

REPORT OF THE

COMMITTEE ON TOWN LIBRARY,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1907.

To the Selectmen:

The whole number of volumes now on the catalogue is 9038, of which 252 have been added during the past year. Of these 148 have been purchased with the annual appropriations, 9 have been purchased with the income of the Mrs. F. A. Carpenter fund and 95 have been presented by various donors, a list of whom is printed with this report. Of the volumes purchased, 52 have been bought especially for the branch library at North Walpole, the usefulness of which depends greatly on the addition of fresh volumes from time to time.

The number of volumes taken out in 1906 was 10,769, divided as follows:

This shows a slight increase over the number, 10,290, taken out last year.

The number of persons using the main library and reading room in 1906 was 9,581, a slight decrease from the number in 1905. The increased use of books at North Walpole has been very encouraging as showing the usefulness of the branch at that place. It is hoped to purchase a reasonable number of books this year for use at that branch. The income of the Carpenter fund has been used for the purchase of expensive books such as would not probably be bought with the annual appropriation. Three volumes printed in Walpole at the printing press of Isaiah Thomas and his successors have been purchased during the year. The collection of

Walpole books now numbers about fifty bound volumes and pamphlets and must be approaching completion. It is very valuable as being the largest collection of Walpole imprints known to be in existence. The addition of each new volume greatly increases the value of the collection.

The reading room has been freely used and is supplied with a good selection of magazines, either presented by friends or purchased with the fund contributed for that purpose. Mrs. J. G. Bellows gives the "Outlook" and Mrs. Edward Bellows "Gunter's" and Munsey's." Henry G. Wheelock of Brookline, Mass., contributes the "Century." the "Strand" and "World's Work." Warren L. Hooper of Cambridge, Mass., presents the "Scrap Book" and an unknown friend gives the "Times Magazine," Mrs. W. C. Banning "Our Dumb Animals" and "Our Animal Friends," and Rev. S. R. Maxwell the "North American Review."

The expense of coal, wood and insurance has been met with the annual appropriation.

A new bookcase was needed on account of the crowded condition of the shelves and has been paid for out of the appropriation. It will probably be advisable to have another case made during the present year.

The income from fines and the use of books by summer visitors has become an important item and enables the committee to keep the library open forenoons during the summer months and also helps to meet the increased expense of lighting with electricity.

An appropriation of \$500 for the coming year is recommended.

REPORT OF

WALPOLE CEMETERY COMMITTEE,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1907.

The usual care has been taken of the Village cemetery and the cemeteries on Carpenter's hill and Drewsville.

The Village cemetery has been raked over in the spring and fall and has been mowed once during the summer. The driveways have been kept free of weeds and gravel has been drawn to repair such places as needed it.

Special care has been taken of lots supported by funds and legacies. They have been kept mowed with a lawn mower and were top dressed in the fall. There are now 29 funds for the support of lots. In addition to those previously acknowledged, the following funds have been received by the selectmen and deposited in the Savings Bank of Walpole. Miss Lucretia S. Hooper gave one hundred dollars for the care of the James Hooper, Jr., lot and Dr. F. H. Hooper of New Bedford one hundred dollars for care of John Graves' lot. Two hundred dollars was received from the estate of Addison Miller for the care of his lot, two hundred from the estate of Mrs. Mary E. Wilder for the care of her lot and one hundred from the estate of Miss Grace Allen for the care of the George Allen lot. Miss Ellen R. Miller gave one hundred dollars for the care of the Jared Miller lot.

A soldier's headstone has been obtained from the government for the grave of James T. Holmes in Drewsville cemetery.

Nine lots in the Village cemetery have been given out during the year to heads of families applying for them. There were 26 burials in the Village cemetery in 1906, six of which were of persons dying elsewhere and brought here for burial. Two persons who died in town were taken elsewhere for burial.

George II. Holden has been appointed a member of the committee in place of the late Judge Bellows. It has not been found necessary to draw any of the appropriation made last March, the expenses having been met by the balance on hand and income of funds. An appropriation of \$100 is recommended for the expenses of the coming year.

ATTENDANCE.

This is a subject of vital importance, so much so that all the states are increasing the strictness of their laws on attendance. A study of the preceding tables will reveal some conditions that ought not to exist. The per cent of attendance, for example, has been lower some years than the average for the state—about 88. A low standard of attendance tends to degrade the work of the school as a whole. It effects not only the students who are irregular, but prevents those who are perfect in attendance from attaining the advancement to which they are entitled. If, as has been claimed, the average commercial value of attendance upon public school to the child is ten dollars per day, then children are being defrauded when they are not present every day possible. And the public is defrauded for it costs no more to run our schools with perfect attendance than with the most irregular attendance. Moreover, under the state law for equalization of school privileges, the distribution is based upon the amount of equalized valuation per pupil of average attendance. Under the present conditions Walpole is receiving nearly \$1,000.00 per year from the state for school With a higher average attendance our share would be purposes. increased.

But this is the commercial aspect of the subject. All that the schools stand for in the development of a higher citizenship, of social and model and intellectual progress, would be helped forward by the more perfect attendance of our pupils.

ATTENDANCE LAWS.

I give for convenience of reference a few of the most important laws of New Hampshire concerning school attendance.

No child under the age of twelve years shall be employed in any manufacturing establishment. No child under the age of fourteen years shall be employed in any manufacturing establishment, nor in any mechanical, mercantile, or other employment, during the time in which the public schools are in session in the district in which he resides.

No child under the age of sixteen years shall be employed in any manufacturing establishment, or in any mechanical, mercantile, or other employment, during the time in which the public schools are in session in the district in which he resides, without first presenting a statement of his age from his parent or guardian, sworn to before the superintendent of schools, or, if there is no superintendent of schools, before some person authorized by the school board of the district in which such child is employed.

If any owner, agent, superintendent, or overseer of a manufacturing, mechanical, or mercantile establishment or any other person shall employ any child in violation of the provisions of either of the preceeding sections, he shall be fined not exceeding

fifty dollars for each offense, for the use of the district.

Every person having the custody and control of a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, or of a child under the age of sixteen years, who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language, residing in a school district in which a public school is annually taught, shall cause such child to attend the public school all the time such school is in session, unless the child shall be excused by the school board of the district because his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance at school for the period required, or because he was instructed in the English language in a private school approved by the school board for a number of weeks equal to that in which the public school was in session in the common English branches, or, having acquired those branches, in other more advanced studies. Any person who does not comply with the requirements of this section shall be fined ten dollars for the first offense and twenty dollars for every subsequent offense, for the use of the district.

PROGRAM OF WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL,

WALPOLE, N. H.

Teachers will not be required to teach more than eight periods per day. Adv. Math. may be either advanced Arithmetic, Solid Geometry, Trigonometry and Surveying, or advanced Algebra, to suit needs of class from year to year. Math. Rev. will usually be a semester in Algebra and one in Geometry, but Arithmetic may be included if desired. Commercial subjects beyond these here given cannot be approved unless a special teacher is employed.

CONDITIONS AND APPROVAL.

State Superintendent Morrison says that the approval of high schools under the law of 1901, is in substance, a certification that the schools approved are of the standard specified by law. The law prescribes that they shall be of college-preparatory grade, that is, that they shall teach those subjects commonly accepted as college admission requirements, and teach them with that degree of efficiency which will adequately prepare students for admission to college.

I summarize the minimum requirements for approval.

- 1. Teachers of college education.
- 2. No teacher required to teach more than eight periods per day.
- 3. A regular program of studies calculated to fulfill the intention of the law.
- 4. This program may not include subjects essentially elementary.
- 5. Reasonable instruction in the constitution of the United States and in the constitution of New Hampshire.
- 6. Approved schools shall be properly equipped. They must possess:
 - a. An adequate supply of text books.
- b. An adequate supply of reference books such as unabridged dictionaries, lexicons, cyclopedias.
 - c. Wall maps for courses in history, geography, etc.
- d. Laboratory equipment for individual work by students in sciences.
- 7. The school must maintain an adequate standard of admission requirement.
- 8. The school must maintain adequate rules for promotion from class to class.
- 9. The governing body must maintain a proper state of discipline within the school.

HIGH SCHOOL PRIZES.

Announcement has been made to the high school by Principal Savage that a citizen who is interested in the school will give ten dollars' worth of books as prizes for scholarship during the year

1906-07. Two prizes will be given in each class to the students of the highest average standing in the regular studies of one of the courses and in deportment, which is to be co-ordinate with one study. It is hoped that such prizes may be given from year to year. They will tend to increase the importance of the school in the eyes of the young people, and to bring it into its true place as the highest department of our public school system.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR THE GRADES.

State Superintendent Morrison has prepared an eight-year course of study leading to the high school. Prominent educators of New Hampshire favor the plan, provided grade one begins at six years of age. Providence, R. I., and Minneapolis, Minn., have change to eight years before the high school, the first city admitting to grade one at six, the second at seven years of age. There is a tendency among educators to raise the age of admission to grade one and to decrease the number of years leading to the high school. This is the way of economy. Children admitted at too immature an age require two years to do the first year's work. It has thus cost almost twice as much as it ought, to get through the first year. But there are other reasons besides those of economy. Dawdling over the work has been of no intellectual value. It is better for the child throughout his course to be in the grade where he belongs on account of his attainment, and to feel the necessity of steady, earnest work throughout the year. This kind of work, under skilled teachers, will lead to the high school in eight years.

But these are the more general aspects of the subject. Here at Walpole the ninth grade was abolished, and the eighth grade admitted to the high school, before the readjustments through the grades could be satisfactorily made, and there has been ground for complaint. But taking all the conditions as we find them now, it seems to me best to retain the eight-year course, and to admit to grade one only those six years of age. The number of students now in the grades and our accommodations are best adapted for this arrangement. If it is desired on the part of a sufficient number of parents to send children five years of age, they may be accepted as sub-primary pupils. An assistant could be employed for Miss Wightman and they could be cared for in the room above the

primary department for such a part of the year as that room could be made comfortable. Their work would be largely kindergarten work. I am not opposed to the kindergarten. I think it has great value. It develops the activities of the child along lines that effect his whole after life. My contention now is that it is folly to attempt to do the first year of an eight-year course leading to the high school with children five years of age. It is no discredit to the child that he cannot do at five what he can easily do at six or seven. At five he had better be playing at kindergarten or out of doors for the larger part of the time, storing strength for the days when he must take up the work of school at six or seven.

NORTH WALPOLE SCHOOLS.

Mr. Barry left the schools early in the fall. His administration had been highly successful, and the school was in such shape that the grade teachers carried on the work easily during the interval before Principal Walsh came. The work is now going forward most satisfactorily. There are many points about these schools that are fine. A reference to the tables accompanying this report will show that the average attendance is the highest of any schools in town and the number of tardinesses the lowest. This is a splendid record.

There are now thirty-four scholars from North Walpole in the Bellows Falls high school. This number is likely to be largely increased in the years to come. Such conditions may arise in the future as to make it wise to establish two years of high school work in the North Walpole schools. This would be an economy for the town, and with the efficient principal whom we have the first two years of high school work could be made equal to that of the best high schools of the state.

OUTLYING SCHOOLS.

Only three schools remain outside of the graded schools of Walpole and North Walpole. They are Drewsville, Christian Hollow and Division 14. Of these Drewsville and Christian Hollow are likely to remain permanently as school centers. Division 14 is divided in sentiment, some preferring to come to the center schools and others wishing to have school continue in their district. Some repairing must be done here if the school is continued another year. These outlying schools ought to receive a fair share of the improvements which are the order of the day.

The character of the work being done in these schools often compares favorably with the best work of the more highly graded schools. In Christian Hollow the school is more highly organized and shows clearly the importance of having the same teacher serve a series of years in the same school. This length of service is even more important in the schools with many grades than in those where the work is more highly organized.

CONCLUSION

Conditions are most favorable for efficiency in school work in Walpole. Buildings and equipment are better than ever before. Work in science in the High school can for the first time be carried on according to the most approved methods. Teachers are earnest and loyal. This spirit seems to be contagious.

For my own part I extend my heartiest thanks for cooperation of teachers and school board in every effort to improve the schools.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Town School District of Walpole:

The school board herewith respectfully submits its annual report. We believe the past year has been a prosperous one for our schools. Mr. C. H. Drown resigned his position as superintendent of schools last July, very much to the regret of the supervisory board. The board was unanimous in calling Mr. Alfred B. Morrill of Easthampton, Mass., to fill the vacancy. Mr. Morrill commenced his labors as superintendent August 1st. His long experience in school work as a teacher eminently fits him for the supervisory work and we believe the district is most fortunate in securing a man of such experience and ability. We commend to

your careful attention his report, and would call your attention especially to what he says in regard to attendance and course of study for the grades.

At our last annual meeting the question of providing larger and better accommodations for pupils in Division 1 was discussed, and the sum of \$15,000 was appropriated for the purpose of building a new schoolhouse or enlarging the present high school building and the matter was left entirely in the hands of the school board. Two or three informal meetings of the citizens were held and plans were presented for a new building and suggestions were made and plans discussed for enlarging the high school building. The board concluded that it was for the best interest of the town and in accordance with the wishes of a majority of the voters to enlarge the high school building, but on a different plan from the one that had been presented. Accordingly plans were drawn and a contract was made with Joseph D. Cote of Bellows Falls, Vt., and the work has been done with but slight interruption to the schools. So that we have, in addition to the two large rooms, one fine school room on the first floor with superintendent's office and recitation room or laboratory fitted with all the necessary conveniences on the second floor, with sanitary closets in the base-Both the high school building and primary building are equipped with a modern heating and ventilating system. One of the old furnaces was used in heating a part of the high school building under the present system and it has not proved large enough, and as the plumbing was in danger of freezing and could not be heated from the furnaces it was thought best to put in a steam boiler for additional heat, which need only to be used in extreme weather. If a new furnace had been put in the cost would have equalled the present cost and the heat could not have been carried to parts of the building where it was needed. buildings have had a coat of paint.

In doing this work the sum of \$5,663.00 has been expended. The primary building has also been papered and painted on the inside, the cost of which has been placed to the repair account. The buildings at North Walpole have been painted on the outside and about \$100 has been expended in taking care of the water

that comes from the roofs. In previous years this water has washed away the light soil causing an annual expense, which, we trust, now will be avoided. Our financial report which follows shows the expenditures for the year ending February 15. We have received from the state treasury, in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 of Chapter 77 of the Laws of 1899, the sum of \$932.74 and for one-half of superintendent's salary \$275. We have administered the financial affairs of the district as economically as was possible with the best interests of the school in view. Our account shows a balance of \$754.12 against \$476.29 one year ago. It has not been the custom to mention the indebtedness of the district nor to make estimates for another year in this report, but believing this information will be appreciated by the voters and tax payers of the district we give the following. The indebtedness of the district consists of 6 notes held by the Savings Bank of Walpole. One note of \$1,400.00 on demand. Notes given this vear: One note for \$1,000.00 due July 15, 1907. One note for \$1,000.00 due July 15, 1908. One note for \$1,000.00 due July 15, 1909. One note for \$1,000.00 due July 15, 1910. One note of \$1,663.00 due July 15, 1911. These notes are drawing interest at 41 per cent. We would suggest for your consideration at the annual meeting that the note for \$1,400.00 be paid in equal instalments during the next four years, in conjunction with the notes due those years, which will make the amount to be paid each year about equal and about the same amount as we have been paying each year for several years. The amount appropriated by the town each year for the last two years has been \$4,657.50, and for supplies \$1,000.00 The amount appropriated by the district is \$8,500.00 We believe with the same appropriation this year we shall be able to meet all obligations.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town of Walpole, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1907, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 2—To choose selectmen, assessors, auditors, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 5—To raise money for the support of schools for the ensuing year and to direct its apportionment.

ART. 4—To raise money for the purchase of school books and school supplies, for the ensuing year.

ART. 5—To raise money for the support of the poor, town library, cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current and incidental expenses as may accrue.

ART.6—To see if the town will vote to raise the license fees for licenses of the second, third, and fourth classes for the sale of intoxicating liquor in said town under the provisions of Chapter 95 of the New Hampshire Session Laws of 1903, entitled "An act to regulate the traffic in intoxicating liquor."

ART. 7—To see if the town will vote to appropriate money to buy a piece of land and erect a building thereon suitable to house the property of the town.

ART. 8—To see what action the town will take in regard to accepting state aid for building highways.

ART. 9—To act upon any account that may be presented.

ART. 10—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
