First. To bring in your votes for

Town Clerk,
One Selectman for three years,
Tax Collector,
Town Treasurer
Highway Agent,
One Library Trustee for three years,
One Cemetery Trustee for three years,
One Trust Fund Trustee for three years,
Three Auditors.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.

Third. To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes for the year 1932.

Fourth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town charges.

Fifth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the repairing of highways and appropriate the same.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a McCormick Deering tractor and Warko grader, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Seventh. To see what action the Town will take in regard to paying the over draft \$2,769.14 on building Chester road, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Eighth. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to discontinuing the road near Dearborn Mill.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 for the repair of bridges and appropriate money for the same.

Tenth. To see what action the Town will take in regard to putting in steel girders and cement on Deer Neck bridge and raise and appropriate money for same.

Eleventh. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discontinuing the roads abandoned when the new cement road was built.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for improvement of the road in No. 4 district.

Thirteenth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Trunk Line Road.

Fourteenth. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and set apart an additional sum equal to fifty per cent of the amount required by section 4, chapter 35, Laws 1905 relating to State Highways.

Fifteenth. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State Aid Road.

Sixteenth. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000 for the purchase of a Fire pumper and equipment, such as hose, ladders, tank and truck, and appropriate the same. By petition of thirteen signers.

Seventeenth. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$700 for the repair of the Mead and Morrison tractor now owned by the Town. By petition of twenty-seven signers.

Eighteenth. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 for the purchase of the red barn of Frank Prescott near the blacksmith shop, for the purpose of storing Town road equipment, and other property, or some other suitable building. By petition of ten signers.

Nineteenth. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the cutting of bushes along the highway.

Twentieth. To see what action the Town will take for proper observance of Memorial Day, and choose a committee for same.

Twenty-first. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the H. B. Burnham fund income being expended for library or school benefit.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Auburn:

In this, his third annual report, the Superintendent wishes to consider financial economy made possible through smaller school enrollment, relocation of schools and transportation, and improved health facilities.

ENROLLMENT AND ORGANIZATION

In the last two years the pupil enrollment in the schools of Auburn has decreased from one hundred fifty to one hundred thirty children. This decrease has been particularly evident in the grammar room of the Severance school. Here in September only fifteen pupils were occupying a room equipped for thirty-five. To maintain in Auburn the average of twenty-five pupils per teacher room, as suggested in districts receiving state aid, it became evident that eventually either the two rooms at Severance must be combined in one room of all eight grades or a combination made with the nearest one-room school.

In September, upon request of Miss Quinn, teacher of the Severance grammar school, for release from her contract with the school board of Auburn, permission was granted. To fill this vacancy, the school board and Superintendent felt that there was need of some combination that would retain an experienced teacher in charge of this grammar school. To meet the emergency Mrs. Brown, teacher of No. 7 school, was immediately transferred to Severance and, with the exception of two pupils who entered the Village school, the eight grades of the No. 7 school were combined with the two-room graded school at Severance.

Although this combination necessitated the transportation of the majority of the children from the No. 7 school, it has effected a net saving to the taxpayers of approximately

four hundred dollars. To the pupils it has given teachers particularly adapted to their grades, longer periods of instruction in subject matter, and those competitive interests derived from contacts with larger classes.

At Bunker Hill there occurred the only additional change in organization. Here Beatrice S. Clark was elected to succeed Miss Labbeé who accepted a departmental position in the schools of Rochester. Upon the withdrawal of Mrs. Clark in October, Miss Frances E. Illsley of Auburn, a 1931 graduate of Plymouth Normal school, was elected teacher.

Auburn is now maintaining three one-room schools in addition to the two-room school at Severance.

RELOCATION OF SCHOOLS AND TRANSPORTATION

Last year it was brought to the attention of your school authorities that all children being transported over the route from Chester Road to the Bunker Hill school were living within the two-mile limit of their school. Hence this route no longer entitled Auburn to state aid money. To meet the situation this Bunker Hill route, which would have cost the district alone over four hundred dollars a year, was discontinued.

To better accommodate the children thus deprived of transportation, and to improve the building facilities at a minimum of expense, the building formerly used at the No. 2 school was abandoned and the No. 1 building on the Chester Road opened.

During the summer the interior of the latter building was thoroughly renovated and equipped with individual seats and desks. Access was provided by separate passageways leading directly from the schoolroom to toilets and woodshed.

Although the school grounds at No. 1 are more ample than those at the No. 2 school, the Superintendent strongly recommends that closely woven wire fence be placed on the boundary between the school property and the public highway.

HEALTH FACILITIES

All one-room schools in Auburn are now equipped with indirect heating and ventilating systems that not only contribute to the health and convenience of the pupils but can be operated more economically than the open stoves.

The problem of adequately heating and at the same time properly ventilating the classrooms of the Severance school is difficult to solve since there is only one chimney and this is situated in the corridor at some distance from the rooms. A somewhat expensive, but efficient means, of correcting this lack of ventilation would be by the erection of an outside chimney to serve each room.

At Severance the use of a large drinking fountain with bubbler attachment has been adopted to eliminate the annual expenditure for paper drinking cups.

Hot lunches are now being served during the winter in the majority of your schools. At Severance the materials are generously provided and deliciously prepared by the community club. This service is a real asset to health and mental efficiency.

I wish to call attention to the valuable work continued by your school nurse. Her report for last year will be found under a separate heading. This year her frequent and thorough inspections of the schools during the appearance of scarlet fever and chicken pox were appreciated by parents and teachers. Through the extension of her services in other school districts and the reduced pupil enrollment in the schools of Auburn, there has been a reduction of sixty-five dollars in the portion of the nurse's salary paid by Auburn.

IN CONCLUSION

Although the number of pupils attending public high schools and academies demands this year an increased appropriation for tuitions, you are enabled by consolidation and relocation of schools to reduce by several hundred dol-

lars the total sum derived from taxation for all school purposes.

This year, with one exception, experienced teachers have been retained in all of your schools. Such experience is a valuable asset to efficient schools and a source of educational economy not to be overlooked.
