streets, for payment of the town debt, for lighting the streets, for defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of Union soldiers, for preventing the spread of insect pests within the town, and for other charges arising within the town, and for the payment of the firemen for the ensuing year.

7th. To hear the reports of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

8th. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the use of the Robinson Female Seminary during the coming year.

9th. On petition of James A. Tufts and ten others to see if the Town will appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars to defray the expenses incident to the unveiling of the Soldiers' monument.

10th. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two thousand dollars for necessary repairs on the steamer house.

11th. On petition of Emma Fellowes and eighteen others to see if the Town will vote to establish some system for the collection of garbage and ashes and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to maintain the same.

12th. On petition of John Scammon and thirteen others to see if the Town will appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for ten band concerts to be given by the Exeter band.

13th. On petition of Ralph E. Meras and forty-three others to see if the Town will vote to reimburse Ralph E. Meras for expense and losses sustained in connection with the injunction and resulting litigation on the former Palmer building, 207 Water Street, to the extent of one thousand dollars, and appropriate said sum for that purpose.

14th. On petition of Fred G. Carter and forty-eight others to see if the Town will vote to elect a committee of three to confer with the Selectmen and highway agent as to the best means of keeping the roads in condition for use of automobiles during the winter.

15th. On petition of J. William McNulty and thirteen others to see if the Town will vote to install one electric light on Grove Ct. and appropriate money for the maintenance of the same.

16th. On petition of Eugene Carbonneau and nineteen others to see if the Town will vote to install an electric light on Dewey St. and appropriate money for the maintenance of the same.

Robinson Female Seminary

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Robinson Female Seminary:

The scholastic work of the present year, in general, has been very satisfactory. Most pupils have shown earnestness of purpose and have succeeded in their studies.

The standing in colleges of Seminary graduates, which continues to be excellent, recently has brought expressions of approval from college authorities and has given some privileges which the school greatly values. Wellesley College now allows the school to omit from scholarship credential blanks a great amount of detailed enumeration which formerly was required. At the close of the last semester, the Seminary stood several points higher on the honor roll at New Hampshire College than many schools sending to the college ten times as many students. Normal schools and commercial schools have added their testimony to the same purport. An especially high rating was given to the Seminary for the past year by the school inspector of the State Board of Education.

On the side of school discipline a report must be less satisfactory. During the early part of the year, class room discipline presented unusual problems. Fortunately, many of the difficulties have been lessened greatly through increased skill and efficiency acquired by younger teachers. The situation has demonstrated anew the wisdom of retaining experienced teachers of demonstrated ability.

The resignation of Miss Clara M. Burleigh at the close of the last school year was a serious loss to the Seminary. Since 1908 she had served the school with exceptional ability, tact, and dignity.

A teacher of known ability was secured as her successor, Miss Aldine L. Merrill, a graduate of the Seminary in the class of 1916 and of Mr. Holyoke College in 1920.

The addition to the teaching staff of Miss Edith Carleton, a graduate of the three-year course in the Keene, N. H., Normal School, has made it possible to devote to the pupils of the entering class the attention which is essential to their scholastic progress. Without this additional teacher the exceptionally large enrollment for the present year of 300 pupils would have made impossible really satisfactory instruction.

During study periods all pupils go to the room reserved for study on the second floor. This arrangement is of great advantage both to the pupils in recitations and to those who are engaged in study. A serious disadvantage, however, is caused by the fact that the room is very poorly lighted on the corridor side.

Additional artificial lighting facilities are needed, if dangerous eye strain is to be avoided. Gas light has been unsatisfactory; in part due to poor quality or low pressure of gas, and in part to an insufficient number of fixtures. If the number of fixtures were increased so as to give adequate illumination, a further serious handicap would be imposed upon the problem of ventilation, because an amount of oxygen would be consumed which would interfere seriously with a system of ventilation which, in cold weather, already fails to meet the standard required for health.

Proper electric lighting would remove the features of gas lighting, which are especially objectional in a structure of such architectural arrangement as the Seminary building, and would give access to an electric current which would make possible the use of a stereopticon, reflectroscope, or moving picture machine. A large number of the best schools are finding these inventions for visual teaching of very great value in many lines of school work. There are strong arguments for the addition of an equipment of this sort.

Work in science classes would be improved if electricity were available for experiments.

A thoroughly modern Domestic Arts equipment includes at least one electric stove for demonstration purposes in cooking, and some of the various other electric devices that are being used in the household. They should be added to the Seminary equipment as soon as possible.

The typewriters in the commercial room which have been in use since the course in commerce was established are so much worn that some new machines ought to be purchased for the work of the next school year.

Economy demands the protection of the Seminary buildings by repairs and painting. In this report it is not necessary to enumerate the details of the need, since they have been called to your attention in previous reports.

Many considerations justify a conviction that in the immediate future the Seminary will render to the community a service of great usefulness. By no means the least of these considerations is the confidence that as in the past, so in the future, the genuine interest of the members of the Board of Trustees will express itself in generous effort, in unflinching courtesy, and in constant support of teachers devoted to the welfare of the school.
