Motion made and seconded to increase the winter budget by \$4,000.00-adopted.

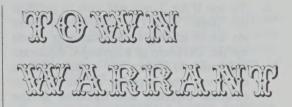
Motion made and seconded that we add \$500.00 to Planning and zoning.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ALLENSTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE. QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Knights of Columbus Hall in said Allenstown on Tuesday the 10th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to give a one percent (1 percent) discount on all 1970 property taxes paid within thirty (30) days after mailing the tax bills.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit of the Town accounts made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (Funds therefor are included in the Budget.)
- 6. To vote upon the following proposition:

Are you in favor of the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

7. To vote upon the following proposition:

Shall \$1,619,000.00 be appropriated for the purpose of constructing a municipal sewage disposal system, including sewerage, storm drains, interceptors, pumping stations, treatment works and such other related facilities and equipment, inclusive of land acquisition, easements, and rights of way as are required; and the Selectmen be authorized to borrow said sum under the Municipal Finance Act, and to accept and contract for Federal and/or State aid which may be available to the Town.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

8. To vote upon the following proposition:

Shall \$59,786.00 be appropriated for the purpose of purchasing the land and building on Turnpike Street, currently under option by the Town, and remodeling and equipping said building for use as a Fire Station, and the Selectmen be authorized to borrow said sum under the Municipal Finance Act. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 for the purpose of providing Visiting Nurse Service. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Regional Planning Commission now organized and named the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the State Office of Planning and Research. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Two representatives will be Law. appointed from Allenstown.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,421.00 as the

Town's share of the studies and operation of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new Town truck and to turn in the old Town truck for allowance against the purchase price of said new truck; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 in the current fiscal year for this purpose and further to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Town's Capital reserve fund such sum, not to exceed \$4,500.00, as shall be necessary to defray the balance of the cost of said truck. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to tar the road from Route 3 to Granite Street Extension and old Cemetery Road.

(This Article has no Budget Committee recommendation.)

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon. In accordance with the vote of the 1958 Town Meeting, a motion will be in order at 10:00 A.M. to adjourn the reading of the Warrant to 7:00 P.M. Saturday, March 14th, at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT IN THE TOWN OF ALLENSTOWN IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Knights of Columbus Hall in said District on the 7th day of March, 1970 at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To vote upon the following proposition:

Shall Four Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$425,000.00) be appropriated for the purpose of constructing and equipping an addition to the Elementary School, consisting of eight classrooms, a resource center and a multi purpose room, and making necessary alterations to the present School Building; and the School Board be authorized to borrow said sum of money under the Municipal Finance Act; and to accept and contract for any Federal or State Aid which may be available to be expended in reduction of said sum.

6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00) to cover the current deficit for one additional Teacher, one additional Teacher's Aide, additional supplies and equipment, and a part time Janitor caused by the 52 percent increase in enrollment, said funds to be used in the 1969-70 fiscal year ending June 30, 1970.

- 7. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and the Truant Officers, and to fix the compensation of any other Officers or Agents of the District.
- 8. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 10. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District Officials and Agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Chapter 15, Laws of 1959 amends RSA 76 by inserting after section 11 the following new section: 76:11-a Information *Required.* The tax bill which is sent to every person taxed, or his agent, ifknown, as provided in section 11, shall show the rate for municipal, school and county taxes separately. Any town, through its selectmen, may request that the tax commission compute the rates which will appear on the tax bills as provided hereunder and upon said request the tax commission shall furnish the required information.

A combined or total rate is shown above for those towns with a single school district and with no precincts or village districts. It is recommended that the combined rate be shown on each tax bill in addition to the separate rates. Precinct and multiple school district towns and cities should also arrange their tax bills so that each taxpayer will know his total tax rate as well as the rate breakdown.

RSA 76 as amended by Chapter 120, Laws of 1963 provides for delivery of the list (warrant) to the collector within thirty days of receipt of approval of the tax rate unless for good cause the time is extended by the commission. The collector shall within thirty days after receipt of the warrant from the selectmen send out the tax bills unless for good cause the time is extended by the commission.

#### Board of Selectmen Allenstown, New Hampshire

#### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Allenstown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Trustees of Trust Funds and Library.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1968 and December 31, 1969: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1968 and December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$4,668.51 in 1969.

#### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenue: Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$6,140.97, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,464.46 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$676.51.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1969, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### Current Deficit:

The current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of the Town decreased from \$3,129.54 to \$2,461.03 in 1969, as shown herewith:

#### Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that there was a net overdraft of appropriations in the amount of \$5,464.46 - in other words, total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by the amount as indicated herewith:

On July 2, 1969 a certificate of emergency was issued by the Tax Commission authorizing the expenditures of \$2,400.00in excess of the appropriations for the purpose of replacing a sewer main. Also, on July 22, 1969 a certificate of emergency was issued in the amount of \$7,500.00 for the Town's share of the cost of repairing and renovating the Main Street Bridge. However, no money was spent in 1969 on this latter authorization.

Therefore, authority was granted under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act to exceed appropriations only in the amount of \$2,400.00 for replacement of sewer mains.

#### Treasurer:

Our examination disclosed that in several instances the Treasurer did not properly identify the source of monies received by her. For instance, money received from the State for head tax reimbursement was recorded as a forest fire refund. In many instances, money received from the Town Clerk for dog licenses issued was recorded as motor vehicle fees.

More care should be taken by the Treasurer in recording the source of monies received.

#### Town Clerk:

Particular attention should be given by the Town Clerk to the matter of extending and recording motor vehicle fees. Entries in the cash book should be in agreement with amounts received and the book should be properly added.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials

of the Town of Allenstown for their assistance during the course of the audit.

# **REPORT OF THE FIRE STATION**

# PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Fire Station Planning Committee met many times during 1969 to investigate the best location for a new station and the best type of construction for a station always trying to keep in mind the future growth of the town and the taxpayer.

After much investigation into the location of fires, location of people, movement of the center of population and the location of the older, more flammable buildings in town, it was the unanimous decision of the committee that the new fire station should be located east of Route 3 but close to this road.

The committee then looked into possible sites in the desired area as well as sites in other areas. It was found that sites that were large enough, with good access to good roads and in an area that would not be objectionable to large numbers of people, yet is easily accessable by the members of the volunteer fire department were not readily available.

The building type, approximate size required and possible cost was also investigated. It was concluded that a cement block structure of the desired size would cost a minimum of \$46,500. This figure does not include land cost, plumbing, paving and moving costs.

Investigation into the Travel World building on Turnpike Street at Route 28 and Route 3 showed it to be a suitable size, in an excellent location and available at a total cost less than it would take to construct a new station on a different location. It also has ample land available for expansion if this should ever become necessary.

The committee unanimously recommends to the town that the Travel World building be purchased by the town for use as a new fire station.

# Report Of Forest Fire Warden & District Chief

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

### Fire Permit

A *fire permit* is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be *prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.* 

### **Exceptions**

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

### **Penalties**

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.



- **3.** For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

If the people of this nation ever subscribed to the concept of providing equality of educational opportunities, it has never been fully implemented. While some progress has been noted in the districts of Supervisory Union No. 53 from year to year. it has always been within the framework of the same basic program. It becomes particularly noticeable in the upper grades of the elementary schools, where boys and girls, whose interests begin to differ widely, continue to be subjected to the traditional academic program. With no opportunity to explore within broadened educational offerings, some young people become disillusioned about the values of education and, subsequently, never realize their potential.

Expansion of school programs depends upon facilities, equipment and teachers. For too long have we stood by complacently and allowed schools to be built without first determining what we should build. The reason for this is simple of explanation: Providing specialized facilities is more costly than building traditional academic classrooms; the less expensive the plan, the easier does it become to sell. In deference to the local taxpayer, the priorities of a child's right to an education become subverted. This is not to be construed that the individual property owner is opposed to good education; he rightly stands in opposition to

assuming a disproportionate share of the tax load.

The time has come - if we really believe in equality of educational opportunity to change our thinking about taxation. Based on an antiquated tax structure, providing for schools and all other phases of town government, the local citizens are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain the status quo, let alone improving services. As states have had to seek help from the federal government, it becomes increasingly mandatory that the towns and cities turn to the state. The big question here is with regard to the method of providing additional revenue. While no particular kind of tax reform is advocated in this report, one needs only to look at the differences in wealth amongst the towns of New Hampshire to appreciate that there are differences in what can be provided for education. The districts that make up Supervisory Union No. 53 had the following amounts of equalized valuation per pupil in 1968:

Allenstown	\$44,750
Candia	16,268
Deerfield	30,693
Hooksett	30,623
Pembroke	23,277
Raymond	21,974

The equalized valuation per pupil for Allenstown would be considerably lower if all children attended the public schools; a truer figure might be about \$20,000. The state average was \$35,510.

An examination of the wealth in some of the other towns makes it very evident that there is an uneven distribution:

Education is a function of the state and it would seem that steps to relieve the communities of the burden they have been carrying are long over due. Not only is the state in great measure ignoring its financial responsibilities, but, through standards imposed by the State Board of Education, even greater demands will be placed on the towns. Placing the blame on the state for not distributing wealth more equitably is to ignore the fact that it is up to the local representatives to agitate for tax reform in the General Court. Until such time as this occurs, heavier demands will continue to be placed on the local taxpayer, with no appreciable improvement in local education.

This is my last report and I want to take this opportunity to thank the members of the school boards, as well as those citizens who have served on numerous committees over the past years, for their support. I trust that my efforts, though seemingly small at times, have had some impact on the total educational program.
