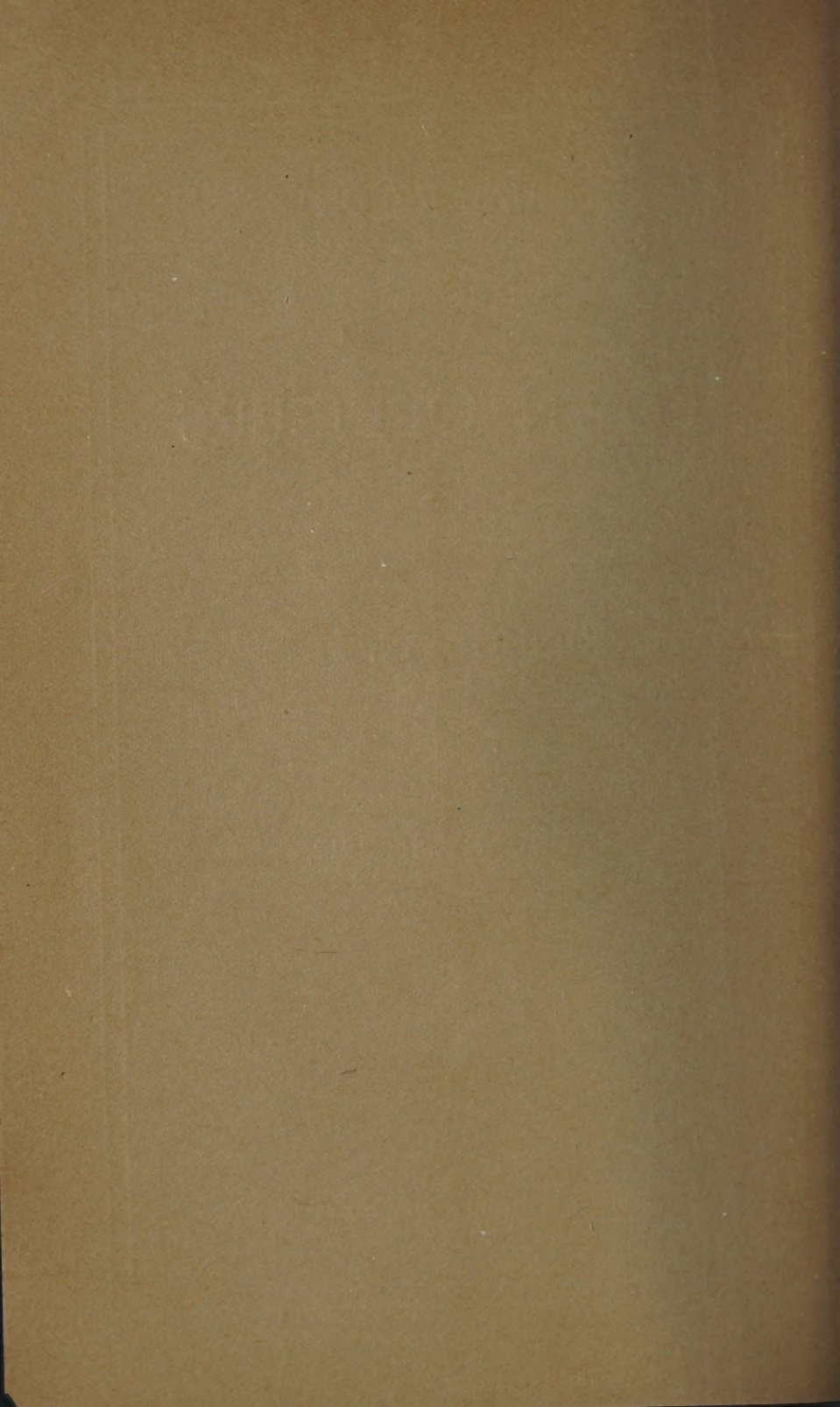

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of Rindge:

Herewith is presented my third annual report, the eighth annual report of the superintendent of schools in Rindge.

The enrollment at the end of the winter term by schools and grades is as follows:

The number of pupils in the Rindge schools show a slight decrease from last year, but as the above figures are for the winter term and several pupils are not now in attendance who will return in the spring, the decrease is not as great as would appear from the above table.

The Converseville (No. 6) school was closed at the end of eight weeks as there were only two pupils left to attend and these were taken care of at the grammar school and at East Rindge, without expense.

In marked contrast to previous years, there has been but one change of teachers this year, and of our present teaching force two will complete two full years at the end of the spring term; this has done much to increase the efficiency of the schools. The grading of the pupils now is better than it has been before and in most cases the grades are doing just the work laid out to be done in that particular year. The fact that those Rindge pupils who have gone elsewhere to other school systems have fitted well into the grades at those places without loss of time shows

plainly that our schools are doing for our children what is being done for children in other places, and that under present conditions the educational advantages offered by the Rindge schools compare favorably with the advantages offered in other and in many cases larger towns.

The effort to attend regularly on the part of nearly all the Rindge pupils deserves commendation and the fact that some schools have been low in attendance percentage does not indicate any lack of interest or effort in those schools.

The West Rindge school building has been put in excellent condition at considerable expense but the repairs to ceiling and outside doors were necessary and instead of purchasing a stove to replace the old one which was no longer safe to use, the board, after inspection of a heating and ventilating system installed in Jaffrey by the Waterbury-Waterman Co., decided to purchase such a plant for the West Rindge school and the results during the past winter, under unusually severe conditions, have clearly shown the wisdom of their action. Except for some little misunderstanding at first as to the best methods of running the fire, there has been no trouble in heating every part of the schoolroom to a uniform temperature and the children of this school can take their seats in comfort at the opening of the morning session, and no time has to be lost. In addition to the comfort of an evenly heated room is added the very great advantage of a constant supply of fresh air. There has been constant trouble with the stove and chimney at East Rindge and I very much wish that this school might be equipped with a heating plant of the same kind. As no chimney is needed, the plant having its own smoke flue, the considerable expense of repairs on that account would so much lessen the actual cost to the district of such a heater. The cost of fuel is less than in the case of an ordinary stove and the results can be understood only by one who has visited schools heated in both ways.

Covered water tanks with faucets have been purchased for each school at but little more cost than ordinary water pails and now with each child bringing his own drinking cup the chance of carrying disease is much lessened and dust and dirt are kept from the water. The East and West Rindge and grammar schools have been provided with covered ink wells for each child so that the annoyance and harm done by the constantly spilled ink bottles ought to be at an end.

The East Rindge school has been fully equipped with slate blackboards so that after the Grammar school has been equipped all the schools will be as well equipped in this respect as is possible. The pupils and teachers very greatly appreciate the advantage of good boards.

In closing this report, I wish to express my pleasure at the kindly spirit which the citizens of Rindge have shown toward the schools, and the very helpful co-operation which the school board has given me in my effort to do those things which seemed to me to be of the greatest service to the schools.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC AND DRAWING.

To Superintendent J. N. Pringle.

I wish to present the following report of the departments of music and drawing for the school year 1911-12.

The schools at East and West Rindge are separated into two divisions according to ability. The lower division of each school have wrote songs from The Modern

Music Primer and Cole's Child's Studies in music. The ground work in staves, keys, notes and rests is presented to the children of this division.

In the upper division of the East Rindge school one and two-part in the First Reader of The New Educational course is carried on. The Second Reader is studied in the West Rindge school by the corresponding division. The study of all musical terms is pursued in the upper divisions.

The First Reader and Modern Primer are studied at the Center primary school. The elements of two-part work are being taught here. The work in the grammar school is based upon the Second Reader. This consists of one and two-part work.

In all the grades especial attention is paid to individual sight reading and interval work. One great object in the last named work is to develop softness, sweetness and purity of tone. As a result monotonous are rapidly disappearing.

Drawing was begun in the Rindge schools in the spring of 1911. The schools are divided for this study as for music. We are taking up object drawing, measurement, illustrative work, designing, shading and color work. Special work was done at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The children designed and made several useful articles at Christmas, such as clipping-cases, match scratchers, blotting pads, cards, etc.

I consider that the schools are taking up the work with excellent success and feel as if much of this is due to the interest taken by both pupils and teachers.

To the superintendent, teachers and pupils I wish to express sincere thanks for the interest shown and kind support given me.
