



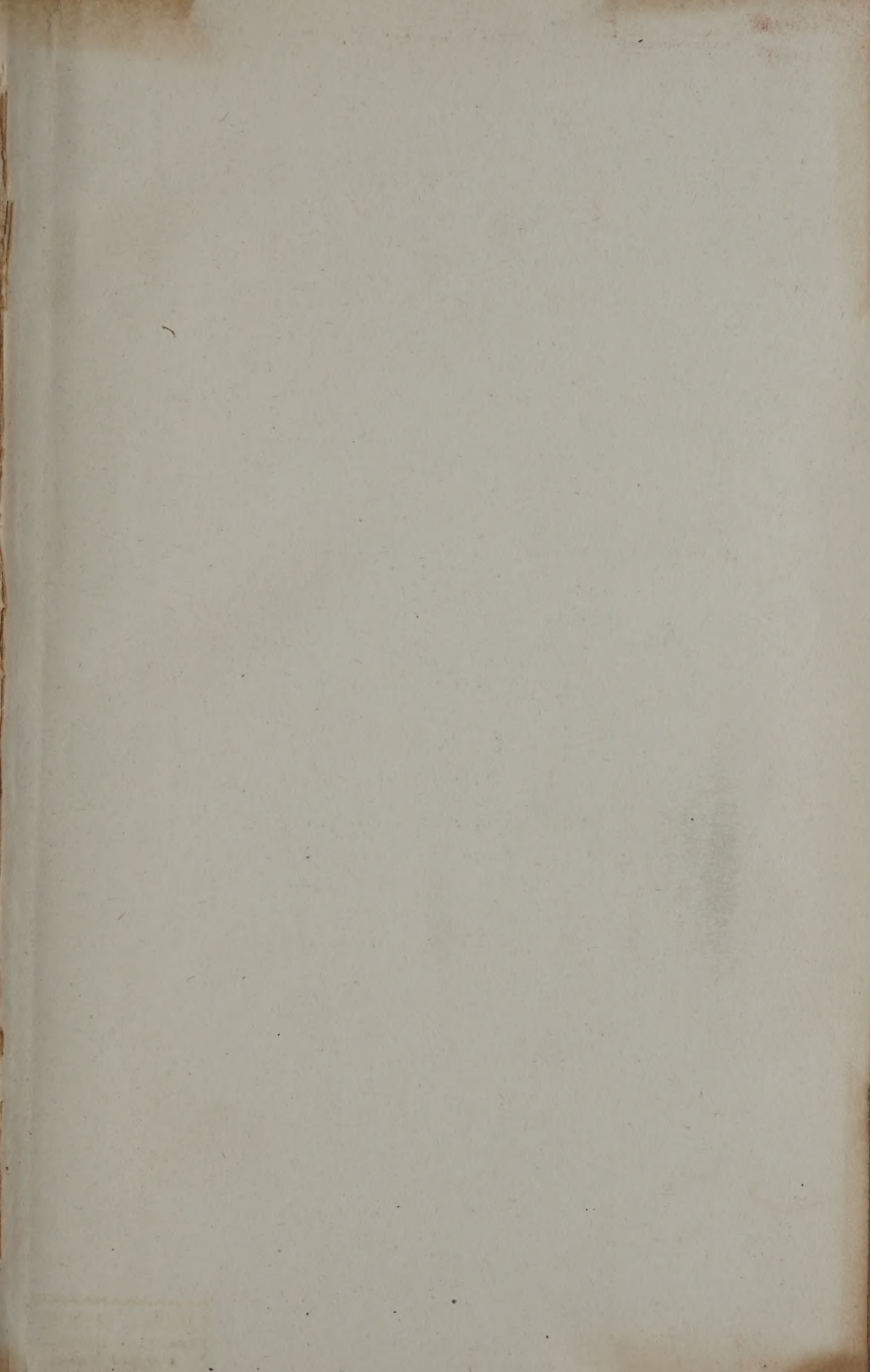

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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

L. S. *To the inhabitants of the Town of Warner, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to Vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Warner, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a moderator, to preside in said meeting.
2. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools the ensuing year.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways and bridges the ensuing year.
6. To act on the petition of J. R. Cogswell and others, to see if the town will vote to build a new Town Hall, or repair and enlarge the old one, or sell, or otherwise dispose of the old Town House, or take any other action in the premises as may be expedient, and to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for such purposes.
7. To see if the town will vote to accept the title to the burial ground in the rear of Union Hall lot, east of Kearsarge street, agreeable to the proposition of N. G. Ordway.
8. To act upon the petition of P. C. Wheeler and others, to see if the town will vote to sell the town farm.
9. To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

In presenting to you the first annual report of the School Board under the new dispensation, we ask you to consider the manifold disadvantages under which we have labored on account of the extreme unpopularity of the law, which, while it clothed us with arbitrary power, was viewed by many with distrust and disapprobation. Thus peculiarly situated, we deemed it advisable to "go slow" at the start. Wherever it was practicable, without causing too much friction, we united the smaller schools for the spring term: in five instances putting two in one, and in one instance putting three in one: thereby reducing the number from 22 to 15. In the fall the same plan was continued, except that two additional schools were organized; one in Howe's (No. 21,)—a district too small to make a school by itself and too isolated to unite with anything, in town or out, without imposing considerable hardship on small scholars, but which was, for the spring term, classed with the College (No. 18). Another was kept in Newmarket, which went to Waterloo in the spring. In this school there are a goodly number of scholars—mostly small—and living in the extremity of the district farthest from Waterloo. In all cases the schools were extended as far into the winter as was, by those interested, deemed expedient on account of the inclemency of the weather. (For length of schools see tabular statement.) With few exceptions the schools were fairly successful—many of them eminently so. Even the exceptions were not conspicuous failures; only the best results were not obtained, owing to various causes; chief among which, were perhaps, lack of sympathy of thought and action between teachers and patrons of the schools. The vast importance of co-operation with and encouragement of the teacher by citizens of the district—not to mention various other duties—



has been too often and too forcibly urged upon your attention by abler pens than ours, to need repeating here. If parents would only give these matters a little more attention and perform all their duties faithfully, poor teachers and unprofitable schools would be rarely found.

We would call your attention to the advisability of building two school-houses—one for the accommodation of Districts No. 7 and 24 (Kimball and Joppa); another for No. 10 and 18 (Collins and College). In both cases the old school-houses could be utilized, and the expense need not be very great.

Upon the whole, we are of opinion that some good has been accomplished the past year without imposing very severe hardship on any, and when all antagonistic feelings engendered by the arbitrary and optional features of the law shall have been toned down and smoothed off by contact, and when the law itself shall have been so modified as to be no longer objectionable, more beneficial results may be realized.

# SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

The High School is still under the instruction of Henry S. Roberts, A. M., as Principal. This is his third year. I most heartily endorse all that has been said by former committees, of the merits of his management, order and methods of instruction, and add that the school is now more nearly answering the purpose for which High Schools are intended than ever before. Most excellent results are already manifest from a firm adherence to the "qualifications for admission" as published in the Catalogue of Warner High School 1886-'87 and which are now in practical operation. Said regulations require a good degree of thoroughness in Arithmetic, Geography and Grammar, reading, writing and spelling, and must not be sought to be obtained in the High School.

It is gratifying to your committee to observe that, of late, parents and pupils alike are awakening to the fact that while scholars really thorough in nothing are sent up from the common to the high school, irreparable damage results, not only to the latter but to the former as well. In fact when the pupil is too rapidly advanced he is injured; not infrequently finding himself "in the situation of a body rubbed over with oil and thus deprived of the natural perspiration." His environments are incompatible with his attainments—he cannot move on, he is often too proud to return to the common school; the result is that he drops out, and begins his life work but poorly equipped for it.

Miss Laura F. Parker having resigned at the close of the last school year, the services of Miss Mary P. Frisbie, of

Portsmouth, N. H., were secured. Miss Frisbie thus for (we feel entirely safe in saying it) has given excellent satisfaction and co-operates in perfect harmony with the Principal.

One branch of instruction, which has been too much overlooked and neglected in many of our high schools, has been introduced by her with good effect. I refer to drawing. The representation of the appearance or figures of objects, on a plain surface, by means of lines and shades, as with a pencil, crayon, pen, compasses etc., is an *art* as well as music, and, perhaps, not inferior to it. For, according to Addison, "our sight is the most perfect and most delightful of all our senses." Lucretia E. Manahan, first assistant of the Manchester High School, lately very truly said, "history tells us that the more cultivated and intellectual a people become the more attention was paid to drawing and more it was elevated". She showed, also, "even from a practical point of view drawing had a direct monetary value in it." Irving, the great, popular teacher of the youth of our century, said "in America, literature and the elegant arts must grow up side by side with the coarse plants of daily necessity." I have long sought to bring this desirable accomplishment to the front but with indifferent success. Now that we have an assistant who is proficient in the art let us utilize the opportunity.

By referring to the list of the *Alumni*, I find that more ladies graduate than gentlemen. From 1873 to 1886 inclusive, the total number of graduates is 36. Ladies, 20; gentlemen, 16. In 1885 three ladies graduated and no gentlemen; in 1886, four ladies and one gentleman.

Without going into an extended discussion of this matter here, it is certainly to be desired that our young men might show as ardent an appreciation of the value of a higher education as the young ladies. But, if we are to judge by the record they do not. What is the cause? Of course it is

not to be found in inferiority of intellect, or less ambition: nor are we to presume that his thirst for education is less pressing. Now, I think there are three things which, to a very great extent, account for this lamentable anomaly. First, the worldly circumstances of parents; second, the manifold opportunities offered to boys, at an early age to earn, if not a livelihood, a considerable amount of pocket-money; third, the worship of the self-made man. But, an enlightened understanding of the duties of parents to the state and their children, will give them to see that their worldly circumstances must be extremely low to justify them in withdrawing their boys from school for the sake of their personal services and earnings, *especially when they evince an aptitude and desire for a higher education.* The boy who is inclined to succumb to the temptation of supplying his purse with that ephemeral substance denominated pocket-money, in preference to storing his mind with knowledge, should, at least, be held in check until he sees his error and can give a better reason for his course. To be sure, the plaudits of the self-made man are heard everywhere and they are very fascinating to our youth; but they cannot too early learn that it will be found that the self-made man—properly so called—rarely neglected the opportunities of his youth: the self-made man is generally preceded by the self-made boy.

The existence (and it cannot be too often repeated) of such an institution as the Simonds Free High School of Warner, is, and ever will be, of incalculable advantage to those boys, who, with head and heart, seek its benefits—especially to the “Laddies of pregnant pairs;” and, as years roll on, it is to be hoped that every Warner boy, whose mental pregnancy is assured will strike for its highest honors.
