TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges including town officers' salaries, expenses of town officers, election and registration, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, snow pathing, street lights, general expenses of highway department, town poor, Soldiers Aid, interest on temporary loans and on long term notes and on principal of trust funds used by town.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid maintenance.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid construction.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.
6. To see if the town will vote to hire the sum of \$2,000.00 by four yearly notes of \$500.00 each.

This money to be used to repair the west road, so called, providing the bill passes, which is now before the legislature.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to repair the west road, so called, providing the bill, now before the legislature does not pass.

8. To see if the town will vote to repair and tarvia the farm road, so called, to the corner of the residence of George Hastings, providing suitable arrangement can be made with the New Hampshire highway department by the selectmen.

9. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to expend on the road leading from Leighton's corner, (so-called) to the main road running from the Taylor store to South Danville, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

(By request.)

10. To see if the town will vote to buy the snow plow used this winter by the truck and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to buy 1000 feet of snow fence and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see if the town will vote to shingle one side of the roof of the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to buy 50 chairs for the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the public library the ensuing year.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

18. To hear reports of auditors and committees and act thereon.

19. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the office of bell ringer, and authorize the selectmen to hire a janitor whose duties shall be to take care of the Town Hall and ring the bell once on Sundays.

20. To see if the town will vote to return \$450.00 to the town treasury, being money appropriated for Butman's Hill.

21. To see if the town will vote to repair the furnace in the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be used to improve the sidewalks between the Town Hall and the residence of Benjamin H. Clow. (By request.)

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to erect a fence around the cemetery in the east part of the town, known as the Ray yard, and what method they will adopt to expend the same. (By request.)

24. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the advisability of adopting a Town Building Ordinance.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

It is a pleasure to present to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of the Hampstead schools. Reports are also presented by Miss Augusta Nichols, Headmaster High School; Mrs. Eva W. Thompson, Supervisor of Music; and Miss Helen Thomas, School Nurse.

There were 180 pupils enrolled in our schools last year (this is 5 more than during the year ending in June, 1929). The attendance averaged 96.1 per cent of the membership. This figure is a little higher than the average for the state during this period. 14 pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year. In the matter of tardiness our record in the Elementary Schools was the same as the average for the state. The number of tardinesses at High School was greater than the state average.

Your attention is called to the table of statistics at the end of this report. It contains detailed information about the schools not easily found in any other form.

The following table shows the attendance in the Hampstead schools during the last five years and is presented to show the trend of our school population:

Number of pupils enrolled in 1926—169.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1927—180.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1928—182.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1929—175.

Number of pupils enrolled in 1930—180.

We were very fortunate in being able to retain our teachers for another year.

Fifteen pupils completed the work of the eighth grade and fourteen of these entered High School last Fall. These figures bear out the contention that

parents with very few exceptions wish for their children the benefits of a High School training.

If a High School is to hold the interest of a large per cent of those entering, it must offer vocational education. Hampstead is doing a good deal along this line. We already have a good course in Commerce and Home Economics for the girls. Manual Training is given to the seventh and eighth grade boys. Mechanic Arts is about the only curriculum that we are not giving at present. Such a course would continue through the four years of the Senior High School and would be of great value to many of the boys. The number of boys taking Mechanic Arts in High Schools offering it, is unusual. At present such instruction is confined to city High Schools. Many village high schools will start this work within the next few years.

It is gratifying to know that the health instruction offered in the schools is actually improving the health of the pupils and the parents, teachers, school nurse and pupils are removing many of the physical defects that hinder the mental and physical growth of the boys and girls in our schools. Local organizations have often assisted the school nurse financially in her work. This assistance has been used to remove adenoids and tonsils; glasses have been secured. Statistics concerning this work will be found in the school nurse's report.

It is continually necessary to buy new text books. As old books wear out they are replaced by those that better meet the general educational conditions. We have, during the past year, bought new Health books, Geography, History and Reading books. New books have been secured for English, Science and Domestic Arts at the High School.

Schools are continually changing in curricula, methods, and management. If this were not so the educational system of a community would soon lose the support and confidence of its people. The Program of Studies for grades 1-6 has been revised by the State Board of Education and was distributed during the Fall of 1930. This new program is greatly appreciated by the teachers.

According to our tests, steady improvement is being made in the routine work of the schools. Our principal difficulties are in adapting work to the individual differences found among the children. Both achievement and mental tests have been given. These tests are of great help to the teachers and give them a better understanding of both class and individual needs.

The per pupil cost in the Hampstead schools during the year covered by this report was low. It was over twenty dollars per pupil below the average cost in the state for both High and Elementary pupils.

We have now used our new Elementary building for half a school year. The new school is now well organized and a fine grade of work is being done. The children appreciate the advantages they now enjoy, and a fine interest and enthusiasm is being shown. The teachers have done very well in the way they have looked after the children. From the time the school bus arrives in the morning, until it leaves in the afternoon, the children receive the attention of their teacher. Parents have appreciated this, especially in the care of the young children. The transportation has been very satisfactory. Other school districts have shown an interest in the new building and in several cases, requests for a sketch have been received.

Hampstead High School continues to be characterized by earnestness of purpose and high moral. Miss Nichols works both with zeal and ability. Those associated with her have followed her fine example. The Superintendent has kept in close contact with the school and testifies to the fine cooperative service of the staff of teachers and to the wholesome life of the entire school.

The work in all our schools appears to be of a good grade this year. This is due chiefly to the ability of the teachers in no small degree, also to the fine spirit and interest shown by the citizens, as well as the school officials. In closing I wish to express my thanks for the hearty support of parents, teachers and School Board in the work of the past year.

To the Superintendent and School Board:

The following report for Hampstead High School is based on the work of the past year as well as that of the present.

There has been little change in registration, the Senior High School has gained through the admission of a large freshman class while the Junior High School is somewhat smaller.

The Program in Hampstead High School is unusually broad in scope, comparing most favorably with that of larger schools. The maintenance of interest which is reflected in the small number who leave school may be attributed to this factor—the introduction of a more diversified program of studies.

The introduction of an exploratory course in Typewriting last year was so satisfactory that at the suggestion of the State Department, a full Commercial Curriculum has been introduced. It is probable that registration in this curriculum will not be large

for some time but the courses are being elected by pupils in other curricula. The purchase of three new typewriting machines by the School District has facilitated this work.

The Senior class of last year showed a creditable standing in the examinations given by the State Department, exceeding the state median in the Otis Self-Administering Test of Mental Ability and in English forms as determined by the Iowa Placement Examinations. Good reports have been received concerning the work of graduates of the school who are students of higher institutions of learning.

Among the most noteworthy projects of the school should be noted the Student Council, which cares for the ordinary routine affairs of the building and the school paper, "The Trumpet", through which the school expresses its ideals and objectives.

Through the cooperation of the School Board,

Superintendent, and townspeople, the school has acquired a gymnasium where the Junior High boys and girls have regular gymnasium work and the Senior High School pupils play basketball. The increased facilities for extra-curricula activities should result in much good, both from the ethical and the physical standpoints.

The use of one of the rooms at the Central School has relieved the congestion at the High School somewhat, but if another room were available the work of the school could be made more efficient.

The pupils appear to have become thoroughly accustomed to the cadet system and almost no interruption in school work results from the change in the teaching staff. The exceptionally fine type of student teacher which the school has been fortunate in receiving, has challenged the ambition of the pupils. These teachers have set a worthy example. The cultivation of character, the first essential of a successful life, has been the aim of the teaching staff.

I hereby submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Hampstead Schools.

The work in music is being carried on in the following way. The music supervisor visits each room once

a week; outlines the lesson for the room teacher, and presents, step by step, the music problems throughout the course.

Music Appreciation is the ultimate aim of our Music Course. The pupils are taught to read music and sing tunefully as well as to listen intelligently to music, in order that they may appreciate the finest music of the great masters. The books from the New Educational Music Course furnish attractive material for vocal music, while the phonograph gives an opportunity to listen repeatedly to the enduring classics.

Through the kindness of the Parent Teachers Association we have been able to form a toy orchestra in grades one and two. In the orchestra there are ten bells, ten pair of rhythm sticks, a pair of cymbals, a triangle, and a tambourine. To the delight of the children, each one in turn is allowed to take part.

On November 8th, the students of the High School presented the operetta, "Betty Lou" a Theodore Presser publication.
