Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same, including electric lights and interest on Cemetery Trust Fund notes.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of town officers, library trustees, trustees of trust funds, and committees.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its state aid road and its trunk line road.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the permanent improvement of Contoocook Valley trunk line, Chapter 93, Laws 1915.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to that required by law for the support of Tucker Free Library. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the fire department; also to see if the town will vote to pay the insurance of the members of the fire company, the expense not to exceed \$15 per year.

10. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishment of fires.

11. To see what action the town will take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister, to raise money for same or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a new road machine, raise money for same or take any action relative thereto.

13. To see if the town will vote to instruct the highway agent to divide the town into two or more districts and appoint a patrolman for each district, who shall have charge of same, under the supervision of said highway agent.

14. To see what action the town will take to perpetuate the memory of the soldiers and sailors who have taken part in the great war, and appropriate or raise money for the purpose.

Under a recent ruling of the State Board, hereafter all cases of whooping cough are to be quarantined and reported.

One of the cases, which involved the quarantine of a working man, required the payment of his wages for nearly four weeks.

Another case required the employment by the Board of a trained nurse for more than two weeks at a considerable expense.

Seven houses have been fumigated, as the law requires.

Two reported cases of nuisance have been investigated and conditions remedied.

The epidemic of influenza has furnished us with about two hundred cases, and is still afflicting quite generally every state in the Union. On its appearance among us we quarantined ourselves, giving up the gathering of numbers of people. Then no cases appeared for about five weeks, but on returning to our usual habits of life, the disease reappeared, with some fatal results.

The United States Public Health Service, in its investigations at army and navy stations, has tried by every means known to medical science to convey the disease from a patient to a healthy person, but so far without success. The authorities tell us we may expect the disease to stay with us at least all winter.

Venereal diseases, which for so long have been unmentionable, or known as "private," have at last forced themselves upon the attention of the public, and have compelled the most stringent measures for their control, including quarantine and report to state authorities.

The total expense of the Board of Health as shown in the treasurer's report has been \$198.38.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS.

There have been but few bell alarms during the past year, and within the hydrant service limits the fire loss has been small.

There have been more still alarms for chimney fires than usual, but these were taken care of with chemicals and in most cases without fire loss. Nearly all these fires could have been prevented by proper care of chimneys.

A motor chemical would be of great assistance to the department in responding to fires outside the hydrant service, but owing to the high price of all fire apparatus, we will not ask the voters to consider one this year.

We would call your attention to the fact that for many years General Taylor Engine Company has paid for accident insurance carried by the members. This is the only case in the state of which we have knowledge where it is not paid by the town. Since the number of men in the department was reduced to thirty-three the fines collected have not been sufficient to pay the expenses of the company, so we hope you will vote to pay the insurance premium and relieve the company of that much expense.

The department has been greatly assisted by the prompt and accurate reports of fires given by the operators at the Central Telephone Office.

In closing, we wish to thank the citizens for the assistance which they have so willingly given us.

WATER WORKS DEPARTMENT, 1918.

Report of Board of Water Commissioners.

The Board of Water Commissioners herewith submit their fifth annual report. The financial report is for the year ending January 31, 1919. The statistical report of pumping station is for the year ending December 31, 1918. There has been practically no new construction work. One additional hydrant has been installed at north end of stone bridge on Depot Street. By the installation of this hydrant better fire protection is given to the principal business section. On account of scarcity of labor and high prices of material no new connections of old subscribers have been made to the new pipe line, or distributing system. Only such work as was absolutely necessary has been done.

Unfortunately, during the extreme cold weather of last winter, 1918, the main 10-inch service pipe that crosses the stone bridge froze up. This main is the direct distributing pipe from the reservoir that supplies the necessary water and gravity pressure for our fire protection north of the river. This being the second time that this same trouble has occurred prompted your commissioners to have the matter thoroughly investigated. Consequently it was presented to a consulting engineer in Boston. After a careful investigation he submitted what he thought was necessary to be done. His recommendation was then submitted to the Fire Underwriters of New Hampshire for their approval. The proposition as recommended by the engineer was approved by the Fire Underwriters, after which the changes were made as suggested. It resulted in a total cost of \$620.25. This includes cost of labor

and all material furnished. We hope all further trouble is now eliminated.

SOURCE OF INCOME.

The net income from water rents from January 1, 1918, to July 1, 1918, amounted to \$975.84; from July 1, 1918, to January 1, 1919, \$1,170.60, making total rents for the year \$2,146.44. Rents for the year show a loss of \$137.02 from the amount received in 1917.

PUMPING STATION.

The operating expenses for the past year, which includes services for attendance, fuel and oil, was \$267.26. This shows an increase in cost of maintenance over the amount paid in 1917 of \$179.17. The principal reason for this increase is accounted for in the extra amount of water pumped. Under the faithful and careful management of Mr. Farley the station and equipment have been well taken care of. The pump and engine have been kept in excellent condition and are giving perfect satisfaction.

CONSUMPTION OF WATER.

Attention is called to the large increase of water pumped last year. Comparing the amount pumped in 1918 with the amount pumped in 1917 shows an increase of 2,447,-903 gallons. It is fair to assume that a very large per cent of this increase can be attributed to leaky faucets. Carclessness on the part of those using the water by not keeping faucets from leaking no doubt will account for thousands of gallons wasted. Then again, through the cold weather faucets are purposely left open during the night to prevent pipes from freezing. We understand a tremendous amount of water from this source alone was wasted during the cold weather of last winter, 1918. Attention is called to the fact that this practice is in absolute violation to the rules and regulations governing the care and use of water. When the town water system was established four years ago each applicant for water was obliged to subscribe to certain rules and regulations in order to give them the privileges of the system. For the benefit of those not perfectly familiar with Articles 3 and 4 of the Rules and Regulations, and realizing that every citizen usually reads the town report, it may possibly be of some value to publish these two articles at this time.

ARTICLE 3. All persons taking water must keep their *pipes* and *fixtures* in good repair and *protect them from frost* to the service box at their own expense. They will be held liable for all damage resulting from their failure to do.so.

ARTICLE 4. They shall prevent all unnecessary waste, and water shall not be left running to prevent freezing.

Hereafter when the water commissioners have sufficient proof that water is being wasted by leaving faucets open to prevent pipes from freezing, a ineter will be immediately installed. Now that this matter has been brought to the attention of everyone using water, let us hope that from this time on each and every subscriber will do their "bit" to eliminate further unnecessary waste.

STATISTICS.

The following statistical table shows that during the year the pump was used 61 times; 3,780,066 gallons were pumped into the reservoir; 2,447,903 gallons more were pumped in 1918 than in 1917. In 1915, 2,739,100 gallons, in 1916, 2,698,373 gallons, in 1917, 1,332,066 gallons were pumped; a total of 6,478,342. The number of gallons for three years exceed the number for 1918 by only 2,698,276 gallons.

The actual running time of the engine was 305 hours, 55 minutes.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

With the appropriations voted by Henniker School District in the last two years we have been able to provide supervision for our schools. Under supervision we are attaining certain results, which we are pleased to note. We find that we have:

1. A larger proportion of trained teachers.

2. Better grading of classes throughout the town.

3. Better work in the early grades, especially in reading, arithmetic and spelling.

4. Many lessons characterized by thought or research in place of rote-work, in which interesting new material is used for reading and reference.

5. A more natural approach to the high school through the Junior High School.

6. Development of established courses in the high school, such as history and physics; also the introduction of new courses in chemistry and in the two vocational subjects, agriculture and domestic arts.

7. A better understanding of our relations to the State Department of Education, with real "team-work" by officers, teachers and pupils, to measure up to its standard, that the town may reap the benefits of doing so.

Our resources have enabled us to remodel one rural school building in an up-to-date fashion, to furnish a domestic science room and a chemical laboratory; to fit up a manual training room, and to open a convenient shop, outside the center building, where iron work is done.

Just now, when the State of New Hampshire is awakened as never before to the need of providing educational opportunity for its unlettered inhabitants of all ages, do not the people of Henniker feel proud that they are already so well started in the performance of this duty? Surely they will encourage the children under their charge to persevere "over the top," that each one may win his full share of the advantages set before him.

A liberal policy toward our schools means that we can have something of great value within our own borders, something that will help to quiet the discontent of our young people with their home-town. When we have shown them that some of the best things in life are to be found near at hand, we may keep them with us, and, in time, see our deserted hillside homes restocked with young life.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of Henniker:

I herewith submit my third report as superintendent of Henniker schools.

From the date of my last report in February, 1918, to the close of the school year in June the work of the schools as a whole was very satisfactory. The final examinations of the eighth grade, however, were disappointing, and it became necessary to condition a large part of the class for entrance to the high school in one or more subjects. The most of those conditioned successfully passed off their conditions by examination in September and were admitted to the high school.

The climax of the school year was, as usual, the graduating exercises of the high school. These exercises reflected great credit upon the participants as well as upon those having the preparations in charge. Since the opening of schools in September there have been many interruptions because of the influenza epidemic. Class work has been seriously interfered with because of the many individual absences from sickness. In consequence, at the present time classes are generally fully a month behind their schedule of work.

The teacher problem, so serious in many places in the state, has been realized in but one school in Henniker the Quaker-Street school—and the time lost there will undoubtedly be made up in full.

The new work of the year has been the organization of the Junior High School. I urgently invite you and all citizens interested to inspect not only the class of work being done here but its quality. I believe the new organization of work means much to the educational advantages offered by the town.

The work of the high school has been broadened this year and should prove more efficient than formerly, as by the addition of another teacher on part time the hitherto overburdened teacher has been relieved and allowed more time for work. We have been able to do this through the kindness of the Rev. Mr. Geisinger in consenting to teach a few classes. I trust that his teaching will be of as great benefit to him personally as I know it has been to the school.

The coming year must see the beginning of greater and better things in our schools. The war has taught the schools much, and the schools must profit by the teaching. The fact that in the recent war one of every six young men examined for military service was rejected as unfit for any kind of such service, and that one in every three was rejected as unfit for active service, is a sad comment upon the training of both the home and school. Laws of health, sanitation, proper ventilation and general physical condition of pupils must have a more prominent place in our educational program if we expect our boys and girls to measure up to the required standard of best citizenship.

May I call your respectful attention to four things and ask for your consideration of them in the light of the best interests of the boys and girls of Henniker?

First—Whether the legislature passes the educational bill before it at this writing or fails to pass it, I believe the time has come when the town of Henniker should, of itself, equalize school privileges to the extent of giving all its children an equal number of weeks' schooling. The present arrangement of giving thirty weeks to some pupils and thirty-eight to others is but a relic of the old district system, and is perpetuating a system that the town district law was intended to remedy. It seems to me not only unjust but is certainly a great handicap to the pupil from the district schools who attempts to enter the high school.

Second—You are running two schools, one with four pupils, one with seven, that is costing you about \$67 per pupil for thirty weeks' schooling, while in the Central School, in corresponding grades, the cost is but little more than \$32 per pupil for thirty-eight weeks' schooling. Can you afford to do this?

Third—Sanitary and better ventilated schoolhouses will be required in the future more than in the past. If the policy of remodelling one schoolhouse a year is resumed this year, as I trust it will be, I would suggest that the building at Hemlock Corner would be the logical one to rebuild, as at this time it has the largest number of pupils to accommodate.

Fourth—For two years previous I have strongly urged an increased appropriation for books and supplies. This last year, it is true, the amount raised was a little larger than usual, yet in purchasing power it was much less than any appropriation you have had for some time. I must again urge a real increase in the appropriation for books and supplies. It is a real need, a pressing need. Progress is being materially retarded by the lack of sufficient and proper text-books and supplementary reading books. Every teacher realizes this fact, and I feel sure they will corroborate my statement.

I do not expect that you can secure in one year all the books and supplies needed, but I sincerely hope that a respectable beginning will be made toward remedying a serious matter.

I wish to record my appreciation of the splendid harmony that has existed the past year in the work between myself, the school board and the teachers.

The Board of Public Trust Funds herewith submit their third annual report.

The aggregate amount of invested securities of the Tucker Free Library, par value, \$35,790.94. The character of these investments will be found upon another page of this report.

The aggregate amount of invested securities of Cemetery Trust Funds January 31, 1919, \$4,725.26.

Eight hundred dollars have been received by the trustees since our last annual report. The entire fund is invested in Town of Henniker notes, with the exception of \$50, which is invested in a United States Liberty Bond. Out of an available yearly income of \$201 there was expended by the agents the past year \$170.07.

Over fifty private burial lots in the various yards in town are being maintained by the income of public bequests.

Since Januray 31, 1918, the following cemetery bequests have been received: June 1, 1918, received from the estate of R. M. Dowlin, \$100; August 1, 1918, received from the estate of Levi C. Newton, \$100. On same date received from the estate of Josephine S. Colby, \$100. October 1, 1918, received from the estate of Franklin Goss \$100; same date, \$200 was received from the estate of Elizabeth P. Gove, income from this legacy to be used to recut the inscription on the monument to "Ocean Born" Mary Wallace; to provide perpetual care of the graves or burial lots of all persons by the name of Wallace before this date buried in the old cemetery back of the town house in Henniker,

December 1, 1918, Addie I. Stevens of Manchester, N. H., gave to the town \$50, income to be used yearly for the care of her mother's lot in the Plummer cemetery. Same date received from Fannie M. Whitcomb \$100, income to be expended yearly to keep the O. E. Wilson, Worcester Goss and Henry Whitcomb lots in the new cemetery in good order. Also on the same date \$50 was received from the estate of John H. Savage.
