*To the inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in
Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Adams Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officials for the year ensuing.
2. To choose three delegates to represent the Town at a convention to be holden at Concord on the first Wednesday of June next for the purpose of revising the Constitution of the State.
3. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges and for other necessary charges arising in said Town.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post, No. 45,

Department of New Hampshire, Grand Army of the Republic, to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of the highways in accordance with the provisions of Section 4, of Chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Derry Public Library and for the maintenance of said Library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will vote to install the following hydrants:

One near the corner of Grove and Park Sts.

One near the corner of East Broadway and Boyd Road.

One near the corner of West Broadway and Elm Sts.

One near the junction of the Brook and Fordway Sts.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Taylor Library at East Derry, and for the maintenance of said Library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to build a concrete walk on the southerly side of Fairview Avenue, commencing on Birch Street at the corner of Fairview Avenue at the southerly side of said Avenue and continuing on the southerly side to Berry St.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept a legacy of

\$1,000 left to it by the will of Lucretia Hopkins late of Reading, Mass., also to see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of the homestead of the said Lucretia Hopkins in Derry Village, left to it by said will, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote, to exempt from taxes for a period of ten years, The Derry Realty Association Shoe Factory, the same now being occupied by the Emerson Pennington Company.

TO THE CITIZENS OF DERRY:

The Board of Water Commissioners present herewith their fourth annual report.

The year 1911 was not one of special activity in business in this town. There was not much building and consequently but few applications for new water services.

The standpipe which was in a very bad condition inside was thoroughly scraped and painted in May. It should have another coat of paint this year. Any repairs on the inside were thought impossible before owing to the drouth and the necessity of keeping the standpipe full all the time. While it was empty, about a week, the pumps were kept running con-

stantly. A duplicate standpipe is certainly needed, and would be an economical investment. During the autumn 357 feet of six-inch cast iron pipe were laid connecting High street, down Jefferson to Maple street. This connected the dead end at the Emerson-Pennington Company shoe factory with High street and made a circuit back to the pumping station. This improved the whole service west of Beaver brook, and was much needed. Four of the old Coffin hydrants have been replaced with improved Corey Stearner hydrants.

Meters are giving general satisfaction here as they are in other places, and 55 were installed during the year. We find a marked decrease in the amount of water used as the installment of meters increases.

The machinery at the pumping station is in as good condition as could be expected considering the years it has been in use. A new modern pump is strongly recommended as the saving in fuel would be considerable. All running expenses, interest on bonds, etc., have been paid, and \$4,050 have been paid the town on the principal, during the year.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEB. 1912

There is but little to be added to the Librarians report which with that of the Treasurer is herewith presented. That report shows a continued increase in the patronage of the library, and we believe that its increasing worth to the community is apparent. During the past year it was deemed wise to make a small charge for cards issued to non-residents and perhaps a word of explanation may not be out of place in this report. When the library was opened it was not thought best to confine its benefits within an area quite as narrow as that bounded in some directions by simply geographical limits. Quite a number of people residing just outside our town were so closely identified with us in many ways that practically they were citizens, in some instances owning property and paying taxes in Derry. To such the privileges of the library were given. But as time passed, application for cards come in such increasing numbers from people living at a great distance in the different surrounding towns, that it was found necessary to curtail the out of town circulation in order that our own people might be better served. To accomplish this, a nominal charge of one dollar was made for each card issued to a non-resident. As between 50 and 60 books can be charged upon each card and as the subscriber is entitled to an additional non-fiction card upon which the

same number may be had, it will be seen that the use of the books can be had for less than one cent each, which is not an excessive charge when compared with that usually made by circulating libraries, 2 cents per day for a single book. The result has fully met our expectations as will be seen by the number of cards now held by that class of patrons, as reported by the librarian.

The "open system" of distributing books is still continued and is, we believe, far more satisfactory to our patrons than would be that of selecting from a catalogue, and it is a very creditable showing that while the public has had free access to the shelves, not one book has been wrongly taken therefrom and of the more than 26,000 loaned during the year only two are unaccounted for. This is doubtless partly due to the carefulness with which delinquents are reminded of their remissness in keeping books longer than is allowed. This is done first by mail, and when necessary by messenger. Impartial exactness in the collection of fines, on account of overdue books, also contributed largely to the result.

The expense of maintaining the library has increased considerably from different causes. So large a circulation, with comparatively so few books, even with careful usage, necessitates much repairing, and that only 24 vols. have been withdrawn because of unfitness for further use, is due to the fact that more than 3000 have been repaired by the librarian and competent assistants during the last year. This work takes time and involves extra expense. As the books become more worn this expense will increase as well as that of re-binding when new covers are necessary.

New shelving will be required this year at an expense of

not less than \$50, beside other additional expense and the suggestion of our librarian that an increased appropriation from the town is desirable, is worthy of the consideration of all, who would like to see the library made of the largest possible benefit to the town. Its present capacity for usefulness is certainly greatly lessened by lack of funds.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY:

The seventh annual report is herewith presented:—The Library has been open for the delivery of books on Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 3 to 5 o'clock, on Saturday afternoons from 2 till 6 o'clock and every evening from 6 to 9 o'clock, except Sundays and legal holidays. The reading room has been open every day from 2 to 5 o'clock and from 6 to 9 o'clock except Sundays and holidays.

The statistics show, as in all previous reports, increasing circulation. The increase is not as large as in some years, nevertheless the past month, January, had the largest circulation of any single month in the history of the library, 2,691 volumes were loaned during the month. The increase in circulation this year has been in adult reading matter and mostly in the non-fiction classes. Juvenile circulation

has decreased slightly. Unbound magazines have been more freely circulated, also the bound volumes, many of have been bound at the library.

Greater care than ever has been used in the selection of the new books, for owing to the increased cost of books, the number purchased has been less than in previous years. Only one complete set, "Messages and Papers of the Presidents," in XI volumes has been added.

If the library is to continue adding as many new books as it has in the past, more money will have to be appropriated for this purpose, and if the library work increases as it has steadily every year since it was opened, more service will be required to satisfactorily meet the demands of the public. The number of hours when the books are delivered should be increased in the near future, and on Saturdays two persons should be on duty both afternoon and evening. The cost of rebinding is increasing each year as the books are wearing out more rapidly. A new book stack will be needed in the early spring. If a larger appropriation could be secured, it could be used in a great many ways to increase the efficiency of the library.

The new magazine racks which were added to the reading room last summer, have been very helpful in keeping the reading tables in a more attractive condition and they also display the magazines to a much better advantage. The new desk chair is also in service and the remodeled desk is a great convenience.

In June I invited about 30 neighboring librarians to meet at this library. This followed a similar meeting at the Manchester City library. Eight out-of-town librarians were

present. A demonstration of book repairing was given by Miss Caroline Clement of Manchester, and a profitable afternoon was spent in the discussion of library problems. I also attended the New Hampshire Library Association which met at the Portsmouth Public library and received some valuable suggestions for library work.

Since the rule for non-resident patronage went into effect in June, seven non-residents have availed themselves of the privileges of the library by the payment of \$1.00.

Your librarian has had the services of Miss Hazel T. Rowe in the repairing and such service will continue to be needed. This is in addition to the work your assistant librarian, Mrs. Florence M. Nichols, is doing on Saturday.

The inventory has been taken as usual and with the exception of two volumes lost through circulation, every book can be accounted for.

10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell the schoolhouse in District No. 9 and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The School Board of the Town School District begs to submit to the inhabitants of the District the following report for the year ending February 15th, 1912, together with an estimate for the coming year to end February 15th, 1913.

The Supervisory District this year is composed of the same towns as it was last year, namely: Londonderry, Windham and Derry.

Mr. Arthur W. Reynolds was re-elected superintendent at a salary of fourteen hundred dollars.

The West side school is becoming somewhat crowded and it is only a question of time when part of the children attending that school will have to be transferred to the Oak Street school, where we have one room at present not occupied.

At the Oak Street school much time has been lost this winter because of the difficulty of heating the building on extremely cold days. Something should be done to remedy the situation in regard to the heat at this school. Mr. Benson, the janitor has worked very faithfully and conscientiously and has done as much as any person possibly could do to keep the building warm without success. We wish especially to commend him for the manner in which he has performed his duties.

Both school buildings at the Depot have been cared for in an excellent manner as far as janitor service is concerned.

All the district schools are running with the exception of the school in District No. 9. The scholars in this district are well accommodated in the schools at the Depot. Those who live too far away to walk are being conveyed. The school house in District No. 9, is deteriorating fast and it is a question for the district to decide whether or not they wish to sell the building. At the present time it is about as convenient for the children to come to the schools at the Depot as it is for them to walk to that school house.

In District No. 5 a new hard wood floor has been laid and adjustable desks and chairs have been ordered.

During the past year we have endeavored to run the schools in the most economical manner. We have paid all the outstanding bills of the District excepting notes. Owing to a misunderstanding, for which no one can be blamed, twenty-four hundred dollars which the School Board supposed they would have for the payment of notes during the year was not raised, but by most careful economy, we have paid two notes, one of twelve hundred dollars and one of three hundred and twenty dollars and still were able to show a balance of eighteen hundred dollars at the end of the fiscal year.

We would advise the payment this year of two or more of the notes which are outstanding against the District.

The following is an estimate of the amount required to meet the statutory obligations and this report is a notice to the selectmen required by law: Books and supplies, seven hundred dollars; flags and appurtenances, twenty-five dollars; estimate for the year ending February 15th,

1913, to be appropriated at the District meeting; for notes and interest, twenty-eight hundred dollars; for the following purposes: salaries and expenses of School Board, salary of truant officer, salaries of other district officers, for teachers' salaries, minor repairs, janitors, fuel and incidental expenses, eight thousand dollars above the amount required by law.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE DERRY TOWN DISTRICT.

I hereby submit to you and through you to the citizens of Derry, my third annual report, which is the seventh in the series of superintendent's reports.

As all our teachers were re-elected last June, and as all but two accepted, we have very nearly the same staff as last year. Miss Cora B. Goodwin was transferred to the Oak Street School to the grade formerly taught by Miss Rose B. Chase, and her place at East Derry was filled by Mrs. Bertha Wiggins; Miss Clarissa G. Hall, who has entered the Normal school, was replaced at District No. 5 by Miss Alice B. Ingham. Shortly after the beginning of the year Miss Sylvia M. Dinsmoor resigned to enter a business position, and was succeeded at No. 4 by Miss Mina A. Boyd. In November Miss Marion H. Blood accepted an election at Beverly, Mass., and Miss Margaret M. Winn was transferred from District No. 8 to her place at the West side. Miss Katherine Kennefick was placed at No. 8.

Thus we have but four new teachers in a corps of twenty-two; all of these are trained teachers, and all except one are experienced. They, as well as those who have been here longer, are doing excellent work.

During the spring term of 1911 we were saddened by the death of our supervisor of music, Mrs. Florence Hood. For several years Mrs. Hood had devoted herself to her work, and had met with great success. Through her bright and cheerful manner of dealing with the children and her patience and perseverance in overcoming obstacles she had endeared herself to teachers and pupils alike, and all mourned her loss as that of a true and helpful friend. Her work is now being successfully carried on by Miss Marguerite E. Clark of Derry.

The following table showing the important figures for the years 1905-1912 will, I am sure, be of considerable value for purposes of reference. The figures for 1912 are, however, only approximate, although they are sufficiently accurate to be used; not until the end of the school year in June can the correct statistics be reckoned.

I wish to call attention to several very interesting facts that are shown by this table.

In the first place it is apparent that in 1910-11 our average membership was the smallest since 1905, the decrease being due to the period of business depression through which we were then passing. At the present time, on the other hand, we have more pupils than ever before. This rapid

growth is the most interesting and striking feature of the year and is full of meaning. It has been chiefly in the two large buildings, as is shown by the following table:

Especially significant is the condition at the West Side building, where there is an average of nearly forty pupils to a teacher. If this continues to grow, we shall soon be overcrowded here. Indeed we have already found it necessary to divide the second grade and give a division of it to the teacher of the sub-primary room. It has not been possible to transfer any of these children to the Oak Street building, as the second grade there has forty pupils.

At the Oak Street school the sixth grade has overgrown the capacity of a single room, and has had to be divided. If we are forced to the necessity of carrying on two sixth grades, the old problem of lack of room will again face us.

Our per cent. of attendance took a gratifying step ahead last year, and there is every indication that it will not recede

this year. For this excellent showing we are indebted largely to the teachers, who by maintaining a spirited competition between the children of the different grades, have largely settled the matter of truancy. Their efforts have been ably seconded by efficient work on the part of the truant officer.

The steady increase in the cost of teaching is due mainly to the better wages being paid our teachers. The sudden jump from 1910 to 1911 was caused in part also by the decrease in pupils in 1911, which naturally gave a larger average. In 1912 the average will drop again on account of the large number of pupils per teacher. In the state of New Hampshire the cost of teaching per pupil for the years 1907 to 1910 has been respectively, \$15.09, \$15.84, \$17.04, \$18.16, so that we have no reason to feel that we are paying too much.

These figures are, however, subject to erroneous interpretation. As a matter of fact no distinction should be made between what is called the sub-primary grade and the first grade, for both are doing, or attempting to do, the same work, and both are really first grade. It follows, therefore, that those pupils who are reported in the above table as promoted from the sub-primary grade are in reality not promoted at all, but are merely sent to a new teacher to be

put through the same process for the second time. In order to be actually promoted from the sub-primary class the pupil would have to enter the second grade.

I believe that we have here a serious waste. This high retardation in the primary grades is conspicuous all over New Hampshire, and I cannot refrain from quoting briefly from the words of State Superintendent H. C. Morrison, who in speaking of the subject in his report for 1909-10, gives the the following causes:

“(a) Children are admitted to the first grade in large numbers before they are old enough to carry on the formal work of the schoolroom. It has been well understood, both by wise laymen and by scientists, that most children ought not to attempt the formal work of the schoolroom before the age of seven or eight. Hundreds are placed in school at five, or even less. Result, thirty-two per cent not promoted and nine per cent retained in the grade two years. (He refers here to the state at large). Here is an accumulation of left-overs which lasts from grade to grade, growing older all the time, becoming more and more hopeless, and furnishing a larger and larger percentage of arrested development until it leaves school in the upper primary somewhere. This “bunch” has by that time become retarded four years or more and has acquired most of the characteristics of hopelessness which will last it through life,—beaten before it began.

What shall be done? Remove the cause. That means either admit no children whatever below the age of six, or preferably keep them in a good kindergarten from five to seven.”

“(b) Another chief cause of the retardation of the primary school is to be found in the fact that the lower primary is the hardest point in the system in which to keep up regular attendance, and this is apt to be due, again, to premature admission. Parents keep young people at home, as is often necessary, for many days, often an entire term at a time. The result, of course, is an overgrown first grade the following year, the condition becomes chronic, and the schools carry a burden which is an injustice to the taxpayer and to the children themselves.

“The remedy is the same as in the former case. Discourage premature admissions and require children under the age of eight to be sent with reasonable regularity or not at all.”

These words describe the conditions in Derry with all faithfulness. In receiving children under six into our schools we are burdening ourselves with the necessity of supporting at least one teacher, who might be dispensed with, with no loss to any one, merely by raising the age limit to six years.

There are in our schools today a considerable number of children, many of them from ten to fourteen, who need the service of a special teacher. We are constantly receiving pupils, for example, who are unfamiliar with the English language, and others who, through some lack of opportunity in earlier years, have been kept far behind. I recommend that a capable teacher be obtained at once and set to work upon these children.

At the close of last year, diplomas were given to thirty-seven graduates of the eighth grade; three of these pupils were residents of Londonderry who had attended our schools. Of the thirty-four Derry children thus certified, twenty-four

entered Pinkerton Academy in September. At the end of the fall term there were in the Academy eighty-three pupils from the Town District.

In closing this report, I wish to urge upon the parents the importance of becoming familiar with what is going on in the schools. Visitors are always welcome in any of the rooms; the teachers are at all times glad to explain methods, and to talk over what is being accomplished. It is only by becoming acquainted with any institution that we can fit ourselves to pass judgment upon it.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

DISTRICT, NO. 2.

To the Board of Education of the Derry Special School District:

I respectfully submit herewith my third annual report.

During the past year and a half we have been so fortunate as to have no change in teachers, and in our grammar room we have had no change for several years. I feel that the district is well satisfied with the wisdom of such permanency of teaching force; to all certainly who have had an opportunity to compare our schools with others that have suffered frequent changes the advantage cannot fail to be very apparent.

We are fortunate too, in that each of our teachers is enabled to have several grades to care for. It has been well said, that under right conditions the unclassified graded school is the ideal one, for in it each pupil may advance as rapidly as he is capable of doing, and, instead of being held back with a class, may if advisable, do work in two or even more different grades. This condition we have and much loss and waste of time and effort are thus being saved.

Our total enrollment for 1910-11 was 60; average membership 50.7; average attendance 46.34 and per cent. of

attendance 91.4. This year the corresponding figures up to March 1, 1912 are, enrollment 53; average membership 47.9; average attendance 44.6; per cent. of attendance 93.1.

Eleven pupils graduated from our eighth grade last June, one of whom is a resident of Londonderry. Of the ten who live in the district all but one entered Pinkerton Academy. These pupils have shown themselves well fitted and are doing excellent work.

The needed change in the location of one of the furnaces was made during the summer, with the result that we have had little or no trouble in heating the building this winter. I would suggest that the cold air box of this furnace be so adjusted as to make it possible in ordinary weather to obtain a better supply of fresh air. This change, though of the utmost importance, is of a trifling nature, and can be made with little outlay.

I would also have the windows of both rooms fitted with common shades. The shades now in use are unsanitary and almost worthless for keeping out the sun. What are needed are plain curtains of suitable color, so arranged as to roll at the bottom of the window.

For two or three years our flag-pole has been unfit for use. It would be wise to replace it with a new one, for as it now is we are unable to comply with the law which requires each building to display the flag on every suitable day.

I thank the Board, parents, teachers, and pupils for their cooperation and support.
